London Regard to Proposal to Reduce British and U.S. Navies

LONDON, July 30.—The first lord of the admiralty, Hon. A. V. Alexander, has joined the discussions proceeding between Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Macdonald, prime minister of Great Britain, and General Dawes, United States ambassador to Britain, and Ambassador Gibson, representing United States in Paris, with a view to reaching an agreement on the problem of naval armament reduction. An official communique says "substantial progress was made toward an agreement."

Comment in London newspapers with respect to the conference leans toward the belief that the cruiser strength will not be the only naval armament reduction. The Express is of the opinion that battleships, destroyers and submarines will also be affected.

The conference, which is one of the most important ever he'd, is proceeding at No. 1 Downing Street.
