Story of His Military Life Is Thrilling One, Especially That Dealing With His Final Thrust Against German Forces in 1918

PARIS, March 20. — Marshal Ferdinand Foch, the generalissimo who led the allied armies to victory in the world war and who is generally acclaimed one of the world's greatest soldiers, died at his home at 5:50 p.m. today after a lengthy illness. He was 77 years of age.
