BUSINESS OF PORT STEADILY INCREASING AS SHIPMENTS ARE MADE HERE FROM MANY SOURCES

Five through freights sent east every week in addition to regular time freights; much lumber, shingles, pulp, salmon and herring being shipped by way of Prince Rupert.

For the past few weeks there has been a marked advance in the shipment of goods through this port to the east. The merchants of the eastern provinces and the southern brokers are realizing the advantage of using the terminal facilities of this port. Large shipments of fish and lumber are very easily taken care of here and quick transit across continent means much to those who are in business.

Canadian salmon is being shipped just now in greater quantities than in any other preceding summer. Consignments from the Naas, Skeena River and the Queen Charlotte Islands are arriving steadily and the wharves are well filled with cases which have been landed here awaiting transfer to the railroad. The Alaska salmon pack will be a little late this year and shipments from the north are not arriving in very great quantities so far. However, very large shipments are expected in the next few weeks just as soon as the run has been taken care of in Alaskan waters.

Speed in Shipment.
 The mild cured herring which is such a popular dish with the prairie people and the Atlantic coast residents has been arriving very steadily from Alaska. Large shipments are being brought here by the Grand Trunk boats and by snow and ice boats. The feature in the shipment of this sort of merchandise is that it reaches the east quickly. Herring which is loaded on to boats at Big Port Walters, Alaska, arrives on the New York market only sixteen days later. With the new car ferries completed it can easily be imagined just how much this will mean to the shippers who require service in as brief a time as possible.

Lumber and Pulp.
 Another commodity which is rapidly being railed over the G. T. P. is lumber and pulp and at the present time both the Prince Albert and the Tillamook are at Swanson Bay taking on full loads for this port. Shingles are arriving steadily and paper from Ocean Falls is very frequently brought to Prince Rupert on the large Grand Trunk steamers for eastern merchants. Firms such as T. Eaton Co. are realizing the advisability of making use of this fast service. Besides the two regular time freights more than

From Queen Charlottes. In a very short time, now, all the lumber which was left over on the Queen Charlotte Islands, following the cutting for the aeroplane spruce, will be brought here to supply prairie and eastern demands. When the loggers were taking out their first class spruce for the Imperial Munitions Board only the best part of a log was sawed and the rest left behind. At that time No. 2 spruce was not taken out, as men could make more at getting out the better grade. At the present time there are several million feet of the islands which will soon start moving, as already several orders have been placed for this B. C. product.

WILSON TELLS OF THE LEAGUE
Japan's Promise to Return Shantung to China Was Entered in Minutes.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Washington, Aug. 21.—President Wilson interpreting the League of Nations covenant for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, declared that it imposed no legal obligation for the United States military forces in protecting territory or the independence of any nation, but the covenant might involve action in certain circumstances. An "absolutely compelling moral obligation" is even stronger than a legal promise. Article 10 guaranteeing the integrity of the league members against aggression would leave to each nation complete freedom of choice as to the application of force. The president revealed that Japan's promise to return Shantung to China was reduced to written form in the minutes of the Peace Conference.

PASSENGER RATES ON THE ATLANTIC TO BE INCREASED

Montreal, Aug. 21.—Commencing from this date it has been decided to increase all passenger rates on the north Atlantic between all points in France, Great Britain, United States and Canada. The increase will amount to a flat raise on minimum rates for all classes as follows: First class increase, \$15; second class, \$10; and third, \$5.

SINKING OF RUSSIAN SHIPS IS CONFIRMED

Attack Was Part of Combined Effort Against Petrograd by Yudenitch.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 London, Aug. 20.—The British Admiralty has officially confirmed the sinking on Monday of the Bolshevik battle cruiser Petropavlovsk, the battleship Andrea Parversuan, and a Bolshevik destroyer by British naval forces in the Gulf of Finland. Another Russian cruiser probably was seriously damaged. The naval battle was connected with the big combined Russian and Estonian offensive against Petrograd inaugurated by General Yudenitch. It is expected that the outcome will be the formation of a new government for northwest Russia. The battle coincides with the arrival reported from Stockholm of a large number of British tanks and quantities of munitions at Reval. It is officially stated that no British troops are engaged in operations against Petrograd on the Pskov sector, 180 miles southwest of the capital.

EXPORT TRADE FALLING OFF

Drop of \$42,000,000 During First Four Months of Fiscal Year.
 Ottawa, August 21.—For the first four months of the fiscal year ending with July, the total trade of the Dominion is \$657,787,357. This represents a falling away in trade of approximately \$42,000,000 compared with the same period last year when the value of the imports and exports was \$702,722,565. EIGHT U. S. CAVALRY TROOPS CHASING BANDITS IN MEXICO

ONE HUNDRED TANKS AND 3,000 RIFLES SHIPPED TO BORDER WITHIN PAST WEEK—AEROPLANES USED IN SCOUTING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Columbus, August 21.—One hundred tanks of the one-man type and 3,000 rifles have been shipped from the army reserve depot here to forts near the Mexican border within the past week. El Paso, August 21.—Four troops of the Eighth United States Cavalry, reinforced by four more airplanes from Fort Bliss, resumed the hunt for Mexican bandits which kidnapped Lieuts. Peterson and Davis. El Paso, August 21.—(later) Eight cavalry troops have crossed into Mexico below Candelaria, Texas, in pursuit of the Mexican bandits. Aeroplanes scouted with the cavalry in an effort to pick up the trail of the bandits.

GERMANY HAS HER TROUBLES

Insurrection in Upper Silesia Causes Trouble in Industrial Districts.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Berlin, August 21.—Despatches to the newspapers indicate that there is an insurrection in Upper Silesia in the industrial sections. The German Government, which is at Weimar temporarily, has issued a statement declaring the military authorities masters of the situation.

SERIOUS FIRES IN THE STATES

In Northern Idaho and Montana Getting out of Control—Incendiaries in Woods.
 (Special by G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Missula, Mont., Aug. 21.—The general fire situation in Montana and northern Idaho was never so serious as it is today. New fires are breaking out and old blazes are getting out of control. It is reported that incendiaries have set fires in the woods and in several instances have severed connection between the fire fighting crews and the rest of the world.

WORKMAN LOST ARM AT MILL

Was Injured by Moving Crane When on Gin Pole This Morning.
 John A. Wymes lost an arm today as the result of an accident at the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, Ltd., at Seal Cove. It seems that Wymes was working on construction work at the top of a gin pole when his arm was caught and crushed between the post and the wheel of the moving overhead crane. He was at once rushed to the hospital where it was found that he had sustained a compound fracture of the left arm which was so badly injured that it had to be taken off. Wymes is a carpenter, and Mr. Ewart, the manager, speaks most highly of him as an efficient workman. He has been with the company for about three months.

CURRIE EXTOLS CANADIAN ARMY

Inspector General of Canadian Forces Tells of Wonderful Work of His Command.
 "During the last three months of the war the Canadians fired 25 per cent of all the ammunition fired by the whole British army. I am glad to say that our army fought against the greatest military machine the world has ever produced, yet never lost a gun in the last two years, never failed to take an objective and some divisions never allowed a hostile foot to enter their trenches. We never lost an inch of ground we had once consolidated." This was a statement made by Sir Arthur Currie, Inspector General of Canadian forces, before 700 people at Toronto Canadian Club.

NOMINATION TO SCHOOL BOARD

J. C. McLennan in the Field and Will be Elected Unless Another Candidate Enters on or Before Saturday at Noon.
 Showing that interest is being taken in the forthcoming election of a member of the school board to take the place of Miss Davies who recently resigned, one nomination has already been received by Returning Officer E. A. Woods. The nomination is that of J. C. McLennan, who is proposed by D. G. Stewart and seconded by W. E. Williams. Should there be no opposition, Mr. McLennan will be declared elected on Saturday. If another candidate appears the polling will take place on the following Wednesday.

INTERNATIONAL LOAN PLANNED

Sum of \$250,000,000 to be Raised by New Minister of Finance, Says New York.

United States And Peace Treaty.

There is a good deal of speculation as to whether President Wilson will be able to pilot the Peace Treaty through Congress. The League of Nations, which was Wilson's pet scheme, seems to be the worst stumbling block. It is almost unthinkable that after the work that has been done in preparing the treaty and the vital interests that the United States has at stake, it should be turned down by that country. However, there is no telling what the United States Senate might do. It looks as if the long delay in getting it through was caused by a desire to seem important in the eyes of the world.

Moral Obligation Compared with Legal.

In explaining the League of Nations covenant to the Foreign Relations Committee, President Wilson is reported to have said that the absolutely compelling moral obligation was even stronger than the legal obligation. That sounds well, but apparently the United States felt no moral obligation to go to the relief of little Belgium until her own life was threatened. That is all the moral obligation is worth. It is a pretty good excuse for doing something when it is found that action cannot well be evaded.

This is no reflection on the United States any more than on any other country. Great Britain went to the relief of Belgium and we are glad she did. It is doubtful if, even in her case, the danger behind was not the compelling force. It was for Great Britain a case of saving her own life. Little Belgium was the immediate excuse for action. In the past morals have not been a very great factor in international politics, and it is doubtful, even yet, if it can be as great a factor as President Wilson would have us believe. The world is not yet possessed of a high moral conscience. The daily life of the people in individual countries disproves it. Very few people, even in Canada, have a moral conscience when it comes to a business deal and international politics is largely a matter of business.

Moral Obligation Just Now in Mexico.

Has the United States a moral obligation just now in Mexico? U. S. troops are chasing Mexican bandits in Mexico and preparations are being made for a more extensive occupation of that country, because two American citizens were robbed of a comparatively small sum of money by means of a ransom extortion.

It would undoubtedly be for the good of Mexico to be controlled by the United States, but whether or not there is a moral obligation to conquer that country for the good of the country and the glory of the United States no country but the United States can say. If it were not for the territorial aggrandisement idea, there would be little incentive to conquer Mexico or even to attempt to bring law and order in that stricken land.

A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY, AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00) AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that ERNEST A. WOODS has been appointed Returning Officer to take charge of the said vote.

BY-LAW NO. 1. WHEREAS THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY, AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00).

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert has determined to resurface the following plank roadways in the City of Prince Rupert, namely:— Section Six—4th Ave. E., Hays Cove Circle and Hays Cove Bridge. Section Seven—6th Ave. E. Section Eight—Conrad St.

AND WHEREAS the purpose of such resurfacing it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue Serial Debentures to raise the said sum of \$25,000.00, payable in five (5) years from the date of issue, and to come into effect of this bylaw, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of five (5) years the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) out of the schedule to this bylaw, for the payment of the principal and interest of said debt.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements and real property of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,550.00.

AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for local improvements and school purposes, is \$860,676.26 which is not twenty (20) per centum of said assessed amount.

AND WHEREAS this bylaw cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to resurface the plank roadways herein referred to, and also make repairs to the same, where necessary, such work to be executed under the supervision of the City Engineer.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said work authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$25,000.00, which debt shall be payable in five (5) years from the date of issue of this bylaw, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to sign, and affix the Seal of the Corporation, to each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the office of the Bank of Montreal, at Montreal, Canada, or at the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the city of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York, U. S. A. or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

5. Each of the said debentures shall bear date the 1st day of September, A. D. 1919, and such debentures shall have annexed thereto coupons for the interest thereon at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March in each year, the first payment to be due on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1920.

6. The said coupons shall be deemed to have been properly executed by each one having written, stamped, printed or lithographed thereon the names of the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City of Prince Rupert. Each coupon shall be numbered with the number of the debenture to which it is attached.

7. All debentures issued under this bylaw shall be numbered consecutively, no matter when issued, beginning with the number one (1).

8. The principal of the said debentures shall be payable on the 1st day of September in each year and amounts set out in the Schedule to this Bylaw.

9. For the payment of the debt hereby authorized and the interest thereon, there shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, the annual sums set out in the Schedule to this Bylaw.

10. The total annual sums for interest and payment of the debt referred to in the preceding section shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures by a rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable land or improvements or real property within the Municipality.

11. The said debentures when issued, sold or hypothecated, and any coupons thereto attached, shall be deemed a valid and binding charge upon the said City of Prince Rupert.

12. The Council may sell the said debentures at less than par if it is found at any time necessary so to do.

To the Ratepayers of the City of Prince Rupert: Re Proposed New School

We, the undersigned members of the Prince Rupert Board of School Trustees desire to draw the attention of the Prince Rupert ratepayers to our reasons for recommending that a permanent public school building, costing approximately \$135,000, be erected on Acropolis Hill.

(A) As to the site, our reasons for choosing Acropolis Hill are:

1. Two-thirds of the school children now attending school live to the south of McBride Street, according to figures supplied by the public school principal. The one-third living north of McBride already have the King Edward School.

For Section 2.

2. It is necessary to have a public school building which will accommodate the school children from the southerly parts of Section One and any from Section 2, and Acropolis Hill will be central for years to come until it is necessary to build a school in Section 2.

3. The only other school-site at all centrally situated for the present school-going children is the Ninth Avenue site, and the medical authorities advise against this site as being unhealthy in comparison with Acropolis Hill.

4. Acropolis Hill already has a \$35,000 playground which will be available for the Acropolis School House and this asset alone should win universal support for the Acropolis site, as it is impossible to make a good playground of sufficient size on the Ninth Avenue site.

Only Suitable Site.

5. The only other available site is the school reserve near Hays Creek, but this is only several blocks from the King Edward School, and it would be manifestly unfair to erect another public school so near the King Edward, and force children from the southerly limits of the city to go so far. Moreover, the Hays Creek site is a very central one for the townsite as a whole, and for that reason should be retained for the site of our future High School.

6. If we look at a map of the townsite, it will be seen that schools built, one in Sec. 2, one on Acropolis Hill, one on the present King Edward School site and one where the present Seal Cove School is, will divide the townsite from south to north in approximately equal distances, and looking to the future, this is as it should be.

Protect Children.

7. Answering the objection that Acropolis Hill is difficult for little children to climb in rough weather, we propose erecting a hand rail from the bottom of the hill, which will assist the children in windy weather, and in any event the climb is only several hundred yards further than they have at present to go on Borden Street.

8. Answering the objection that there will not be good water pressure in case of fire, it is our purpose to install an electric pump to give this pressure, this pump only to be used in case of fire. A tank under the roof will provide sufficient force for water supply in the school. The city engineer and our architect have both declared this to be feasible.

Finally, it is impossible to secure a site which has no objectionable features, and in criticising the Acropolis Hill site the above reasons must all be considered, and though the majority of this Board were at first against the Acropolis site, it is now unanimous in its favor after a

great deal of careful thought and consideration.

Should be Permanent.

(B) As to the erection of a permanent building, our reasons are:

We should have a permanent structure erected out of brick, hollow tile, stone, concrete or a combination of these, for the reason that the city can obtain thirty to forty years to repay the bond issue which will make the payments very light upon the present ratepayers; lighter in fact than the payments for a frame structure, the bonds for which would have to be redeemed in ten years' time.

For this and other reasons, Mr. Johnson, the present city treasurer, who is an authority on these matters, strongly recommends the building of a permanent and not a frame building.

Needed at Once.

We need a schoolhouse of 12 class-rooms for the reason that we will be able to fill at least eight class-rooms as soon as the school is ready for occupancy and we should have a few rooms in reserve so that we shall not be compelled to build another school as soon as we have this one completed, which will be our predicament if we build a temporary six or eight room frame structure as some have suggested. At the present time we have all the available room taken in the Borden Street High School, and we will, in September, have at least three class-rooms rented outside of our schools and scattered about the city, with the consequent injury to the health of the pupils caused by inadequate lighting and ventilation of these places. Without a twelve-room schoolhouse we will be unable to cope with any reasonable increase in the population of the city.

Cost of Wood.

The architects have advised us that a twelve-room frame school house will cost approximately \$100,000, as against \$135,000 for a permanent school building, and the city treasurer has shown us that the annual payments to be made for this frame building will be considerably greater than for the permanent building, for the reason above stated. Mr. Johnson states that the carrying charges for this permanent school (reckoned at \$150,000) will only amount to an added three-quarters of a mill to our tax rate, while a frame structure at \$100,000 would mean an added 1 1/2 mills to the tax rate.

In a permanent building we will have greater security from fire, and much less cost for fire insurance, repairs and general upkeep, and we think the time has come when, as a city, we should commence to get away from so much temporary, make-shift erections, and thus avoid the necessity of having to be continually renovating and rebuilding as the old temporary structures become delapidated.

Defeat Detrimental.

Finally, we desire to impress upon the Prince Rupert ratepayers, in the most forcible manner, that the defeat of the present Bylaw will result in a delay detrimental to the best interests of public school education in the city. The school physician is already complaining about the effects upon the eyes of the children of the rented temporary premises now in use, and as the school population is steadily fast increasing the situation, from the standpoint of school room accommodation, will be desperate before the new building can be utilized.

We urge the ratepayers, therefore, to give this Bylaw their solid, loyal support, and thus show the rest of the province Prince Rupert's attitude towards education facilities.

TELLS OF WORK OF COMMISSION

Major F. A. Robertson, Chairman of Provincial Organization, is Visiting in City.

Major F. A. Robertson, chairman of the British Columbia Returned Soldiers' Commission, is in the city on an official visit in connection with the work of the organization which he represents. Seen in regard to the work of the organization the Major said that it was a central bureau of information for the returned soldier where a man could get information or advice and often be given the right steer. Most of the complaints they received were in connection with pay, but all sorts of other subjects were included.

The Provincial Legislature had voted a sum of \$250,000 to be used for patriotic purposes and most of this was available for the work of the commission. Their aim was to see that no needy cases ever were without attention but at the same time they had to be careful not to squander the money. There were no regulations laid down as to the disposal of the money, but each case was treated on its merits. Members of any of the forces, Canadian or Imperial could be helped from the fund.

The Commission was empowered to make advances on the soldier gratuities, but this was discouraged. Usually it was found better that the soldiers should depend on themselves as much as possible.

There are about 700 representatives of the commission in the province. C. L. Youngman, of the forestry department, secretary of the local G. W. V. A., is the representative here.

INDIAN CHIEF IS FINED FOR HAVING LIQUOR

Cider of 4.7 Proof in Possession of Port Simpson Big Tye.

William Goodwin, one of the chiefs of the Port Simpson band of Indians, was this morning fined \$50.00 and costs for having in his possession cider, which carried 4.7 proof spirits, this being an offence against both the Indian Act and the Prohibition Act. The case was tried before Indian Agent Perry.

Two barrels of the cider were seized in his store by Constable Watkinson at the fish camp in Wark Channel. The cider was manufactured in Vancouver and the department proposes instituting proceedings against the manufacturers.

Last week Constable Watkinson paid a visit to the Indian houses at Balmoral cannery and seized several barrels of home brew. Two Indians were charged, both hailing from Hazelton. One was fined \$100 and the other \$20 and ten days in jail for being drunk and failing to state where he procured the liquor. The cases came before Dr. Large at Port Essington.

The old company stock does not share in any of the ore now mined and shipped. The only value the stock has is that of division on the remaining payments due on the sale price of the property. Each shareholder receives this share according to the amount of stock he holds.

From the investor's standpoint he would have to ascertain the amount of money still due the old company for the properties and buy according to what the stock would be worth on division, which would be a very small amount per share on the outstanding stock.

Article 5 of my contract reads: "The party of the second part shall have the right to go upon said claims, develop the same, take the ore from same and to sell the same during such time as he complies with the terms of this contract." I personally have no
