United States and Britain Believed to be Close to Accord On the Matter of Disarmament

This Is General Opinion in London, Following Announcement of Premier's Trip to Washington; Will Strengthen Labor

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The impending visit of Premier Ramsay MacDonald to the United States is taken generally today as signifying that the London and Washington governments are very near to an accord on the matter of limitation of naval armament. His visit is expected to be short, possibly a week or more if he can spare the time.

When parliament reconvenes at the end of October Premier MacDonald, with a naval reduction agreement to his credit, would be immeasurably stronger with the house of commons than at any time since the inception of his government in June, the premier's friends believe.

MANDATE TO BE RETAINED

British Government Will Adhere To Balfour Declaration in Palestine

LONDON, England, Sept. 13.—Lord Passfield, secretary for the colonies, informed a deputation of Jews that there would be no question of the British government giving up the mandate for Palestine or departing from the policy embodied in the Balfour declaration of establishing in Palestine a national home for Jewish people.

Appeal Dismissed On Technicality

Action Against Peter Bruno Thrown Out of County Court; Dahlberg Case Stands

Because the appeal papers were made out for hearing on Tuesday, September 3, the day following Labor Day, instead of Monday, September 9, the first Monday after Labor Day, when the regular monthly session of county court was actually held, Judge Young, in county court today, dismissed the appeal of the crown against Peter Bruno, who was dismissed by Magistrate McClymont in police court some time ago on a charge of keeping liquor for sale. Milton Gonzales acted for Bruno, and W. E. Fisher for the crown. Date will be set later in another similar appeal—Rex vs. Dahlberg.

FRASER MILLS ARE CHAMPS

Won B. C. Baseball Title From Generals by Odd Game

VANCOUVER, Sept. 13.—Fraser Mills won the British Columbia baseball championship when they defeated Generals of Vancouver in the deciding game here by a score of 6 to 0. The Mills won four games and the Generals three.

It was hours before it could be determined the new record set, as it took rechecking and calculations to establish the fact.

BRIGHT PICTURE

J. W. Dafee Sees Canada as Leader in World Commerce and Financial Power

CALGARY, Sept. 13.—Canada as the hub of the world, bound by its location on the globe to be on the main stream of traffic both by air and land, was pictured by J. W. Dafee, editor of the Winnipeg Free Press, in addressing the Canadian Chamber of Commerce here today. Not only did Mr. Dafee see the Dominion holding a commanding position in world trade and ultimately in financial power but he prophesied that the world would also be dependent upon Canada which held the key to the great mineral treasure house of North America.

State Health Insurance Is Advocated At Convention by Provincial Hospital Chief

NANAIMO, Sept. 13.—The twelfth annual convention of the British Columbia Hospital Association opened here yesterday. Secretary Winthers reported seventy hospitals in the province, of which sixty-three are affiliated with the association.

Mr. Winthers submitted his resignation owing to illness. In his annual address President J. W. McVety of Vancouver, viewing from the standpoint of the hospitals, which lose from 35 to 50% of their accounts through inability or unwillingness of patients to pay, stated that health insurance should prove as advantageous in a general field as the Workmen's Compensation Act in a more limited field of industry accidents.

CAUSED HIS CONFIDENCE

Note From United States Believed To Have Made Ramsay MacDonald Hopeful

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Secretary Stimson says that the note sent to Ambassador Dawes might have caused Premier Macdonald of Great Britain to be "confident that there would be an agreement" between Britain and the United States on naval limitation.

LOWER TARIFF

Important Step Taken by British and French at Geneva

GENEVA, Sept. 13.—Great Britain and France today took a joint step toward bringing about a world conference on the lowering of tariff bars in the spirit of comments of European statesmen while discussing last week Premier Briand's project for a United States of Europe. Delegations of the two nations in the economic committee of the League of Nations recommended that negotiations be begun between members of the league and non-members as well as to promote the meeting at the earliest possible moment.

DR. KING, MINISTER OF FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, TO PAY VISIT WITH FARRIS

In the course of a tour of the province, Hon. Dr. J. H. SAVE A CHILD

Rightly enough, the school board complains that the city council has failed to provide a sidewalk on Sixth Avenue East, where daily small children, coming to and from school, perforce in the roadway, dodge many motor-vehicles rushing over that main artery. The board was told that every day there are hair raising escapes of children there. One of these days it may be something worse than an escape. If a child or children should be killed there would be a great hue raised to prosecute the unlucky driver and a great rush taken to put in the sidewalk.

If the city cannot see its way clear to put in a proper sidewalk, it should be possible to devise some temporary expedient to keep the children out of the road. Else that or close the street to motor traffic during the danger period. It should not be necessary to point out that a child's life, which may be saved, cannot be reckoned as against the expense or formalities involved in putting down the sidewalk. The school board is justified in its complaint and it is high time some action were taken to meet the situation.

MUST BE PROSPERITY

When men of the standing of William M Birks, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and one of Canada's leading business men, tells you that Canada's total trade stands fifth among the nations of the world, that she has the third best favorable trade balance and the best in the world per capita, there is nothing else for us to conclude than that Canada is not doing so badly after all, in spite of occasional howls of blue ruin we may hear.

There can be no gainsaying the fact that Canada as a whole is very prosperous today. There may be sections of the country that have not experienced that prosperity in as great degree as others. With a general improvement continuing, however, there can be no doubt that all parts of the Dominion will eventually feel it. Prosperity is in the air in Canada today.

MR. BENNETT KNOWS

No doubt if there were a Liberal government in power in British Columbia and a Conservative in Ottawa, Hon. R. B. Bennett would not say that the British Columbia Doukhobor problem was a Dominion and not a provincial matter. Here looks like a deliberate attempt to embarrass a problem that is already proving quite difficult enough.

Mr. Bennett knows very well that it is the duty of the provinces or the localities to enforce the law and to prosecute people who refuse to send their children to school, burn down buildings and stage nude parades. Who may have been responsible for the Doukhobors being here has nothing to do with the matter and it would only be presumption on the part of the federal authorities if they stepped in unless, of course, they might be asked.

When Attorney General Pooley has exhausted all other means of dealing with the situation and feels he must resort to that extreme, he may then seek to have the Doukhobors deported. Then the matter will have taken on federal aspect and will, no doubt, be dealt with by Ottawa on its merits.

RADIO RECOMMENDATIONS

Even more far reaching than might have been expected are the recommendations that have been made by the federal Royal Commission named to investigate the radio situation in Canada. Apparently, the commission has gone right to the bottom of things and has decided that if improvements are to be eventually carried out right, it might as well be now.

That it would be to the best interests of radio receivers at least to have Canadian radio broadcasting controlled by one big concern in many ways seems evident. It would be a big matter, however, which would have to be proceeded with slowly. One of the dangers is that it might become cumbersome.

No doubt, there will have to be much more discussion of this matter before any attempt is made to put the recommendations of the commission into operation.

JASPER GOLF NEAR FINALS

White of New York and Starkey of Edmonton Play Brilliant Game

JASPER, Alta., Sept. 13.—The semi-finals of the Totem Pole Trophy, the golf classic of Western Canada, now being contested on Jasper Park Lodge course will be played today, when Gardiner White of New York V. A. Newhall, Ben Cool and Herb Black of Calgary will meet in the final eliminations.

The feature of yesterday's matches was the battle fought between Gardiner White and Jack Starkey of Edmonton. From the first both played a brilliant brand of golf and although White won by three and one, Starkey was playing well to the top of his game and his driving and second shots reached almost the perfection mark. He was in the lead, one up at the sixth, but stymied himself at the seventh to lose the hole and make the match even. He lost the next three and halved the next three, won the fourteenth, to cut the lead against him down to two. He lost the next, "The Bad Baby," and was down dormie to three. At the sixteenth White missed a putt and Starkey took the hole. The finish came at the seventeenth when White took a four and Starkey needed a five.

There never was a dull minute during the match and the result was in doubt for most of the way.

Newhall defeated F. Hopkins of New York, by six and five. Black won over Martin Straith by five and four. Cool eliminated a fellow Calgarian, J. L. Bell. L. A. Walsh of Calgary, D. McDonald of Winnipeg, A. Straith of Victoria and Alex McKinnon of Edmonton advanced to the semi-finals of the first flight. Walsh won from Dr. Lowrie of Winnipeg five and four, McDonald defeated O. M. Schloss of New York three and two, Straith won from H. A. Louty of Vancouver at the nineteenth hole while McKinnon also had to go an extra hole against Jack Ruttan of Winnipeg to earn his bracket.

Walsh vs. McDonald and Straith vs. McKinnon are the pairings to decide the finalists. Dr. Campbell of Winnipeg, and H. E. Molson of Montreal will meet in the final of the third flight, the former having eliminated L. Orpen and the latter S. May.

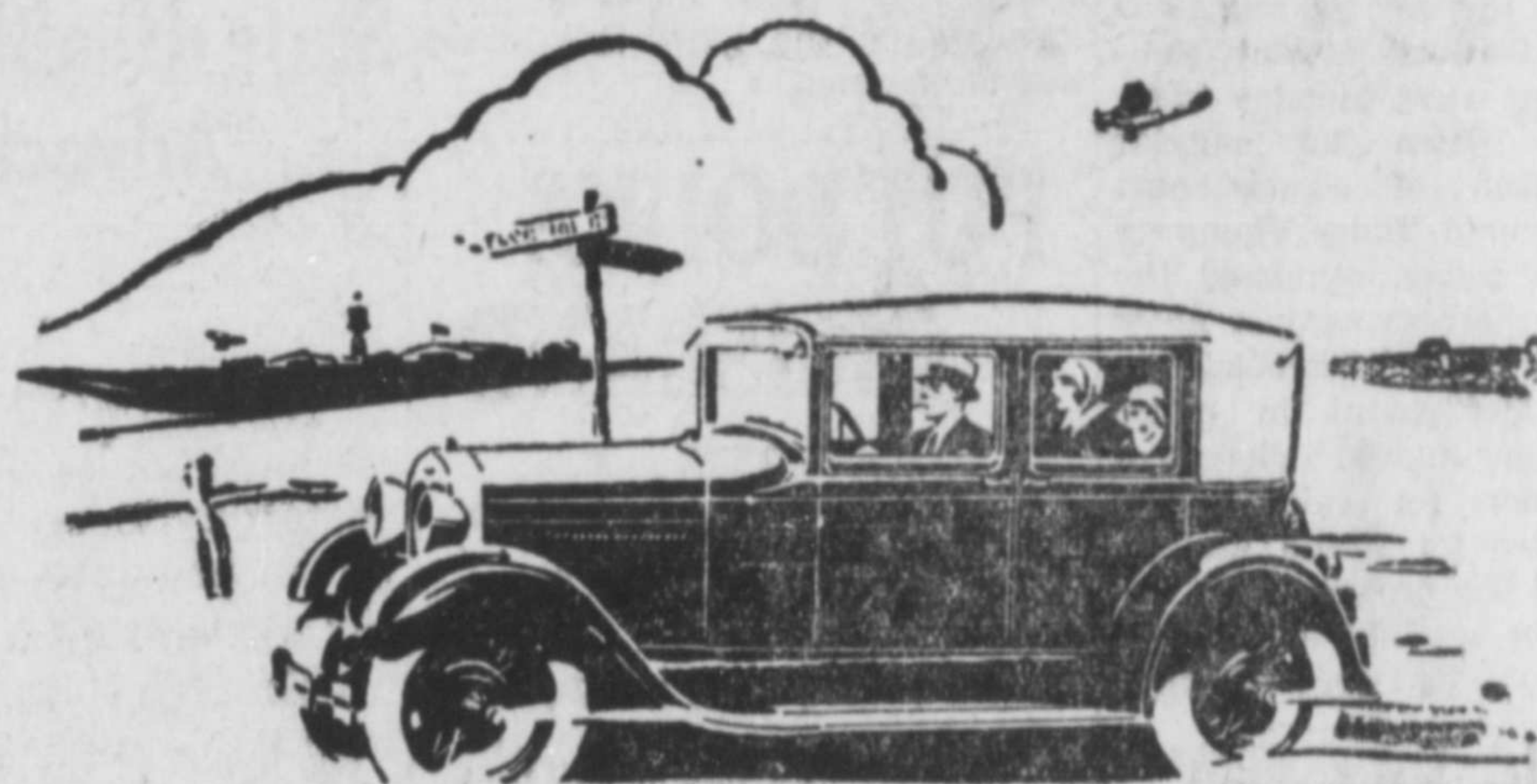

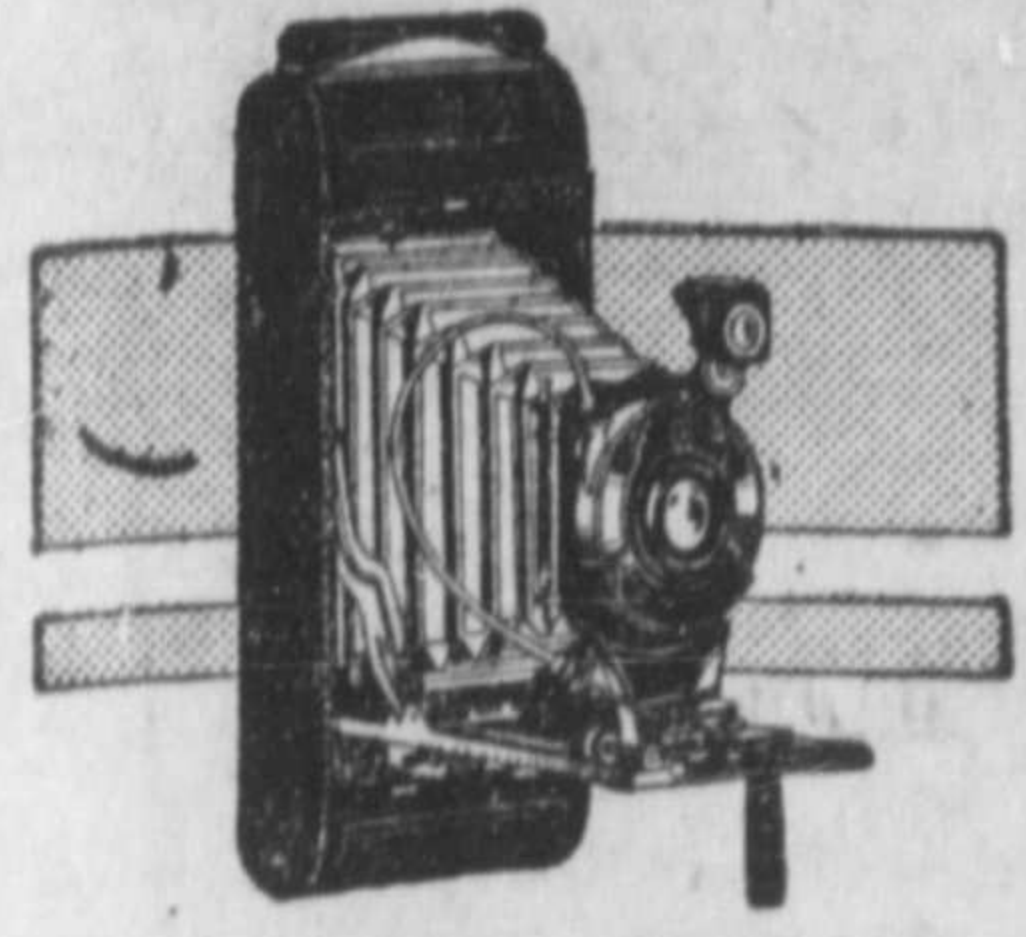

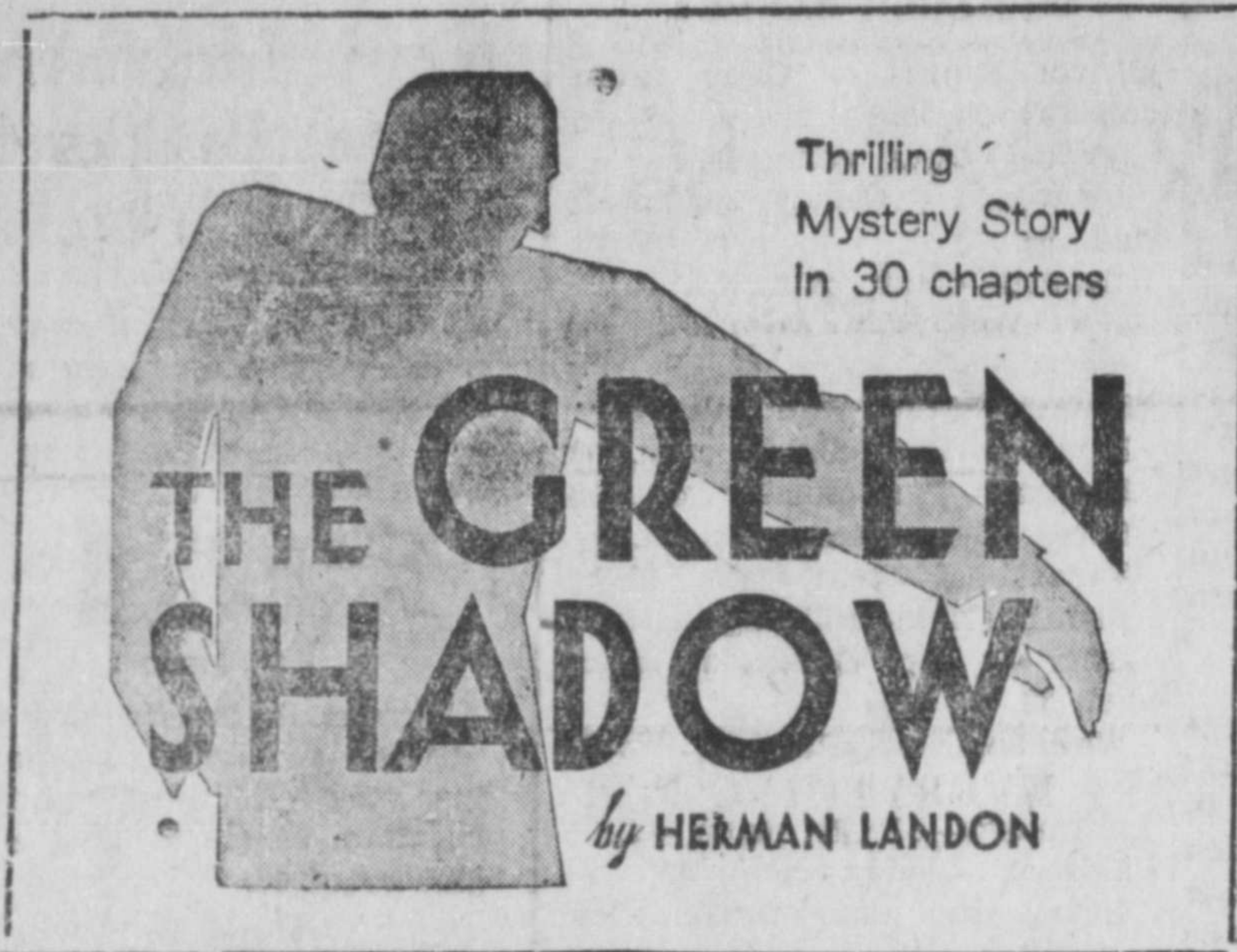

Ex-Mayor L. D. Taylor of Vancouver was wearing his red necktie and looked the picture of health, when here Wednesday afternoon going south after a trip to Dawson. Indeed his relief from civic cares seems to be resting lightly with him. He said he was feeling just as well as he looked, and had had a wonderful trip.

What he might have lost in the way of seeing excitement in the northern mining camps was fully compensated for throughout the trip by the comfort which he would not have had 31 years ago. From what he saw and heard, Mr. Taylor is confident that there is as great a future for mining in the Klondyke as there has been in the past. Transportation now, as then is still the big problem but there is plenty of mineral which he says is bound to come out some day.

As well as visiting the Yukon, Mr. Taylor took a trip up the Klondyke River as far as Telegraph Creek with which he was also highly pleased. That is one trip he would not have been able to make 30 years ago he says.

Another prominent passenger going south on the Princess Louise was Capt. George Black, M.P. for the Yukon, who will go to Vancouver to remain until the House of Commons session opens in Ottawa.
