# BANK CUTS BIG MELON

Shareholders for \$200 When Increasing Capital

MONTREAL, Jan. 14.-A letter to the shareholders of the Bank of Montreal, announces that the directors have decided to issue new stock at \$200 a share on the basis of one share for every five now held and applicable to stockholders on record at the close of business on February 9, 1929. The present value of the stock is about \$400. Under the financing plan the paid up capital will be increased by 59,834 shares of \$100 parvalue and the total paid up capital stock will be increased to approximately \$36,000,000.

# Statement on Finances of City Issued Today

Arrears of Taxation Were Paid Up, General and Local Improvement, Amounting In all to Over \$40,000.

The corporation of the city of Prince Rupert showed a surplus on revenue account during the year 1928 of \$6,350.64, according to a statement issued this morning by City Treasurer D. J. Matheson. This surplus is based upon full collection of taxes for the year and does not take into account an over-expenditure of \$16,288.70 on trunk sewer construction which will have to be met during the coming year either by general levy

The total general taxation levy in 1928 was \$229,210.43 an l, of this, \$196,874.50 was collected, or 86 per cent. Arrears on general taxation received amounted to General administration \$ 26,322.91 \$20,329.96.

The local improvement levy totalled \$101,800.96, of which \$55,815.33, or 55 per cent, was





The heroism and hardihood of the halibut fishermen has been mentioned many times in these columns. Every year fresh instances of their courage and efficiency come to light. A recent rescue in western Alaskan waters draws a tribute from the Alaskan Daily Empire published at Juneau. It speaks of the Alaska fishermen, but the same applies exactly to those Canadians engaged in the dangerous calling. This is what the Alaskan paper says:

"Kipling has immortalized the fishermen of the Grand Banks, but nowhere in the world, nor at any time in history, have hardier or braver men sailed the seas than those who catch halibut in the waters of the North Pacific. They are not strutting or swashbuckling heroes. They never seek fame. To them fighting the terrors of the sea, saving human life and craft from watery graves, are in the day's work. That they are competent soilors, masters of wind and wave, "Captains Courageous," all of them, is proved many times in each season. And their humanitarianism, their recognition that all are "brothers under the sun," and their quiet and matter-of-course way of accepting without question that the duty to aid those in distress is of more consequence than making large catches, quick trips, and thereby good profits, is proved time and again in every fishing season.

"Nowhere lives a finer race of men than these Alaska er-with surprising results." fishermen. ## NOTABLE EXAMPLE

The city of Ketchikan has built itself a dock at a cost of about \$10,000. The dock warehouse has a frontage of 144 feet, is 72 feet deep, and the dock is so constructed as to be able to accommodate the steamers which ply from Puget Sound ports to Alaska.

Prince Rupert has never had to build a dock or even floats so far. No accommodation has been made here for the fishing boats except such as the provincial government built or private concerns provided. Ketchikan deserves to proceed. It does things.

## PRINCE RUPERT TO FORE

Prince Rupert comes to the fore in at least one respect. It has recently received high commendation for its fire fighting record. It has had such a record for many years. When the present fire apparatus was purchased it was tried out in Toronto and caused a good deal of favorable mention in the newspapers there. The Prince Rupert Optimist mentions it, speaking of the truck as a "massive affair of steel build throughout, making seven tons of dead weight that require an eighty horse power engine to propel. The engine is a six cylinder and capable of driving the big bulk of fire-fighting apparatus along a level stretch at 40 miles an hour. This high power also gives the machine ability to climb hills in a manner calculated to make a healthy horse look sick."

The apparatus would not have fought fires without a capable fire brigade and this the city seems to have had under Chief McDonald.





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
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
