## Real Punch Behind the United States Government's Campaign To Reduce the Cost of Living

### Hoarded Butter, Coffee, and Sugar Seized by Officials under the Food Control Act; Eleven Cents a Pound Set as Fair Price For Retailing Sugar.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Washington, August 15.—Indications of real punch behind the United States Government's campaign to reduce the high cost of living is given in unmistakable fashion. Already news has come from Chicago, St. Louis and Birmingham of seizures of great quantities of foodstuffs by federal officials who were recently instructed to proceed under the Food Control Act to stop hoarding.  
 In Chicago 1,282 tons of butter, worth \$50,000 was seized. In St. Louis, 284,180 lbs. of coffee which is showing rapid advances in price, and in Birmingham 100 barrels of sugar.  
 In connection with the price of sugar the Department of Justice has adjudged eleven cents a pound as a fair rate at which to retail the product.

## MISS DAVIS RESIGNS FROM SCHOOL BOARD

### New Trustee to be Elected at Time By-laws are Voted on.

At the meeting of the school board last evening the resignation of Miss Davis, school trustee, was considered and finally accepted with regret. A bye election will be held for the election of another trustee at the time the by-laws are voted on by the rate-payers.  
 The matter of another teacher for the High School was discussed at some length but in the absence of some of the members of the board the matter was laid over until this evening. It is almost essential that an additional teacher be obtained for the next term because in addition to a new senior matriculation class there will be many more students coming from the public schools and also a number of pupils are expected from outside points. The new teacher will take up the various branches of Mathematics and Science.

## CLOSE GAME BALL AGAINST OCEAN FALLS

### Score of 11 to 10 in Favor of Local Team in the Tenth Inning.

In the baseball game last evening between Prince Rupert and Ocean Falls the former was winner by a score of 11 to 10. The match was hotly contested throughout and at times it looked rather shady for the home team. At the end of the ninth the score was tied with ten runs each and both teams doing their best to get the advantage. In the tenth Rupert was successful in getting the extra run.

The tactics of last night's game were rather unusual and many of the fans were disappointed in the attitude which the players took in winning the game. The home team started out with Tinetti as pitcher and being a little wild he was yanked out to be replaced by Green, who had not even warmed up. Green was wild and just as he was settling down to pitch was replaced by Clementson who lasted for an inning. At last Harry Day took the box as the pulp makers were hitting Clem too easily to allow it to be continued. When the regular hurler took the box the score was 10 to 7 in favor of Ocean Falls, but by the end of the game the runs were equalled. Harry pitched crackerjack ball from the moment that he put the first one over. The Ocean Falls boys showed up splendidly although there were many loose plays by both teams during the game. The centre fielder pitched for seven innings but when the home boys began to find him, Burdon who pitched such an excellent game yesterday was put back into the box.  
 There were no exceptionally brilliant plays during the match and air-tight ball did not seem to be characteristic of the evening. In the first part of the game on account of Rupert's 4 runs gained in the first inning the local boys were not very keen, but when the tide turned they were right up on their toes and played hard. Excitement ran high. Towards the end the poor light worked against the pitchers as they could hardly get the benefit of the corners.

## NEW DEAL IN LIBERALISM

### MacKenzie King Chosen to Give Effect to New Policy, Says Special Correspondent.

MacKenzie King is leader of the liberal party of Canada because a majority of the convention decided on a new deal in liberal policies, says a special correspondent of the Edmonton Bulletin. They wanted a new man to give effect to a new policy and they wanted a Liberal, not a reactionary, to lead the Liberal party. It is reasonable to believe that the decision so spontaneously arrived at by the Liberal convention reflects liberal sentiment throughout the country. It is stated in the eastern press that eight provincial premiers and the leader of the provincial Liberal party in Ontario in caucus on Wednesday night decided to support Fielding. It is generally understood that they did support him in the general ballots. No wonder Sir Clifford thought it was all over but the shouting when he left the city on Thursday morning! As an advanced Liberal with an international reputation as a student, writer and public speaker, with an administrative parliamentary and governmental experience, with youth and vigor on his side and without any party entanglements, Hon. Mr. King enters upon the position of national Liberal leader singularly well equipped for the important duties of his position. It is to be hoped that his term of service will be as fruitful of good for Canada as that of his predecessor.

## PREMIER AND SMITHERS TO GREET PRINCE

### Chairman of Grand Trunk Board of Directors Leaves With Sir Robert Borden.

 Ottawa, August 15.—Sir Alfred Smithers, chairman of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway, left on the same train as Sir Robert Borden en route to greet the Prince of Wales.  
 Sir Alfred has been at Ottawa in conference with the Premier on the Government's proposals regarding the acquisition of the railway. It is understood that some definite proposal will be made to deal with the whole question at the coming session of parliament. In the meantime the G. T. P. will be operated by the receivers.

## Shopmen's Strike In United States Is Declared Off

### Men Return to Work on Saturday Next; Australian Seamen's Union also Advise men to return to Work After Being out Six Months.

 Chicago, August 15.—The shopmen's strike is off and the men will return to work on Saturday. The decision to return was arrived at by representatives of the strikers from widely scattered points throughout the country, after an all-day meeting.  
 A mass meeting of car repairers representing 27,000 strikers also decided to return to work.  
 The end of the strike will pave the way for international officers of the shop crafts to obtain action by railroad administrations.

Melbourne, August 15.—The Australian seamen's union has advised the strikers to return to work. The seamen's strike has lasted two months and has had the effect of tying up shipping in the south seas to a very large extent.

## FINED FOR HAVING BOTTLE OF LIQUOR

### James Jackson Threw Away Bottle When Caught—Pleaded Indigestion But Had to Pay.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMordie, James Jackson was fined \$50 for having liquor in his possession. The accused gave a long story to the magistrate explaining how it was possible for him to carry it if he had a prescription, but as this could not be produced in court, the plea of indigestion was not regarded as sufficient to allow him to go free.

The man was overtaken by Constable Adams last evening in front of the G. T. P. offices and on feeling the policeman's hand placed gently on his shoulder he threw the bottle over the bank. Luckily it alighted on the ash pile and rolled down the incline. After Mr. Adams had got his man to the station he returned to the spot and with the aid of Chief Vickers the evidence was recovered. When found, the bottle, which contained genuine liquor, was standing on end but the neck had been broken off in hitting a rock.

## SECURE SUGAR TO PRESERVE FRUIT CROP

### Trainloads of Sweetening Product Will be Sent Forward Immediately by Refiners.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Ottawa, August 15.—Immediate relief of the difficult sugar situation in the west is looked for as a result of a conference between representatives of the British Columbia Fruitgrowers Association and eastern sugar refiners with the member of the Dominion cabinet. The outcome is that sugar, literally by trainloads, will be sent forward by special arrangements with refiners and the railways.  
 The sugar supply will reach its destination in time to save the British Columbia fruit crop.  
 At present there is in B. C. 40,000 tons of preserved fruit, chiefly plums, prunes, peaches, pears and crab apples.

## BABCOCK SAYS FRASER SALMON THREATENED

### Sufficient Number of Fish Must Pass up River to Propagate, Says Expert.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Vancouver, Aug. 15.—Unless the state of Washington consents to join the Dominion in taking adequate steps to restrict the salmon fishing industry in Puget Sound and the Fraser River so that annually sufficient fish are permitted to reach the spawning beds of the Fraser River watershed, the industry so far as the Fraser River is concerned, will become commercially extinct," says J. P. Babcock, assistant provincial commissioner of fisheries.

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving full fulfillment of conditions of purchase.

## JAGGED HOLE TORN IN ENA SIX FEET LONG

When Freighter Went on Rock in Seymour Narrows Watertight Door Saved Her.

It was only the swift closing of the watertight door between the tunnel and the engine room, shutting off the rush of water that was roaring through a gash in her sides that prevented the C. P. R. freighter Princess Ena from going to the bottom of Seymour Narrows within ten minutes of her striking Ripple Rock.

The freighter was going through Seymour Narrows at 6:30 in the morning, about an hour before low tide. Captain Cliff was lying on the settee in his room, having come off duty about four hours before. He was awakened by the rolling of his vessel, and rushed below. The boat had struck Ripple Rock at an angle, and her stern had gone clean over, cutting a jagged hole for about six feet along either side of the keel, under the tunnel recess.

### Prompt Action Saved Ship.

The water poured into the tunnel with a roar, and rushed into the engine room. The men on duty jumped to the platform and screwed down the watertight door but not before the sea was several feet deep in the engine-room, and rising rapidly. Fortunately the door shut into place without delay. "That shows the advantage of keeping it in readiness for use," said Captain Cliff. Had any obstruction prevented the watertight door going into place quickly, the Ena would have sunk within ten minutes, the captain stated. He added that the rock penetrated the only part of the hull that was not double-bottomed.

Captain Cliff did not feel the jar of the impact with the rock, it being the rolling of the ship as she left the obstruction that aroused him.

### Lifeboats Swung Out.

Not knowing the extent of the damage, Captain Cliff ordered the lifeboats swung out in readiness. The Ena proceeded through the Narrows to Plumper Bay, where she anchored. The ship's pumps gradually cleared the engine-room of water, but the water gained slowly in the after hold, where it had seeped through from the tunnel.

Captain Cliff thought it best to make for some point where the vessel might settle in shoal water if necessary, and so at 2:30 in the afternoon the Ena proceeded south through the Narrows to Menzies Bay. There she lay at anchor in four fathoms for some hours, and when the tide went down she settled on the bottom, with the water about four feet below the waterline.

Early next morning the salvage ship Tees arrived on the scene, having left Victoria early on the previous afternoon with about 40 men aboard. Three pumps were put aboard the Ena, and Diver Donaldson went down and made a survey. It was found that the injured ship had settled upon the greater part of the hole, so that it was found necessary to await high tide, when she floated off into deep water. On Friday the diver went to work and placed patches over the damage on either side of the keel. This took all day, and at 6:30 the Ena started

### Ena's First Accident.

This is the first accident the Ena has been in on the coast that has caused water to get into her, and it is the first mishap Captain Cliff has had with his commands. Mate Palmer was on duty at the time of the striking of Ripple Rock. The fast tide that races through Seymour Narrows, causing treacherous eddies, makes it easy for a ship to be set off her course and on to the hidden rock over which the water swirls in mid-channel.

This will probably be the last salvage job done by the Tees, which is to be turned back to the C. P. R. again by the last of this month.

The Canadian Department of Mines has just issued a preliminary report on the economic geology of the Hazelton District, by J. J. O'Neill, which is published in booklet form with maps attached and is well illustrated. It should prove useful to those engaged in mining.
