Christchurch Alchemists Sucin Transmitting **Elements Into Gold** 

WELLINGTON, N.Z., Sept. 4. -Two Christchurch chemists have advanced to hitherto unachieved heights in alchemy research by their success, after fifteen years' work, in dean electro-magnetic process which will transmit certain elements into gold. An important feature of the experiments is said to be the discovery of a new force given the name of chromedyne, which is claimed to be ten times more powerful than electricity.
