## LEGISLATIVE MILL IS NOW GRINDING FURTHER STEPS TAKEN IN MATTER OF NORTHERN ROAD

### Government Will Change Game Act and Modify Constitution To Do Away Holding By-elections

VICTORIA, Jan. 24. — Four government measures were introduced and given their first reading in the legislature yesterday. One of these does away with the holding of by-elections for ministers called to office; another proposes to take the Game Act out of the jurisdiction of the provincial police and place it in the hands of a game commissioner, the province to be divided into districts and the existing game board to be abolished.

In regard to the first-mentioned bill, the effect of the amendment will be to change the Constitution Act. Under it ministers selected immediately following a general election will not have to go back for re-election, or will a by-election be necessary at any time a member of the house is selected for ministerial office.

Introduction of a remedial bill reveals the fact that the speakers have been drawing an extra indemnity for the office without having legal claim to it. Moreover they have been violating a rule of the house which forbids the taking of a salary or remuneration under gift from the government.

Amending the section will rectify this and legalize the intention of the legislature that there should be an extra allowance for the speaker. It will also be made retroactive.

The governments will put in an extensive artificial spawning program and a quantity of the catch will be restricted partly through the extension of the closed seasons and also by fixing of the limit to quantity of fish which can be caught in any particular year. Practically the same policy will be followed in the case of halibut.

### IRON INDUSTRY IN PROVINCE

Bounties to Be Given For Re-Manufacturing From Scrap Iron

VICTORIA, Jan. 24. — Private members, who commented yesterday on the government's intention to introduce a legislation to aid the establishment of the iron and steel industry, expressed the opinion yesterday that the bounties on steel manufactured from scrap iron would be one of the chief features.

This, it was said, foreshadowed the establishment near Vancouver of a plant for this purpose. It is said among private members that the bounty would be between \$1 and \$1.50.

### HUGE YIELD WHEAT CANADA

OTTAWA, Jan. 24. — Canada's yield of wheat for 1928 was 533,571,700 bushels. This is the first time the crop has passed the half billion mark, it was announced yesterday by the bureau of statistics.

### PATTULLO TO SPEAK TODAY

Moved The Adjournment of The Debate Yesterday After The Mover and Seconder Had Spoken

VICTORIA, Jan. 24. — The usual address in reply to the speech from the throne was moved by W. F. Kennedy, member for North Okanagan and seconded by Dr. G. K. McNaughton, member for Comox, both of whom spoke at some length.

The adjournment of the debate was moved by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, leader of the opposition, who will be the first speaker on the address today and who will give some indication of the policy of the opposition in dealing with the public questions coming before the House. It will be Mr. Pattullo's first speech from the benches to the left of Mr. Speaker.

### Ex-Alderman Casey Tells About Conditions as He Found Them in East Canada and United States

Indicating that the Dominion is on the eve of a period of great commercial and industrial prosperity, business in the larger cities of eastern Canada seems to be flourishing and unemployment is an apparently minor matter, according to Ex-Ald. George B. Casey, who returned to the city yesterday following a month's trip east. It was over 30 years since Mr. Casey had been east and he noted a great change in general conditions and a big increase of population. Windsor, Ontario, is one of the cities that has been going ahead rapidly and it now boasts a population of some 60,000 people.

Besides visiting his native home at Chatham, Ontario, Mr. Casey spent most of his time while away at Detroit, where his mother and other relatives live. The automobile industry is making a great city of Detroit. It is here that the immense plants of the Ford Motor Co. are situated. Mr. Casey made a tour of one of these plants and its magnitude was an almost incomprehensible revelation. Some idea of the size of the industry may be judged by the fact that Henry Ford made an announcement on New Year's Eve that 30,000 more men were to be taken on at the gradual rate of some 400

### COMBAT MOVE TAKE HALIBUT MARKET AWAY

Vessel Owners' Association of Seattle Sends Delegate to Washington

SEATTLE, Jan. 24. — Acting on a rumor that a representative of the Ketchikan Commercial Club had been sent to Washington to ask for a bill setting duty on halibut entering at Canadian ports, H. E. Loken, manager of Seattle Fishing Vessel Owners' Association, has been sent to Washington to combat such a move, it was announced here.

Reports received by the association states that a duty of two cents or more per pound on halibut catches is being sought on ships unloading at Prince Rupert, while Ketchikan is duty free. Such action would virtually make Ketchikan the controlling centre of the fishing industry of the north, the association declares, and would be detrimental to the individual fishing boats.

### NICHOL LEAVES LARGE ESTATE

\$2,500,000 Will of Former Lieutenant-Governor to Be Probed Next Week

VANCOUVER, Jan. 24. — Application will be made next week for probate of the will of the late Hon. W. C. Nichol. The estate will probably be valued at \$2,500,000, consisting of real estate and securities.

Income from the estate will be divided equally among members of the family and the residue will pass to the heirs of the children.



CANADIAN DOGS FOR BYRD'S ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

### TOLMIE HAS COLD WILL NOT LEAD HOUSE FEW DAYS

VICTORIA, Jan. 24. — Premier Tolmie will be confined to his home for a day or two by a cold contracted yesterday when he stood bareheaded in the wind on the steps of the Parliament Buildings to greet the Lieutenant-Governor.

Hon. H. R. Pooley, attorney general, will lead the house in Tolmie's absence.

### PROTEST MADE AT EMBARGO

Railways Join In Protest Against Recent Immigration Ruling

MONTREAL, Jan. 24. — A partial embargo placed against central European colonists by the Dominion department of immigration and colonization drew the C.P.R. and the C.N.R. yesterday a formal protest.

The decision, it is claimed in the statement issued by the presidents of the two systems, will not only work a hardship on both the transportation companies, but will destroy the faith of the governments of those people affected have in Canada.

### Five-Year Charter is Sought for Railway to Peace from Stewart

Capital to Be Increased From Two to Ten Million Dollars and Old Charter Otherwise Amended to Permit of Financing

VICTORIA, Jan. 24. — Completion of the Northeastern Railway from Stewart to the eastern boundary of the Peace River block within five years and the extension of a branch line up the Findlay River from Fort Grahame, B. C., to tap the richly mineralized Ingenika district is proposed in a bill it is planned to introduce this session.

George A. Walkem of Vancouver will present the petition for the introduction of the bill which amends the old charter to permit the financing of the undertaking. Authority is sought to increase the capitalization of the company from two to ten millions.

LONDON, Jan. 24. — It was stated officially at Buckingham Palace today that there was no change to report in the King's condition, the progress previously announced being maintained.

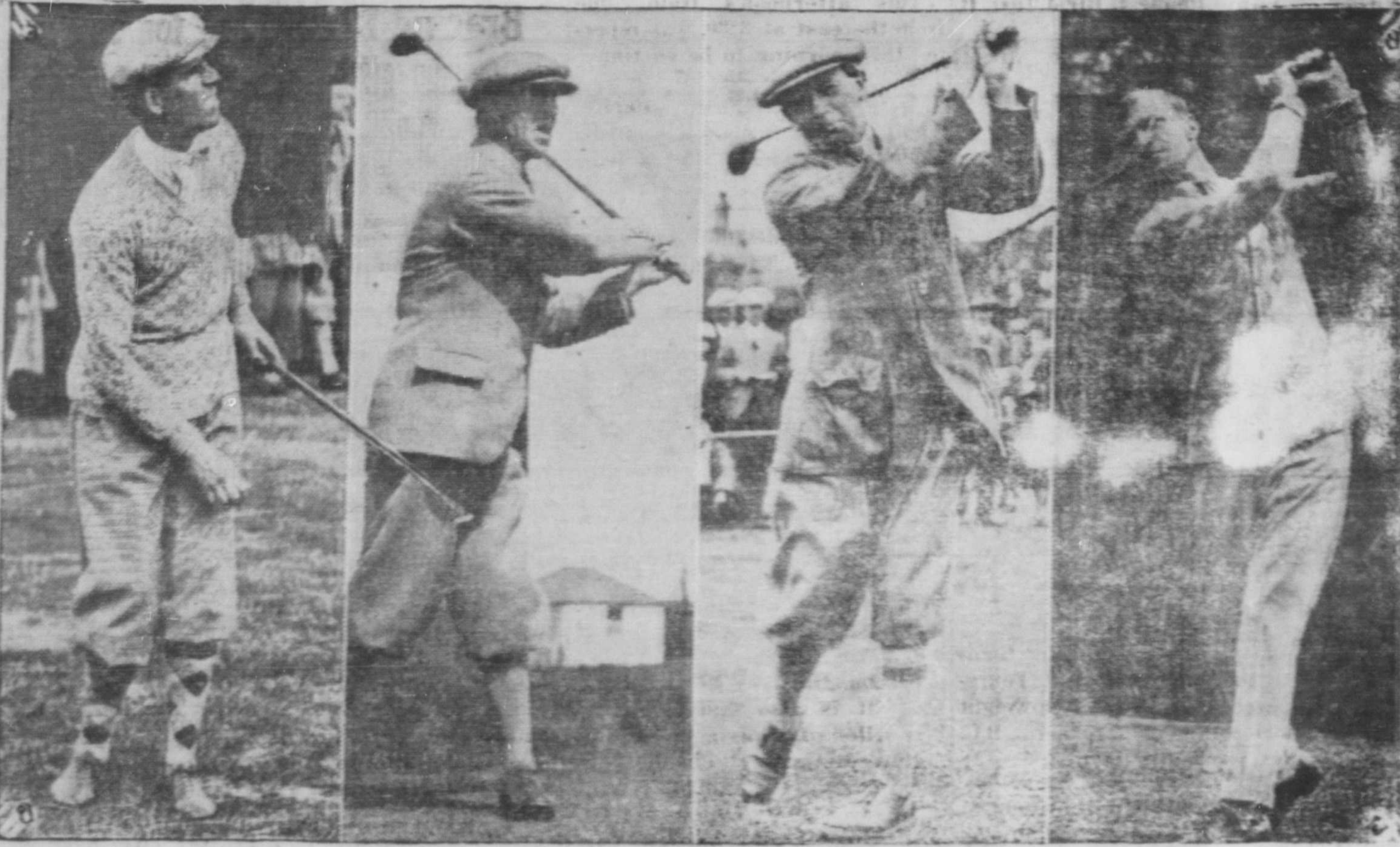

**POLITICAL CONSCIOUSNESS**

One of the debaters in the team that is touring Canada from Australia spoke of the need of developing a political consciousness in the people of the country. That is what we need in Canada. We need a people who will study political questions and take part in campaigns, voting not according to party affiliations, but according to the best individual judgment of the voter.

The Daily News tries to give the people of northern British Columbia as much political news as possible, showing both sides of questions. Yesterday we featured the speech from the throne, which is the official pronouncement of the Tolmie administration. We shall also, as opportunity arises, give summaries of the speeches of the leaders on both sides. In that way people are induced to take an interest in government affairs.

Often we hear people speak of too much politics. We do not agree with them. We think we have too little politics. Politics is the science of government, and we should all learn as much about it as possible. This is different altogether from what is sometimes branded a machine politics or party politics.

**ANIMATED ATLAS**

The Natural Resources Intelligence Department has just issued an "Animated Atlas," in which by means of pictures an attempt is made to illustrate the natural resources of the various provinces and sections of the country. It is a very interesting attempt, but there is one criticism which might be made. The pictures of animals made to represent the sections devoted to big game hunting so predominate over the pictures of sacks of gold and timber that the impression might be conveyed that the whole country is overrun with wild animals.

The prairie provinces have minor pictures showing grain growing, but bears and moose and elk and wolves seem to dominate. While the maps are interesting and very well executed we doubt their value.

**FASCISM'S FUNNY WAYS**  
(Victoria Times)

One of the leading Fascist newspapers in Italy has denounced the tourist trade to that country because of its humiliating effect upon the populace. It says the poorer class of tourist is of little benefit, while the wealthy visitor is "pretentious and aggressive and seems to regard the whole of Italy as his own property." We then read that "the epoch when rich English nabobs and others of the same brand invaded Italy from January to May, when there were frequent marriages between coats of arms and dollars, is over; today things are different. We feel far better alone in our homes, and we shall keep to ourselves our patrimony of art, beauty and memories without hearing at every step that fastidious 'very beautiful' of the traveling admirer."

The London Times says articles such as these are certain to have an unfortunate effect upon British, Canadian and United States tourists, who of recent years have formed by far the largest percentage of tourists in Italy. All we feel inclined to say is that the London Times now has an excellent opportunity to help the United Kingdom with its recently-announced "Come-To-Britain" campaign, leaving the black-shirt holiday ground to its own seclusion. The great London daily also may devote more space to extolling the beauties of Canada as a land of wonder which never will have to play second fiddle to any country on earth as a holiday resort. Let the wealthy Briton try the lakes of British Columbia and give Como and Maggiore a rest until Italy lifts her tourist ban. Western Canada will provide him with all the Alps he may require. And our people will not shudder if he drops a few "very beautifuls" occasionally.

**NEW DESTROYERS TO BE FINISHED IN JUNE, 1930**

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—The two new destroyers of the Amazon class for the Royal Canadian Navy should be completed by Thornycroft at Southampton about June, 1930, according to word received at the Esquimalt Naval Barracks.

Each craft will carry four 4.7 inch guns, two anti-aircraft guns and two triple twenty-one-inch torpedo tubes. With a speed of thirty-five knots, each will be 320 feet long and manned by a crew of 150.

Together the destroyers will cost Canada \$3,500,000. One will be stationed at Esquimalt, replacing H.M.C.S. Vancouver, and the other at Halifax, replacing H.M.C.S. Champlain, loaned by the British Government when H.M.C.S. Patriot and Patrician were retired. No word on the date of arrival of the destroyers has yet been received.

  
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**CHIEF JUSTICE BUYS LICENSE**

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—Chief Justice Gordon Hunter of the supreme court of British Columbia, who lives at Victoria, and Mrs. Eleanor Morden of Detroit, obtained a marriage license here yesterday.

ROJND PRINCE RUPERT

Terms of Toric Deal Made Public; Cutting Ore Body on Tiger at Alice Arm; North Star Company Formed

Terms of the deal whereby the Britannia Mining & Smelting Co., Ltd., has optioned the Toric mine at Alice Arm provide that Britannia assumes current debts to the amount of \$30,000 of the Toric Mines Co., Ltd., this amount to become a first mortgage on the property. If, by the end of March this year, Britannia exercises its option to purchase, it will immediately incorporate a new company out of the shares of which Toric will be paid for the property, Britannia having the option to purchase the shares back. If Britannia does not exercise the option, the deal provides that all moneys paid by it on the property shall be repaid to Britannia by March 31, 1930, the total amount not to exceed \$5,000.

Development work by the Utility Mining & Financing Co. on the Tiger property at Alice Arm is being concentrated in No. 3 tunnel. The ore body encountered a few weeks ago has been cut through and has a width of nearly nine feet. The ore is of good milling grade. The extent of this ledge, which was not indicated on the surface, cannot be determined until drifts have been made on it. Work is being pushed as rapidly as possible in No. 3 tunnel in order to encounter the 14-foot ore ledge cross-cut by No. 2 tunnel. The tunnel is now in 300 feet.

The North Star Ore & Smelting Co. has been incorporated with capitalization of \$100,000 for the purpose of developing the North Star mine at Alice Arm, thus adding another operating property to the Alice Arm list this year. Capital has been supplied by Chicago interests for the development of the North Star, which adjoins the Dolly Varden and has been under development for some years.

An enquiry has been received from New York asking how much Silver Creek Mines, Ltd., will take for the Saddle property in Hastings Arm. Officials of the company in Vancouver are looking into the offer, as a result of which new interest is being centred in the property. P. E. Peterson, engineer for the company, is at present in New York. The Saddle property is now near the shipping stage, the aerial tramway requiring only a few weeks' work to complete when the snow clears.

DR. DAVIES WILL REMAIN

Withdraws Resignation From City Temple at Victoria Meeting

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—Rev. Clem Davies, pastor of the City Temple, who recently resigned has reconsidered under pressure from the members of the congregation.

In announcing his decision following several previous refusals to stay, the pastor stated that he considered that a modern should not be compelled to spend so much of his time "cadging coppers from comfortable congregations" and since good was transmissive, no church member could receive any appreciable amount of help from a church unless he was prepared to render in return his quota of finance, and service to the cause. Under the conditions heretofore prevailing, he said, that it would be better to face the question of immediate dissolution while the movement was in a position to meet all its obligations, than to succumb slowly from lack of financial support and active interest. He had found the universal desire for his continuance, coupled with assurance of adequate support of the movement, irresistible, and under those conditions he would retract his decision and remain.

Much satisfaction was evinced by board members at the conclusion of their deliberations, since their object had been reached and a policy outlined to undergird the Temple, which, when put into practise, would enable the church to render a larger service to the city, province and membership.

### NEW LIBRARY FOR VICTORIA

Proposal to Build Made by Member of Board

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—The selling of the present Victoria Public Library for \$100,000, and the erection of a more commodious and modern building on city-owned property, is a proposal that is being considered to provide more accommodation at the library, Alderman William Marchant, member of the library board states.

The existing library had reached its capacity, the alderman said. The janitor's rooms were being used for the storage of books. The board would be faced this year with the problem of finding more space.

Several alternatives were offered. One was the branch library system, whereby residents could procure fiction books from the branches in their district and use the main library for both fiction and reference. This system would lessen the amount of space required now for the fiction books at the Public Library.

Another suggestion is that the present library be extended. The first named alternative, that of erecting an entirely new building, offers the best solution to the present congestion, however.

"Many of the farmers themselves are running cars today and they all want good roads," said another delegate. "We want good highways today, not 25 years from now, and the gasoline tax is a fair way of distributing the cost."

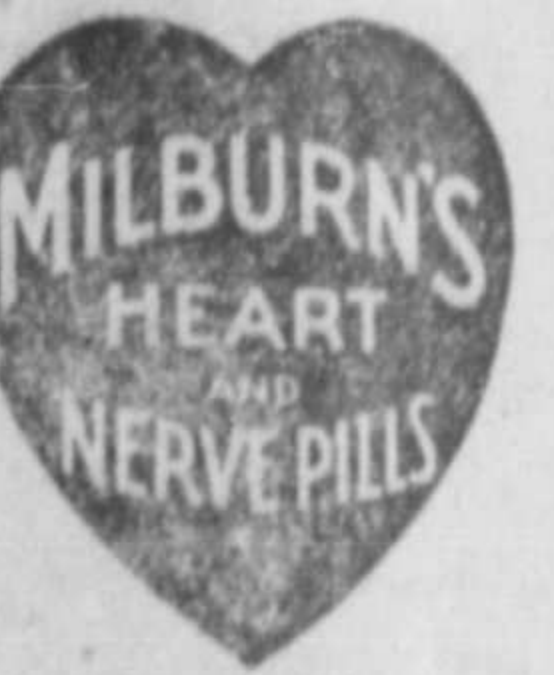

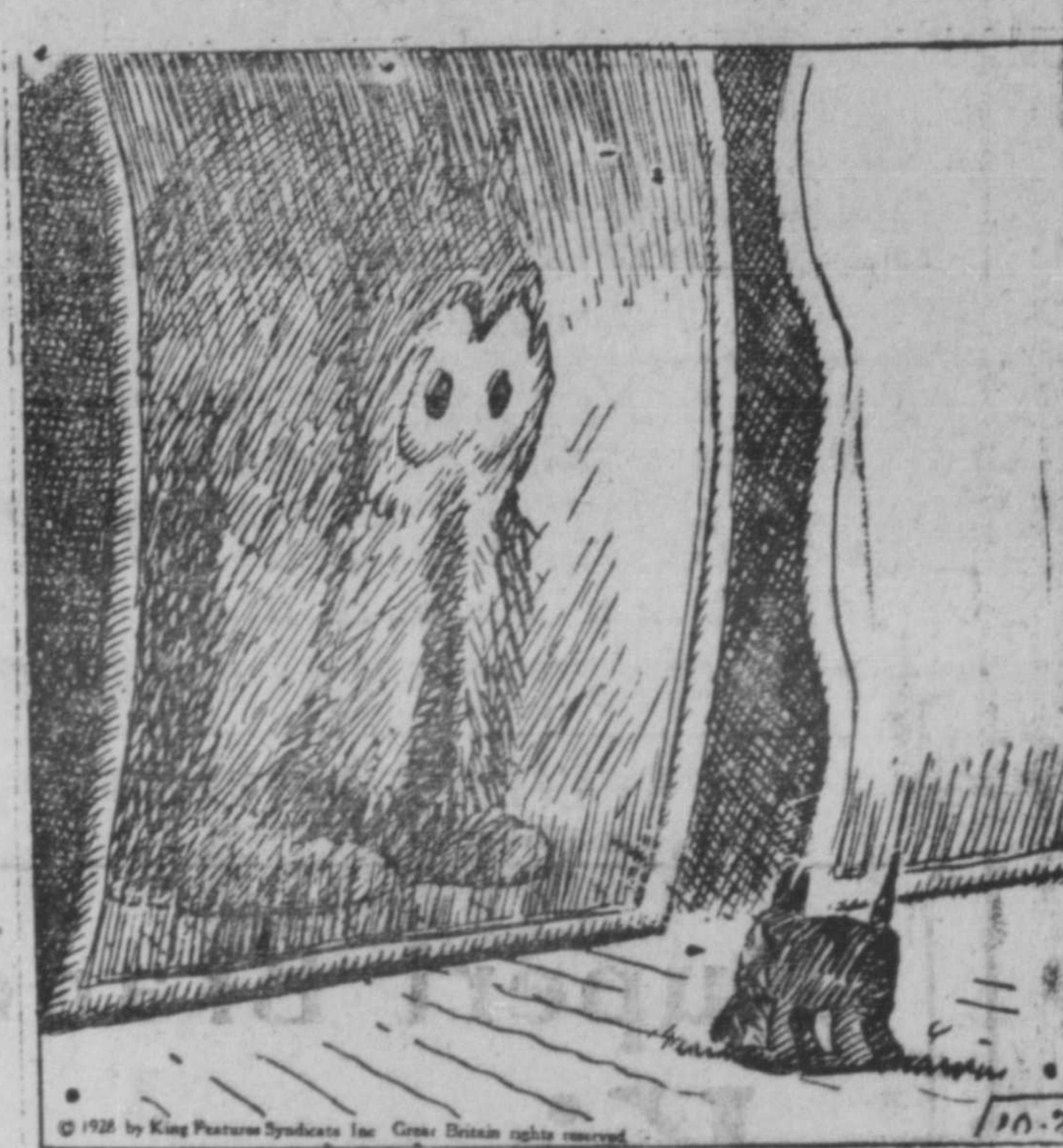

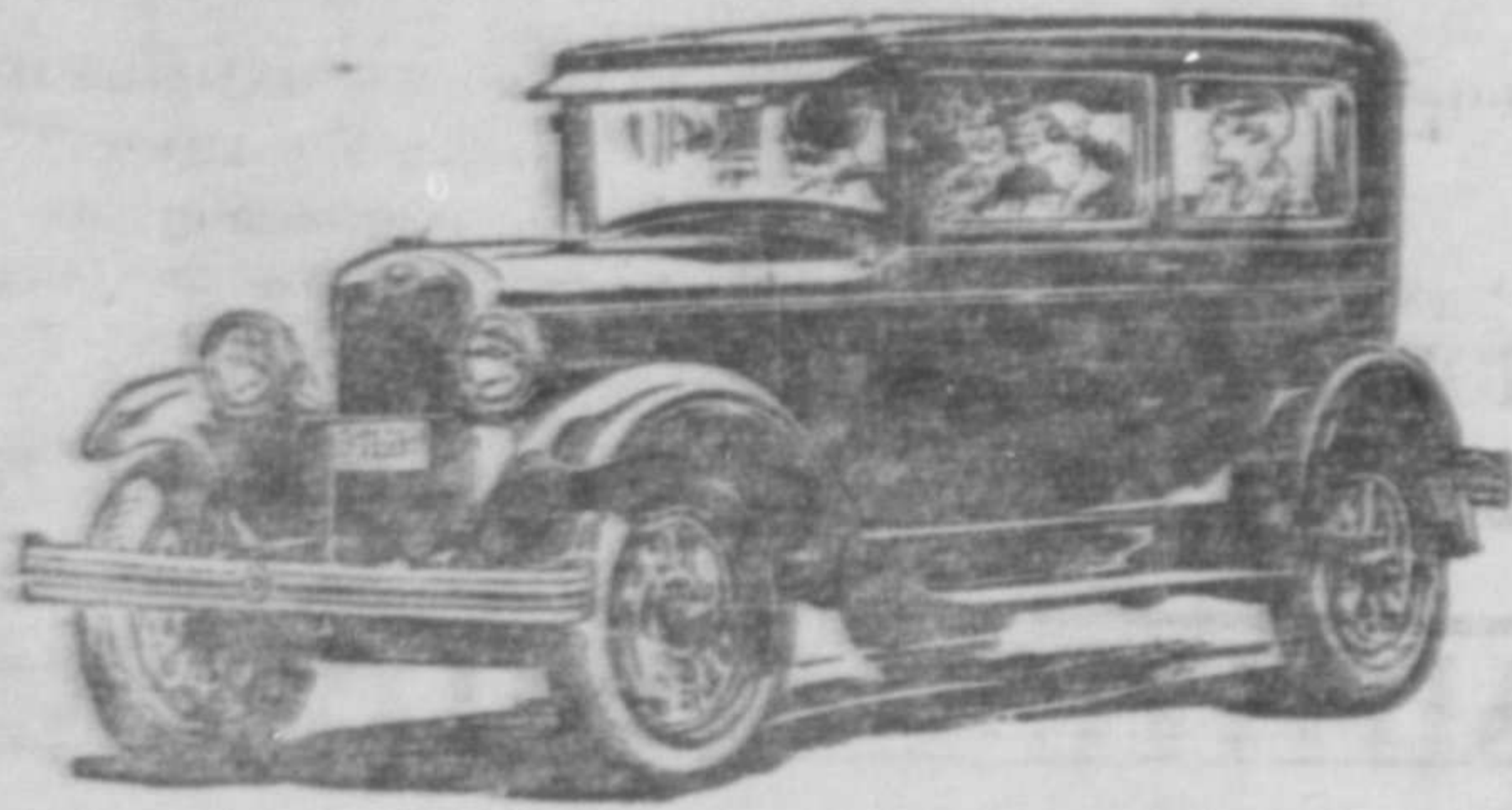
