International Peace Engages Governments; U.S. Would Go Slow

WASHINGTON, June 29. - Suggestions have been made by the United States Government to Great Britain that the naval disarmament question be approached with caution, in view of the present status of that problem. There is a feeling of uneasiness in official circles here that the conference of naval powers might result in failure without sufficient preparation.

The United States Government had been informally sounded out by Great Britain, it became known yesterday, on its attitude toward a conference of the principal naval powers, either separate from the League of Nations or

under league machinery.

LONDON, June 29.—Premier Ramsay Macdonald in a public speech he made here last night said his Government was actively working at its great task of international peace.
