London, August 25 .- Three hundred soldiers of the Warwick, rkshire, and Gloucester regiments have been arrested for resing to obey orders to embark for France. The soldiers for most part objected to embarking because they heard they ould be sent to the Black Sea after arrival in France, whereas y had received promises no one would be sent to Russia unless y volunteered.

The war office statement says the men were being sent to rkey, not to Russia.





The products of this concern are obtained entirely from fish offal. The company manufactures fish meal, which is a valuable, fertilizing ingredient, and fish oil, which is used in the manufacture of soap. In the opinion of the company's manager this oil can be used in the manufacture of glycerin also. The offal is obtained from the various Skeena River canneries and from the Prince Rupert fish packing com- NEW FORM OF panies. Method of Manufacture.

The offal is collected from the arious canneries and packing houses and conveyed to the fertilizer plant in scows towed by a gas power boat. This operation is repeated, and after the oil and moisture are extracted the residue constitutes meal ready when all men are just and this to be used in fertilizers.



Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption new confined to sur-

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may

with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptors must occupy claims for value of \$10 per acre, including clear-ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres.

before receiving Crown Grant: Where pre-emptor in occupation not ess than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, be-cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence

of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, proand residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be

leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of

Alifed Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from en-listment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfiliment of conditions of purchase, in-terest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
