WASHINGTON, June 12.— The American Government was declared in high official circles to be greatly gratified and ready to welcome the plan of Premier Ramsay Macdonald of Great Britain to visit the United States to confer with President Hoover on Anglo-American relations.

With his arrival in London Friday, Charles G. Curious Phenomena Seen at Queen Charlotte Islands Following Big Earthquake

SKIDEGATE, June 12.—The hot springs on Hot Spring Island, on the east coast of Moresby Island, have gone completely dry since the recent earthquake. The springs were considered to be among the best in Canada.

Hand loggers at the head of Peel Harbor, on the west coast of Moresby Island, report that one of the mountains cracked open and smoke was issuing from the crevices.

At Hippo Island there was one of the biggest landslides on June 7 that had been known on Queen Charlotte Islands. The roar of the earth movement, like thunder, was heard by the fishermen in the neighborhood above the noise of their engines. The mountain was completely covered for a long time by fine dust.
