Rights of Public On Streets Are Interestingly Stated In a Satire On Chancellor of England in Judgment

In his address to the Rotary Club at their luncheon yesterday afternoon, Milton Gonzales read a very interesting satire supposedly given by the Lord Chancellor in a case which had to do with the right to hold a political meeting in a public place. His Lordship is alleged to have said:

"Now. I have had occasion to refer before to the curious delusion that the British subject has a number of rights and liberties which entitle him to behave as he likes so long as he does no specific injury or harm. There are few, if any, such rights, and in a public street there are none, for there is no conduct in a public thoroughfare which cannot easily be brought into some unlawful category, however vague. If the subject remains motionless he is loitering or causing an obstruction; if he moves rapidly he is doing something which is likely to cause a crowd or a breach of the peace; if his glance is affectionate, it is annoying, and if it is hostile he is menacing, and in both cases he is insulting: if he
