## Canadian Government to Await Final Action of U. S. on Tariff

OTTAWA, June 21.—While the progress of the United States tariff legislation is being followed here with attention, there is no disposition to act hastily. The attitude of watchful waiting adopted by the Government before the introduction of the last budget is being maintained. There is no tendency to ignore proposed changes in the U. S. tariff schedules and their possible effect on Canada's trade is being noted, but the process now going on is one of merely gathering information.

Changes upward in the Canadian tariff can be made only by act of Parliament, consequently if the Government should consider it advisable to meet the United States increases by an upward revision here, such changes would have to wait until the next session of Parliament.

The view held here is that there probably will be no finality in the U. S. tariff until fall. Then will be time enough to settle down and determine exactly what the effect on Canada will be. That once determined, the Government has intimated that it will be prepared to act in the best interests of Canada.

While there has been no announcement of a definite nature either during the session just past or since, it seems probable that the policy of the Government will be one of greatly increasing trade within the Empire. The logical step to achieve this is by means of the Canada-British preference. If the United States shut out Canadian commodities a market for these will be sought elsewhere, preferably within the Empire. This means to be the view held here.

NEW YORK, June 21.—The Athletics pounded three Yankee pitchers, including the once incomparable Pennock, for 16 hits before 65,000 fans today to win the first game of a double-header 11 to 1. Babe Ruth hung up his twentieth homer as Al Simmons hit his fifteenth and the Athletics pounded the Yankee hurlers for five hits in five times at bat and drove in three runs. The victory increased the lead of the Athletics over the champions to eight and a half games. The series is regarded as a crucial one in the pennant race of Philadelphia and New York.

## MEXICO SENDS CANADIAN HOME

Major Kingsford of Toronto Released From Prison but Ordered Expelled

A PERNICIOUS FOREIGNER

OTTAWA, June 21.—Major W. R. Kingsford, former Toronto resident and an officer in the Royal Canadian Dragoons, has been released from a Mexican prison and placed in charge of the British consul at Guadalajara, Mexico, according to word received here last night.

Following an order of President Gil of Mexico for the expulsion of Kingsford as a pernicious foreigner, the Canadian officer had been under guard since May 19. The order was made in consequence of objections by the authorities in the state of Jalisco to the presence of Kingsford in that state. He had been in charge of a coffee plantation.

## Airplane Struck Power Wires on River St. Lawrence, Crashed and Three Men Were Killed

MONTREAL, June 21.—Capt. Hon. J. C. Jervis, M.C., 32 years of age, son of Lord St. Vincent and former A.D.C. to Viscount Willingdon, and two companions were instantly killed when a seaplane in which they were riding crashed in the St. Lawrence River yesterday afternoon between Point St. Charles and Nun's Island. Other victims were Pilot C. S. Caldwell and Dr. William D. Morris, who came here two years ago from Victoria, B.C., where his parents reside.

Captain Jervis came to Canada in 1926 as aide de camp to the governor-general and after two years joined the staff of Canadian Victoria here.

It was several hours before the bodies of Jervis and Morris were recovered from the wrecked plane. The body of Caldwell was not found.

The plane was flying low when it struck two high tension wires carrying electric power and almost immediately burst into flames and crashed and turned over.

The accident apparently happened when engine failure made it impossible for the pilot to avoid striking the high tension wires.

## Proposal to Ask for Sale of Railway to C.P.R. Is Set Forth

Thomas McClymont Urges That Matter Engage Associated Boards Instead of Suggestion For a New Province

In a carefully thought out address at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday, Thomas McClymont proposed that instead of agitating for a new province for the north, the Associated Boards of Trade at their meeting this month should commence an agitation for the sale of the section of the railway from Red Pass Junction to Prince Rupert to the Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. McClymont said:

"The newest and liveliest topic, not only here but in the interior, is the 'New Province' and soon the matter will be brought into the limelight by virtue of being placed before the Associated Boards of Trade. Our own Board of Trade will have a resolution and from press reports, we note that those in the interior will also have resolutions on the matter.

The cause of this agitation can only be that the people are dissatisfied with existing conditions, and seek some remedy and in casting about for one, have seized upon the largest possible and perhaps without first ascertaining whether it might not turn out to be a liability rather than an asset.

In the olden days those favoring similar propositions would be termed rebels. Sometimes force of arms was resorted to, to bring about the desired end and the rebels when caught were usually hung in chains or beheaded, and while in a general way rebels seldom receive any credit, yet they seem to be necessary for the placing before a nation the wrongs under which people may be governed and when the wrongs are righted the rebels are forgotten except by way of infamy. This country has not been free (Continued on page two.)

A HOSTILE COUNTRY

President Hoover, if he ever looks across the boundary and notes the attitude of the Canadian people, as we believe he does, sees a country unanimously in favor of taking decisive action to protect itself against a hostile United States tariff. Both parties agree that action is necessary, but they are divided as to the method.

The Government has announced its intention of taking the tariff as a rebuff to Canadian desire for closer business relations. Their remedy is to say: "If you don't want our business, we won't want yours and will trade elsewhere. We will form an Empire combine and trade among ourselves."

The Conservative policy is to raise the tariff wall higher than it is today against the admission of American goods.

The argument of the Government is that the people of this country should not be penalized in order to carry on the fight with the States. High protection, they say, means higher prices in this country and consequent increase in the cost of living. Instead of raising the tariff wall higher against the south they will lower it east and west and admit British goods on easier terms than obtain today. That will tend to make the cost of living lower and will attain the same object of diverting trade from the south to the British countries to the east and west. This follows the policy already in force of establishing close trade relations with the West Indies.

Which ever way he looks, President Hoover sees a unit in favor of taking the hint that Canadian business is not wanted in the States.

PROPOSAL TO ASK FOR SALE OF RAILWAY TO C. P. R. CLEARLY SET FORTH

from rebels and some had to fly the country, according to history. Their methods were drastic, but they felt the wrongs keenly and today we find that the things the rebels stood for and were willing to fight for are obtained, but what those in authority stood for at that time have been abolished. I confess therefore, a strong liking for rebels and they are worthy of kinder consideration.

Rebellion still goes on, but we now settle matters by friendly debate and the ballot.

There has been a great upheaval in England recently we find this most aristocratic country is now governed by a new democracy. It all happened in a few hours and no blood spilled, and it is a pity that the early leaders of the Labor party are not here today to share in the fruits of their early struggles. I refer in particular to John Burns and Keir Hardy. They were the pioneers in the House of Commons and were looked upon more as rebels than ordinary members. This is all changed and I am confident the new government will govern sanely and well.

Carving Province

Coming then to our own proposed upheaval of carving this province in two, the southern part will look upon these favoring such a project as rebels, and while I have confessed to having a liking for rebels, yet I regret that on this stand I cannot agree.

Had there been a proposal for amalgamation of provinces, it would have found more favor with me, for I know of no country having as much government for the population as Canada. We have machinery of government more in keeping with a population of fifty million than of ten.

The cry of large territory may be raised to warrant all this duplication, but we can point to territory just as large as the provinces and governed in the main from an office in London. As a self governing Dominion, we manage our own affairs, but more centralization is what I would favor, rather than expansion and duplication. However, I do not favor knocking down a project if I cannot replace it by something else, and this I propose doing.

The Proposal

In a short time the Associated Boards of Trade will meet here, and I suggest that they change their slogan of a "New Province" to that of a demand and agitation that the Dominion Government be asked to negotiate for the sale of the C.N.R. from Red Pass Junction to Prince Rupert and to sell it to the C.P.R.

This proposal may seem even more fantastic than the "New Province" crusade but I contend that it has merit, and more within the bounds of possibility and realization than the carving up of the province. We are led to believe that the C.P.R. wish an outlet on this northern coast. We know that the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., which is akin to the C.P.R., are looking over and acquiring all the mining properties they can find in the interior as well as to the north. We also know that they have established an assay office in our city to look after such properties. All this must mean that the C.P.R., through their subsidiary connections propose to develop this northern country. The C.P.R. is not only a railroad concern, it has the means and is in a position to build business to feed the railroad.

In advocating this project, it is not that I have fault to find with the management of the C.N.R. I think they have done wonders to clean up the mess caused by the bankruptcy of the old Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific, but as a government owned railroad, they have not a free hand, they are subject to criticism in parliament and at times become a political football. With such handicaps, and lack of power, the C. N. cannot do what an independent road can do.

No government is happy when they have railroads on their hands, and I believe they would see, if an opportunity presented. We here feel that the line from the east to Vancouver is considered the main line, and from Red Pass Junction to Prince Rupert, the branch, and if the subject has any merit, let us agitate that this branch line be sold that it may become more of a main line. I do not suggest that such a change would cure all our ills, but it would put new spirit into the people interested, and once that is accomplished, a different feeling will prevail.



### STORAGE OF X-RAY FILM IS DISCUSSED

Letter From Fire Marshal on Subject Read at Hospital Board Meeting Last Night

Storage and handling of X-ray films in the local hospital came up for decision at the monthly board meeting last night when a letter was read from J. A. Thomas, British Columbia fire marshal, who stated that the matter was to be considered at a forthcoming Dominion fire prevention convention in Ottawa, with special reference to storage in hospitals, etc. Until more explicit instructions were given following this convention, Mr. Thomas urged that in the meantime the utmost care be observed.

H. W. Birch, managing secretary, stated that an inspection had been recently made by Fire Chief D. H. McDonald and a representative of the fire marshal and it had been suggested that no more than 1000 pounds or two years' films be allowed to accumulate.

R. E. Benson told the board that by returning the old film to the manufacturers a rebate could be secured. The matter will stand in abeyance until further word is received from Mr. Thomas.

### GRASS AND TREES ARE PLANTED AT HOSPITAL

Donation of Trees by Terrace Man to Be Acknowledged by Board

G. V. Wilkinson, chairman of the grounds committee, reported to the hospital board last night that the grounds had now been seeded in grass which was coming up nicely. Will Robinson of Silver Birch Farm, Terrace, had presented the committee with 10 maple, 10 birch and two red spruce trees, which had been planted around the grounds and were doing well. In spite of the fact that noticeable improvements had been made, the committee reported that it still had left \$25 of the \$100 granted for the work. Some expenditure had also been necessitated in improvements to the Nurses' Home grounds.

The board instructed the secretary to write a letter to Mr. Robinson acknowledging the donation of the trees.

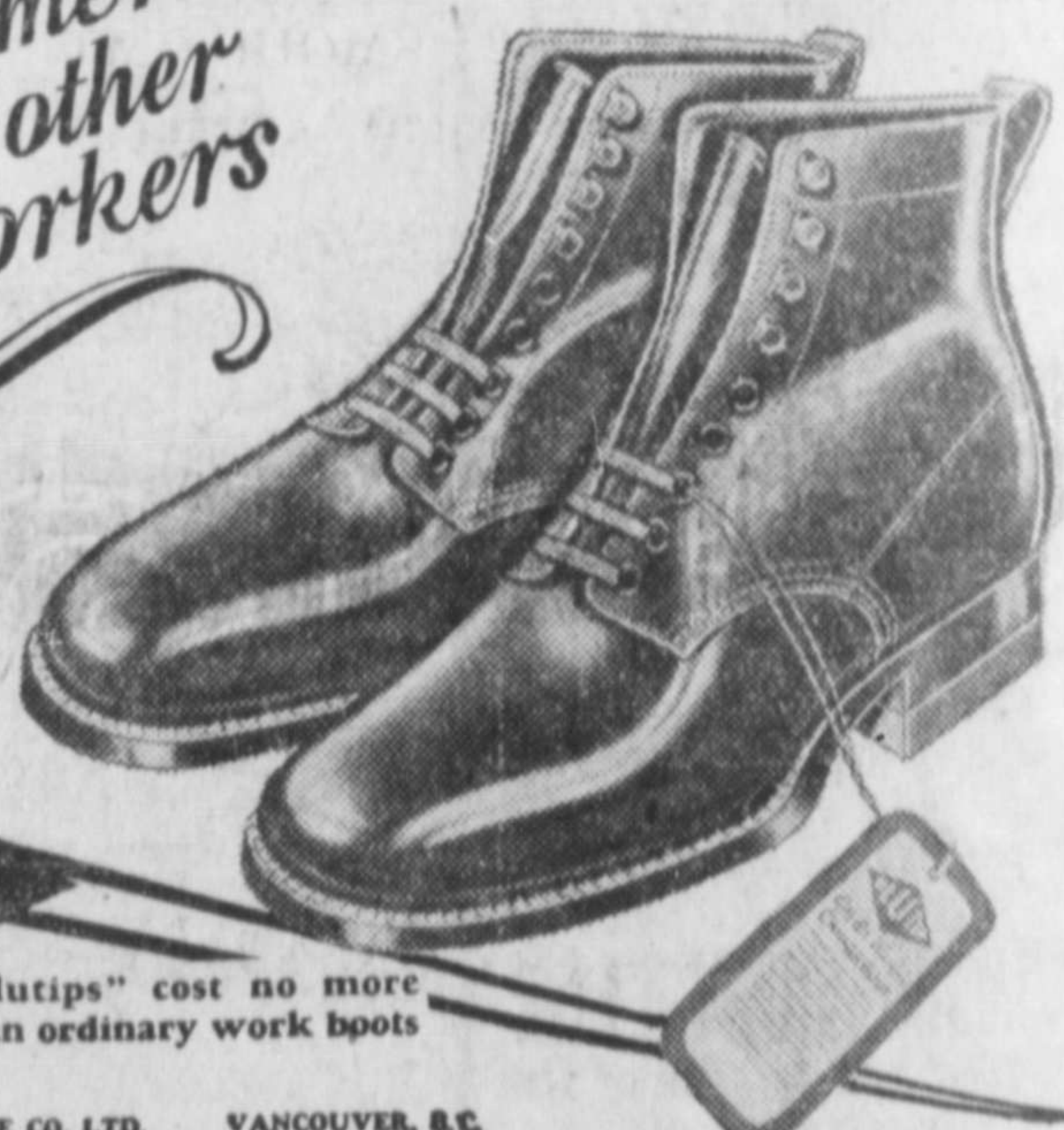
