Kolchak Government Crisis In Russia is Expected Soon; Japanese are at Vladivostok

British Soldiers Mutiny Because They Thought Were Being Sent to Russia; Bolsheviki Being Driven Back; Ukrainian and Roumanian Forces Acting in Conjunction.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, August 25.—Vladivostok is surrounded by insurgents and the town is filled with refugees, according to Bolshevik wireless. A Japanese squadron has arrived at Vladivostok.
Washington, August 25.—Ambassador Morris who was sent to the United States department from Tokio to Omsk to report on the conditions in Siberia has advised the Government that the next thirty days will probably see a crisis in the affairs of the Kolchak Government.
Berne—Thursday—According to latest reports from Ukraine, the Bolsheviki have been everywhere driven back by the Ukrainian and Roumanian forces acting in conjunction.
London, August 25.—Three hundred soldiers of the Warwick, Berkshire, and Gloucester regiments have been arrested for refusing to obey orders to embark for France. The soldiers for the most part objected to embarking because they heard they would be sent to the Black Sea after arrival in France, whereas they had received promises no one would be sent to Russia unless they volunteered.
The war office statement says the men were being sent to Turkey, not to Russia.

COMMITTEE OF SENATE VOTES TREATY CHANGE

Would Amend Document to Make Shantung Returnable to China.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, August 25.—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted 9 to 8 to strike out the word "Japan" from the provisions of the Peace Treaty relating to the disposition of Germany's rights in Shantung and insert in its place the word "China." In effect the amendment is to provide for the return of the territory to China.

Is Charged With Having Betrayed Miss Edith Cavell

Defence of Quien Will Ask that Case Await Trial of Former Kaiser And others Primarily Responsible.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, August 25.—George Gaston Quien, charged with having intelligence with the enemy and alleged to have betrayed Edith Cavell, appears before the Sixth Council of Paris today.
The prosecution claims that they will prove that after obtaining funds and help from Nurse Cavell he went to Holland and returned to Brussels as a German agent and betrayed her to the German commandant.
The attorney for the defence will ask for an indefinite postponement until such time "as the Kaiser and other parties primarily responsible for the death of Miss Cavell be brought before an international tribunal."

PRINCE NIKOLAI IS NOW HEIR APPARENT ROUMANIAN THRONE

Paris, Aug. 25.—Prince Nikolai has been officially recognized as heir apparent to the throne of Roumania in place of Prince Charles, who renounced his rights a few days ago.

SUGAR SHORTAGE IS VERY ACUTE

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—The wholesale grocers' convention predict that sugar will soar to 20c. a pound before the present shortage is relieved.
The seamen's strike in New York is blamed for the present shortage in Canada.

C. W. Peck, M. P., returned from a visit to Stewart by launch this morning. While in the mining town a banquet was given in his honor by the residents. Many points of interest in the vicinity were visited by the member.

THREW GLASS, MONTH IN JAIL

Geo. McAuley Convicted on Charge of Assault and Has to Pay Penalty.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMorde, Geo. McAuley, charged with assault, was sentenced to one month imprisonment with hard labor. On Saturday evening, according to the evidence, the accused had entered one of the pool rooms in a drink-erased condition and had thrown a beer glass at the barmaid, Miss Hazel Raine, who appeared in the court this morning with a sore nose and forehead.
L. W. Patmore, who appeared for the defence, asked for a light sentence, but the magistrate stated that hitting a woman was too serious a crime to be allowed to go with a simple fine even on the possible excuse that he was irresponsible for his actions on account of his condition.

HIGHER PRICE FOR HALIBUT

Thirteen Cents Paid for First Class Fish on Exchange and Nine Cents for Second.

The bidding for the fish which was up for sale at the local exchange was very keen yesterday. Prices soared over the 13 cents mark for first class and almost 9 1/2 for the second class. This is much higher than has been paid for some time and those fishermen who were fortunate in being in for the big price were very free with their cigars towards the end of the sale. The highest prices of the day were paid to the Advance, Marguerite and Agnes B.

C. A. secretary in France during the war and is much pleased with what he has seen of this part of the country.

SHIPBUILDING IS ONCE MORE PROCEEDING

R. Morgan Co. Once More Busy On the Slips and Requiring More Men on Job.

Work on the construction of the slips at the shipyards was resumed this morning and J. R. Morgan, Ltd., are asking for men to work there. It is expected that this work will be pushed through to completion and that there will be a keel laying ceremony here in the near future.
There is about two weeks more work to do on the new buildings at the shipyard, that work having gone ahead during the strike, while the excavation operations are tied up. Now the slips will be pushed and it is possible that the first keel will be laid in three weeks from now.
The steel is being unloaded from the cars, this work having proceeded with during the last week. The repair work is proceeding and the office staff is complete. Everything now seems to be business and Prince Rupert people will be glad to feel that this important industry is once more in full swing here.

Widows and Children Must Get Justice.

On Saturday we reported a meeting at which strong pleas were made for the widows and orphans of those fell overseas. When the men went away to fight for their country it was on the understanding that the country would look after their wives and families.

So far, the Canadian Government has not done the right thing by the widows and orphans. As the speakers said at the recent meeting, no woman can expect to live on \$48 a month. In Prince Rupert widows of soldiers have had to go out scrubbing in order to make enough to keep them decently.

Mackenzie King Not Coming Yet.

It will be rather a disappointment to Prince Rupert people to think they will not have an opportunity to see and hear W. L. McKenzie King, the new leader of the Liberal party, until well on into the autumn. Perhaps by that time the election campaign will be on and he will not come under such happy circumstances.

We are becoming so important that all the statesmen will want to come here before long. In the meantime we must content ourselves with an occasional visit from one of the minor ministers of the crown. We are looking forward to Mr. Ballantyne coming and hope that when he arrives he will be so interested in our needs that we shall want to see him often.

Sport Interest Is Reviving.

There is a revival of interest in local sports. The football league and the baseball games add to the healthy development of the place. Soon we shall have more sports, for basketball is talked of for the autumn, and it is much to be desired that some organization shall be formed to give physical classes and gymnasium work at the Exhibition Building throughout the winter.

There is a proposal to complete the levelling of the Market Place and use it for outdoor sports. The suggestion is worth investigating. Possibly it would add to the interest taken in games generally if that ground were made available for the football and other games as well as for the boys.

Children Should Have the Best.

The children should have the best we can offer. What is the good of making money if the children are not going to get the benefit of it. Just now the children of the community need a school. They need the best in quality and on the best possible site.

Good Schools are Good Business.

What Prince Rupert wants more than anything else is population. If we have good schools, family people will come here. If we have poor accommodation, discerning parents will stay away. Just now we have an opportunity to help the school trustees provide a good school for the community.

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

TAKE NOTICE that a vote of the rate-payers will be taken on the following by-law, in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on the 27th day of August, 1919, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 7 p. m.

A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAIRS OF CERTAIN PLANK ROADWAYS IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AS HEREINAFTER SET OUT, INCLUDING RESURFACING WITH TWO-INCH PLANKING, AND REPAIRS OF SUPERSTRUCTURE WHERE NECESSARY AND TO CREATE AND SECURE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SUCH WORK, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00).

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert has determined to resurface the following plank roadways in the City of Prince Rupert, namely:

Section Five—Fulton St. and 8th Ave. W. Section Six—4th Ave. E. Hays Cove Circle and Hays Cove Bridge.

Section Seven—6th Ave. E. Section Eight—Conrad St. AND WHEREAS for the purpose of such resurfacing it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00);

AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue Serial Debentures to raise the said sum of \$25,000.00, payable in five (5) years from the date of the coming into effect of this by-law, and bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of five (5) years, by special rate, the sum set out in the schedule to this by-law, for the payment of the principal and interest of said debt.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements and real property of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,580.00.

AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for loan improvements and other purposes, is \$860,676.26 which is not twenty (20) per centum of said assessed amount.

AND WHEREAS this by-law cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to resurface the plank roadways herein referred to, and also make repairs to the superstructure where necessary, such work to be executed under the supervision of the City Engineer.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said work hereby authorized, it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$25,000.00, which debt shall be payable in five (5) years from the date when this by-law takes effect, for which debt Serial Debentures may be issued to be secured as hereinafter mentioned.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may and they are hereby authorized and instructed to sign, and affix the Seal of the Corporation, to each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the office of the Bank of Montreal, Canada, or at the office of the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the city of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York U. S. or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

5. Each of the said debentures shall bear date the 1st day of September, A. D. 1919, and such debentures shall have annexed thereto coupons for the interest thereon at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March in each year, the first payment to be due on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1920.

6. The said coupons shall be deemed to have been properly executed by the one having written, stamped, printed or lithographed thereon the names of the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City of Prince Rupert. Each coupon shall be numbered with the number of the debenture to which it is attached.

7. All debentures issued under this by-law shall be numbered consecutively, no matter when issued, beginning with the number One (1).

8. The principal of the said debentures shall be payable on the 1st day of September in the years and amounts set out in the Schedule to this By-law.

9. For the payment of the debt hereby authorized and the interest thereon, there shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, the annual sums set out in the schedule to this By-law.

10. The total annual sums for interest and payment of the debt referred to in the preceding section shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures by a rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable land or improvements or real property within the Municipality.

11. The said debentures when issued, sold or hypothecated, and any coupons thereto attached, shall be deemed a valid and binding charge upon the said City of Prince Rupert.

12. The Council may sell the said debentures at less than par if it is found at any time necessary so to do.

13. The amount of debt authorized by this by-law is subject to consolidation with the amount of any other debt authorized by any other by-law of the City, and notwithstanding anything herein contained authorizing and directing the issue and sale of debentures for the purpose of a debt hereby created, the City of Prince Rupert Consolidated Stock may be issued in the place of said debentures to the amount of such debt. This section shall only apply insofar as the Council may be empowered by Statute so to do.

14. This by-law shall take effect upon the 1st day of September, 1919, but before its final passage shall be submitted to a vote of the rate-payers under the provisions of Section 165 of the Municipal Act.

FISH OFFAL FERTILIZER PLANT HERE

Vice-Consul David Donaldson tells in U. S. Commerce Report of Local Industry.

A comparatively new industry has been established at Tucks Inlet, across the bay from Prince Rupert, in Osborne Cove, says Vice-Consul David Donaldson in the U. S. Commerce Report. The company which established this industry is known as the Tucks Inlet By-Products Co., a Canadian organization capitalized at \$125,000 and with head offices in Vancouver.

The products of this concern are obtained entirely from fish offal. The company manufactures fish meal, which is a valuable fertilizing ingredient, and fish oil, which is used in the manufacture of soap. In the opinion of the company's manager this oil can be used in the manufacture of glycerin also. The offal is obtained from the various Skeena River canneries and from the Prince Rupert fish packing companies. This plant in reality serves a double purpose, inasmuch as it provides a marketable product of very considerable value from an otherwise worthless raw material, and at the same time disposes of offal that would be a nuisance in a community such as this, where fishing is the most important industry and canneries are so numerous.

Method of Manufacture.

The offal is collected from the various canneries and packing houses and conveyed to the fertilizer plant in scows towed by a gas power boat. Upon arrival the offal is hoisted to the top of the factory to the storage hopper, from which it descends through the various cooking and crushing machines to the basement. This operation is repeated, and after the oil and moisture are extracted the residue constitutes meal ready to be used in fertilizers.

As the offal fats are contained in oil cells or tissues, the offal used for oil is heated or cooked in order to break up these cells. Then the moisture and oil are pressed out and separated and the oil refined.

Fertilizer and Oil.

The oil is placed in storage tanks at Prince Rupert and shipped in tank cars via the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Fish meal is shipped by steamer direct from the plant. Both oil and meal are shipped principally to the United States, the former to Chicago and vicinity and the latter to Pacific coast ports. The meal is used principally in California and Hawaii.

The company contemplates erecting another plant on the Skeena River in close proximity to the canneries. This will save a great portion of the very considerable cost of transportation from the Skeena to the present plant and enable the company to extend its collecting operations to the north for supplies, which the present capacity will not warrant.

It is not an organization or a sect or a new religion. It is an ideal, entertained more or less vaguely by many, but soon to be consciously practiced by all. It is the Message of God to man given again and again, and now once more proclaimed by these three wise men of the east, the prophets of the Bahai Revelation.
