Saskatchewan to Have Coalition Government Dr. Anderson Head

REGINA, June 12.—After a Liberal administration of 24 years, a Conservative Government with the combined support of the Independents and Progressives under the premiership of Dr. J. T. Anderson may come into power during the latter part of the week. This forecast by political prophets followed conferences of opposition members-elect yesterday.

At separate meetings the three opposition parties, numbering 35 members-elect, adopted identical resolutions calling upon Premier James Gardiner to resign immediately. No statement is anticipated from the premier, however, until tomorrow or Friday after the official returns have been received.

The formation of a coalition government was forecast last night in an official statement issued by the Conservative party. Announcement was also made that ten members-elect of the Independent and Progressive groups had indicated their willingness to co-operate with the Conservatives on the following terms:

A pledge for reform of the civil service.
Retention of the identity of each group.
Freedom in the matter of Federal politics.
The statement said these terms had been accepted by the Conservatives and that Dr. Anderson was chosen leader of the respective groups acting co-operatively.

BEAVER COVE PAPER MILL IS REVIVED

Engineers Said to Be Making Survey and Big Mill Likely to Be Built

VANCOUVER, June 12.—While contracts and agreements have not been closed, it was stated here today on what appeared reliable authority that the International Pulp & Paper Co. will probably build a 500-ton paper mill at Beaver Cove, on the north of Vancouver Island, involving a capital outlay of from fifteen to twenty million dollars.

If the project goes ahead as proposed it will involve the establishment of a town of something like 4000 people at that point.

International engineers are now making a preliminary survey.

HUGE BENEFITS FROM TOURISTS
Sum of \$250,000,000 Said to Have Been Left in Country Last Year
OTTAWA, June 12.—Tourist traffic brought \$250,501,000 into Canada in 1928, according to estimates of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, an advance of nearly \$5,000,000 over the estimated amount spent in the country the previous year.

The increase was largely due to the heavy influx of motors from the United States.

GOVERNOR OF B. C. ON TOUR

Hon. R. R. Bruce Arrives Here Today En Route to Atlin Electoral Riding

On the invitation of H. F. Kergin, M.L.A., Hon. R. Randolph Bruce, lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Victoria and will proceed north to visit Atlin electoral riding. Visits will be made at Atlin and Telegraph Creek, and returning here on June 26. His Honor will then go to Anxox, Alice Arm and Stewart. A visit is also planned to the Queen Charlotte Islands on the way south.

Though his visit is of an unofficial nature, Lieutenant-Governor Bruce was met on his arrival here this morning by Mayor S. P. McMorris, who extended a welcome on behalf of the city. He was driven around the city, taking in the cold storage plant and drydock.

EMIGRATION TURNING TO SOUTH AMERICA

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, June 12.—The tide of emigration which for decades flowed westward across the Atlantic to New York and other American ports has definitely set in a southwesterly direction.

European steamship companies are operating larger and faster steamers to South America than were the pre-war emigrant carriers of the North Atlantic, with much better accommodations. Under these conditions Brazilians believe that their country is on the verge of a great increase in population with consequent agricultural development.

PLANS FOR FLOATS HERE ARE FINISHED

Plans and specifications for the new fishermen's floats at Prince Rupert have been completed by the federal department of public works and were brought north today by J. P. Forde, district engineer, Victoria. Construction of the floats, to cover which an appropriation was made at Ottawa, this session, is to be started in the near future.

EAT BEEF AND SOLVE TARIFF

OTTAWA, June 12.—If Canadians would eat fifteen per cent less bacon and fifteen per cent more beef, there would be no cause for anxiety with respect to the proposal of the United States Congress to increase the tariff on live cattle. This was pointed out by Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, in an interview today.

Canada exports only fifteen per cent of the beef raised in this country.

SIR W. J. HICKS TO BE CREATED VISCOUNT IN FINAL HONORS LIST

LONDON, June 12.—Premier Baldwin's resignation honors list is due shortly and it will include a viscountcy for Sir William Jonsyn Hicks, home secretary in the late government, thus creating a vacancy in the House for Twickenham, where Sir William was elected with a majority of 6000.

Sir Thomas Inskip, attorney-general in the late government, who was defeated in Central Bristol, will likely be the Conservative candidate.

PULP PROJECT FOR JUNEAU DISTRICT

JUNEAU, June 12.—Work is continuing this summer on the surveys in connection with the proposed Cameron-Chandler pulp and paper project. J. H. Cameron is in the district looking over the concern's interests.

Curious Phenomena Seen at Queen Charlotte Islands Following Big Earthquake

SKIDEGATE, June 12.—The hot springs on Hot Spring Island, on the east coast of Moresby Island, have gone completely dry since the recent earthquake. The springs were considered to be among the best in Canada.

Hand loggers at the head of Peel Harbor, on the west coast of Moresby Island, report that one of the mountains cracked open and smoke was issuing from the crevices.

At Hippo Island there was one of the biggest landslides on June 7 that had been known on Queen Charlotte Islands. The roar of the earth movement, like thunder, was heard by the fishermen in the neighborhood above the noise of their engines. The mountain was completely covered for a long time by fine dust.

NEW BUILDING IS COMPLETED

Garage and Warehouse of Lindsay Cartage Co., near the junction of First, Second and Third Avenues, is now completed and ready for use. The structure measures 85 by 100 feet and is two storeys in height, having cost about \$20,000 to erect. The basement floor will be used for warehouse purposes and the upper storey for a garage and automobile showroom.

WASHINGTON IS PLEASED

Visit of British Premier Will Be Welcome Event for U. S. Government

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The American Government was declared in high official circles to be greatly gratified and ready to welcome the plan of Premier Ramsay Macdonald of Great Britain to visit the United States to confer with President Hoover on Anglo-American relations.

With his arrival in London Friday, Charles G. Dawes, the new American ambassador to Great Britain, is expected to become acquainted with the proposal and to participate in the discussions of it on behalf of the United States. Meanwhile, it is said, on behalf of the president, that he learned about the proposed visit of Mr. Macdonald only through newspaper despatches.

TERRIBLE TOLL OF ACCIDENTS IN U. S.

CHICAGO, June 12.—Accidents killed 36,000 persons in the United States in 1928, the National Safety Council announces. This was an increase of 3.1 per cent over 1927. Of the total number of deaths 27,500 were attributed to automobiles and 368 to civil aviation. Railroad accidents, the report said, are on the wane.

RADIO INSPECTOR TO BE APPOINTED FOR PRINCE RUPERT

The Prince Rupert radio association has been notified by E. J. Haughton, superintendent of radio, that a part time inspector would be appointed to be located in Prince Rupert. This news was very welcome to radio fans, as a person on the spot can take quick action in regard to interference and follow it up.

On account of the rain, last night's C.N.E. softball fixture between the Station and Round House was postponed and will be played tonight if conditions permit.

MESSAGE OF BALDWIN TO CAN. PREMIER

OTTAWA, June 12.—A farewell message which former Premier Stanley Baldwin sent to Premier Mackenzie King on the day of Mr. Baldwin's resignation has been made public here as follows:

"I have today tendered my resignation to the King. On leaving office I should like to send you a message of farewell and sincere good wishes. It has been a great privilege to work in collaboration with you and I wish to express my warmest thanks for your helpful co-operation during the last four and a half years in all matters of common concern."

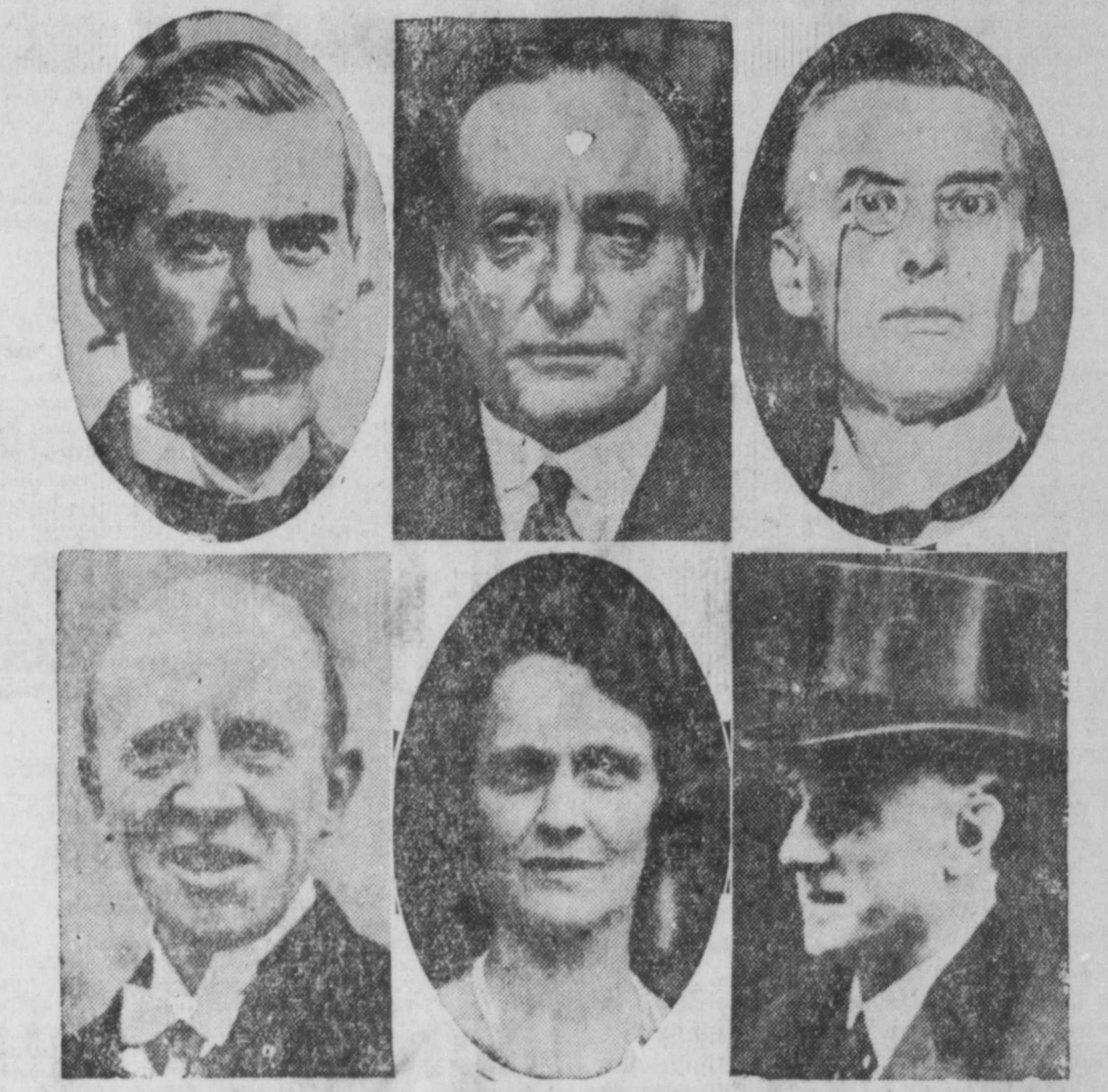

Neville Chamberlain, Minister of Health in the Baldwin Government, who doubled his majority in Birmingham; Ben Tillett, famous laborer, who regained his lost seat in Lancashire from the Conservative Party; Rt. Hon. Sir Austin Chamberlain, Britain's Foreign Secretary in the Baldwin Government, who only just scraped through with less than one hundred votes. Bottom, left to right, is Sir Harry Britain, one of Baldwin's old standbys, who faded away before a crushing Labor poll; Lady Astor, who again won her seat for the Conservative Party by a large majority; Sir A. 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Thorough Overhaul Planned for Steamer Prince David at the Local Drydock Shipyard

Speaking of reconditioning of the steamer Prince David, which has been acquired by Canadian National Coast Steamships for local service out of this port, Reginald Beaumont, assistant to the Pacific coast manager of the steamship company, stated this morning that final plans for the work had not yet been completed, although the intention was to convert the vessel from coal to fuel burning and also to extend the present limited passenger-carrying accommodation. The work, which by the time it is completed, is expected to be quite extensive, will be carried out at the local drydock.

RED SALMON AT KODIAK, ALASKA

SEWARD, June 12.—Indicating a successful season, the first run of red salmon is reported in the Kodiak district. Grimes and Matma cannot get up several hundred cases in the first few days and the Kodiak cannery also packed several hundred cases, but the run was light.

ASSIGNED BUT ASSETS GOOD

VANCOUVER, June 12.—Following a meeting of directors, the Brunette Lumber Co., Ltd., of New Westminster, made an assignment under the Bankruptcy Act yesterday. The total liabilities are shown at \$729,322 and the total assets at \$1,687,131, leaving a credit surplus of \$957,809.

BUSHBY BUYERS ARE BUSY AT ISLANDS

SKIDEGATE, June 12.—The Bushby Company is still buying dogfish here for the reduction plant at Prince Rupert. Two old-timers are being employed by the company. Captain Oswald, who bought salmon here a year ago, and Capt. Jim Morrison, who was skipper of the steam trawler Triumph 18 years ago.

SWEDE GROUP IS BONDED

SKIDEGATE, June 12.—A. Rogers, Rand McDonald and Nels Larson of Lockport, Queen Charlotte, have bonded their mineral claims, the Swede group, to an American mining concern for \$90,000.

TOURIST TRAFFIC

Every time we hear of the enormous benefits the country receives from the tourist traffic we feel as if we had received a slap in the face because of the fact that the highway connecting Prince Rupert with the rest of the province is not built and therefore we are unable to secure any part of the benefits to be derived from the invasion by motor car.

Today we are told that two hundred and fifty million dollars was spent in the Dominion by tourists last year. All we ask is that three or four of those millions be spent in constructing the Skeena River highway and then the country will have the finest scenic highway in British Columbia.

It is any wonder that Prince Rupert people are anxious to have a new province when in twenty years all the road built by the Provincial Government has been five and a half miles and now the work is dropped entirely with the promise that it will be resumed at some indefinite future time?

WORK ON GAME GROUND

The Gyo Club has again set itself to some useful work in the city in its proposal to improve the playground at the corner of McBride and Sixth Street. The city own four corners of equal size at that intersection and a proposal was made that the roads through the centre should be diverted and the four made into one good athletic park at which games might be played. This did not meet with general favor.

Just now one of the corners is in use. It was levelled off by the city several years ago and this spring has been used more than ever before. A game of baseball may be seen in progress there almost any fine evening and the youngsters shape themselves well. While the ground is not in first-class condition, it answers the purpose.

What is needed is a second ground where boys or girls may play football, softball, or another game of baseball without interfering with the one already in progress. The juvenile population is growing, but the facilities for recreation are not growing to keep pace with the demand.

The Gyro Club is to be congratulated on its efforts in the past and on its new proposal. There is plenty of scope for its activities and it is to be hoped that it will keep right on. We feel sure that in doing so it will have the backing of the rest of the community. Nothing is too good for the boys and girls who are growing up and playgrounds used judiciously are the best means of helping them by teaching them to help themselves.

MARKETING BONDS

When people heard that there was a slump on the stock market and that prices of securities were doing down they did not realize that this might have any effect on the situation in Prince Rupert other than to affect the stock gamblers. Yet this slumping of securities affects the marketing of city bonds and that affects the amount of work which the city may do in improvement work. So we find ourselves tied up with the gambling interests, the progress of one affecting the progress of the other.

SALARIES OF MEMBERS

Some people are never satisfied. After striving to be elected to represent the people of Canada in the House of Commons the members tried to advance their own salaries from four to six thousand dollars or thereabouts in addition to travelling expenses. These 235 members, along with 96 senators, draw down quite a lot of money already, the senators being paid the same amount as members of the Commons and that for doing almost nothing. Happily the Mackenzie King Government refused to grant the request for an advance and the members have to continue on that meagre pittance of four thousand or \$333 a month for the whole year.

In the old days it was considered an honor to be chosen to represent the people in Parliament. Today the members are paid for their services and they want more. It is such movements as these which make it necessary in some countries for dictators to step in and take the power out of the hands of the people's representatives. We do not want to elect men who will lord it over us. We want them to be on a level with the rest, not highly paid officials.

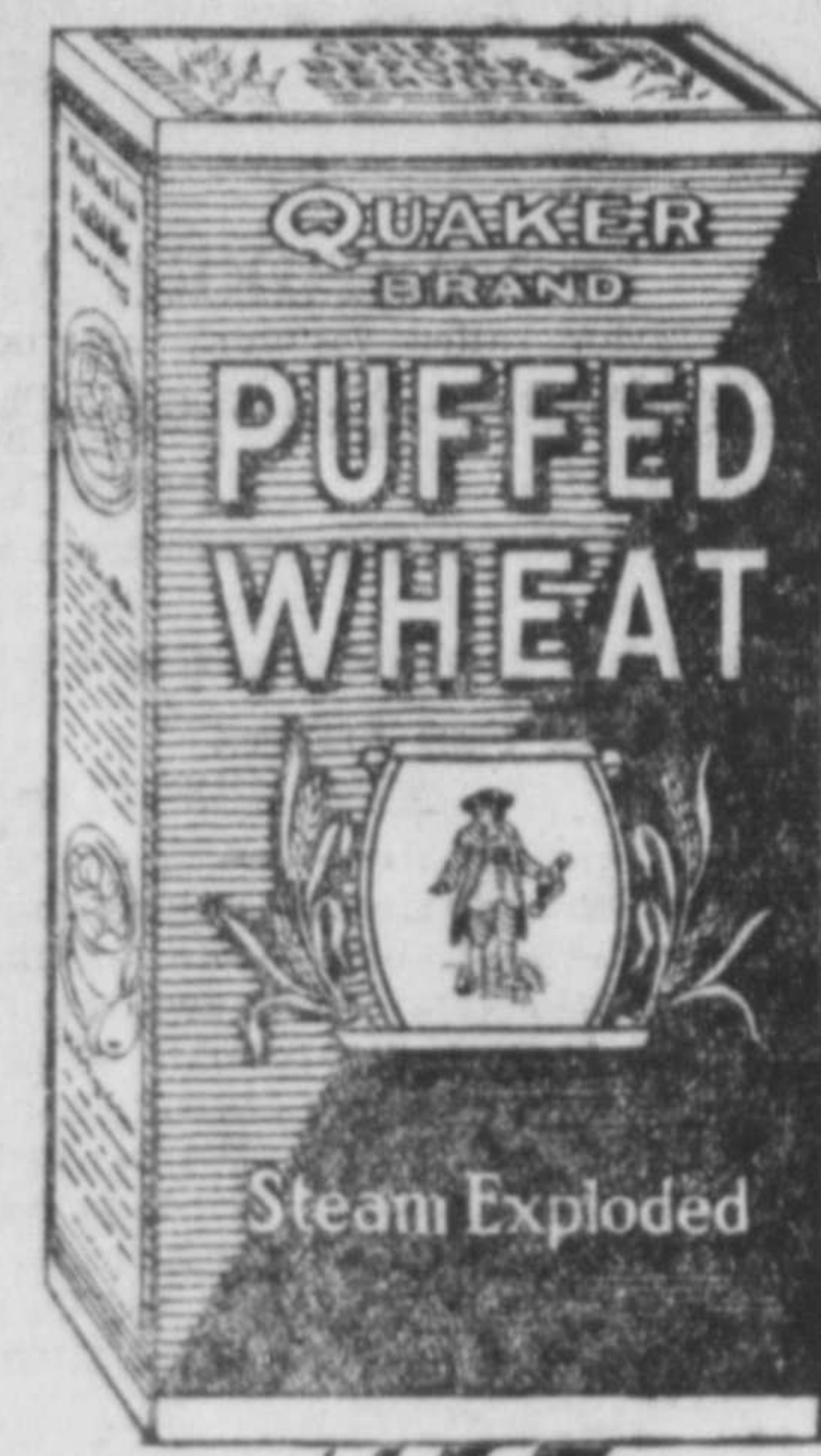
F. E. Gigot and W. C. Blanton moved last week into their new office premises in the Beaman Block.

THREE PASSIONS AT THE CAPITOL

Film Gives Story of Ultra Modern English Life

"The Three Passions," at the Capitol Theatre tonight and tomorrow, is a story of present-day English life, given in an ultra-modern presentation. It presents an interesting contrast with earlier Ingram pictures in which the East, or the South of Europe provided the background and the story called for "costume," as in "The Garden of Allah," or quaint setting as in the case of "Mare Nostrum."

Apart from the prospect of appreciating a director's versatility, "The Three Passions" promises patrons a strong cast, in which Alice Terry and Ivan Petrovitch as co-stars are the chief attraction. Their fellow artists include Shayle Gardner, a New Zealander prominent on the British stage and screen; Claire Eames, whose performance in "The Silver Cord" written by her husband, Sidney Howard, is still remembered; Leslie Faber, a "West End" favorite of London who is also well known in New York, and Andrews Engleman, the Russian player who made a hit in "Mare Nostrum."

"The Three Passions" has scenes at Oxford University in a big English shipbuilding yard, in London restaurants and other haunts of her "bright, young people," and in a mission in the slums of the "East End." Many big sets were used at the Ingram studio at Nice in staging the interiors, one representing a strike of 2,000 workmen calling for a reproduction of a gigantic engineering works which is said to be the finest set ever used in France.

INVESTIGATE COAST HERRING

(Juneau Empire)


The investigation of the herring fisheries of Southeastern Alaska, to be made this summer by Biologist George A. Rounsfell of the United States Bureau of Fisheries, is one that will be welcomed by all those who have the best interest of the Territory at heart. For many years now the state of these fisheries has been a disputed issue. There are a large number of Alaskans, particularly many engaged in the fresh fishing industry, who hold that the use of herring by reduction works for oil and meal is destroying the herring supply. The charge has been made that the use of small-sized fish, held by some to be immature, is rapidly wiping out the stock of propagation of the species in this section of the Territory.

On the other hand, the number of people who take a contrary view, who contend that the supply has not been and is not being endangered by current operations is almost if not equally as large. And they point out very properly that other fishing countries, particularly the Scandinavian, have been fishing herring for a great many years, using them for reduction purposes as well as for human food without visible injury to the supply. In the past decade here, the question has been made a political issue. In many instances facts have been disregarded and sentiment and prejudice allowed to enter into the discussion which can not be properly settled on any other than a factual and scientific basis.

The work of Mr. Rounsfell is therefore of more than casual importance. It will be watched with a great deal of interest by Alaskans and it is to be hoped that the results will conclusively settle the moot question as to state of the herring supply in Southeastern Alaska and remove it from the political arena.
