# Canada May Refuse Clearance to Liquor for the United States Result of Campaign in Its Favor

OTTAWA, July 12.—The impression is growing here PREFERENCES that the Dominion Government may modify its policy in PREFERENCES respect to granting liquor clearances to the United States. In fact, it would cause no great surprise to some observers if the cabinet went all the way and complied with the request of the United States to refuse altogether liquor clearances to that country.

Whether these forecasts are correct or not, there can be no doubt that recent developments throughout the country along the Detroit River caused violent repurcussions. During the last session of Parliament there were severa? petitions from religious and temperance bodies asking that clearances be refused. These formal protestations were mild compared with the telegrams and letters which pour in on ministers of the crown these days. These are coming from every province and while they are not made public it has become known that many of them do not mince words in expressing the opinions of the writers about the present policy of permitting clearance of liquor to the United States in contravention of the dry laws of that nation.

The Government is accused of fearing the liquor interests. The accusations against them are said to take in a tremendous range.

(Winnipeg Free Press) Hon. Herbert M. Marler, who has been appointed as Canada's minister to Japan, will leave shortly for Tokio. His going to this now post has taken on greater importance since the government decided last year on the policy of sending a minister to Japan. Canada, is faced now with greater necessity of finding other markets for her products which the United States shows an increasing tendency to exclude, and there are very great possibilities of developing trade with the Orient.

Mr. Marler's qualifications for the embassy at Tokio are freely admitted and he is included in the general commendation that is given the Government, even by political opponents, for the selection of its ministers to other countries. He was honored a few days ago by a notable gathering in Montreal, his home city. At this banquet, Hon. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce, after expressing confidence in Mr. Marler, remarked very pointedly: "Canada is prepared to trade with countries that want to trade with her. There are countries which do not want to trade. There are countries which only want to sell, and, so far as I am concerned as Minister of Trade and Commerce, I am going to exert every ounce of influence which I possess in encouraging trade with those who really want to trade." # Is Before the Court

Skipper of United States Boat Tells Why He Was in Canadian Harbor in May Last Before Being Taken to Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, July 12.—That the United States fishing vesse May struck a ledge of rock off Gander Island, bending her propeller and damaging the fresh water tank aboard and then proceeded to Goose Harbor anchorage to have a survey made of her condition, was the reason given by Captain B. M. Jenson, master of the craft, in the admiralty court here yesterday for her presence in Goose Harbor when the cruiser Malaspina seized the vessel on May 6 last.

The hearing opened in condemnation of the proceedings against the U.S. fishing craft May. Captain Laird of the Malaspina told of a conversation he had with the captains of the May and Puritan on board the Malaspina. He claimed that when asked why the May was in Goose Harbor, the master of that vessel did not answer.

"I asked him if he came in for rest and he answered 'yes.' A few seconds later he offered the excuse that he came in to take off the cy inder head of the ship's engine. I asked him why he did not say that in first place and he said he had. I stated he had not. Then he answered, 'If you fellows are going to take it that way I won't say any more."

The May was taken to Prince Rupert under her own power and there turned over to the customs department.

GILLINGHAM, England, July 12 .- While laughing thousands watched what they thought part of a fire fighting show, eleven boys of the naval cadets and firemen were burned to death here last night. Six were seriously injured and taken to St. Bartholemew's Hospital, in aid of which the fete had been held.

11 Boys Burned to Death

The specially erected model house designed to be the scene of a gala fire brigade rescue spectacle became instead a horrifying death-trap for the twelve to fourteen-year-old boys.

The youngsters were dressed in clown suits and were on the floor when the structure caught fire and they made frenzied efforts to get out of the flames, bringing great applause from the crowd that did not at first realize that the acting had suddenly become a tragic reality. In five minutes the flames had destroyed the oil-soaked canvas and all that was left was the charred bodies of the youths and the gaunt skeleton of the model house.

Frantic mothers and fathers crowded into the little mortuary here this morning seeking the bodies of their sons.

### C. P. R. AND NORTHERN B. C.

There is considerable discussion going on in regard to what the C.P.R. means by the purchase of the railway at Stewart. Primarily doubtless the idea is to provide an outlet for the George Copper and other mines which the Consolidated already owns or controls. The railway was necessary to them.

But the subject of discussion is whether it is the intention of the railway company to continue the line through the mountain into the Groundhog country and possibly on into the Peace. Very likely even the C.P.R. heads do not themselves know what they will do in this regard. Much will depend upon what stand is taken by the C.N.R. and what developments take place at other points. What is certain now is that the C.P.R. will have a northern outlet, whether it be at Stewart or at Prince Rupert or at both, and that this will virtually affect the matter of northern transportation. The probability is that in years to come the output of Northern Alberta and Northern B. C. will be divided between the Hudson Bay and Northern British Co'umbia.

### SHIPMENT OF SILK

At the present time the C.P.R. ships its silk and teal and other Orinetal products through Vancouver. The trains have to climb the grade of the Kicking Horse valley which is costly and slow. By shipping through Prince Rupert or Stewart the trains could reach New York well ahead of the present schedule and without the expensive gradient. At Prince Rupert there are already docks that could serve the ships and doubtless the C.N.R. would gladly lease them their big dock for the purpose. The ships could take part cargoes of wheat, if necessary, and also lumber. Developments here in the matter of the lumber business and future developments in other lines all seem to indicate that this north country will be very busy, that it will get its share of shipping and that eventually a big city will be built here that will be one of the 66 big seaports of the world.
