Chimneys Crashed When Earth Was Shaken by Violent Quake in East Yesterday Afternoon Says Report

HALIFAX, Nov. 19.—Crashing chimneys and swaying buildings in several centres accompanied the most severe earthquake shock ever felt in the maritime provinces yesterday afternoon. No reports of damage have reached Halifax. Most of the provincial towns in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick reported nothing worse than a few tumbled chimneys and broken dishes.

The tremors were felt with marked severity in Sydney, Cape Breton, and St. Johns, Nfld. A dozen chimneys in Charlotte Street section of Sydney and several barns collapsed in the outlying districts. A supreme court witness fainted in the course of a trial and the scene shifted at a theatre fell 20 feet to the stage but escaped with a shaking up. Many stores found goods tumbled to the floor.

Albert Sargison of Victoria Dies

Well Known Newspaperman of B. C. Capital Passes Away Last Evening

VICTORIA, Nov. 19.—Major Albert George Sargison, a member of the editorial staff of the morning Colonist, died last evening following a brief illness, aged 67 years. Mr. Sargison had been connected with the newspaper for many years. At one time he was part owner and business manager, but during one of ownership changes he sold out and later joined the editorial staff.

Theatrical Man Died At New York

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The death occurred here yesterday of John Court, the well known theatrical man, who a number of years ago built a number of theatres and organized one of the largest theatrical circuits on the continent.

LORD BYNG ILL

Former Governor-General of Canada Suffering From Congestion of Lungs

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Suffering from congestion of the lungs, Lord Byng of Vimy did not pass a very good night and there was fear that he may suffer an attack of pneumonia. He has been confined to his bed since November 10.

BLACK RUST ARGENTINE

Wheat Jumps In Price Result of Adverse Reports

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—Wheat soared 1/2 to 5/8 higher today on reports of black rust from Argentine and similar action took place in Chicago, together with eastern buying. November wheat closed at 136 1/2.

In parts of the Argentine province of Cordoba the crop is described as near a failure from black rust intensified by sultry weather.

SECRETARY WAR DEAD

Hon. J. W. Good Lives but Short Time to Enjoy Honors in Hoover Cabinet

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Having enjoyed the honors of a cabinet position less than a year, Secretary James William Good, secretary for war in the United States cabinet, died at the Walter Reid Hospital here yesterday.

Good served as a member of the House of Representatives for 12 years, from 1909 to 1921, and rose to the important position of chairman of the house appropriations committee. In that capacity Mr. Good had much to do with the formulation of the appropriations for the war department as he had specialized in the allotment of funds for military defense while serving on the committee.

Besides his familiarity with the needs of the war department, he also was of assistance to President Hoover as a counselor in matters dealing with legislation, particularly government financial affairs. While in Congress he had been one of the principal sponsors of the budget system and was able to advise the president on questions of centralizing government expenditures.

The appointment of Mr. Good to the cabinet post was in recognition of his activities as "pre-convention western manager" of the Hoover campaign, which led to the nomination of Mr. Hoover as the Republican presidential candidate at the Kansas City convention in 1928. During the campaign he was in charge of the western headquarters of the Republicans and was a leader in the task of winning the Middle Western farmers to the Republican standard.

Like President Hoover, Mr. Good was a native of Iowa, having been born at Cedar Rapids on September 24, 1866. After being graduated from Coe College in his native state and the law school of the University of Michigan he entered upon the practice of law. In 1906 he was elected to his first public office, city attorney of Cedar Rapids.

Upon the conclusion of his service in Congress he returned in 1921 to law practice in Chicago, in which he continued until his appointment as secretary of war. With the entrance of the United States in the World War in 1917, Mr. Good in Congress demonstrated his attitude towards national defence and American soldiers. He led the fight in the House against the opponents of the national defence act and successfully sponsored two amendments "to put teeth in it."

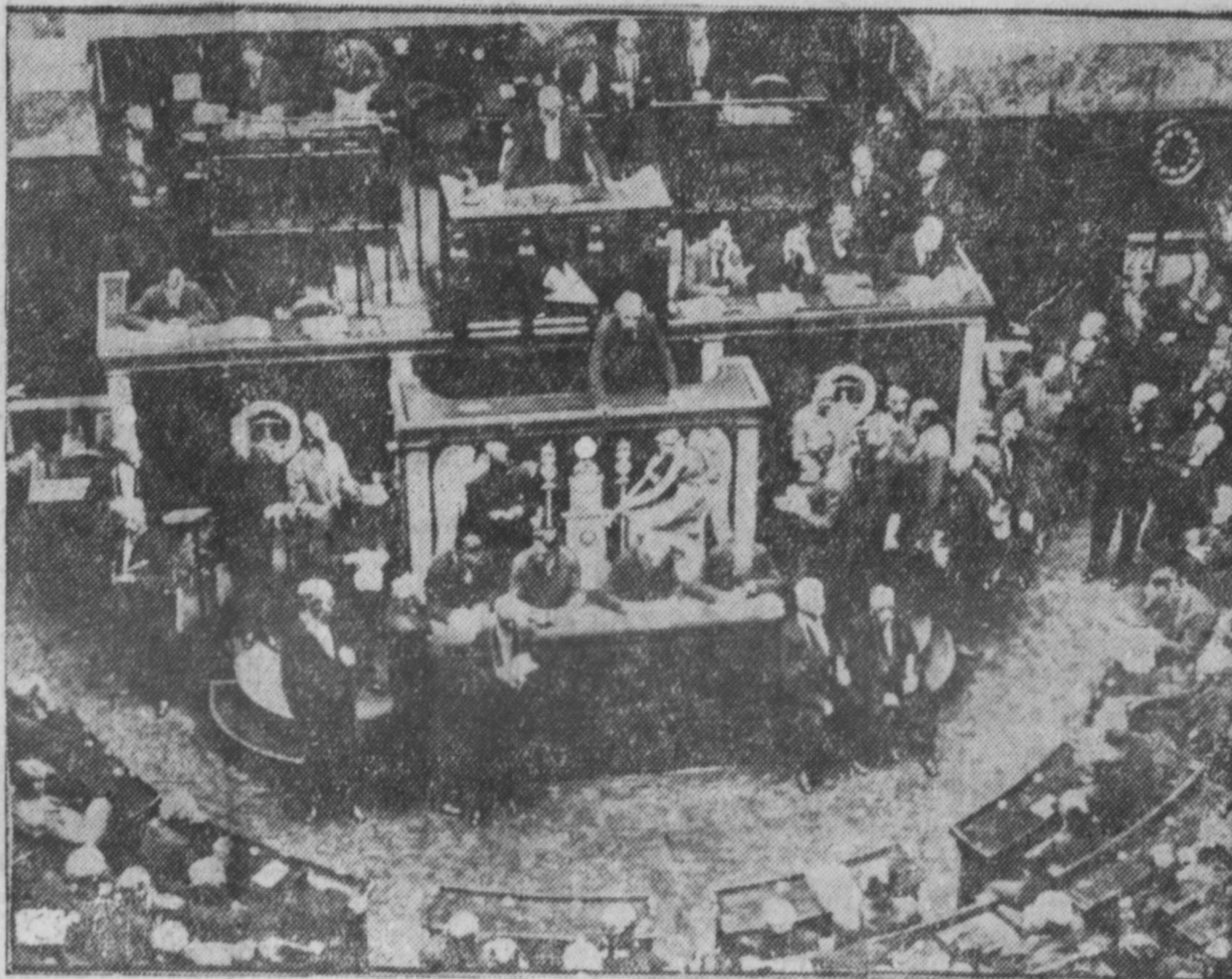
One amendment provided for the government's use of private facilities for the manufacture of munitions and armaments, while the other went further in providing that the government could take over a plant if its owner refused to give the government preference in orders during time of war. The latter was regarded as the first move towards the conscription of industry in time of war.

Mr. Good also sponsored the move to increase the pay of private soldiers and sailors on overseas duty from \$15.0 a month to \$30. When opponents of the measure tried to reduce the figure, the Iowa declared in the House: "Let us not make this a rich man's war and a poor man's fight. There has been 'no give and take,' it has been all 'take'—take from the pay of the common soldiers of the United States."

BIG EARTHQUAKE FELT AT SEA BY A CUNARD LINER

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The Cunard line today received a message from the liner Caladonia telling of a severe earthquake at sea, south of the Grand Banks off Newfoundland, yesterday which caused the ship violent vibrations for two minutes.

LOOKS TO YOUNG MEN TO ADVANCE CANADA IN FUTURE

VICTORIA, Nov. 19.—"I look to the young men in pride and confidence that they will not only seize the material advantages which Canada possesses, and which I think are greater than those of any other country, but also will seek to build up a unity of thought, and a unity of purpose and brotherhood that have made and will continue to make Canada the most honorable and decent country in the world to live in," said Colonel Woods, President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, amid cheers, speaking here.

"None of us is seized with the tremendous import of the development now proceeding in Canada," he declared. Her northern progress is so important as to indicate a leading position in the world. The drama of advancement and activity before us far exceeds any that has taken place in the United States.

Convention of Salmon Fishermen Held In Prince Rupert Yesterday And Today; Resolutions Passed

The salmon fishermen's convention, in session today in the city, Charles Lord presiding, passed several resolutions of particular interest to fishermen and citizens generally. There was a good attendance and at the close of the convention a new general executive was elected consisting of W. Lang, T. Deane, S. Paton, T. Roberts and O. Olson. M. Anderson was secretary.

Prominent among the resolutions passed were the following:

"That only those British subjects who can demonstrate their citizenship by their ability to speak English or whose names are on the voters' list be permitted to troll."

"That we engage in an effort to reduce the tariff on fishing gear."

"That we oppose any division of this coast into fishing areas with a view to processing the salmon in the areas in which it may be caught."

"That we oppose cannery licenses being issued to any cannery not operating a cannery and demand an open door for all and any parties capable of operating canneries."

The convention heard read the names of seven local businessmen who refused to sign the petition of protest against the use of salmon traps; they asked for the enforcement of the Duff Commission's report and decided not to incorporate for another year.

It was reported that the membership of the fishermen's union had increased five times.

There was some discussion about Orientals fishing illegally. The chairman opened the convention with an address in which he reviewed the activities of the last year and suggested a line of policy for this.

General Election Will Be Fought On the Question of Tariff, Declares Mackenzie King in Calgary Speech

CALGARY, Nov. 19.—The next general election in Canada will be fought out probably on the tariff question, Premier Mackenzie King declared at a meeting here last night. He appealed to the people of Alberta, which now sends so many United Farmers to Ottawa, to return supporters of the Government. He urged those who held Liberal principles and were opposed to high tariffs to get together. A united front of progressive thought and action should face the common Conservative foe.

The date for the next general election has not yet been considered by the cabinet, Mr. King announced. No date is likely to be fixed until there is something definite about the United States tariff bill and until a decision has been reached about holding the Imperial conference in Canada, proposed for next year.

No extreme policies would ever best serve the interests of Canada, Premier King asserted. He condemned any action which would give cause for hatreds against another nation or another race.

TWO BOATS TAKE FISH TO SEATTLE

Two American boats, not satisfied with the prices offered here, are taking their catches to Seattle. These are the Kanaka with 46,000 pounds and the Electra with 35,000 pounds. Both offered their catches on the local exchange today but refused to take the offers and a second sale took place with those boats eliminated. No Canadian boats were in sales were:

No Communists In Labor Party

EDMONTON, Nov. 19.—Communists, as individuals and as organizations, were definitely divorced and cast aside by the Alberta section of the Canadian Labor party in annual session in Edmonton, the party voting out the organizations and deciding to bar any known Communist from attending any party meeting as a delegate from an affiliated organization and to inform the latter that they must not name Communist delegates.

While the decision of the party was not unanimous by any means, it is sweeping in its effect and bars Communists from taking any part whatever in the Canadian Labor party, Alberta section, proceedings, and from being named candidates for any public office with the sanction of the Labor group or any of its affiliated organizations.

U. S. APPROPRIATIONS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The first move toward the carrying out of President Hoover's scheme for an increased building program was taken here yesterday. It is proposed to increase the federal government expenditures for public works from \$175,000,000 to \$423,000,000. One effect of this increase will be to give increased employment.

RALLY ON EXCHANGE

Stock Prices Recover After Morning Drop and Close Firm

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—A brisk rally which carried many leaders up from two to eight dollars net and a few specialties even higher, followed the opening wave of selling that carried many issues down from one to eleven dollars on the stock exchange today. The final prices were generally at or near the high levels of the day.

DOG SAVED MAN'S LIFE

Attacked Bear When Gun Failed, Giving Time to Get Into Action

QUESNEL, B.C., Nov. 19.—Charged by an infuriated grizzly bear, the largest ever seen in the Barkerville country, Hans Iverson, trapper and big game guide, of Indian Point Creek, Barkerville, owes his life to his dog, which held the grizzly at bay until Iverson could get his rifle, jammed at the critical moment, into action.

The day previously Iverson had killed a moose. Returning to take home the carcass he found a huge grizzly in the act of making the dead moose into a cache, covering it with earth, moss and debris.

Before the trapper had time to unsling his rifle the grizzly was charging down upon him. He hastily attempted to throw a cartridge into the chamber but the rifle jammed and Iverson found himself at the mercy of the beast. It was then that his police dog took the offensive, holding the bear occupied until Iverson could get his rifle in working order and killed the animal.

WAS SHOT BY PARSON

Man Hunting, When He Was Mistaken For Deer at Sooke, Near Victoria

VICTORIA, Nov. 19.—Louis Godtel, 43 years of age, a lifelong resident of Sooke district, was killed yesterday while scouting for deer near Otter Point.

Godtel was mistaken for a deer by Rev. Samuel Lundie, his hunting partner, reports state.

Plane Wrecked In Behring Sea

Rescue Plane About To Leave From Teller, Alaska, to Aid Elison

NOME, Alaska, Nov. 19.—A radio message yesterday from the fur-trading ship Nanuk, icebound on the Siberian coast, said that Carl Ben Elison's plane, carrying the Arctic flyer and the mechanic, Borlan, was sighted wrecked nine days ago some 60 miles from the ship. It is presumed that natives brought word to the Nanuk. The fate of the flyers is unknown. Frank Dorbrandt, who was with Elison flying with cargo and passengers of the Nanuk to Alaska, is preparing to take off from Teller, Alaska, to the aid of Elison. Rescue conditions are adverse.

BRITAIN WANTS CHEAP FOOD

Cheap food is what the people of Great Britain demand. That is why they do not like the present action of the Wheat Pool and other grain interests in refusing to sell Canadian grain and thus holding up the price.

Canada wants the best possible price for her grain. If the farmers are well paid for their product, the country is prosperous. All branches of industry feel the effect.

The difference between Canada and Great Britain on the grain question is as great as the difference between Canada and the United States on the tariff question. In each case it is a question of market, something that is alleged to have been responsible for many of the wars of the world.

Today people regard these economic differences with equanimity. They refuse to get excited about them. If we lose money over it, that is better than losing our best sons in a useless war. We are today coming to a point where we can fight an economic contest without losing our tempers.

GREAT IRISHMAN

T. P. O'Connor was one of the great Irishmen. He was one of the few men of his day who was able to fight a political battle without losing his head and doing and saying rash things. He was a literary man of considerable note and wit had that fount of humor that helps so much to carry the Irish to places of prominence in other countries than their own.

Many Irish members of Parliament attained prominence in their way. Many were the talk of the country for a week or a month. "Tay Pay" had that quality which survives. He saw all his compatriots pass from the political scene, yet he remained to the end, the last of the fighting Irishmen of a generation ago.

LEARNING TO LAND

Only a few years ago men were learning to fly. They were having their first experiences in the air, and their great aim and ambition was to get up and stay up. Today the problem that is engaging most of the experts is how to come down. Under proper conditions, landing is simple, but the moment they get away from those conditions there is extreme danger. One of the next great developments in aviation undoubtedly will be to land at any time and in any place with safety.

MEXICAN ELECTIONS

It is impossible yet to intelligently discuss the Mexican elections because no one can tell what will happen before that which he writes is published. Up to this morning there was nothing more serious than a few riots in which a score of people were killed.

In Mexico the election is only the first step in the contest. Taking over the reins of Government is a much more important move and those who hold the reins usually object to letting go with the result that a fight ensues.

Caravan Women
Visit Victoria;
Tell of Work

Miss Eva Hasell and Miss Iris Sayle Collected \$16,200 For Work Last Year

VICTORIA, Nov. 19.—Well known throughout Canada and Great Britain as the founder of the Sunday School Motor Caravan work in Western Canada, Miss Eva Hasell, accompanied by Miss Iris Sayle, arrived in Victoria.

Last summer these two workers covered 4,000 miles in Northern British Columbia and the Peace River district, visiting families and interesting parents and children in religious instruction in the Christian faith. As a result of the season's work, 18 new Sunday Schools were started, and 1,100 boys and girls added to the Sunday School by one.

Rapid Growth

In an interview, Miss Hasell remarked upon the rapidity with which the Peace River district is developing. Where a year ago, there were 3,000 people today the population is estimated at between five and six thousand.

Many new school districts have been organized, and the whole territory is presenting a great challenge to the church to provide as quickly and thoroughly as possible for the spiritual needs of the people. Miss Hasell's particular concern is to give parents help and encouragement in attending to the religious instruction of the children.

Miss Hasell is an English churchwoman who has done a remarkable work for families of pioneer settlers in scattered parts of Western Canada during the last nine years.

Last year, for example, she collected in England over \$16,200, and supervised the operation of 13 motor caravans in eight dioceses in the prairie provinces and British Columbia, each van carrying two trained Sunday school workers, one being also a qualified mechanic.

Miss Hasell and her fellow workers have visited tens of thousands of homes, started hundreds of Sunday schools, and added thousands of children to the church, through baptism and membership in the Sunday School by post.

The last two summers were spent by Miss Hasell in the Peace River district and other parts of Northern British Columbia.

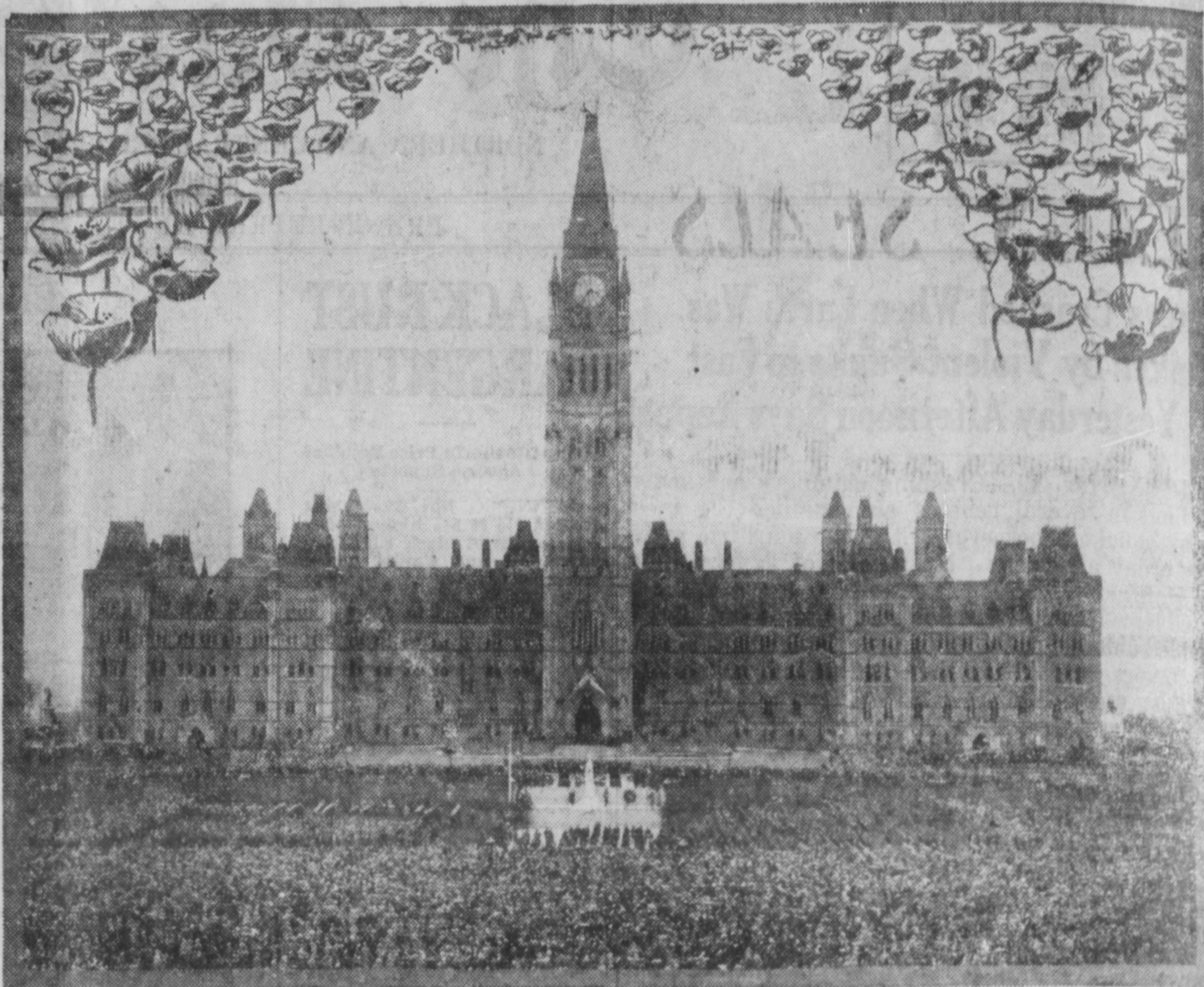
ACTIVITIES
OF KU KLUX

Alberta Minister Says Move Will Be Dominion-Wide in Scope

EDMONTON, Nov. 19.—Political action by the Ku Klux Klan in Alberta is not likely to be provincial only in character, but to be Dominion-wide, in its scope and influence, declared Hon. George Hoadley, minister of agriculture for the province, in an interview regarding reports that the Knights of the Fiery Cross were organizing in the province.

"I have known for some time," Mr. Hoadley said, "that agents of the Canadian organization had entered Alberta and were organizing at a number of places and in fact discussed the subject some time ago with one of my Ottawa friends."

"The Klan took an active part in the recent Saskatchewan election because they considered they had a grievance to remedy in the school situation in that province. We have no such situation in Alberta. Everyone in this province knows that our public schools are above suspicion and are strictly non-sectarian."

When it was pointed out to Mr. Hoadley that there were indications, agents of the Klan were organizing through and with the co-operation of another fraternal organization in the province, the minister said: "There are some of us who are members of that other organization, too, and we are not going to sit back and watch them have all their own way."

Cure For Sea Sickness Found

BERLIN, Nov. 19.—For the first time the therapeutic results of the treatment of seasickness with vasano have been published by Dr. F. Metzler, ship's physician on the liner Hamburg, who has described his experiences with the drug in cases running over a period of two years.
Dr. Metzler found that if vasano was administered early enough it invariably prevented mal-de-mer even in passengers who had suffered from the disease for years. In the milder form of seasickness, he says, tablets of vasano did the trick, whereas in persistent and more aggravated cases vasano suppositories were indicated, the curative effects setting in within half an hour and continuing, if not leading to a radical cure, at least 12 hours.
Vasano administered in conjunction with a soporific Dr. Metzler also found highly efficacious. He considers hypodermic injections the ideal form for administering the drug.

NEW BOAT IS COMING

C. P. R. Steamer Princess Norah to Make Her Initial Call at This Port Saturday

Replacing the steamer Princess Mary in the Alaska service for the winter, the new Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Norah will pay her first visit to this port Saturday morning when she calls here northbound from Vancouver to Skagway. The Princess Norah was built by the Fairfield Shipbuilding & Engineering Co. Ltd., Clydebank, Scotland, last winter and was delivered to the coast last spring, having been used since her arrival on the west coast of Vancouver Island run. She is a vessel of 2500 tons register, 250 feet long and 48 feet beam and is fitted with all the latest devices for the safety and comfort of passengers. Inside appointments of the vessel are very handsome. She is largely of a built-in type, being designed especially for service in heavy weather. She has capacity for 700 day passengers with 61 staterooms and beds for 165 persons. Her dining saloon seats 102 persons. She is a single screw vessel and a feature of her mechanical equipment is a bow rudder which enables her to make short turns and navigate in very narrow waters. No doubt many local persons will take the opportunity to inspect the vessel on the occasion of her initial call.

The gas and whistling buoy marking Vancouver Rock, Millbank Sound, B.C., has drifted away and will be replaced at earliest opportunity.

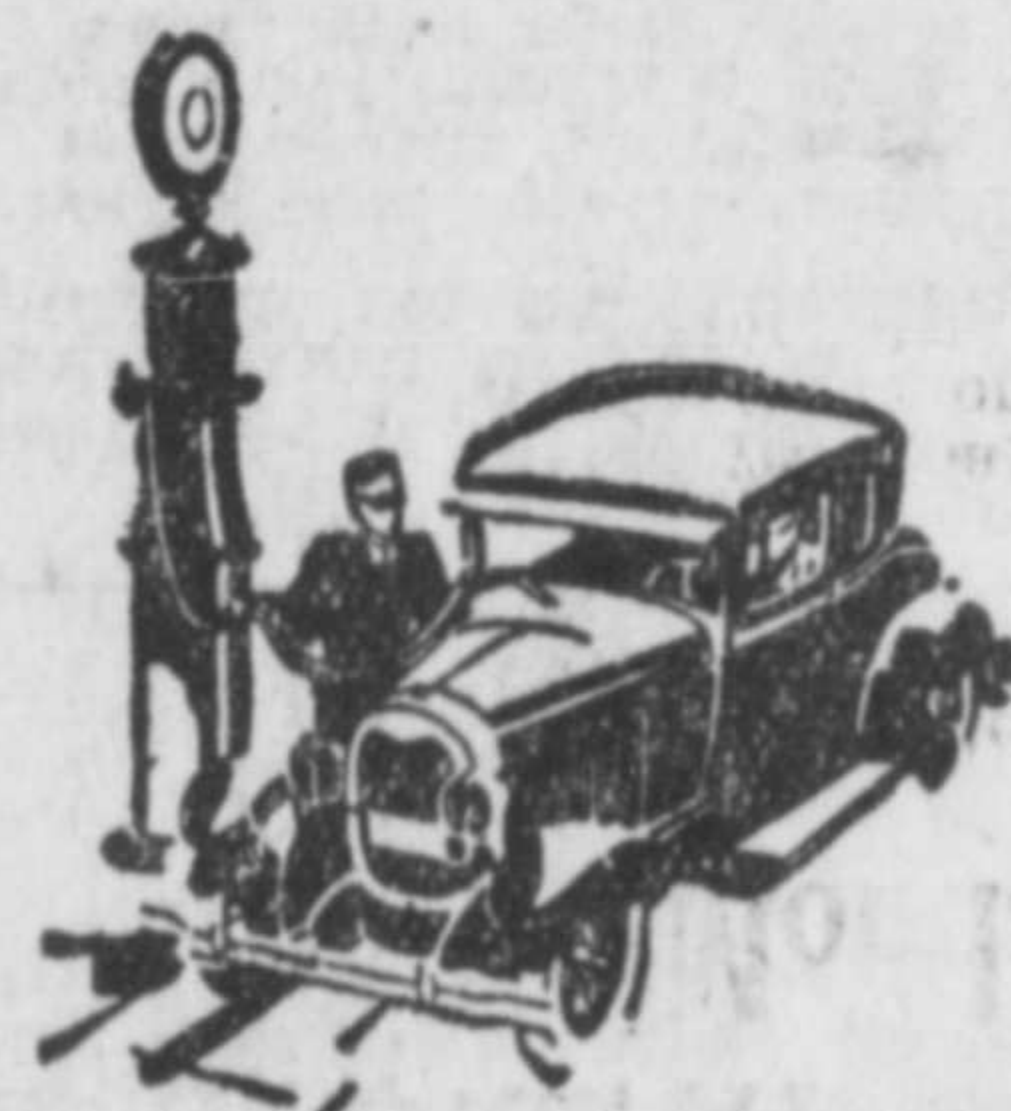
Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

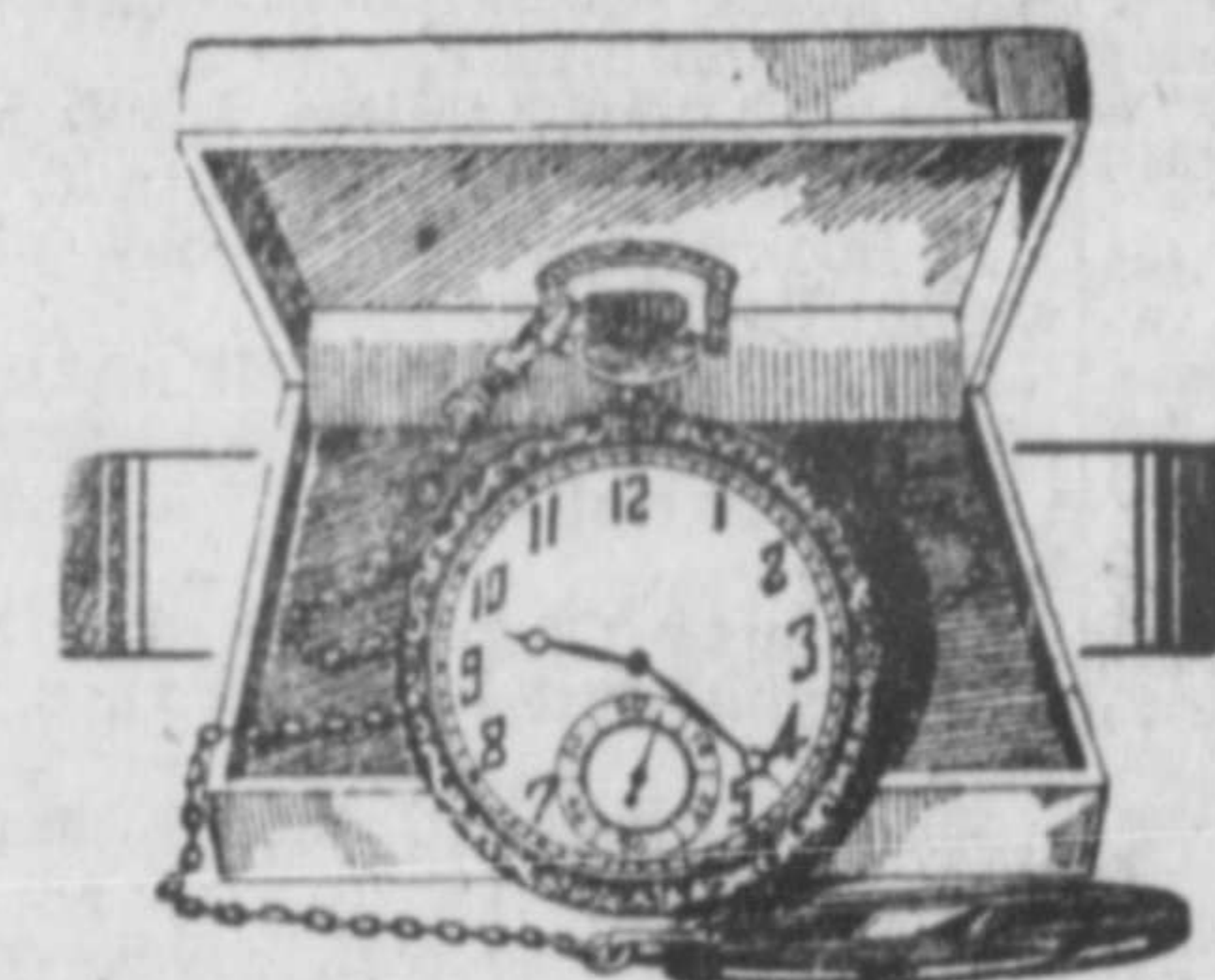
