## Bank at Smithers Was Robbed of \$2,000 Today but Loot Was Recovered and Bandit Escaped

### Tall Man Entered Building With Gun and Told Teller to Hand Over Cash, Which He Did; Shooting Followed

SMITHERS, July 17.—The town of Smithers was all excitement this morning when the news got abroad that the Royal Bank here had been robbed, that the robber had escaped, but that before making his getaway from town the currency which he had taken had been recovered.

It was about twenty minutes to eleven this morning when Teller A. Forde was suddenly confronted by a tall man with a handkerchief covering part of his face. The bandit drew a gun from his pocket and told the teller to shove the money through the wicket.

Forde emptied the till containing two thousand dollars and the man grabbed it and ran out, followed by the teller, who fired several shots at the robber, but without visible effect.

Fifteen minutes later some local citizens coming on the bandit ordered him to stop if he wanted to live. The man dropped the money and escaped into the bush.

Up to noon today the robber had not been arrested, but the police are stopping all avenues of escape and it is so difficult getting out of the country that it is thought he cannot get away.

## PREMEDITATED MURDER IN THE STABBING CASE

### Stephen Boljkovac Preliminary Trial Commenced at Hazelton Last Night

HAZELTON, July 17.—That the murder of Dimitar Smilevich by stabbing at Dorreen was premeditated is indicated in the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest yesterday. After hearing witnesses the following pronouncement was made by the jury: "That Dimitar Smilevich died as the result of knife injuries inflicted by Stephen Boljkovac, who with premeditation murdered said Dimitar Smilevich."

Following the inquest, Boljkovac was arraigned on a charge of murder and the preliminary trial commenced.

## SHOWERS CAME ON PRAIRIES

WINNIPEG, July 17.—A score of districts in widely separated parts of the prairies reported showers in some cases heavy enough to give immediate relief yesterday. Generally, however, the heat wave continued in Saskatchewan and Alberta, with the weather bureau predicting fair and warm.

## Government is Not Likely to Refuse Clearance to Vessels Clearing for the United States

OTTAWA, July 17.—The matter of refusing clearances to liquor laden boats destined to the United States is not within the competence of the Federal Government as the law now stands, nor can it come within that competence until authority for such a course has been given by act of Parliament, Hon. W. D. Euler said here.

"I adhere to the sentiments expressed on that subject last session and I am convinced that subsequent developments have borne them out," said the minister of customs. "Tightening up of American enforcement activities has had a salutary effect," Mr. Euler said, adding that he felt the sense of the House at last session was by no means favorable towards the refusing of clearances.

## LIBERALS GAIN ANOTHER SEAT

### Government Supporter Elected With Good Majority in Isle La Crosse, Saskatchewan

MEADOW LAKE, July 17.—Jules Marion, Liberal, was re-elected in Isle La Crosse constituency to the Saskatchewan legislature at the deferred election yesterday, less than half the returns giving him a majority of 246 with prospects of increasing this. Marion's election increases the slim lead of the Liberal party in the legislative standing.

## CONDITION OF KING GEORGE IMPROVING

LONDON, July 17.—It was officially announced at Buckingham palace this morning that the King's condition continues to show good improvement.

## FOUR LOST LIVES AT CORNWALL, ONTARIO

CORNWALL, Ont., July 17.—Four persons, an aged couple and two children, were burned to death when fire destroyed four houses and four others seriously injured here with property loss of \$30,000.

## JOINS H.M.S. COLOMBO

George G. Bushby and son, John, sailed yesterday afternoon on the Catala for Victoria. The latter is to join H.M.S. Colombo as midshipman.

## HUGE LINERS FOR UNITED STATES SOON

NEW YORK, July 17.—It was announced today that the United States shipping lines would start construction next year on two liners to cost \$25,000,000 each. They will be 956 feet long and the displacement will be 56,000 tons. Each will have accommodation for 4000 passengers.

## U. S. CRUISERS WILL BE SOLD

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 17.—Two decommissioned light cruisers, the New Orleans, and the Albany, no longer fit for naval service, are to be offered for sale by the navy.

The ships were purchased during the Spanish-American war from the Brazilian Government. The New Orleans participated in the engagement off Santiago, Cuba, against Cervera's squadron. The Albany saw service in several expeditions to Central America during the first decade of the century. They were used to escort convoys out of New York during the World War, and were decommissioned in 1922.

## NORTHERN MINING MAN DIES IN SOUTH

### R. D. Featherstonhaugh, Who Was in Atlin in Early Days, Succumbs at Age of 74

The death occurred on Sunday in Vancouver of Richmond D. Featherstonhaugh, aged 74, well known in northern British Columbia through having been active in the early development of mining properties in the Atlin district and later in the Peace River country. He was a mining engineer and came to British Columbia 35 years ago from Windsor. The funeral is being held in Vancouver this afternoon.

## FIVE KILLED NOVA SCOTIA

WINDSOR, N.S., July 17.—Five persons were killed yesterday when a motor car was struck by a Dominion Atlantic Railway express "New Yorker" near here. The dead are Charles H. Wright of Wolfville; his son, Grabam, 11 years of age; and a daughter, Juan, aged 16; a father-in-law, N. W. Eaton; and the latter's daughter, Mrs. Frank Heustan.

## TO TRAMP OVER TRAIL OF '98 FROM SKAGWAY

### Members of Chicago Geographical Society Aboard Steamer Today En Route North

Passengers here today en route to Alaska on the steamer Prince Rupert include a party of members of the Chicago Geographical Society who plan to tramp over the famous old trail of '98 from Skagway to Lake Bennett. They are also photographing interesting views along the coast for the records of their society.

## BOAT WAS SUNK ON WEST COAST

### Few Details Received Yet as to Margalice; Salvage Boat Despatched

### NARROW ESCAPE OF CREW

### Vessel Struck Log When Running For Shelter and Sank Immediately

The well known local halibut boat Margalice, Capt. Jack Christiansen, has sunk in four fathoms of water in Inskip Channel on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands. No further particulars of the accident than this were received yesterday afternoon by the Pacific Salvage Co. in a brief wireless message from the tug Lorne. The salvage boat Red Boy, Capt. Charles Larkin, was sent out on receipt of the message to raise the Margalice.

Damage, the extent of which is not yet known here, will be covered by insurance.

SKIDEGATE, July 17.—The halibut fishing boat Margalice, when running for shelter to Kuisun Harbor on the west coast of Moresby Island, struck a floating log and sank at once, the crew barely having time to get into a dory and escape. She is in six fathoms of water.

Captain Christopher and his crew rowed to the herring fishing camp nearby, and the men there are helping in an effort to salvage the wreck.

## NOME FLIGHT BEGINS FRIDAY

NEW YORK, July 17.—Chaplain Ross G. Hoyt of the army air corps tactics group at Langley Field, Virginia, announced last night that he planned to take off from Mitchell Field Friday in an attempt to fly to Nome and back within three days with stops at Minneapolis, Edmonton and White Horse. The distance is 8460 miles. A stop will be made at Nome for six hours.

The project is sponsored by the war department.

## Prairie Heat Forces Price Wheat to Greater Heights July Delivery up to \$1.77

WINNIPEG, July 17.—Continuance of terrific heat in western Canada and across the border created another bull market today, wheat working up as much as nine cents with the close eight to nine cents higher. July touched \$1.77; October, \$1.68 1-2; and December, \$1.64 1-2.

Manitoba reported temperatures of 100 above zero in some districts, while Alberta and Saskatchewan were more moderate.

VANCOUVER, July 17.—Wheat was quoted on the local exchange today at \$1.67 1-2.

## GRAF ZEPPELIN WILL LEAVE IN AUGUST ON FLIGHT TO NEW YORK

FRIEDRICHSHAVEN, Germany, July 17.—It is officially announced that the dirigible Graf Zeppelin will leave in August on a flight to New York.

## FIRE LOSSES ON INCREASE

VANCOUVER, July 17.—Fire losses in British Columbia during 1928 amounted to \$2,667,551, an increase of more than \$14,000 over 1927, according to a report of Fire Marshal J. A. Thomas.

Prince Rupert's loss was \$6258.

## MANY SEALS TAKEN PRYBILOFF ISLANDS

SEWARD, July 17.—Reports have just been received from the Prybiloff Islands to the effect that 21,522 seal skins had been taken up to July 8 as compared with 18,023 of the same date last year.

More seals were killed by the natives this year off the coast of Sitka, than for many years past. Over 800 skins were taken there.

## China Replies to Russia Regard to Dismissal of Officials from the Chinese Eastern Railways

NANKING, China, July 17.—The Nationalist Government has replied to Russia's ultimatum regarding the Chinese Eastern Railway dispute. The Chinese ask that the Soviet release all Chinese imprisoned in Russia, said to number about a thousand, and that the Soviet adequately protect Chinese Nationals in Russia from aggression and repression.

The Chinese claimed that dismissal of Russian railway officials was justified because the Soviet officials had not carried out the terms of the 1924 agreement.

The note also said that evidence of Communist propaganda had been found in Manchuria.

## HEAT MODERATE NORTHERN B. C. EVIDENCE OF NAVIGATOR ON MARY FISCHER

### Favorable Comparison With Intense Drought of Prairies Just Now

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 17.—The Juneau Gold Mining Company yesterday announced the acquisition of a controlling interest in the Manville Goldstein group of claims on Taku River. Development will be started immediately.

### Said Vessel Had Lost Anchor in Gale and Proceeded to McIntyre Bay

VICTORIA, B. C., July 17.—That United States fishing vessel Mary C. Fischer, after drifting for hours before a northwest gale, having experienced engine trouble and lost an anchor, proceeded into McIntyre Bay, Graham Island, for shelter, was the testimony given yesterday by Cliff Sumerlin, navigator, in the condemnation proceedings here. The vessel was seized by the Rividis on May 29.

He anchored five miles off shore, Sumerlin said, and must have drifted on the heavy tide. Capt. A. A. Fillion, master and part owner of the vessel, had been ill with a cold.

The case was proceeding.

SPEAKING MARATHON

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT  
Big Party Going Into Cassiar District; Premier Pays Another Dividend; Alice Arm Camp Shows Promise

A fully equipped party recently left ancouver having as its objective a comparatively little known section of the Cassiar lying west of the Finlay River and north of the Ingenika. Attention has been drawn to this part of the province by reason of discoveries made in the Ferguson mine on the south and the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. on the north. The intervening territory has been described by Dr. Victor Dolmage, formerly of the Geological Survey, as being very promising for the further discovery

of valuable minerals, possessing as it does all the geological characteristics requisite to the deposition of metalliferous ores. The present party was organized by A. Erskine (Gardie) Smith, one of the old time mining operators of the province. Mr. Smith made a trip some years ago into this country from the western side, but since then it has been demonstrated that the only practical and economic method of approach is by the Finlay River and its tributaries which are largely navigable by motor boat. This method was adopted in the present instance, the party leaving from Prince George and working northwards till the Finlay was reached. The expedition is in charge of Neil Smith, a mining engineer and metallurgist of wide experience. The trip will cover a section of the province that may open up a new vista in British Columbia mining. Provision has been made for a thorough prospecting of the district. It will be several months before the expedition returns, but those interested are satisfied that it will meet with successful results. Also accompanying the party is the organizer's eldest son, A. Erskine Smith Jr., who has held positions with the Granby, Premier and other British Columbia mining concerns.

The Premier Gold Mining Co. has just paid out another dividend of six cents per share on the issue of 5,000,000 shares to stockholders on record on June 13. The total of the present disbursement is \$300,000, increasing the grand total of payments to \$13,750,000, all made since December 31, 1921. In 1928 the value of ore sold was \$3,180,118, the operating earnings \$2,244,546 and the dividends paid, \$1,300,000. The production was 275,811 tons and the reserve, 634,537 tons the latter being valued at \$6,450,710. H. A. Guess, vice-president, stated in his annual report that it might be assumed that the mine had been bottomed above the fifth level.

W. G. McMorris, managing director of the Kitsault Eagle Silver Mines Ltd., recently visited Alice Arm to make an examination of the tunnel which is being driven by the company on the Sunrise group. The tunnel is showing mineralization but the objective has not yet been reached.

The Britannia Mining & Smelting Co., which is operating the Toric mine at Alice Arm, has added considerably to its holdings by staking 28 nearby claims. The claims are situated on the top of the Toric hill and extend from Goat Creek to the head of East Creek, adjoining the Toric on the east. In the Toric, the company now has about 16 men employed.

It is evident that the mining industry at Alice Arm is due for considerable expansion this year. Examinations are being made of several properties and enquiries made regarding prices and terms. As the snow disappears from the higher altitudes, further examinations will be made and it is expected several more properties will be under bond before snow flies next fall. At the present time in the upper Kitsault country three properties are being developed, chief of these being the Toric whose big sensational ore body is being developed by the Britannia Mining & Smelting Co. Joining the Toric on the north and having the same formation and class of ore is the Tiger which is being developed by the Utility Mines Ltd. This is an exceedingly promising property upon which results of development have far surpassed expectations. A short distance south of the Toric lies the Home-guard, containing large deposits of copper in addition to silver and gold, which is being developed by the Dalhousie Mining Co. Development work is expected to be resumed shortly by Chicago interests on the North

Star which lies ideally between the high grade ore bodies of the Dolly Varden and Toric. Further south and close to the town of Alice Arm, the Esperanza Mining Co. is actively engaged in development work and ore mining. Across the valley on McGrath Mountain, the Kitsault Eagle Silver Mines Ltd. is pushing ahead its 1000 foot tunnel which is expected to strike big ore showings on the Sunrise group at a depth of 500 feet. The future of Alice Arm mining camp was never brighter before and never was greater interest being displayed in it by the large mining companies.

MOUNTAIN BOY COMPANY

The Mountain Boy Mining Co. Ltd., with head office at Montreal, has been registered as an extra-provincial company with head office at Vancouver and paid up capital amounting to three million dollars. This company was incorporated through the efforts of Pat Daly to operate the Mountain Boy mine on the Bear River near Stewart.

ADMIRATION EXPRESSED FOR CANADIAN COURTS BY ALASKAN NEWSPAPER

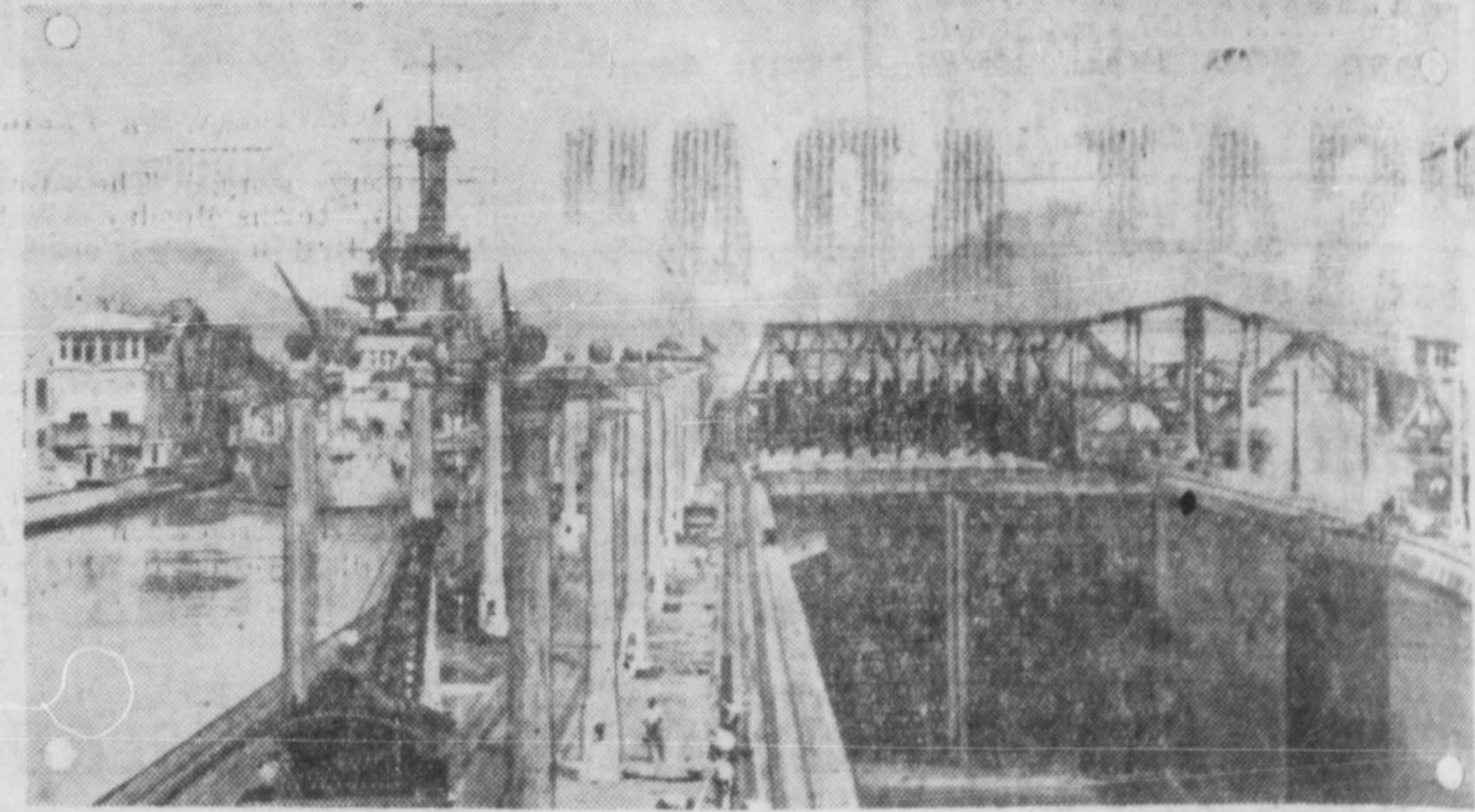

Often Americans are compelled to have greater admiration for Canadian justice than American. Particularly is this brought to attention in the case of William Harris, father of Lou Harris of Ketchikan, in his suit for his share of profits in the Big Missouri mine in the Hyder district. It was only a few days ago that the court decided that Harris was entitled to \$100,000. Then came an order to turn the money into court that the successful plaintiff in the case might be given the benefit. This was delayed until tomorrow, but the courts of Canada apparently are not going to allow a man to be deprived of that to which he is rightfully entitled through technicalities and unnecessary delays.

Often times in America we see men given judgments in their favor who are held up for months and even years through the delays of the law simply force the aggrieved person to compromise for less than awarded by the courts. This is seldom seen in Canada or in England. No less an authority than Chief Justice Taft of the United States supreme court has said that the delays of American justice constitute our greatest national scandal. And the average citizen is inclined to agree.

Extension of the system has been limited for some months because the present boards are full to capacity. A new board of 200 lines, which will take care of probably about 400 more phones, is expected to be delivered in about two months' time and will be installed immediately it arrives.

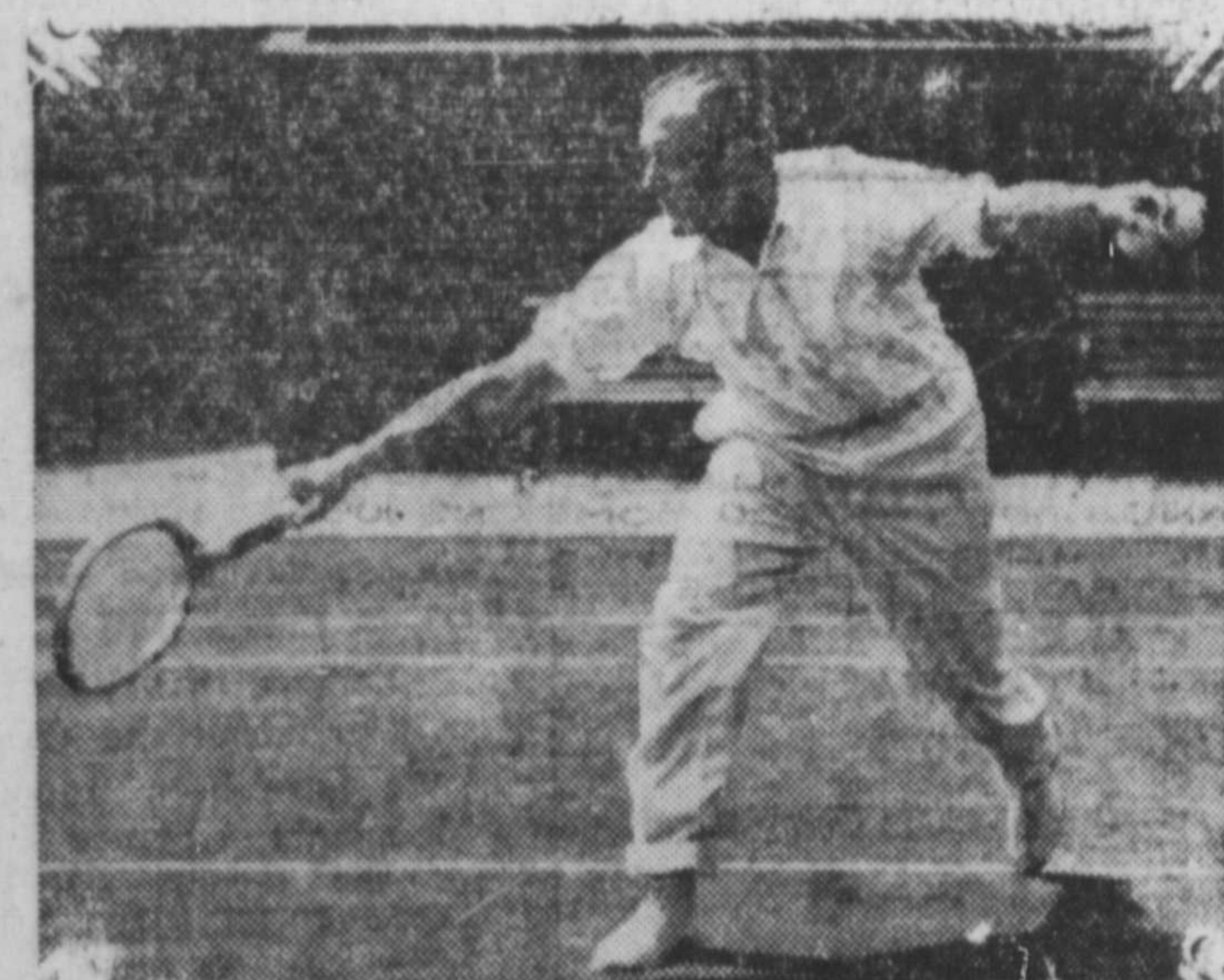
