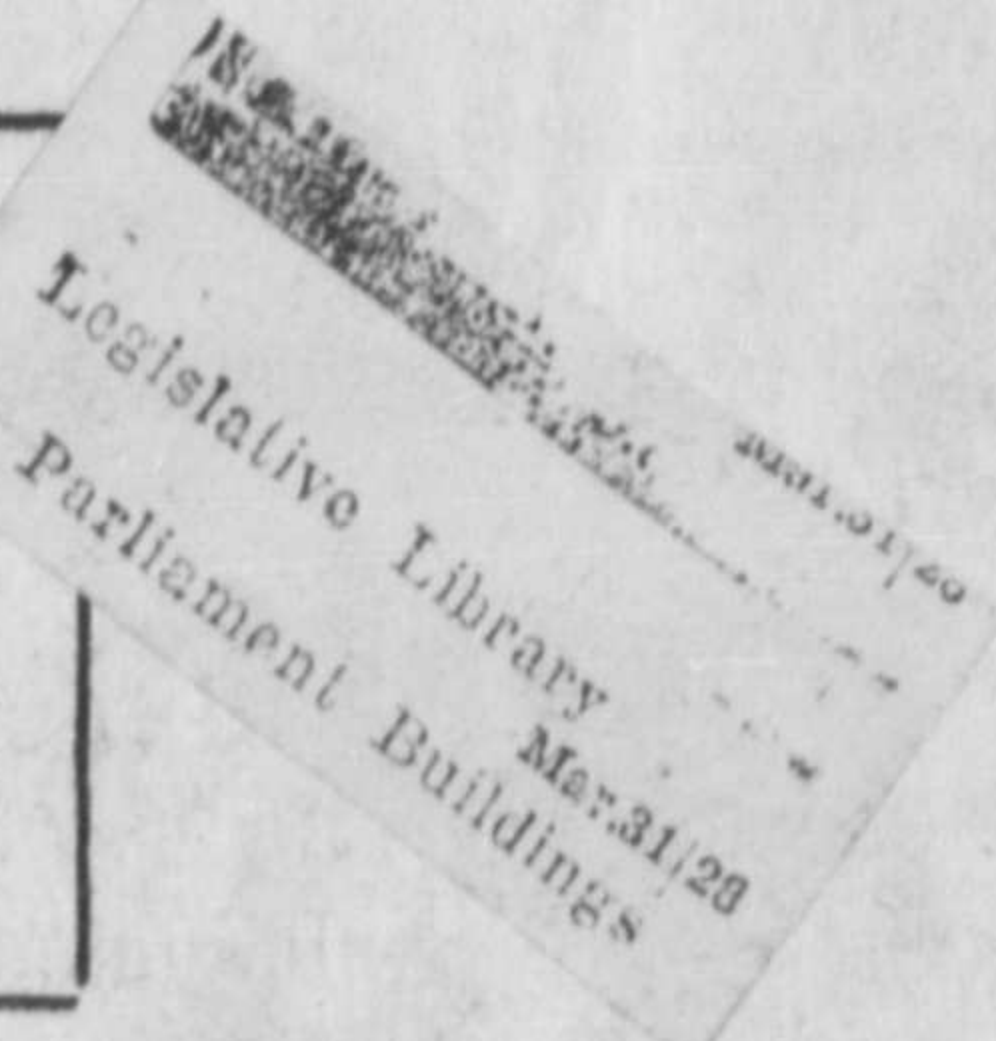

# ATLIN TO EDMONTON FLIGHT

## NEED OF AIRPLANE SERVICE SHOWN IN RUPERT

### Nome to New York Flyers Landed in Dark, Edmonton

Sheer Luck, Combined With Skill, Prevented Accident When Aviators Mistook Flare Signals and Missed Runway

EDMONTON, May 1.—Gliding through pitch darkness to a strange field, Parker Cramer and W. S. Gamble, the Nome to New York flyers, landed safely at the aerodrome here at 10 o'clock last night from Prince George. Flares had been set out to mark the runways, but these were misunderstood by the aviators and indicating obstacles. Sheer luck, coupled with flying skill, alone saved the flyers from disaster. They landed off the regular runways, but managed to bring their plane safely to the hangar.

The flyers reached Prince George at 3:35 yesterday afternoon from Atlin and an hour later continued their journey here. South from Atlin they followed the government telegraphs route practically all the way to Hazelton.

### NEW SYSTEM CONSERVATION GAME TODAY

Order-in-Council Passed Yesterday Gives Bryan Williams Complete Charge Today

VICTORIA, May 1.—British Columbia's new system of game conservation goes into effect today under an order-in-council, with Bryan Williams of Vancouver in complete charge, probably with headquarters in Vancouver, Attorney General Hon. H. R. Pooley, announced. About sixty men now with the Provincial police in game work will be removed to the game branch.

### C. N. LINERS ARE KEPT BUSY

HALIFAX, May 1.—The Canadian National steamer Canadian Importer, after discharging cargo of two and a half million feet of lumber from Vancouver at Halifax, cleared from this port Monday for Montreal to discharge the balance of the cargo and load there for Vancouver.

The Canadian Inventor, of the same line sailed from Halifax Sunday night with general cargo for London and Antwerp.

The largest European air route is that from Berlin to Madrid. This trip, covering more than 1,300 miles, is made in 17 hours.

### SURRENDERS END REBELLION IN MEXICO TODAY

MEXICO, May 1.—The sudden and unexpected proposals for surrender yesterday by leaders of the Mexican rebellion were accepted with assurance of protection on behalf of the federal government. This marks practically the end of the rebellion, one of a dozen to take place in this country in about as many years.

### PARIS TAKES NO CHANCE

Expels 26 Foreigners in Few Days Prior to May Day

PARIS, May 1.—In order to prevent any trouble here, extra detachments of troops were assembled at strategic points and within the past few days 26 foreigners known to have been active in communistic propaganda were expelled from the country. Taxi drivers are today taking a day off, as has been the custom for many years.

### REDUCTION IN WORLD NAVIES

Delay Will Occur Now in Order That Countries May Consider New Phrase

GENEVA, May 1.—It is expected that the question of naval reduction will not be formally discussed until the next session of the preparatory committee which will probably be in the autumn. This will allow other countries than the United States and Great Britain to consider their position. The eyes of the Pacificists are now turned toward Washington, where the political aspect of the recent American announcement will be watched. It is believed that if Britain and the United States are in accord at the next meeting of the committee some practical results are possible of attainment.

### CLASHES WITH REDS IN CITY OF BERLIN

BERLIN, May 1.—Numerous clashes between the police and communists took place in Berlin this afternoon, about 200 arrests being made.

### Applications for Airplane Services Made in the City; Alaska Plane Booked Up

That there is need for an airplane service from Prince Rupert is pretty clearly indicated. Yesterday Paul Armour, manager of the Pacific Salvage Co. had an application from three outside people for airplane passage to Seattle. He wired to Juneau for the Alaska-Washington Airways plane southbound from there to call for them and received a reply that the plane was fully booked for its southbound flight Friday.

Mr. Armour says he has also received a request for a plane to go to Stewart this month, and this application it has been necessary to turn down.

Prince Rupert is larger than any of the Alaska cities and the Portland Canal mines are more important than any now operating in southeastern Alaska, yet there is no airplane service. It seems as if there ought to be plenty of business if the service was once established.

### BODIES FOUND OF AVIATORS

Keith Anderson and Hitchcock Died Close to Their Plane

SYDNEY, May 1.—The tragic aftermath of the Southern Cross search closed today with the report from the land party of searchers that the body of Robert Hitchcock had been found under the wing of the airplane Kookaburra and that of Lieutenant Keith Anderson about forty yards away. They had made a forced landing in the wild bush of the Northern Territory while searching for the Southern Cross.

### PILED UP AT GOLDEN GATE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—Apparently piled up on a rock off Point Reyes near the Golden Gate entrance to San Francisco Bay, the steam schooner Kadiak of the Alaska Cannery fleet put distress calls into the air last night and several vessels hastened to her aid. The Kadiak was enroute here from the Aleutian Islands and carried a crew of twelve men.

The Kadiak was towed into San Francisco Bay today by a tug. She had sprung a leak causing last night's distress calls.

WINNIPEG, May 1.—Wheat seeding throughout the prairies is progressing on a wide scale and is as far advanced as at this time last year, according to the general seeding report of the Manitoba Free Press.

### CUSTOMS COLLECTIONS HERE THIS YEAR ARE ALMOST UP TO LAST

Customs and excise collections at the port of Prince Rupert for the first four months of the present year have amounted to a total of \$74,344.11 as compared with \$76,332.55 in the corresponding period of 1928. Collections for the month of April this year amounted to \$22,556.75 as against \$21,332.55 in the same month last year.

### KLEMTU WILL BE REPAIRED

Is Now In Dry Dock After Being Submerged in Grenville Channel

The fish packer Klemtu which struck a rock and sank in Grenville Channel has been raised by the Pacific Salvage Co. and brought here. She is now on the dry dock where she is being surveyed and will be repaired. The stem and forefoot is badly damaged and other injuries received in addition to the water saturation of the interior.

### SIR WILLIAM OTTER IS CRITICALLY ILL

TORONTO, May 1.—Sir William Otter, who served 54 years in the Canadian militia, finally leaving it with the rank of inspector general, the highest military office in Canada, is critically ill at his home here. He is 85 years of age.

### No Evidence to Support Charge of Corruption or of Dishonesty in Winnipeg Power Site Deal

WINNIPEG, May 1.—There is no title of the evidence, before the Seven Sisters power site royal commission that justifies the charges of corruption or dishonesty made against the Hon. John Bracken, premier of Manitoba, or his government, according to the majority report of two of three commissioners, tabled in the legislature last night.

The charges laid by the Conservative leader, F. G. Taylor, regarding the lease of the power site to the Winnipeg Electric Railway were under investigation by the commission from February 4 to April 22. Chief Justice D. A. Macdonald, chairman of the commission and Mr. Justice Kilgour were the reporting judges. Mr. Justice Dyar plans to submit a separate report within a few days, on the main issues of all three commissioners are in a substantial agreement, the statement tabled states. Divergence of views, it is explained, encountered regarding the campaign contributions to all parties, are termed in the report to be relatively unimportant.

### PATTULLO HERE FOR FEW DAYS

Public Meeting on Friday Night Will Feature Visit of Liberal Leader

T. D. Pattullo, leader of the Liberal opposition in the legislature and M. L. A. for Prince Rupert, arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning to pay his first visit to his constituents since his selection as leader of the Liberals and the recent session of the legislature. Mr. Pattullo will remain here until Monday. Then he will proceed to Ottawa, Montreal and other points in the east on a business trip.

On Friday night Mr. Pattullo will address a public meeting here. He stated this morning that he would show the people of Prince Rupert just how much the Conservative government had done for this riding in its first legislative session.

### COMMENTS MADE ON CANADIAN PROSPERITY

GENEVA, May 1.—Canada enjoyed a year of unprecedented prosperity, says the Reviews of Economic Conditions in 1928, issued by the League of Nations last night, as the basis of the work of a consultative economic commission next Monday.

She had asked a neighbor girl to look after the children.

### COAL MINES OPEN IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, May 1.—Fifty three pits employing 14,880 coal miners have been reopened in South Wales and Monmouthshire since the beginning of the year, according to information given in the House of Commons yesterday.

St Louis and Philadelphia are Hot after American League Lead with Boston Ahead in National

NEW YORK, May 1.—While Philadelphia appears to be girding its loins to wrest the American League pennant from New York, St. Louis is rising to bar the way. The Yankees pulled a decision over the Senators in ten innings and the Mackmen were hurled back by Boston while St. Louis closed out Detroit with the third victory in four games, giving them more than breathing space over the second place Athletics.

In the National League, Dizzy Vance let the Giants down with three small singles to win for Brooklyn.

The Boston Braves are still strangely leading in the National with seven victories and two defeats. They won a groggy game from the Phillies, 14 to 12 with both teams out on their feet at the finish.

MORE INTEREST CRICKET GAME

New Method of Scoring in England—South African Team to Visit Country

LONDON, May 1.—With the return to England of the cricket team which regained the "Ashes" in Australia and the arrival of the South Africans for a tour this summer interest in the ancient pastime is at its highest. Not for many years has cricket enjoyed such general popularity as it does at present. The triumphal visit of A. P. F. Chapman's team to Australia, where they won four out of five test matches, has renewed the enthusiasm which waned in the lean days after the war.

While the South Africans are not quite as strong as the Australians, nevertheless they are expected to give a good account of themselves. The team for the most part is composed of young men, captained however by H. G. Deane, a veteran of tried ability. Cricket followers hope the first test, at least will see England represented by the eleven which was so successful in Australia. After that, critics suggest, younger men should be given a chance in view of the visit of the Australians next year. There is no dearth of good material in England from which to draw young blood.

The battle for county championship honors will probably be very attractive this season in view of the alternative in the method of scoring. This season all the counties will play an equal number of games—eight points being counted for a win outright, four each for a tie, five for a lead in the first innings, three being allowed opponents, and four for a tie on the first innings and for games with no result on the first innings. The championship will be decided on points, the old percentage system being eliminated altogether.

The champion team last year was Lancashire which will rely this season on much the same team as last year. They play their first match beginning May 4.

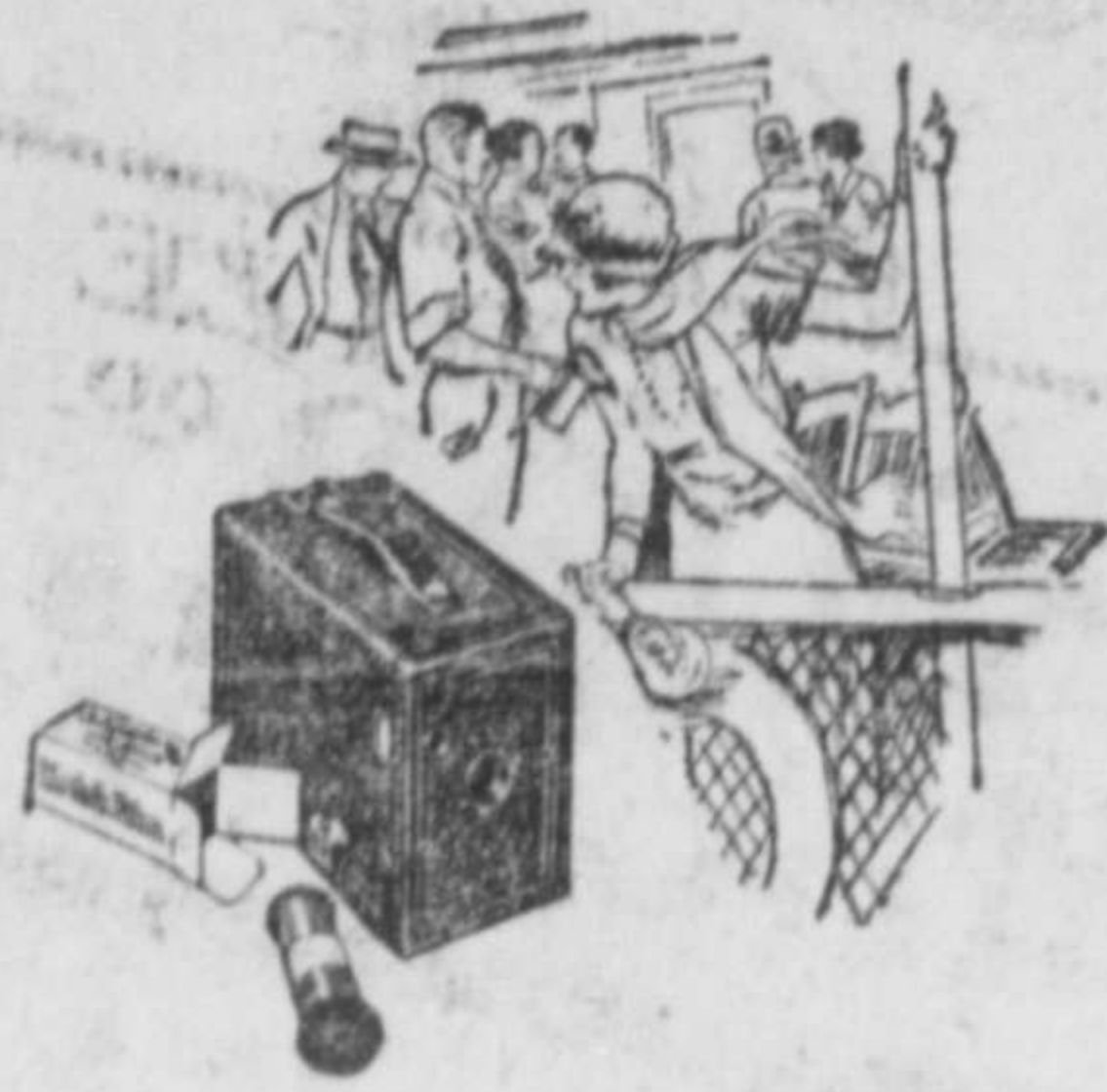

## FINE WEATHER DURING APRIL

Sunshine Last Month Amounted to 197 Hours With Only 2.24 Inches of Precipitation

The month of April was marked with exceptionally fine weather conditions in Prince Rupert according to the report of H. D. Tee, Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist, which was issued this morning. There was an unusually large amount of sunshine totalling 197 hours while precipitation aggregating 2.24 inches was as unusually scarce. It was one of the finest months the city has enjoyed in years.

The April record brings the total precipitation at Prince Rupert for the first four months of this year to 25.50 inches as compared with 30.16 inches in the same period of 1928 while sunshine for this year to date now stands at 407.9 hours as against 320.7 hours in the first four months of 1928.

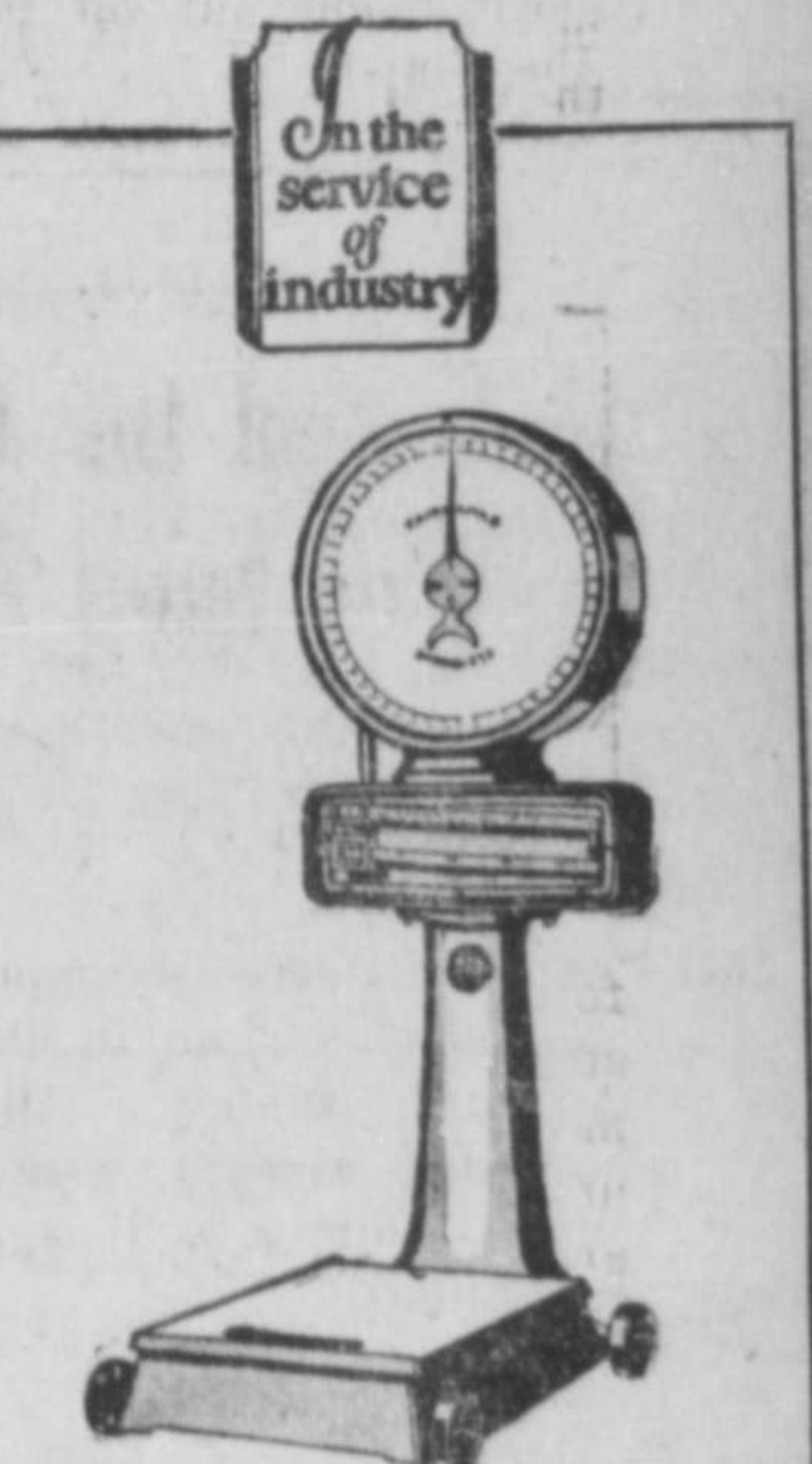

**QUITE A DIFFERENCE**

It is officially reported that Hudson Strait could be navigated safely four months in the year and, if an ice-breaker were used, even longer than that, depending upon the season.

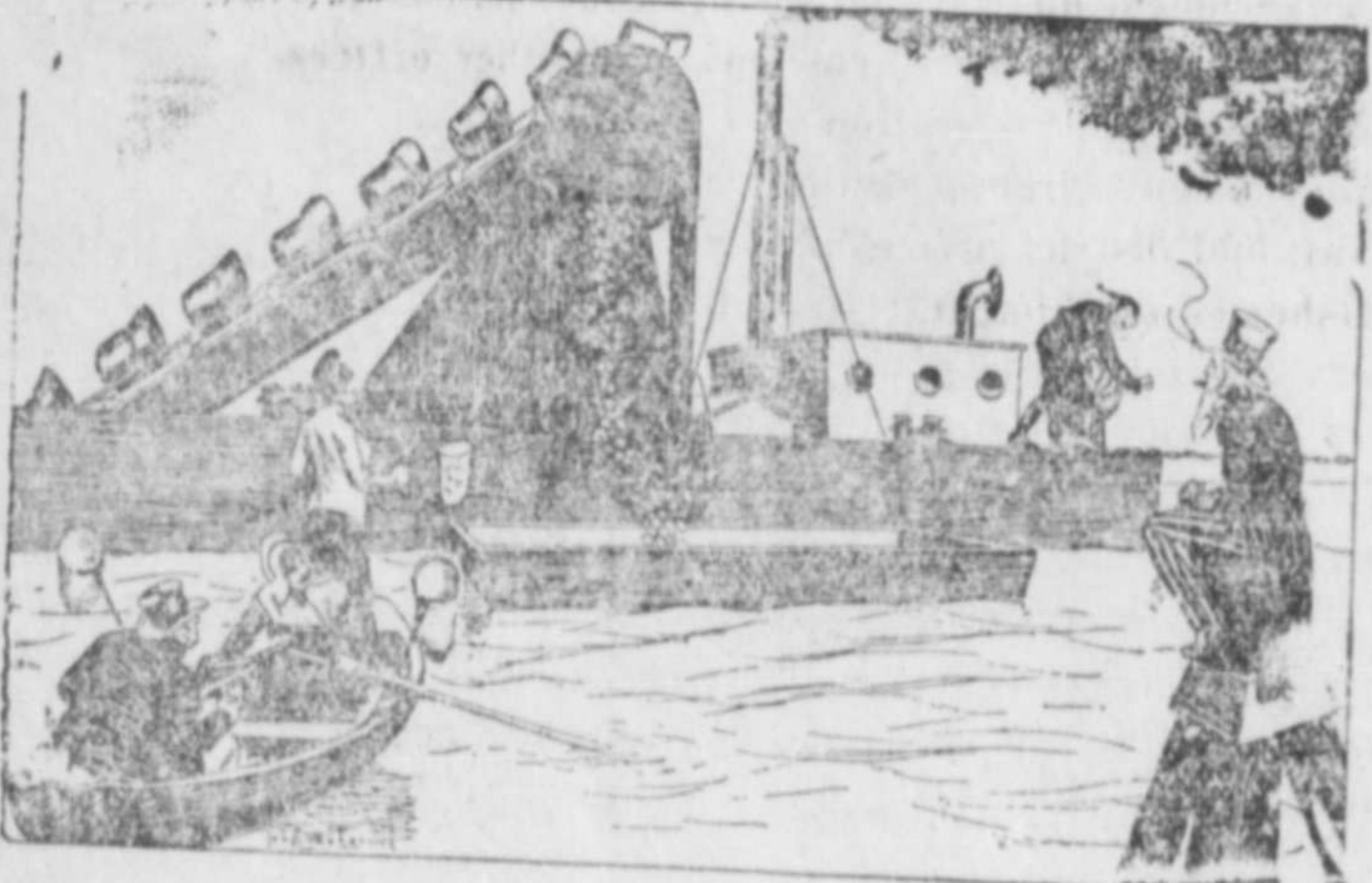
**THINGS WE FEAR DO NOT HAPPEN**

# News of the Mines

## AROUND PRINCE RUPERT Diamond Drilling Contract for Topley Silver; Oil Possibilities in North; Further Details of Copper River Railway

The contract has been let to the Diamond Drill Contracting Co. of Spokane for a diamond drilling program on the Topley Silver property, it is announced by officials of the company. The drill crew is now on the property and ready to commence work. To start the diamond drilling a number of holes at intervals of 200 feet covering a distance of 1000 feet or more will be drilled to cut the vein at a depth of 200 feet. If the result of this drilling is as anticipated, additional holes will be drilled to cut the vein at greater depth. With the completion of this work the company will have the necessary information to determine the exact point at which to start a long drift on the vein system and afford 600 feet of backs. Preliminary work has disclosed the vein at intervals on the Golden Eagle group for over 800 feet by open cuts and by sinking two shafts, one to a depth of 140 feet on the dip of the vein. High-grade silver-lead ore was exposed and the vein proved to be continuous for this depth.

Further particulars have been received of the recent ore strike which was made on the Babine Bonanza property. The one foot calena vein has now widened to five feet in 20 feet of length. Assays run \$1.12 in gold, 3.4 ounces silver, 38.8 per cent lead, and 22.3 per cent zinc, or a gross value of \$104.42 at the face. Sampling across four feet gives assays of 20-cold, 36 ounces silver, 26 per cent lead and 25.5 per cent zinc, or a gross value of \$91.02. A raise is now being started to connect the lower tunnel with the No. 1 at a vertical distance of 225 feet. This raise will follow the contact vein.

The oil boom in Alberta has caused much interest in the possibilities of oil and natural gas development in British Columbia. The late E. A. Haggen recently wrote the late E. A. Haggen recently. There are four localities in British Columbia where petroleum is a possibility. One of these is on the Queen-Charlotte Islands and another in the Peace River. So far none of them have proved a commercial success. In 1884 James Deans, mining engineer, reported an enormous gas flow in the channel of Skidegate which he attributed to a submarine deposit of petroleum. On Graham Island there are numerous deposits of ozokerite, a paraffine wax apparently derivable from the distillation of petroleum deposits by the vulcanism which has succeeded their deposition and development. The drilling done on the island resulted in a persistent flow of gas. Queen Charlotte Islands are located on the strike supposed to extend under the sea from California to Alaska, where it outcrops at Controller Bay. There it has been producing oil for about twenty years. Peace River is likely to prove the most productive field of the province. The petroliferous Devonian formation of Alberta undoubtedly extends into that area. Several wells have been driven in Peace River. Some have shown heavy gas flow which is certainly an indication of underlying petroleum deposits. One advantage of the new interest aroused in the Peace River country will, doubtless, be a complete geological survey of the unknown territory with authentic information as to what may be expected in it in the way of oil and other natural resources.

Further details of the Telkwa-Copper City railway cut-off, the building of which is proposed by British Pacific Industries, Ltd., headed by Sir Alfred Welby, K.B.E., to open up coal fields and other resources in that section are given in a special article published recently in the Vancouver Sunday Province. The route will effect a saving in mileage of 37 miles between Telkwa and the Pacific Terminal, Prince Rupert, and three very desirable features—easy and light construction, heavy tonnage of natural resources, and well balanced grades on both watersheds. The territory traversed by the proposed route leaves the Telkwa River and goes up Pine Creek and then down the full length of the Zymoetz River. Besides mining resources, it will open up an im-

portant timber area and good farming country. The legislature, having held up the railway charter for a year pending the making of investigations, the company will devote all energies for the present season to getting the Telkwa colonies in good shape, for which purpose \$100,000 been set aside. There will also be small sums spent upon properties which the company has under option along the proposed railway line to ascertain their actual merit. The mooted railway line down to tidewater at Kitimaat is apparently a secondary consideration to the Telkwa-Copper City cut-off.

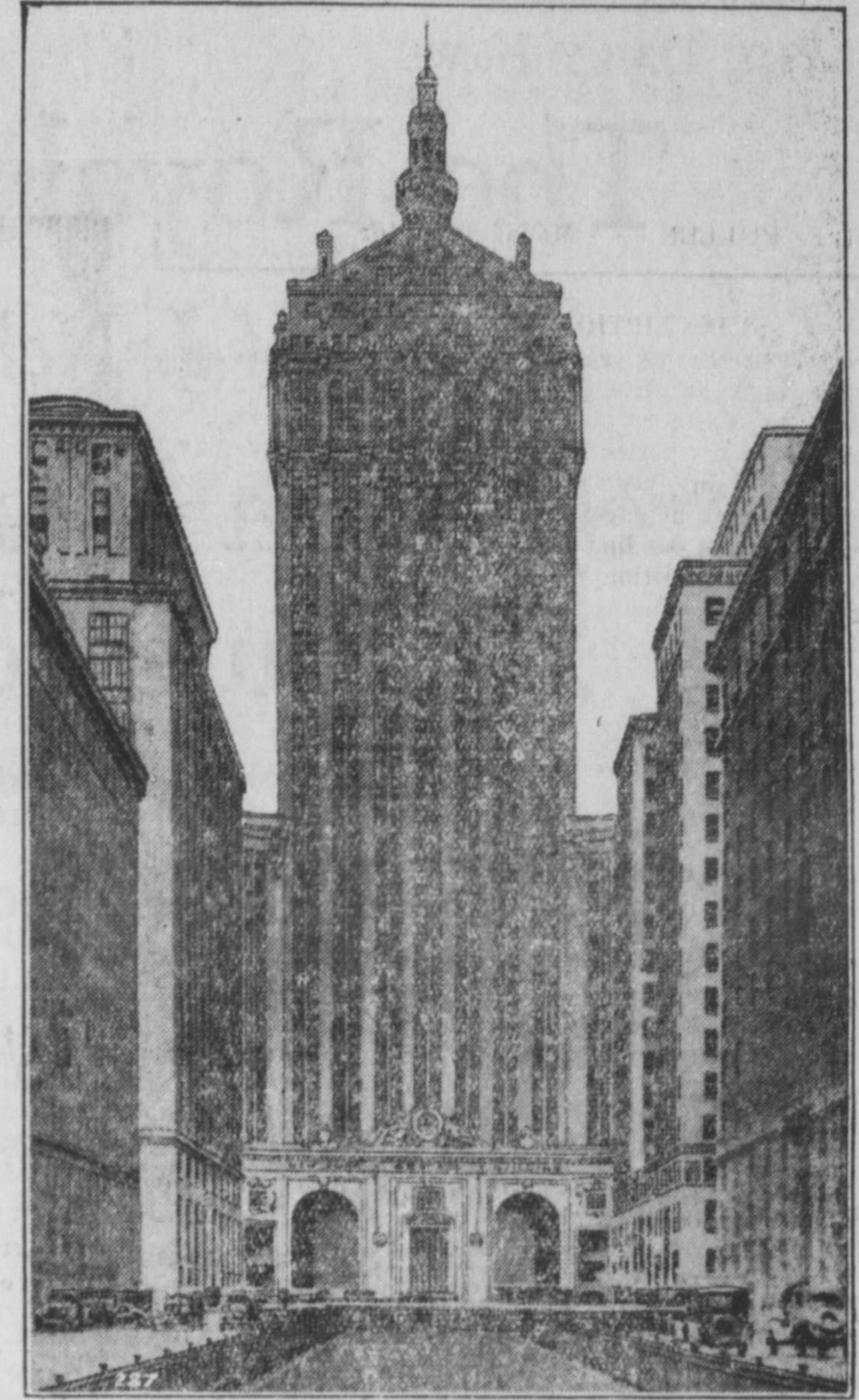

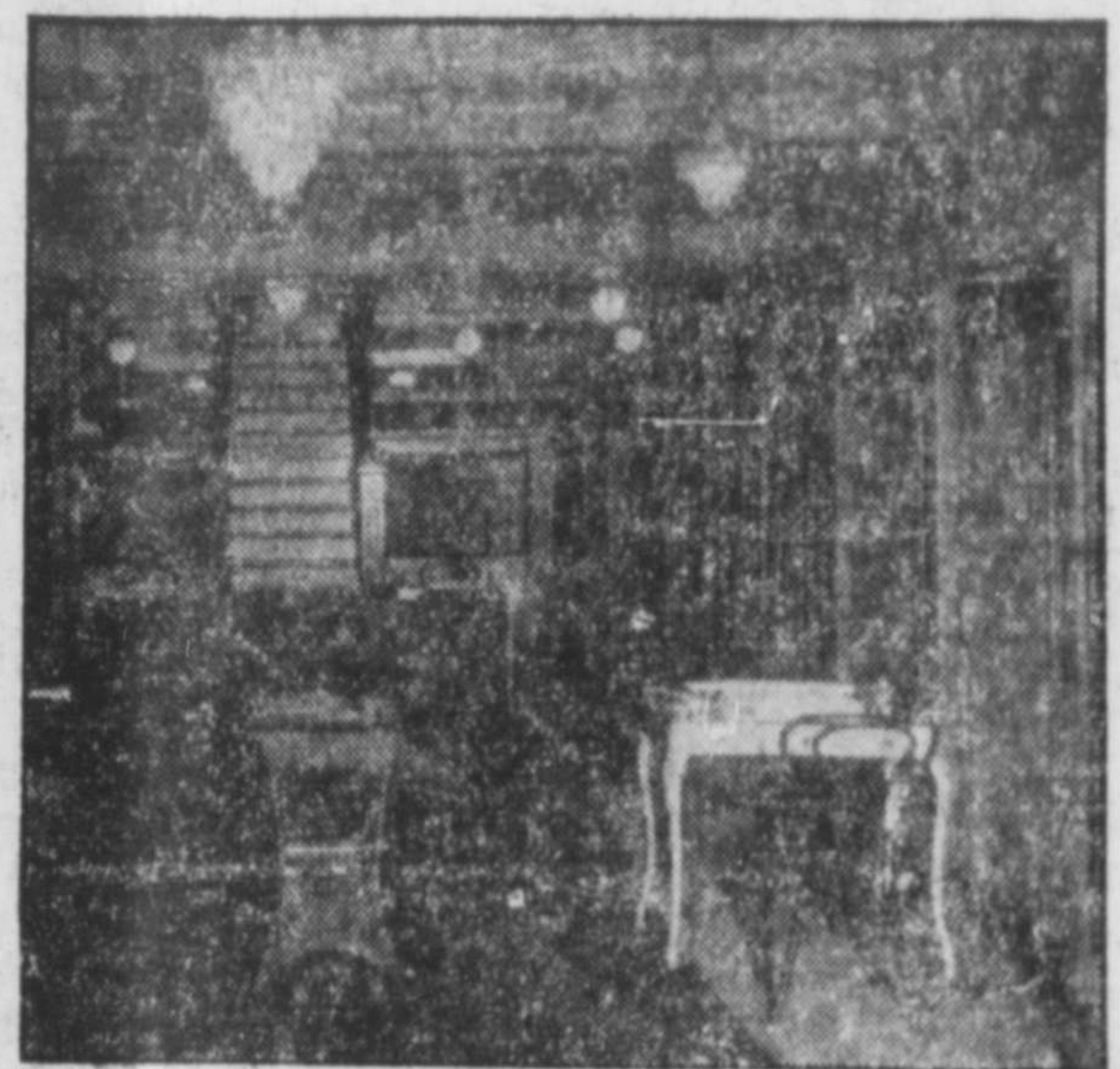

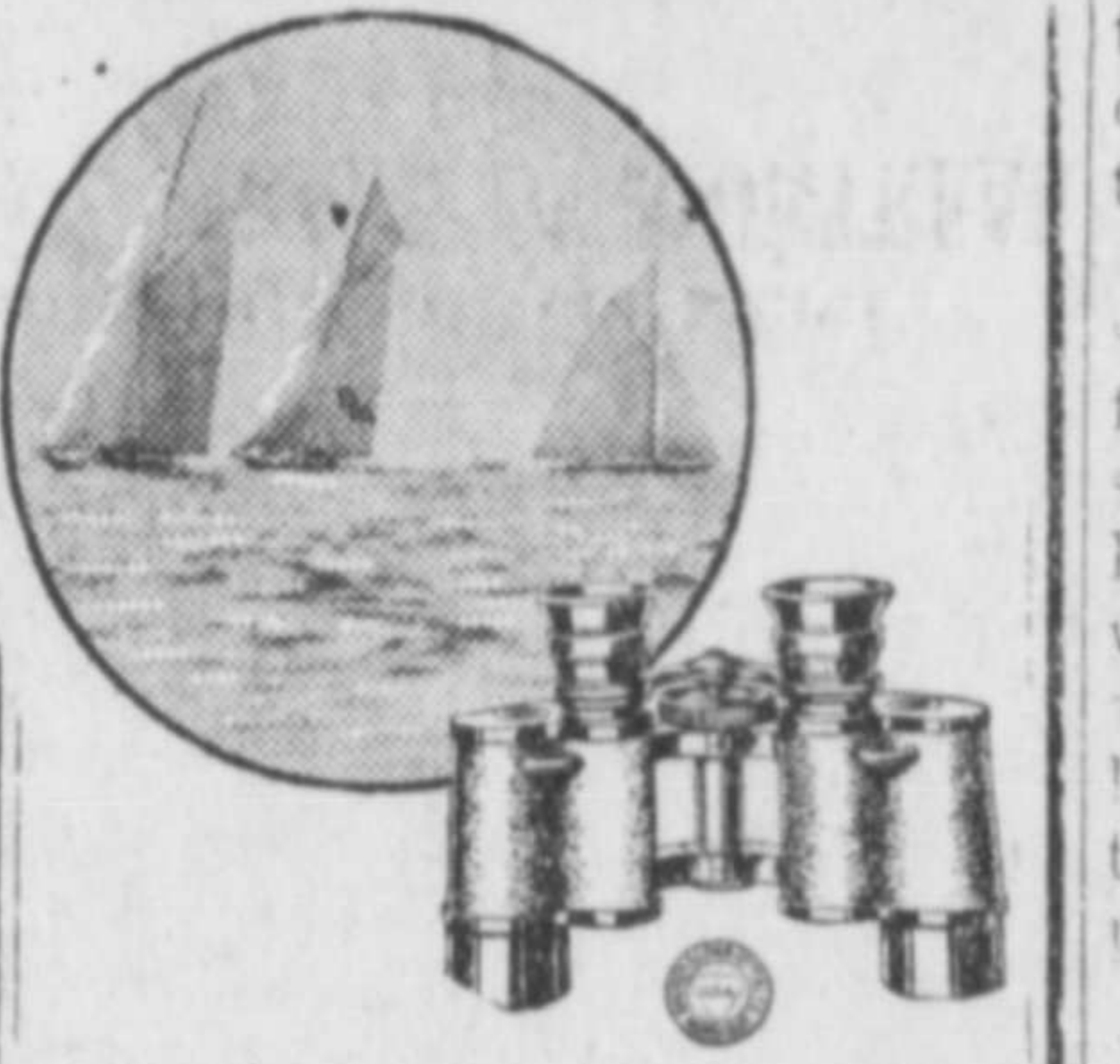
