## Should Hang Our Heads in Shame at Treatment Given to the Widows and Orphans

### Speakers at Meeting Last Night Unite in Condemning Present Paltry Allowance of \$48 a Month to a Widow and \$12 a Month to each Child

"When we think or read of the work of the Canadian Army in France and Flanders we swell out with pride, but when we think what provision is made for the widows and orphans of those who fell, we have to hang our heads in shame."—Major F. A. Robertson, D. S. O.

"We must face this question fair and square. Why not be British and see that the widow and orphan is properly cared for. Forty-eight dollars a month is not enough for a woman, and twelve dollars a month is not enough for a child."—Sergeant-Major Jimmie Robinson.

"Vimy is a glorious place where the maple foliage in autumn will be as glorious as the blood Canada shed. I do not think the Canadian Government is going to fail to provide properly for the widows and orphans of those who fell there."—Francis R. Jones, F. R. G. S.

"The Government could waste money during the war everywhere except on the soldier who got only \$1.10 a day. Why should a woman have to live on forty, fifty or sixty dollars a month when her husband before the war gave her one hundred and twenty."—Rev. Canon Rix.

When some men were getting millions of blood money, the widows of others were getting only \$48 a month and the children \$12 each. That was a statement of Sgt. Maj. Jimmie Robinson at the meeting in the city hall last night. The speaker asked the people to be fair and square, to be British and see that the widow and orphan was provided for else we must hang our heads in shame.

The gathering was small but enthusiastic and some first rate addresses were given, not only by Sgt. Maj. Robinson, but also by Major Robertson, Francis R. Jones and Rev. Canon Rix. O. H. Nelson presided.

Sgt. Major Robinson went on to tell in his forceful way how \$60 was the most a man who was incapacitated could draw in pension if he was not an officer. That was not enough to pay a man to live around the streets. Canadians had played a prominent part in the war, according to General Currie, and it was now up to all to see that the promises made to the men who went away were fulfilled. He found far too much interest taken in the foreign breed. Certain foreigners were being treated here just as were the Germans before the war. What was formerly made in Germany was now made in Japan. They should warn people that this should cease.

## PLANNING MILL IN OPERATION BEFORE LONG

### Major Cowper Young Brought a Constructional Engineer With Him From the South Today.

Major Cowper Young returned this morning bringing with him a constructional engineer to lay out the planning and shingle mills to be shipped at the drydock. Seen by a Daily News representative this morning Major Cowper Young said that the work would commence at once. While he could not say exactly when the machinery would arrive, it would not be long and in the meantime they would get ahead with their preparatory work. Very soon the plant would be in operation.

Christianizing was all right, the speaker said, but color was also a line of demarcation. If they were to keep Canada British they should make every person who came here to live be a Canadian. Speaking of the impossibility of a widow living on \$48 a month or the child on \$12 a month, the Sergeant-Major said every facility should be open for the education of the child of the man who fell overseas. It was Canada's duty to the dependents of those who fell. They should not even have to ask for this treatment. The churches had urged men to go to the front, and some of the members prayed overtime that the war might continue so that they might make more profits. He did not advocate putting all returned men in parliament and he hoped the G. W. V. A. would never enter politics, but he did think they should have the referendum and recall.

#### Major Robertson.

Major Robertson backed up the previous speaker in his demand for better treatment for the women and children. No one deserves attention so much as the widows and orphans. He went on to tell of the work of the provincial Returned Soldiers' Commission, much of which was published in this paper recently.

#### A Great Day.

Francis Jones of the Overseas Club spoke of the great day when Canadian troops marched through London on their way to the war. He also said he did not think the Canadian Government would fail to provide for the dependents of those who had gone overseas. If they did it was out with such governments and put in new ones. They had greater problems to face now after the war than during the struggle. They had seen the foolishness of hairbrained at-

## LIBERAL REPRESENTATIVE FOR B. C. IN PARLIAMENT; KING'S VISIT IS DELAYED

Vancouver, B. C., August 23.—British Columbia will have a Liberal representative in the House at Ottawa. As there are no Liberal members from this province, J. A. Robb, chief Liberal whip, after listening to charges by the local Liberal executive of neglect of this province by all Federal Governments irrespective of parties, consented to act in the capacity of British Columbia Liberal Representative until such time as there is a British Columbia Liberal member at Ottawa.

The executive of the B. C. Liberal Association received a wire from Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, Liberal leader, saying that he will be unable to come to the coast until after the forthcoming session.

Plans have already been laid for a two-day conference of British Columbia Liberals for the discussion of Liberal policy in this province for the reconstruction period.

## NEW DOCK WILL BE COMMENCED IN A FEW WEEKS

### W. P. Hinton, General Manager and Vice-President of G.T.P., Says Work on New Structure Will be Rushed.

"We are perfecting the plans for the new dock here and just as soon as they are ready the work will go ahead," said W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the G. T. P., this morning on arriving from the south. "The dock will be a big one and will cost a good deal and the work will be rushed just as soon as possible," he continued. "The contract should be let and the work commenced in about a month or five weeks. The plans have to be finally approved."

Mr. Hinton is here on an official visit and is going to Anyox tonight, returning here tomorrow and going east in his private car.

## BOAT FOR STEWART EVERY WEDNESDAY

### Change of Schedule Commences August 27 and Continues Regularly Thereafter.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Steam Ship Company are arranging for a more regular service to Stewart, effective on August 27. The steamers Prince Albert and Prince John will on alternate weeks leave Prince Rupert for Stewart on Wednesdays at 2 p. m., thus giving a regular weekly service to the mining town.

One of the steamers will leave August 28 for Masset and northern points on the Queen Charlotte Islands and every two weeks thereafter.

For points on the southern Queen Charlottes the steamer will leave on September 5 and every two weeks thereafter.

## Strike or Election, Says British Labor

### Representative of Labor in Parliament Says British Government Acted in Direct Opposition to Policy of Trades Council

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, August 23.—A general strike or a general election, probably the latter, will be brought on soon to give an opportunity to protest against the action of the British Government in refusing to nationalize the mines, according to a statement made by Fred Bramley, parliamentary committeeman of the Trades Council.

Mr. Bramley added that the Government's decision was in direct opposition to the policy of the Trades Union Congress, which supported the nationalization of the mines.

## WOMEN IN BARS ARE DISCUSSED

### Police Commissioners take Exception to Bylaw Recently Passed By the City Council.

The main discussion of yesterday afternoon's sitting of the Police Commission was introduced by Geo. Hill who objected to the bylaw which was recently passed by the city council in regard to the granting of licenses to girls working in places selling two per cent drinks. He objected strongly that any girl should have to come to the chief of police and give a report of her conduct for the five years previous. Commissioner Macdonald backed this up very strongly and said that it was hard enough for a girl to keep straight on the salaries which were being paid without raking up all her past history when she was trying to get a job. This followed from the statement of the mayor that the bylaw had been enacted so that the undesirable element might be kept out of these places. The mayor said that there were lots of jobs that the women could get without having to tend bar.

#### Securing Licenses.

Another feature of the bylaw which received the condemnation of Commissioner Macdonald was the fact that the sum of \$1 had to be paid for the granting of the license. This was just like paying for having to work. City Clerk Woods pointed out that this was merely a legal technicality and the charge was a nominal one. It was not at all intended as a revenue to the city coffers.

The general sentiment of the meeting was that any girl who desired to work in any of the places where liquor is sold and men congregate, ought to be spoken for by her employer and that he should come to the city hall and get the license. The granting of licenses should not be handled by the police department, but by the city treasurer. It would be up to the police to see that anyone who broke the laws in any way should be taken up for it and the license taken away. The law should be very drastic and the license holders should be sufficiently warned that on the first offense their permit would be revoked and would not be renewed in this city.

During the discussion it was stated that the City Council might at least have shown common courtesy and submitted the bylaw to the Police Commission for consideration, seeing that it was this latter body which had brought the matter up. The Commission was an elective body and just as much responsible to the citizens as the Council.

#### Control Rents.

Toronto, August 22.—It is possible that Toronto will apply for Federal legislation to control the soaring standard of rents.

There was complete harmony throughout, even if there were slight differences of opinion. Everyone was ready to sink minor differences for the common good." That was the report brought by Frank Mobley this morning on his return from the Liberal convention at Ottawa.

Mr. Mobley was very enthusiastic over the event. He said that Premier Oliver made a name for himself there and proved himself to be a national figure. There were soldier representatives and labor representatives present and every class and condition in the country had its interests looked after.

Mr. Mobley goes north tonight.

The members present thought that it would be more effective if the policemen were to go after the men who were supplying the booze. It was very good to "soak" the fellow with a heavy fine when he was caught with a "bottle on his hip." Probably he had paid fifteen dollars for it and yet the man who had very likely sold several bottles during that same afternoon was never caught. The whiskey gang of runners still continued in spite of the stringent efforts against those who were found in a helpless condition. It was only those men who were disorderly who were taken to the police station. Many other drunks were around the city and nothing was ever said to them.

SPITZBERGEN COAL DEPOSITS

Immense Quantities of Mineral of All Kinds on Island in Arctic Ocean.

GERMAN INTERESTS TAKEN BY BRITISH

Press despatches yesterday told of the discovery of an immense quantity of coal at Spitzbergen, the island which abounds in minerals of all kinds directly north of Norway within the polar circle. In that country they have a climate which resembles the United Kingdom as it is kept warm by the Gulf Stream.

The Scottish expedition referred to in the despatch was sent out by the Northern Exploration Company. At the last meeting of the company the chairman reported as follows: "We have now the most abundant evidence of the existence of this mineral, in such quantities and of such quality that if we had to rely on this product alone a great success is absolutely assured. Our last advices show that without modern machinery either to get or load the coal, we have obtained (with a very limited number of men) several thousand tons, and stacked it ready for shipment. Given electrical coal cutters, conveyors, wire ropeways and piers, our output of coal need have no practical limit, and when I tell you that the present price of coal ex ship in the northern part of Norway is £6 to £8 per ton, it appears to me and my co-directors that there is room for the energies of a number of Spitzbergen companies dealing with coal alone.

100,000 Tons in 1918. Considering that Great Britain's share of the world's reserve of coal is comparatively small, we do well to investigate the claims which are being made for Spitzbergen as a new and fruitful source of supply of coal and other minerals, on the possession of which the industrial life of the nation is completely dependent. That coal, both anthracite and bituminous, abounds there in large seams and of good quality there is no longer room to doubt. Although development is only in its infancy, the output in 1918 was over 100,000 tons. With coal

as dear and as scarce as it is in England it is somewhat exasperating to learn that in Spitzbergen—only four or five days' steaming by tramp steamer from British ports—coal of excellent quality, both bituminous and anthracite, exists in abundance, that much of it in fact is lying about on the surface, and that all of it can be easily worked and as easily shipped. The working of the coal seam is so simple indeed that coal can be shipped even now at about 7s per ton f. o. b. at Lowe Sound, Spitzbergen, and when electrical cutting machinery is installed the cost of production will be still less.

The 1918 Expedition.

"One of the results of the 1918 expedition was the extension of our properties by taking possession of the German territory, dismantling their wireless station, and hoisting the Union Jack on their flagstaff, and to fully confirm the conviction your board has always held to the enormous mineral richness of the island of Spitzbergen and in particular of the deposits found on the properties of this company. Now, ladies and gentlemen, before dealing with the future program of the company, I must say a word or two about the German influence in Norway, as I am firmly convinced it has been working very strongly against our company, both before the war and since, cold water having been thrown on our undertakings and interests in Spitzbergen, on several occasions at Tromsø, by Norwegians who endeavored to influence people going to Spitzbergen against our company, and did their best to infer that our company possessed nothing of any value.

Mineral Deposits.

"Having dealt very fully with the past history of the company, I now purpose telling you all about the wonderful mineral deposits, particularly coal and iron, in this company's territory in Spitzbergen. To say nothing of all our other minerals, you have in the coal and iron two most valuable assets not only for this company, but this country of ours and this Empire. We are officially informed by one of the largest shipping concerns that the Swedish company was financed by German banks for the purpose of making a railway to Norway from Gellivare. Twenty million tons of ore were sold to German blast furnaces at 13s 3d, and 13s (Continued on Page Five.)

A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY, AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00).

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert has determined to resurface the following plank roadways in the City of Prince Rupert, namely:— Section Five—Fulton St. and 5th Ave. W. Section Six—4th Ave. E., Hays Cove Circle and Coye Bridge. Section Seven—6th Ave. E. Section Eight—Conrad St.

AND WHEREAS for the purpose of such resurfacing and repairs it is necessary to incur a debt to the extent of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00); AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue serial debentures to raise the said sum of \$25,000.00, payable in five (5) years from the date of the coming into effect of this by-law, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS: 1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to resurface the plank roadways herein referred to, and to make repairs to the superstructure where necessary, such work to be executed under the supervision of the City Engineer.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said work hereby authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$25,000.00, which debt shall be payable in five (5) years from the date when this by-law takes effect, for which debt serial debentures may be issued to be secured as hereinafter mentioned.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to sign, and the City Engineer, as aforesaid, to each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued. 4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the office of the Bank of Montreal, at Montreal, Canada, or, at the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the City of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York U. S. A. or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

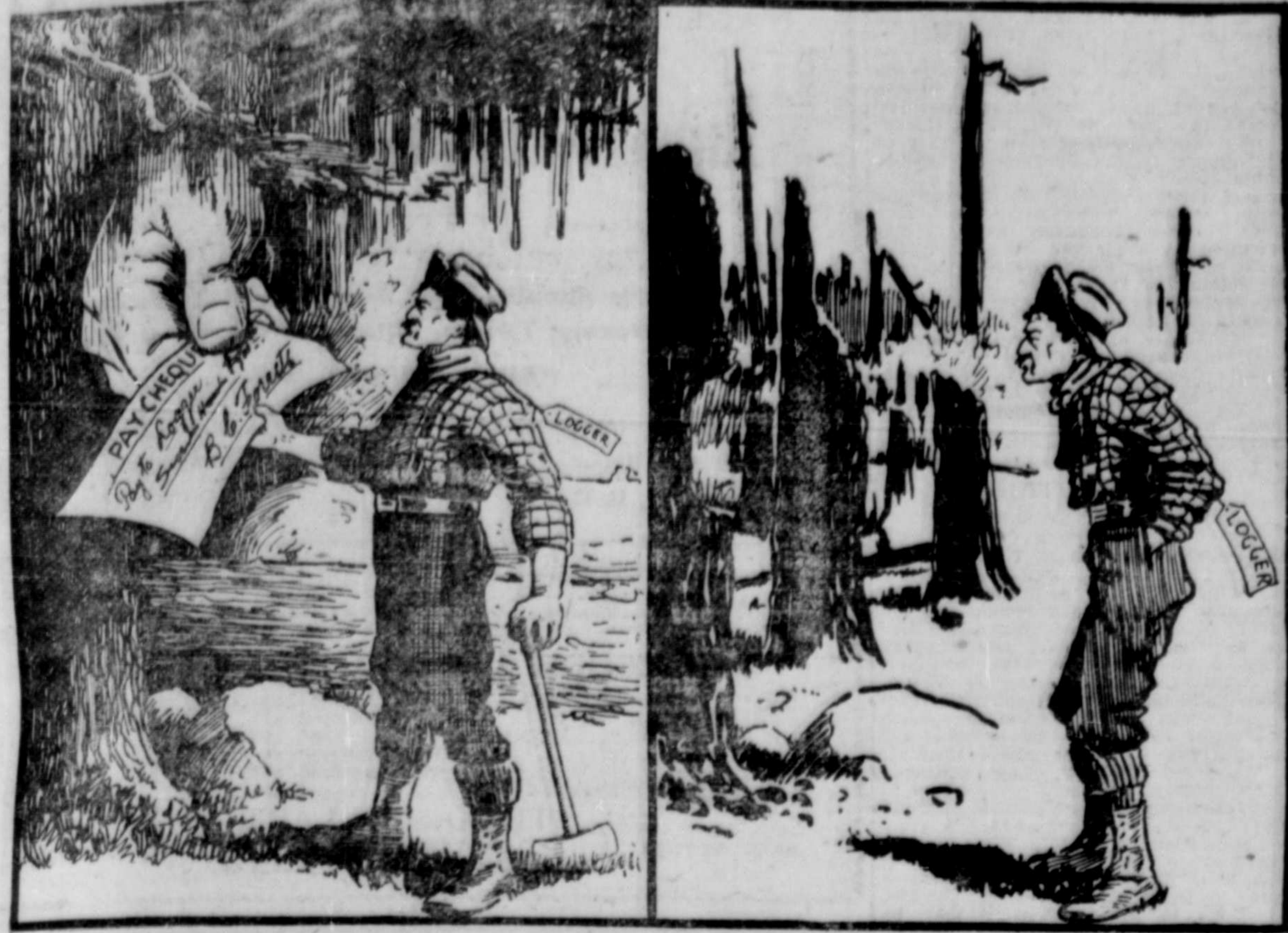

## SOME FRUITS VERY SCARCE

Preserving Peaches Slow in Arriving and Apricots are Practically Over.

Preserving peaches have been expected in the past few shipments received by the local merchants. They are not arriving in any great numbers yet, however, and the price is still high. Apricots are practically over and there are no more strawberries except those that are found in the back yard patches of a few Rupert homes. Plums are still too high priced for any great profit in preserving and the same can be said of peaches, but further less expensive shipments of these two fruits are still expected. Cherries are very scarce and it is hard to get any sent up from the south.

The berries at Metlakatla are now in very fine condition for picking and large pailfuls can be gathered in a short time. A few evenings ago a party went over and the returns on the average for an hour's picking amounted to 14 lbs. each. Some of the berries are on sale in the local stores and are rapidly bought up.

A few of the meat prices have dropped somewhat and veal has come down over five cents per pound. It is not expected that this price will continue for long, as the market is abundantly supplied at this time of the year with livestock. In the fall and winter the supply is much less and prices will begin to soar.

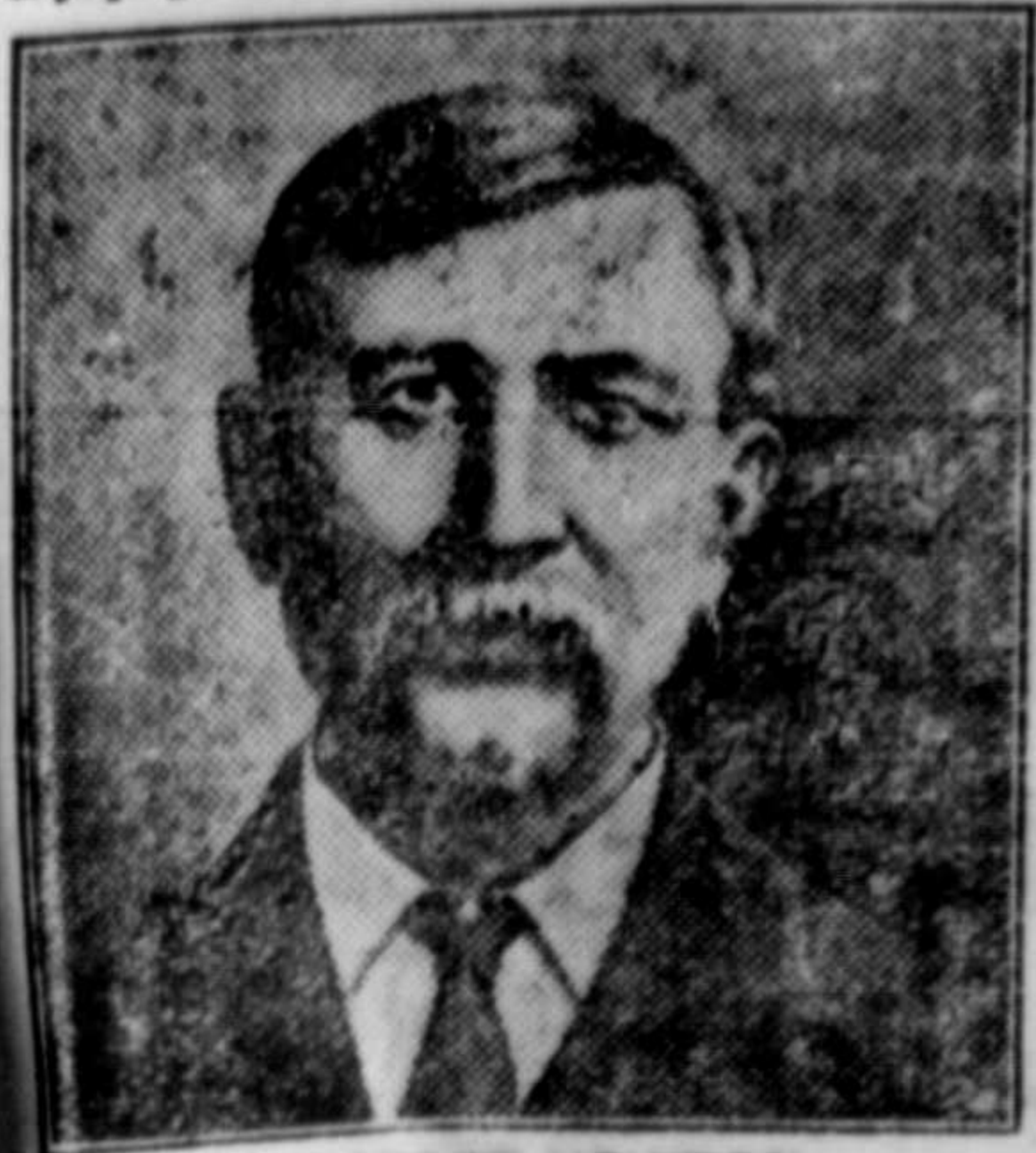

# OBJECTS OF THE OVERSEAS CLUB ARE EXPLAINED

Francis R. Jones, F. R. G. S., Addresses the Board of Trade On Work of the Patriotic Organization.

That the people of Canada should trade within the Empire and certainly not with Germany; that economy should be practised in order to overcome the present shortage of food and clothing, and that we should support the Overseas Club, was the message brought to Prince Rupert by Francis R. Jones, F. R. G. S., and delivered to the Board of Trade at their meeting in the city hall yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Jones spoke of the work of the club which he represents. It was made up of men who believed in the British Empire and subscribed to its creed. Before the war its membership numbered about 100,000; today there were 165,000 who had joined.

The club had raised \$5,000,000 during the war, some of which had been spent in providing tobacco for the troops. A million and a half had been given for aeroplanes, with which 173 machines had been secured, Canada providing 7. The club had also done a lot of propaganda work in giving to many of the neutral nations first hand information in regard to the aims and objects of the war.

### Trade Within Empire.

Today the club was trying to foster trade within the Empire. He believed in buying at home, in one's own town, province, country, or empire. He did not believe in helping Germany to pay a debt which never could be paid, no matter how many millions might be put up.

Men were asking for a new world all at once, continued the speaker. Their fathers did not win reforms and changes in that way. We must be willing to make sacrifices in order to obtain that for which we were seeking. We had been a spending people but it would be necessary to cut out useless expenditures. Economize and buy at home should be the watchword.

### Value of Sentiment.

The speaker went on to tell of the value of sentiment. Some people said that patriotism and sentiment counted for nothing but dollars and cents for everything. That was disproved when on the day war was declared Canada sent that memorable message to the British Premier asking what Canada could do to help. He believed the British Empire was the greatest civilizing influence in the world. A million had died for it, two millions had been maimed and wounded for it. Was all this sacrifice to be in vain? He did not believe so. While the British spirit breathed its lustre should not tarnish. They had got together to fight. They should now get together in business. Sentiment was the greatest motive power in the world.

President McCaffery on behalf of the Board thanked the speaker who announced that Mr. Whitley of the government offices had been appointed local secretary of the club.

9d per ton c. i. f. Rotterdam for delivery over ten years and as far as I know these contracts were just completed before the war. The same ore was sold in Middlesborough before the war at between 25s and 30s per ton c. i. f. The Hamburg-Amerika Line and another German firm entered into a contract to carry this ore to Rotterdam at about 7s per ton, and this contract was relet at various times at from 5s 3d to 6s per ton, hence the Hamburg-Amerika Line would make at least 1s per ton profit, or £1,000,000.

### 1919 Expedition.

"The English and American expert staff comprise mining and geological engineers and foremen miners, and in addition a medical officer and assistant, as well as prospectors, of whom Mr. Mansfield is one of the leaders. The mining engineers will carry out the important duties of developing, working, and shipping the iron ore, coal, asbestos, and marble from our properties. North European labor is also utilized, and includes miners, carpenters, blacksmiths, etc. Last year's expedition took out hut equipment for over one hundred men. As regards this year's expedition, we have already sent out huts completed in every possible way, and with the huts already erected on this company's territory we shall have accommodation for at least 500 men.

The speaker asked what right had he to live and keep a home in comfort when the widow of the man who fell overseas got not half as much. It was time something was stirred up and the returned soldiers should keep it going.

**SHORT WEIGHT AT LOCAL BAKERIES**

Police Investigate Bread and Find Shortage—Other Commodities To Be Scrutinized.

At the Police Commission meeting yesterday afternoon Chief Vickers reported that the local bakeries had been visited by members of the force and it was found that their loaves were all short in weight. One bakery was short-weighted 2 ozs., another 1 oz. and a third 1/2 oz. Regularly now the bake shops will be visited and the loaves tested.

Commissioner Macdonald thought that the same line of attack should be proposed in regard to other vendors of commodities. This applied especially to the sellers of coal. In many cases the teamsters were blamed for the shortages and weird stories were told of how the transfer men managed to get the coal for themselves. Those supplying the coal ought to be anxious to find out just where the shortage occurred.
