

GOVERNMENT OF THE PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

MARCH 31st

Is the last day for filing Returns of Income earned during the Calendar Year 1928

Returns are required to be filed with the provincial assessor, Prince Rupert, from whom the necessary forms and full information may be obtained.

Those required to make returns are as follows:

1. Every corporation or joint stock company (use Form No. 7).

2. Every partnership, and every person engaged in business of any kind, or practicing any profession (use Form No. 7B).

3. Every other person in receipt of income from salary, wages, commission, fees, bonus, perquisites, interest, dividends, rent, or other income from any source whatsoever, in excess of

(a) In the case of a married person, \$1800.

(b) In the case of a single person, \$1200.

(Use Form No. 7A)

Individuals whose total income from all sources is less than the amount specified need not file a return unless requested by the assessor to do so.

In the case of provincial returns the amount of the tax is not payable until GO days after the date upon which the assessor mails a notice of assessment.

The public are earnestly requested to obtain the necessary forms and file returns promptly in order to avoid penalties. Assistance in the making up of returns will be gladly rendered where necessary by the staff of the assessor's
