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T. H. Johnson Tells of Big Event in England While He Was There Recently

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Ransomed by Lady Mayoress After Payment of Sum for Infirmary at That Place

Telling how the Rotary Club of Hull, England, organized a riot for the purpose of raising money for the Hull infirmary for which a quarter of a million dollars was collected, T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company entertained the Rotary Club at his luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Johnson told of making the presentation to the Hull club sent through him from the Prince Rupert club and the wonderful reception he was given. The amount was small but it was the idea behind it that pleased the English people.

During the campaign for the infirmary a Rotary week was organized, something like ten thousand dollars being realized from the sale of badges and stickers on the streets. The badge "Rotary pleads for Infirmary Needs" was used everywhere. There were Zulu camps, bandit bands, and all sorts of devices for extracting money, much of which was gathered in the form of pennies, several tons being collected.

A feature of the campaign was the arrest of the Lord Mayor. It was announced that the Rotarians were to arrest him. The following day the newspapers announced that the Lord Mayor had escaped and left the district. A day later it was said that the police were searching everywhere for the Mayor and then he was captured and officially brought back to the city in chains with a noose around his neck and carried through the streets with a galloping in front of him and finally the lady Mayoress paid for his release.

Another stunt was the renting of one of the public parks and making people pay a shilling each to go in and see the sports, fireworks and races. During the week the sum of \$100,000 was raised by the Rotary Club, mostly in small donations.

Mr. Johnston told of his flight to Paris by airplane, of the trip to Mount Vesuvius at a time when it was active, of the gondoliers of Venice and other interesting sights.

Terrible Tragic Ending to Fete in England When 11 Boys Burned to Death

GILLINGHAM, England, July 12.—While laughing thousands watched what they thought part of a fire fighting show, eleven boys of the naval cadets and firemen were burned to death here last night. Six were seriously injured and taken to St. Bartholemew's Hospital, in aid of which the fete had been held.

The specially erected model house designed to be the scene of a gala fire brigade rescue spectacle became instead a horrifying death-trap for the twelve to fourteen-year-old boys. The youngsters were dressed in clown suits and were on the floor when the structure caught fire and they made frenzied efforts to get out of the flames, bringing great applause from the crowd that did not at first realize that the acting had suddenly become a tragic reality.

Frantic mothers and fathers crowded into the little mortuary here this morning seeking the bodies of their sons.

MAY BE OIL GRAHAM ISD.

People of Islands Becoming Excited Over Possibilities for Queen Charlottes

QUEEN CHARLOTTE CITY, JULY 12.—People on the islands are beginning to get excited over the prospect of another oil boom here.

The arrival of experts to look over the prospects in the neighborhood of Yakoun River and of one or two people from Prince Rupert who are interested in the oil possibilities here has had a stimulating effect and is reminding local people that there are evidences of oil at a good many points on Graham Island, such as seepages, paraffin wax and rich oil shales.

The oil men from California, who had been told that nobody lived on the islands, were agreeably surprised to find here a flourishing little community with a good steamship service by way of the Canadian National. They are planning to spend some time on Graham Island and make a thorough investigation of surface indications for oil.

POOR CROPS ON THE PRAIRIES

Wheat Pool Estimates Them at Only 65 Per Cent of Normal

WINNIPEG, July 12.—Western Canada's wheat crop is only 65 per cent of normal, due to excessive drought in all three prairie provinces, according to the crop statement issued by the Canadian Wheat Pool today.

In the Peace River district of Alberta, where reports had previously been promising, crops have deteriorated appreciably during the past two weeks.

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Goose Island Seizure Is Before the Court

Skipper of United States Boat Tells Why He Was in Canadian Harbor in May Last Before Being Taken to Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, July 12.—That the United States fishing vessel May struck a ledge of rock off Gander Island, bending her propeller and damaging the fresh water tank aboard and then proceeded to Goose Harbor anchorage to have a survey made of her condition, was the reason given by Captain B. M. Jensen, master of the craft, in the admiralty court here yesterday for her presence in Goose Harbor when the cruiser Malaspina seized the vessel on May 6 last.

The hearing opened in condemnation of the proceedings against the U. S. fishing craft May. Captain Laird of the Malaspina told of a conversation he had with the captains of the May and Puritan on board the Malaspina. He claimed that when asked why the May was in Goose Harbor, the master of that vessel did not answer.

"I asked him if he came in for rest and he answered 'yes.' A few seconds later he offered the excuse that he came in to take off the cylinder head of the ship's engine. I asked him why he did not say that in first place and he said he had. I stated he had not. Then he answered, 'If you fellows are going to take it that way I won't say any more.'"

The May was taken to Prince Rupert under her own power and there turned over to the customs department.

NEW YORK, July 12.—The New York Giants gained an even break with the Chicago Cubs in a double-header today by winning a wild second game. The Cubs outthrew the Giants, but the home team bunched its blows. Hack Wilson hit his twenty-first and twenty-second homers and Melvin Ott his twenty-fifth.

Cincinnati Reds made it two in a row from the Boston Braves, while the Pittsburgh Pirates took their second straight from the Phillies. The St. Louis Cardinals evened up a series with Brooklyn Robins.

In the American League, Washington Senators found Jimmy Zinn's pitching easy and defeated Cleveland Indians.

The Detroit Tigers worked a triple play in the seventh, but lost a heavy hitting game to Boston Braves.

New York at Chicago and Philadelphia at St. Louis were rained out.

SMITHERS BOY IS COMMITTED

David Jones Will Face Manslaughter Charge at Assizes Here in Fall As Result of Auto Fatalities

David Lewis Jones, aged nineteen, was committed for trial by Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hoskins at Smithers on Wednesday on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the deaths of Isaac Carlson and Uno Ferner in an automobile fatality on the Duthie Mine road near Smithers on the night of June 29. It is alleged that Jones, who was in charge of the death car, was under the influence of liquor.

The accused is in the lock-up at Smithers, no application for bail having yet been made. The case will come up at the fall session of the Supreme Court Assizes in Prince Rupert.

C. P. R. AND NORTHERN B. C.

There is considerable discussion going on in regard to what the C. P. R. means by the purchase of the railway at Stewart. Primarily doubtless the idea is to provide an outlet for the George Copper and other mines which the Consolidated already owns or controls. The railway was necessary to them.

But the subject of discussion is whether it is the intention of the railway company to continue the line through the mountain into the Groundhog country and possibly on into the Peace. Very likely even the C. P. R. heads do not themselves know what they will do in this regard. Much will depend upon what stand is taken by the C. N. R. and what developments take place at other points. What is certain now is that the C. P. R. will have a northern outlet, whether it be at Stewart or at Prince Rupert or at both, and that this will virtually affect the matter of northern transportation. The probability is that in years to come the output of Northern Alberta and Northern B. C. will be divided between the Hudson Bay and Northern British Columbia.

SHIPMENT OF SILK

At the present time the C. P. R. ships its silk and tea and other Orinetal products through Vancouver. The trains have to climb the grade of the Kicking Horse valley which is costly and slow. By shipping through Prince Rupert or Stewart the trains could reach New York well ahead of the present schedule and without the expensive gradient. At Prince Rupert there are already docks that could serve the ships and doubtless the C. N. R. would gladly lease them their big dock for the purpose. The ships could take part cargoes of wheat, if necessary, and also lumber. Developments here in the matter of the lumber business and future developments in other lines all seem to indicate that this north country will be very busy, that it will get its share of shipping and that eventually a big city will be built here that will be one of the big seaports of the world.

A busy man does not hate anybody. He has not time. But there is one exception. He hates the bore who utilizes his time and gives nothing in return.

SNOWDEN AND THE PREFERENCE

When Chancellor of the Exchequer Snowden spoke of the unsoundness of the preference, he was probably discussing the tariffs as they applied to Britain and had no thought of Canada. Mr. Snowden is a new minister and possibly has not acquired the art of thinking imperially. Also there is a disposition for the Labor leaders to speak for themselves instead of for the government of which they are a part.

The general trend of the day is toward a fiscal policy for the Empire. Trade follows the flag and also the flag is kept waving by the trend of trade. At any rate, that is the view of Conservatives in Canada who turned down the Reciprocity Treaty with United States because of a fear that closer union would follow.

Were it not for British sentiment it would be a great advantage to Canada to form a fiscal union by which there would be absolutely free trade between that country and this, but a tariff wall against the rest of the world. Also there would be freedom of access from one part of the continent to the other. The bar to that is the British allegiance. If the British leaders are now going to throw down the advances of Canada, it will be for this country to take such action as may best forward her own interests.

However, we do not feel that Mr. Snowden is speaking for his Government. In other matters the Labor leaders have shown themselves to be imperialists and doubtless they will see the light in this regard.




