Co-operative Fish Buying in Rupert Is Being Planned

Secretary of Pacific Sea Products Association here for Purpose of Organizing Branch to be controlled From Seattle.

Robert A. Moen, secretary-treasurer of the Pacific Sea Products Association, is in the city with the purpose of organizing here a branch of his association. It is a co-operative association for the purpose of marketing fish and stabilizing prices and generally looking after the interests of the fishermen.

Mr. Moen when seen this morning stated that they were applying for a license to do business in Canada and they were also looking for a suitable location for business here. They already marketed 75 per cent of the fish which came into the port of Seattle and they expected to control the fishing business on the coast.

The fishing business would be expected from Seattle and Prince Rupert would be a branch, Mr. Moen said. From Seattle they would direct the whole business. Boats would be diverted from Prince Rupert to other places when necessary.

Encouraged at Seattle. Asked why Seattle was chosen as the headquarters when so much more fish was marketed here and when this port was so much more convenient for the business, Mr. Moen said that a like they had been given every encouragement. The port of Seattle-Commission had given them the use of the Spokane Street terminal which was a public enterprise. He understood that the cold storage here was also a public enterprise and they would expect to make use of its facilities. At present they were not contemplating erecting a cold storage of their own. They had been approached by the newly formed Independent Cold Storage company and it was under consideration at present.

Not Satisfied. Mr. Moen said that they were in close touch with the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union and the Fish-Vessel Owners' Association which 75 per cent of the fishermen owners belonged. The fishermen were not satisfied with the treatment they got here and the price paid for the fish. Prices were too low. The price for second class fish was less than half that paid for first class. He expressed his concern paid within the limits of the first class price as much as to stabilize prices. The present plan of the Association was to buy for cash on exchange. They had done so far.

FERNIE MINERS ARE AGAINST ONE BIG UNION

Hold Mass Meeting and Decide to Dissolve and Reorganize Under Mine Workers of America.

Fernie, August 16.—At a big mass meeting held here yesterday a resolution was passed by a large majority dissolving the One Big Union and reorganizing the miners of Union District 18 under the Mine Workers of America.

BOLSHEVIKS WIPED OUT AT RIVER LUGA

New Offensive in Which Soviet Troops Lost Large Numbers.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) London, August 16.—Several battalions of Bolshevik troops have been wiped out in a new offensive along the River Luga. The soviet forces lost large numbers of prisoners, machine guns and ammunition in the engagement which took place and their operations are seriously crippled.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Casa Blanca, August 16.—The giant airplane Goliath which left here on Thursday for French West Africa was forced to alight at Mondar, but resumed its flight later.

FORMER EMPEROR URGED TO ACTIVITY

MANY HURT IN NATIONALIST DEMONSTRATION

Soldiers Stoned at Belfast When They Attempt to Break Up Meeting.

London, Aug. 16.—The Nationalist demonstration in Belfast yesterday resulted in a fight in which one soldier and ten Nationalists were seriously injured. Nationalist mobs stoned the soldiers when the latter attempted to break up the demonstrations. The monetary loss to property from damage sustained and looting is estimated at several thousand pounds.

GIVE SHANTUNG BACK TO CHINA

The Japanese Premier States that Territory Will be Restored to Neighbor.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Tokio, August 16.—The restoration to China of those parts of the Shantung province including Kiaochow, now occupied by the Japanese forces, will be made without any unnecessary delay, said Takashi Hara, the Japanese premier.

The territory was given to Japan by the Peace Conference on the understanding that she evacuate it in the near future. Since that time China has boycotted the Japanese merchants.

FARMERS ASK LEGISLATION

National Grange of America Announce New Program of Activities at Washington.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Washington, August 16.—The National Grange, representing 800,000 farmers, announce a program calling for the repeal of the war time food control, the abolition of exports, and the enactment of legislation to protect the farmers.

BANK BILL THEFT IS A MYSTERY YET

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Edmonton, August 16.—The \$50,000 theft of Merchants Bank bills from the registered letter department of the post office is still shrouded in mystery.

ITALIAN CRUISER SUNK IN SUEZ CANAL

Suez, August 16.—The Italian cruiser Basilicata sunk at the entrance to the Suez Canal as a result of an internal explosion. Heavy casualties are reported.

MUCH PLEASED AT RECEPTION IS THE PRINCE

Prince Rupert Man is With Party As Official Representative of News Agency.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) St. John, Aug. 16.—The Prince of Wales expresses himself delighted at the great reception he got on his arrival from Newfoundland. He was cheered by the people and met by Sir Robert Borden and Lieut.-Governor Pugsley.

Among those here in an official capacity is E. C. Cotes of Prince Rupert who is the official representative on the occasion for Beuter's Press Agency, and who it is understood will travel with the Prince's party throughout Canada and the United States. The party left on the cruiser Dragon for Halifax.

FOREST FIRES MUCH DAMAGE IN THE EAST

Sweeps Over Parry Sound District and Wipes Out Settlement.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Toronto, Aug. 16.—Forest fires are sweeping the Parry Sound district completely wiping out the Deer Lake settlement, 23 miles from Parry Sound. Eleven buildings were destroyed in one settlement including a general store, doctor's office, hotel, school and dwelling house.

Cobalt, August 16.—A serious situation is developing in the district west of Elk Lake where bush fires are making headway.

BOAT SEIZED THIS MORNING

Thomas Crosby Took in Tow Craft That Was Fishing Illegally.

The Thomas Crosby of the fisheries service returned to port this morning with a cannery boat in tow. It appears that the small craft had been carrying on illegal fishing and was caught at the game by the government officials. The boat belongs to Inverness Cannery and the two Japanese on board had a catch of 50 sockeyes and about 60 humpbacks. These will likely be sold at the Exchange before the boat is confiscated by the authorities.

DAYLIGHT SAVING

BELA KUN TO STAND TRIAL

Hungarian Government Notified They Will be Held Responsible for Him.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Geneva, August 16.—The Allied governments have informed the Austrian government that they will be held responsible for Bela Kun, the Hungarian communist leader.

Bela Kun will be tried for hanging Rumanians during his regime as leader.

IVOR RANSOM RETURNS HERE

Former Sport Leader Back in the City With G. T. P. Auditing Department.

Among those arriving from the south on the boat this morning was Ivor Ransom, formerly with the Union Bank staff in this city. About three years ago Mr. Ransom was transferred to Vancouver and since that time has been on the prairies in the bank service. Having now severed his connection with the bank he has come to Prince Rupert and will work in the Grand Trunk auditing department.

About his first question after the boat landed was whether there was a gymnasium here or not. Ivor was always interested in sport of all kinds and during his last year in this city was the prime leader in the Boys Own Club which was such a successful organization. Ivor was a great enthusiast for swimming and he was among the first to hasten improvements over at the Salt Lake. He is an excellent swimmer and a stunt diver.

SEIZE MEAT IN STATE OF OHIO

United States Attorney-General Requested to Take Action on Similar Lines to the Other Seizures.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Cleveland, Ohio, August 16.—United States Attorney-General Palmer has been requested to seize 2,420,000 lbs. of meat stored in the state of Ohio and the keeping of which it is claimed tends to hold up the price of meat.

This action is taken with a view to following up the seizures made by the Government yesterday.

COLD STORAGE AT SEAL COVE NEARLY READY

Two Upper Floors Being Prepared For Use and Some Rooms Will be Ready Next Week.

The upper floors of the cold storage plant at Seal Cove are nearing completion and a portion of the fifth floor is expected to be in operation next week. As soon as completed the Cold Storage plant will be in a position to freeze 60 tons every 24 hours and at the same time to hold the other rooms at their proper temperature. These latter, when full, contain ten million pounds of fish.

With the fish freezing going on at the same time the plant will be able to produce ice at the rate of 80 tons every 24 hours, so that it is clear the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. will be a very important factor in the industrial life of this community.

Two car loads of pipe have already arrived for the completion of the freezing apparatus in the upper rooms and two cars of refrigerating machinery are on the ground. One more car load is on the way and when it arrives it will not be long before the whole system is complete.

The plant is so placed as to allow of the use of part of it at one time without interfering with the rest. As this is the season of the year when refrigerating is most needed it is satisfactory to know that a portion at least of the added rooms will be ready at once.

COLONEL PECK VISITING CITY

Has Advised Government to Take Action Regard to Shipbuilding—Invited Prince Here.

"I have already wired the Government at Ottawa asking them to take action to bring about a speedy settlement of the shipyard difficulty," said Colonel Peck this morning. He arrived last night on the S. S. Venture and is intending to visit the different parts of his constituency before returning to Ottawa early in September. He will hardly reach here for the opening, however, as his constituency here is a big one and it takes time to cover it. Colonel Peck said that he was telegraphing to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne as to his projected visit here and expected a reply by Monday. He also had wired the Prince of Wales, whom he knew personally, inviting him to come here.

DECLARE A GENERAL LOCKOUT IN SPAIN

Labor Gathering Will be Important.

A very important gathering of labor leaders will take place at Washington on October 29. It may possibly be made the most important gathering ever held, or it may prove to be a farce. It is a world conference for the purpose of unifying the efforts of labor in all countries.

The News has on more than one occasion given the opinion that no effort for betterment of labor conditions can possibly be stable unless all the countries of the world are included. Cheap labor will always compete with dear labor, and we have passed the day when it might be possible to fence off the countries where cheap labor is employed.

China tried fencing the other countries of the world off and she remained stagnant for a thousand years. That was the penalty. Any country that erects a barrier whether of trade or anything else against the rest of the world will from that moment commence to stagnate.

The labor gathering at Washington will, it is stated, discuss an eight-hour day policy for the entire world; state aid for the unemployed; regulations or prevention of child labor, and conditions of employment of women in industry.

Those who know the labor conditions that exist in some of the countries against which Canadians compete will realize how far-reaching that small program might be. The difficulty will be to follow it up and try to whip the other countries into line.

Strikes Seem to Be Settling Down.

Strikes are not as frequent or as virulent as they were. People are apparently beginning to settle down after the disturbing conditions caused by the war and by the scarcity of food and clothing. The troubles are not all over, but it is possible that the worst is past. Governments are now alive to the conditions which exist and if they act wisely and with vigor, things should settle down, not to the old conditions for those will never return, but to a more stable condition in which labor and capital will co-operate.

Fishing Industry Being Organized.

The representative of the Pacific Sea Products Association is in the city for the purpose of organizing the fishing industry in the direction of the marketing of their product. At Seattle the fishing industry has secured a good deal of encouragement and here public attention has been drawn to the matter again and again with the result that the Dominion Government is now interesting itself in the business.

Prince Rupert is the natural fishing port of the Pacific and if the authorities act wisely and provide proper facilities, the business will not only be retained here, but will increase. The News has said this before, but it cannot be said too often. The authorities do not yet seem to have grasped the fact that the most important industry we have is the fishing industry.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that ERNEST A. WOODS has been appointed Returning Officer to take charge of the said vote.

BY-LAW NO. 1. A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY, AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00).

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert has determined to resurface the following plank roadways in the City of Prince Rupert, namely:— Section Five—Fulton St. and 8th Ave. W. Section Six—4th Ave. E., Hays Cove Circle and Hays Cove Bridge. Section Seven—6th Ave. E.

AND WHEREAS for the purpose of such resurfacing it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue Serial Debentures to raise the said sum of \$25,000.00, payable in five (5) years from the date of the coming into effect of this by-law, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of five (5) years, by special rate, the sum set out in the schedule to this by-law, for the payment of the principal and interest of said debt.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements and real property of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,580.00.

AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for local improvements and school purposes, is \$860,676.26 which is not twenty (20) per centum of said assessed amount.

AND WHEREAS this by-law cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. There shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to resurface the plank roadways herein referred to, and also make repairs to the superstructure where necessary, and to be executed under the supervision of the City Engineer.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said work hereby authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$25,000.00, which debt shall be payable in five (5) years from the date when this by-law takes effect, for which debt Serial Debentures may be issued to be secured as hereinafter mentioned.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may, and they are hereby authorized, to execute, sign, and affix the seal of the Corporation, to each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the office of the Bank of Montreal, in Montreal, Canada, or at the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the city of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York, U. S. A. or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

5. Each of the said debentures shall bear date the 1st day of September, A. D. 1919, and such debentures shall have annexed thereto coupons for the interest thereon at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March in each year, the first payment to be due on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1920.

6. The said coupons shall be deemed to have been properly executed by each one having written, stamped, printed, lithographed thereon the names of the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City of Prince Rupert. Each coupon shall be numbered and the number of the debenture to which it is attached.

7. All debentures issued under this by-law shall be numbered consecutively, no matter when issued, beginning with the number One (1).

8. The principal of the said debentures shall be payable on the 1st day of September in each year, and the amount set out in the schedule to this By-law.

9. For the payment of the debt hereby authorized and the interest thereon, there shall be levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, the annual sums set out in the schedule to this By-law.

10. The said annual sums for interest and payment of the debt referred to in the preceding section shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures by a rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable land and improvements or real property within the Municipality.

11. The said debentures when issued, sold, or hypothecated, and any coupons thereto attached, shall be deemed a valid and binding charge upon the said City of Prince Rupert.

12. The Council may sell the said debentures at less than par if it is found at any time necessary so to do.

13. The amount of debt authorized by this by-law is hereby consolidated with the amount of any other debt authorized by any other by-law of the City, and notwithstanding anything herein contained authorizing and directing the issue and sale of debentures for the payment of a debt hereby created, the City of Prince Rupert Consolidated Stock may be issued in the place of said debentures to the amount of such debt. This section shall only apply insofar as the Council may be empowered by Statute so to do.

14. This by-law shall take effect upon the 1st day of September, A. D. 1919, but before its final passage shall be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers under the provisions of Section 165 of the Municipal Act, Chapter 52, 1914, as amended by Section 25 of Chapter 45 of 1915 and Section 33 of Chapter 44 of 1916.

RUPERT MOSQUITOS ARE VERY MODEST

Professor Dyar of Washington is Collecting Them for National Museum.

Professor H. G. Dyar, of the National Museum, Washington, D. C., accompanied by his assistant Miss Aseyeh Allen, are in the city for a few days on their way south. Professor Dyar is a noted entomologist and has been paying particular attention to mosquitoes. This is his third season spent in Canada, and he has discovered several new varieties of the insect pest and has found that the same brand of mosquito has different habits which vary according to the climate.

Dr. Dyar has worked his way clear across Canada and this summer has visited the Yukon and Alaskan coast towns on his way south. He returned from Terrace on Thursday night, where he secured several specimens of the kind of mosquito unknown in Prince Rupert. Dr. Dyar did find mosquitoes in Prince Rupert, but they are of the woods variety, which are the most modest, and only sting humans as the last resort.

At Mission City, there is a Dominion entomologist with whom Dr. Dyar will compare notes on his way back to Washington.

FRUIT SEASON AT ITS BEST

Apricots and Strawberries Over
But Peaches Will be
In Soon.

The fruit season is now about at its best with strawberries rapidly disappearing from the local stands. The shipments from up river are becoming less and the price is again rising after having been at its lowest gradient. Local raspberries and black currants are in fine condition and much preserving has been done during the past few days.

Peaches are expected to arrive within the next few weeks and will be sufficiently low priced to merit preserving. The apricot season is nearly over and local merchants report that there has not been such a great demand for these fruits as in former years. Apples are still rather high priced and will not come down very much until about September 1. Pears which are still arriving from south of the line are rather expensive and will remain high until the Canadian orchards begin to yield their crop. Currants have gone up in price since last week.

There are no great changes in the regular line of goods except that fresh laid eggs have now raised to 80 cents per doz. Meat, although coming down in price very slightly in the stock market, shows no change here during the past few days.
