Government Takes First Step Toward New Trade Policy for Canada to Offset U.S. Tariff

MONTREAL, June 22—Steps designed to lead to more extensive relations in Imperial trade are being taken by the Canadian Government, according to Finance Minister Robb, who is quoted by the Ottawa correspondent of the Montreal Star as stating:

"Communications already have been addresed to the Governments of all the overseas Dominions on the subject." The newspaper adds that D. H. Ross, trade commissioner to Australia, asked Mr. Robb if the Australian pact would be revised. "We are going much further than that. We are communicating with all the Dominion Governments looking toward greater Imperial trade develop-

The minister refused further to elaborate beyond admitting that what is in view is a policy of preferential Imperialism and development of trade within the Empire by means of exchange of preference. The common inference is that the development comes in consequence of the United States tariff policy.

Near Kalum Lake

INQUEST BY MONROE

Funeral Took Place at Terrace Under Masonic Auspices and Last Post Sounded

TERRACE, June 22. - An inquest into the death of David Shaw, prospector of the Kalum Lake district, was held in the police station on Wednesday before Coroner C. L. Monroe of Prince Rupert. The jury after hearing the evidence of F. Nightwine, who was with him at the time, W. Stevens and Constable H. Raybone, who located the body, brought in verdict of accidental death, caused by being hit on the head by a falling rock and knocked over a cliff.

The deceased man and his brother-inlaw. F. Nightwine, were goat hunting on Saturday about nine miles up Marcon from Kalum Lake. In going tainside a large boulder loosened and fell striking Mr. Shaw on the head and carrying him over the edge. After searching unsuccessfully during Saturday night and part of Sunday, Mr. Nightwine returned to Rosswood and organized a search party. The body was found on Monday about a hundred and twenty feet down the mountainside. Death had been evidently instantaneous. On the arrival of a policeman on Tuesday the remains were moved to Rosswood and thence to Terrace on Wednesday.

Going over this road the motorist could never understand why it was chosen to be improved rather than the straighter and better alternative stretch of highway.
