Imperial Preference Comes Into Effect on September 1; Bill Regulating Labor Hours

List of Articles Issued to which Preferential Rates Apply; Number of working Hours for workers must not Exceed 48 Hours per week Exclusive of Meal Times.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, August 22.—Imperial preference goes into effect September 1. The commissioner of customs has issued a list of articles produced in the British Empire to which the preferential rates apply.

A bill regulating the hours and wages of employment of workers, minimum wages to be paid and the appointment of a commission to regulate the same, contains an order that the number of working hours shall be exclusive of the intervals provided for meals and that any working week shall not exceed 48 hours.

Payment for overtime, it is provided, shall in no case be less than 25 per cent in excess of the normal time rate.

CURRIE TELLS WHY FIGHT WAS KEPT UP TO END

Was Acting Under Direct Orders From General Foch in Taking Mons.

Montreal, August 22.—Following a civic reception tendered General Sir Arthur Currie, General Sir Arthur Currie, General Armstrong and the officers of No. 4 district gave a banquet in honor of the newly appointed Inspector General.

In his address General Currie gave a series of reminiscences with explanations in regard to the last few days of the conflict. He pointed out why Canadian corps had persevered in the fight to the last moment taking and occupying Mons when the armistice had been signed and the enemy beaten. This, General Currie said, had been done under direct orders from Marshal Foch.

NIPPON YUSEN KAISHA WILL CONSIDER PORT

Representatives of That Company in Prince Rupert Were Impressed with Possibilities For Ocean Traffic.

Capt. Usaburo Osawa and Senji Imai, representatives of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, Japan's greatest steamship company, have been here investigating the possibilities of the port. They will report to their company on what they find here. One is the port captain for the company at Seattle and the other is his assistant. They were impressed with the harbor, the railway grade and also with the nearness of this point to the Orient. They pointed, however, to the lack of local cargoes.

While they could give no assurance that the big shipping company would consider this port in its general scheme of transportation, that being a matter for their head office to determine, they expressed the opinion that the port had great possibilities and that it was not unlikely their company might take advantage of them. They left for the south last night.

Other applications for the position of matron were Miss Myrtle R. Mitchell, of Nelson; Miss Frances M. Frampton, Powell River; Miss May P. Turner, Victoria; Miss Amy F. Ebbutt, Nelson; Miss Theresa Clapin, Ottawa; Mrs. R. Pitts, Ottawa, and Miss Mary E. Stuart, Regina.

On the recommendation of the matron, Miss Florence A. Moore who has completed her training and passed her examinations was given her diploma and pin.

Tenders for the supplying of 200 tons of coal were opened and a committee composed of J. C. McLennan, Alderman McRae and D. G. Stewart was appointed to report next week.

CONTROL SUGAR

GROWTH OF BRITAIN'S ARMY INDICATED BY FIGURES PUBLISHED

London, August 22.—Great Britain's standing army with reserve and territorial forces on August 4, 1914, numbered 733,544 according to figures given out here. This army grew during the war until on November 11, 1918, when the armistice was signed, it numbered 8,654,467, including the colonial forces.

Copenhagen, Aug. 22.—Owing to the disturbed condition of the country martial law has been proclaimed throughout the whole of Hungary.

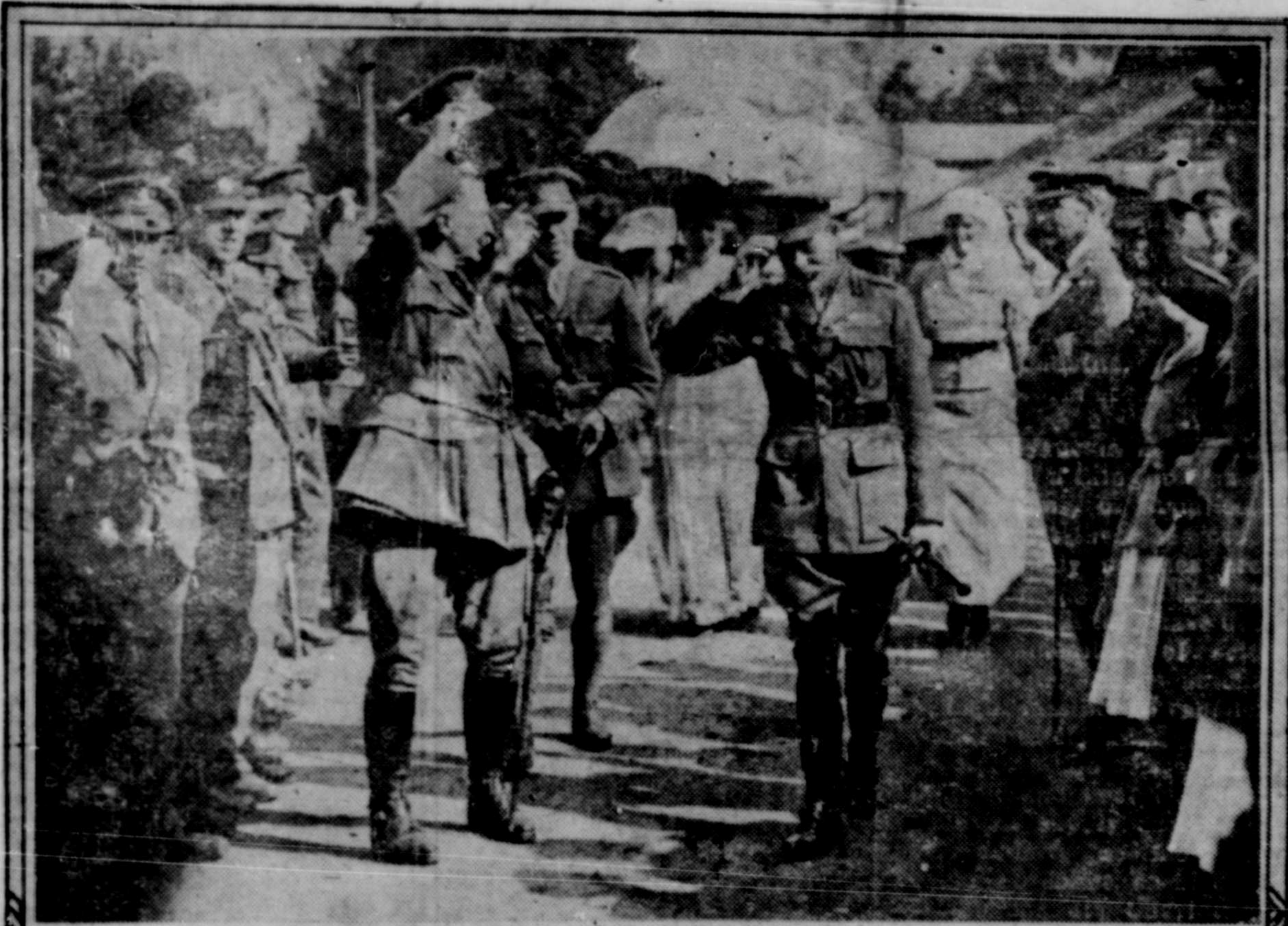

PEND MILLION A MONTH STILL WAR PURPOSES

Estimated Expenditure for Coming Year is Set at Over Three Times the Income.

Ottawa, Aug. 22.—The estimated expenditure for the fiscal year totals about \$820,000,000. The estimated revenue for the same period is approximately \$260,000,000. The difference, the government states, must be made up by borrowing, and the borrowing must be done at home.

There has been some little criticism of the school bylaw in regard to the cost. It is shown, however, by the city hall officials that for a permanent building they may issue thirty or forty year bonds, whereas a wooden structure would have to be paid for in ten years and the annual payments would be heavier than for the permanent building.

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

TAKE NOTICE that a vote of the rate-payers will be taken on the following by-law, in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on the 27th day of August, 1919, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.

A BYLAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY; AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00).

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert has determined to resurface the following plank roadways in the City of Prince Rupert, namely:

Section Five—Fulton St. and 8th Ave. W. Section Six—6th Ave. E. Section Seven—6th Ave. E. Section Eight—Conrad St.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00); AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue Serial Debentures to raise the said sum of \$25,000.00, payable in five (5) years from the date of the coming into effect of this bylaw, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum;

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of five (5) years, by special rate, the sum set out in the schedule to this bylaw for the payment of the principal and interest of said debt.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements and real property of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,580.00, and the value of the said debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for local improvements and school purposes, is \$860,676.26 which is not twenty (20) per centum of said amount;

AND WHEREAS this bylaw cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to resurface the plank roadways herein referred to, and also make repairs to the superstructure where necessary, such work to be executed under the supervision of the City Engineer.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said work hereby authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$25,000.00, which debt shall be payable in five (5) years from the date when this bylaw takes effect, for which debt Serial Debentures shall be issued, the principal of each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to sign, execute and deliver, on behalf of the Corporation, each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the office of the Bank of Montreal, a Montreal, Canada, or at the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the city of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York, U.S.A. or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

5. Each of the said debentures shall bear date the 1st day of September, A.D. 1919, and such debentures shall have annexed thereto coupons for the interest thereon at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March in each year, the first payment to be due on the 1st day of March, A.D. 1920.

6. The said coupons shall be deemed to have been properly executed by each one having written, stamped, printed or lithographed thereon the names of the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City of Prince Rupert. Each coupon shall be numbered with the number of the debenture to which it is attached.

7. All debentures issued under this bylaw shall be numbered consecutively, no matter when issued, beginning with the number one (1).

8. The principal of the said debentures shall be payable on the 1st day of September in each year and amounts set out in the schedule to this bylaw.

9. For the payment of the debt hereby authorized and the interest thereon, there shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, the annual sums set out in the schedule to this bylaw.

10. The total annual sums for interest and payment of the debt referred to in the preceding section shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures by a rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable land and improvements or real property within the Municipality.

11. The said debentures when issued, sold or hypothecated, and any coupons thereto attached, shall be deemed a valid and binding charge upon the said City of Prince Rupert.

12. The Council may sell the said debentures at less than par if it is found at any time necessary so to do.

13. This bylaw shall take effect upon the 1st day of September, A.D. 1919, but before its final passage shall be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers under the provisions of Section 145 of the Municipal Act, Chapter 52, 1914, as amended by Section 25 of Chapter 41 of 1915 and Section 33 of Chapter 44 of 1916.

Sandspit, Prince Rupert's Coming Summer Resort

Special Correspondent of the Daily News spends Vacation there and tells of its Attractions.

At present you go to Sandspit almost any old time, returning precisely the same hour. As the boat schedule is now arranged the visitor may stay either twenty-four hours or two weeks, unless he has friends there or the opportunity of making boarding arrangements, he will be obliged reluctantly to pass the spit and deposit himself nine miles further on up the inlet at "Charlotte" where there is a hotel. At present no such accommodation exists at Sandspit. In spite of the difficulties, however, this place might become at any time an important factor in making the people of Rupert contented with their lot. With such an object in view it is useless to waste time in apologizing for pointing out the reasons.

Sandspit as it is today warm in the sun ninety miles south of here is a point tapering from nothing to three or four miles across and consisting of about a thousand acres, of which a good proportion is land cleared, not painfully by man but easily by nature, who took, just at this spot, one of her infrequent whims to save human beings trouble. Man has cut a few holdings too and his apotheosis in the shape of Government, has run a good road along the three or four miles between the forest and the beach the length of the settlement, with here and there a cut through to farms on the other side.

Rare Loveliness.

The spit is the handle of a beautiful sickle-shaped little bay from the shore of which one looks up "the Inlet" at a view of rare loveliness, even on a coast of lovely views. But the practical thing is the shore itself, three or four miles of wide stretches of splendid sand with ideal bathing; all along. For the last fortnight

at all events the writer can testify that the water was of a delightful temperature. The beach is strewn with whitened logs and multitudes of shells—sea spoils of winter storms. A more fascinating holiday ground for children could not be imagined.

Along the southeast shore of the spit where the land is constantly being reclaimed from the sea and covers itself in two years with grass, lies a potential golf course that would have few equals in the world. As level as St. Andrew's with here and there a sand bunker, here and there one made of a tossed up heap of giant trunks that have voyaged, perhaps from California, the fairway to eighteen good holes lies open under the sun. It is almost possible to hear the language of the future looking for lost balls.

Wide Stretches.

This openness on these wide stretches where the light foam or the mosses give deliciously under one's foot, forms the great attraction to the people of a place like Rupert, where we live a little like the denizens of a moated castle longing for the time to come that will bring us greater freedom of movement. But the climate of Sandspit is also exactly what Rupert needs in complement to its own. Bright, soft, sunny days succeed one another all the summer months. It is never hot, but the warm scent of the sea air blowing over the white clover and the honeysuckle in the rancher's garden, is a thing to remember.

Plenty of Supplies.

No doubt there are other spots where sandy beaches are to be found among the islands along the coast, but they have not usually the amenities of settlement. Sandspit is divided among seven or eight families of ranchers from whom butter, milk, eggs, cream, vegetables and berries, as well as mutton and beef can be had in constant supply. Several of the settlers have gasoline boats which could, no doubt, be hired. There are shops at Charlotte and a wireless station from which the inhabitants chiefly learn at present when not to expect the boat. But these things will improve. For the moment the crying need of Sandspit is a wharf. Ottawa built one and it blew away. There is a tale that the nice boy from college that was given the job disregarded local advice about prevailing winds, but these things are often exaggerated. At all events the wharf has been gone some time and it is obviously difficult to take off freight in a small launch in all weathers or to keep fresh killed meat waiting on the beach without protection for a boat that doesn't come in until tomorrow at midnight.

Sandspit has petitioned for another wharf and is quite likely to have the opportunity of doing it again, so blind has Ottawa grown to documents of that kind from northern B. C. In case it does, Prince Rupert might do a wise as well as a friendly act in adding the weight of a few signatures. It is certainly to the interest of this city that a place of such beauty, convenience and charm should be made as accessible as possible, if for the sake of the children alone. Sandspit blooms with children and none of them are ever ill. Noticing the absence of a long felt want, I asked what one did if one wanted to be buried. Sandspit had not thought about it.

It takes eight hours to get there and the fare is eight dollars and ten cents each way, including meals and berth. Campers would be welcome while Sandspit waits for the little summer cottages and the big summer hotel which are bound to come.

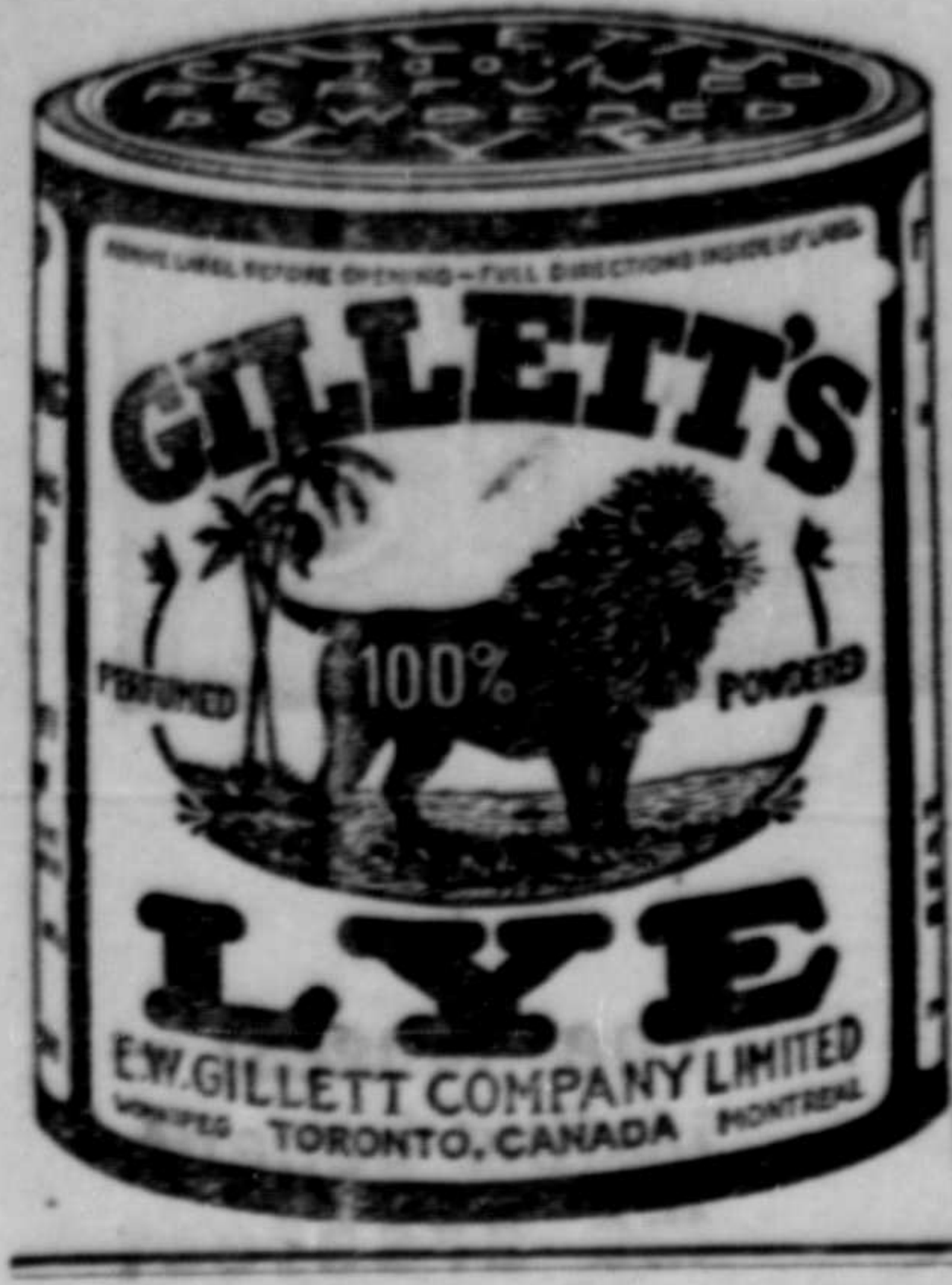

LIEUTENANT TOOK WHEEL WHEN SKIPPER DIED



No bands were playing welcome music for the returning troops arriving on-board the transport Finland, which reached Hoboken the other day. The old Red Star steamship carried her ensign at half staff. One day out from Brest the veteran skipper of the Finland, Captain J. B. Hill, of Philadelphia, died at the wheel. Captain Hill had been with the Red Star since 1888 and was one of the best known skippers of the Atlantic. When the government took over the Finland as a transport Captain Hill received the grade of lieutenant commander and later was raised to commander. Upon his death the transport was turned over to the command of Lieutenant Commander J. R. Rague, who is only twenty-three years old and the youngest commander to bring a vessel of the Finland's tonnage into the port of New York. He was an officer of the Finland under Captain Hill and had a lieutenant commander's rating in the Naval Reserve.
