Dempsey Lays Wreath on Bronze Casket Inscribed "My Pal"; Fighter Says He Has No Intention of Filling Rickard's Shoes

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 .- A train bearing the body of Tex Rickard from Miami Beach reached Pennsylvania station this morning. Thousands of people jammed the station, but only friends and newspapermen, numbering more than 100, were permitted to enter the approaches of the train. Mrs. Rickard was near a state of collapse.

The body of the promoter was encased in a \$15,000 cronze casket and covered with an immense floral emblem,





Prudhomme's amendment and the report was adopted with he alone dissenting and requesting that his dissension be recorded.

The committee apointed by His Worship the Mayor to inquire into charges preferred by Ald. Prudhomme against the engineer and his department held four sittings hearing evidence, and herewith submit our report. For convenience the paragraphs contained in the charges are referred to numerically as follows:

"Paragraph 2, re concrete sidewalks-According to evide ce submitted, we find that the engineer used the standard mixture of 1-2-4 on all sidewalk construction referred to in this paragraph and that Ald. Prudhomme's figures were arrived at from the progress; sheets issued from the engineer's department, which were estimated quantities only of materials delivered to a particular job. Ald. Prudhomme's statement that mixture of 4 cubic yards of rock, 2 of sand and 1 of cement would yield just under 7 yards of concrete did not appear to be substantiated by authorities, who placed the amount of concrete secured from this mixture at from 4 to 4 1-2 yards.

"Paragraph 3, re excessive amount of steel used in sidewalk construction-We find that the engineer did use heavier steel in certain instances than is customary for this class of work, but that said steel was purchased below the market price for the regulation size. We also find from evidence that the steel was properly placed in the forms.

"Paragraph 4, excessive time and material in making forms-We find that the material used in this work was used material and of larger dimensions than would have been necessary if new material had been purchased.

"Paragraph 5, placing piers for sidewalks half way under buildings-The piers referred to in this paragraph were put in to save the greater cost of a retaining wall and not to the advantage of any particular property. The legalities property holders had beforehand been satisfactorily adjusted, they






