Tall Man Entered Building With Gun and Told Teller to Hand Over Cash, Which He Did; Shooting Followed

SMITHERS, July 17.—The town of Smithers was all excitement this morning when the news got abroad that the Royal Bank here had been robbed, that the robber had escaped, but that before making his getaway from town the currency which he had taken had been recovered

It was about twenty minutes to eleven this morning when Teller A. Forde was suddenly confronted by a tail man with a handkerchief covering part of his face. The bandit drew a gun from his pocket and told the teller to shove the money through the wicket.

Forde emptied the till containing two thousand dollars and the man grabbed it and ran out, followed by the teller, who fired several shots at the robber, but without visible effect.

Fifteen minutes later some local citizens coming on the bandit ordered him to stop if he wanted to live. The man dropped the money and escaped into the bush.

Up to noon today the robber had not been arrested, but the police are stopping all avenues of escape and it is so difficult getting out of the country that it is thought he cannot get away.
