Twelve-Engined Flying Boat Carried 169 People Today For an Hour, Breaking All Records as 'My Country, 'Tis of Thee,' and The Star Spangled Banner,' We

ALTENRHEIM, Switzerland. Oct. 21.-The huge twelve-engined flying boat D. C.-X, launched here last July, today made an amazing one-hour flight with a human load of 169.

This is the first time in history of aviation that so many persons have been carried into the air on any conveyance.

The boat, which may be used for transatlantic crossing, was designed to carry forty passengers normally, but has accommodation for one hundred if necessary. It measures 150 feet from tip to tail. Its wings are ten feet thick and the spread is 150 feet from tip to tip.




