"When we think or read of the work of the Canadian Army in France and Flanders we swell out with pride, but when we think what provision is made for the widows and orphans of those who fell, we have to hang our heads in shame."-Major F. A. Robertson, D. S. O.

"We must face this question fair and square. Why not be British and see that the widow and orphan is properly cared for. Forty-eight dollars a month is not enough for a woman, and twelve dollars a month is not enough for a child."-Sergeant-Major Jimmie Robinson.

London, August 23.—A general strike or a general election, probably the latter, will be brought on soon to give an opportunity to protest against the action of the British Government in refusing to nationalize the mines, according to a statement made by Fred Bramley, parliamentary committeeman of the Trades

Mr. Bramley added that the Government's decision was in direct opposition to the policy of the Trades Union Congress, which supported the nationalization of the mines.

All Kinds on Island in Arctic Ocean.

GERMAN INTERESTS TAKEN BY BRITISH

Press despatches yesterday told of the discovery of an immense quantity of coal at Spitzbergen, the island which abounds in min- less. erals of all kinds directly north of Norway within the polar circle In that country they have a climate which resembles the Uni'ac Kingdom as it is kept warm the Gulf Stream.

The Scottish expedition referred to in the despatch was sen out by the Northern Exploration Company. At the last meeting o the company the chairman re ported as follows:

"We have now the most abundant evidence of the existence of this mineral, in such quantities and of such quality that if we had to rely on this product alone great success is absolutely as sured. Our last advices show that without modern machinery either to get or load the coal, we have obtained (with a very limited number of men) several thousand tons, and stacked it ready fo shipment. Given electrical coal cutters, conveyors, wire ropeways and piers, our output of coal need have no practical limit, and when I tell you that the present price of coal ex ship in the northern part of Norway is £6 to £8 per ton, it appears to me and my codirectors that there is room for the energies of a number of Spitzcoal alone.




