By-elections will be Late in October

Hon. W.L. MacKenzie King Refuses to Oppose United Farmers Candidate In Glengarry-Stormont Because Platform Similar to that Of Liberals.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Ottawa August 27.—The nominations for the by-election will take place October 20 and the polling day will be October 27. It is said here to be practically certain that every one of the vacant seats, with the possible exception of Victoria, where Hon. S. F. Olmstead, the Minister of Agriculture, may be returned by acclamation, will be contested.
 A farmers' candidate has already been nominated for Glengarry-Stormont and North-Ontario.
 Alexandria, Ont., August 27.—The name of Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King was placed in nomination at a Liberal convention in Glengarry-Stormont, but a letter from the new leader of the Liberal party stated that as the platform adopted at the recent Liberal convention was in many respects similar to the platform of the United Farmers, he did not feel that it would be in the best interests of the country to have a candidate from each of these organizations opposing one another.

COLONEL PECK AFTER WHARF FOR ALICE ARM

Discusses Matter With Residents and Promises to Try to Secure It and Part of Reserve.

Prince Rupert, August 27.—Colonel W. Peck, M. P., and G. B. Hull, district engineer, paid a visit to Alice Arm district Saturday, leaving at the McCullough during the early afternoon and leaving at midnight.
 A number of the citizens met these gentlemen in the afternoon and evening when it was explained to Colonel Peck how the Alice Arm district was being retarded through a lack of wharfage facilities. The present status of the Indian reserve which is desired for a townsite, between the Dominion and provincial governments, makes it difficult to secure any kind of action.
 Colonel Peck stated that he would look into the matter at an early date and ascertain what could be done to secure at least a portion of the reserve for immediate needs.
 It was pointed out to the members that the wharfage facilities provided by the privately owned company of the Taylor Engineering Company is entirely too limited to handle the volume of business required at this time and with the increased traffic that the development of the district is bound to bring in the near future more wharfage is badly needed. Col. Peck and Mr. Hull went over this matter very carefully and thoroughly with the citizens, viewed the site for the proposed wharf, and each gave as an opinion that the wharf was a necessity and they would support their efforts toward getting the work started as soon as possible.

VERY FEW VOTE ON THE BYLAW
 Voting this morning on the bylaw was very slow. Up to 2:30 slightly over eighty votes were cast out of a possible 600.

ARM FROZEN DURING FLIGHT

Col. W. G. Barker, V. C., Performs Wonderful Feat in Airplane During Long Flight.

MAJOR SCHROEDER MAKES A RECORD

 Toronto, August 27.—Col. W. G. Barker, V. C., the famous Canadian aviator, completed the round trip from Toronto to New York and return at 9.35 a.m. The colonel's left arm was frozen during the flight. It was useless owing to war wounds so the intrepid aviator flew with one hand.
 Toronto, August 27.—(Noon.) Creating a record for long distance flight, Major Rudolph Schroeder completed the international air race between Toronto and New York and return. The actual flying time in the air was 9 hours and 35 minutes.
 The first half of the journey from Toronto to New York was done in 4 hours and 3 minutes, owing to weather conditions on the return the record was cut to 5 hours and 32 minutes.

FIRE AT HOME OF CONSTABLE ADAMS

Blaze Soon Under Control After Chemical Hose Arrives.

Yesterday the fire department had a hurried call to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. Adams on Ninth Avenue where fire had broken out in the roof near the chimney. For over five minutes Mrs. Adams tried to ring the department, but a party line kept the communication closed and the danger of losing the house was very imminent. However, at last Mrs. Adams convinced the parties responsible that it was urgent.
 Very slight damage was done and only a few holes were burned in the roof. The firemen quickly got the fire under control with the chemical hose as Mrs. Adams' efforts in splashing water about the room had hindered its progress considerably. The house is covered by insurance and the loss is very slight.

LABOR TURNS BATTERIES ON THE LEADERS

Methods of Minister of Labor and President of Labor Congress Criticized by Nova Scotia Miners.

 Sydney, N. S., Aug. 27.—Representatives of the United Mine Workers of America turned their batteries on Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor; Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, and P. M. Draper, at a labor convention here.
 The convention went on record as opposed to the methods carried out by Messrs. Robertson, Moore and Draper in selecting delegates to the Ottawa Industrial Conference on September 16. They endorsed the action of the mine workers' executive not to take part in this conference.

BOLSHEVIKI CLAIM WINS

British War Office Says Denikin's Advancing and the Enemy in Ukraine Completely Demoralized.

 London, Aug. 27.—Pskov, west of Petrograd, has been captured by Bolsheviki forces, according to an official Moscow dispatch. The Reds also claim successes on the Volga, including the capture of Kamshin, although despatches issued by the London War Office declare that the advance of General Denikin's along the western Russian front is continuing with great rapidity.
 It is also claimed by the British War Office that the Bolsheviki forces throughout the whole of the Ukraine are completely demoralized.

CALIFORNIA IS TIED UP BY BIG RAILWAY STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO MEN GO OUT IN SYMPATHY WITH STRIKERS ON THE PACIFIC ELECTRIC AND LOS ANGELES STREET RAILWAY—ALL TRAINS ARE CANCELLED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 San Francisco, August 27.—All train services out of San Francisco were cancelled here when the railroad strike which has paralyzed southern California suddenly made its appearance.
 The strike began in Los Angeles in sympathy with the workers on the Pacific Electric and Los Angeles street car system as far as Bakersfield and Fresno and south to San Diego. Overnight and without warning it leaped the distance to San Francisco. All trains on the Southern Pacific, Western Pacific, and Santa Fe from San Francisco and Oakland, including suburban trains are cancelled. Tickets had already been sold for these routes.
 Those on strike include yardmasters, switchmen, engineers, firemen and shopmen. The strike began when 1,000 men walked out of the Southern Pacific yard, and it spread within an hour to the entire Bay district.

Washington, August 27.—A strike vote of 500,000 railway shopmen on President Wilson's proposition for a wage increase of four cents an hour has been ordered by President Bert Jewell of the Railway Employees department of the American Federation of Labor.

INDIAN BANDS FOR BIG FAIR

Two Have Already Entered in Competition for Prize, Both From Naas River.

There will be at least two Indian bands to take part in the contest at the forthcoming exhibition. The Aiyansh and Greenville bands have both entered. They are large organizations, each having over forty pieces. This was the news brought to the attractions committee at their meeting last night.
 Judges were appointed for the occasion, these to be Harry Harvey, J. E. Davey, and J. S. Gay of Smithers.
 The only two entries at present are from the Naas River, but it is thought hardly likely that the other Indians will be satisfied at seeing the Naas people get all the glory. Appeal to Powers By Local Citizen

M. Aivazoff writes to Premier of France, Britain and Canada and to President of United States asking that Army be sent to Russia

M. Aivazoff, better known here as Mitchell Albert, has written Premier Clemenceau of France, President Wilson of U. S. A., Premier Lloyd George of England, and Premier Borden at Ottawa asking that an army be sent to Russia to aid in checking the ravages of the Bolsheviki. He says:—
 "I trust that you will pardon my presumption in writing you at this particular time.
 "As I am a Russian by birth, a British subject through naturalization, now residing in British Columbia, of Canada, I feel it a duty to express my opinion and to convey to you the knowledge which I possess, respecting conditions in my native land.
 "My partners who have extensive business interests in Siberia and Ural inform me that the situation as far as humanity is concerned is intolerable (in fact the people in many instances are eating human flesh) due to Bolsheviki control in that country, and if they are not assisted by outside nations of strength and moral standing in breaking up the movement of these awful plunderers, the country will gradually become a menace to the whole of Europe.
 "Knowing the Russian people as a whole, I am confident that they would welcome the co-operation of the Allies, in maintaining order until the democratic government can be established.
 "Seven Per Cent of People.
 "Bolshevism represents no nation, they being only about seven per cent of the Russian people, but, unfortunately, through terrorism agitated and supported by German propaganda they succeeded in securing the resources of the country, leaving the citizens penniless, and without means to protect themselves against outrages which are being continued.
 "While these people represent only a small portion of the populace, they can create great unrest and desperate conditions. Just think of people similar to those in our country, where they are not in control of the situation, and you will realize at once what conditions are like in Russia. It would be a desperate world indeed if Bolshevism ruled and it must be stamped out before it gets beyond control and extends to other countries in the same manner. Quick and decided action is imperative to save the situation. In view of this, pardon me if I may suggest that the allied nations call for at least five hundred thousands of volunteers (not compulsory) to be dispatched to Russia, as early as possible. A smaller number would be inadequate to accomplish the desired end. I feel that when this is effected those advocating Bolshevism will be paralyzed, while the morale of the better element would be strengthened, assisting in restoring things to their normal condition.
 "German Advantage.
 "If assistance is not given to this unfortunate country as outlined, Germany will continue to take advantage of the weak and unsettled condition of the people, eventually gaining control of the resources of the country and probably form an alliance, dictate the form of government, gradually placing the whole country under military yoke, and using the country for the express purpose of bettering their own conditions.
 "They would certainly use influence in the interests of their manufactured products and discourage trade relations with other countries.
 "The exports from Germany to Russia before the war were enormous.
 "While Russia has a population of one hundred and eighty millions of people, she has few manufacturers in comparison,

PUBLIC WORKS MINISTER IS ON THE JOB

Going Through Country Looking Into Needs of People and Noting Development.

Hon. Dr. King, who went east this morning, before leaving expressed pleasure at seeing so much activity in Prince Rupert and district. He said he had visited Alice Arm and gone over the Dolly Varden and other mines and he thought there was a prospect of much activity at that point. There was already considerable work being done and the Dolly Varden would commence shipping at once. Many of the prospectors were doing real work on their claims and everyone was extremely hopeful.

Reports from the valleys between here and Prince George indicated that the Department of Public Works, of which he had charge, would be very busy for some time to come. They did not mind providing public works as long as the population was there. He was going in to see for himself how the developments were going on. He knew that owners of property, urged to a large extent by the working out of the Land Settlement Board, were making great efforts to bring in settlers to place on their lands. He thought this settlement policy was working out well.

Dr. King is proceeding with Mr. Manson, the member for Omineca, as far as Fort Fraser from which place he will motor to Vanderhoof and return to Victoria by way of the Cariboo.

Voting on Bylaw Going on Today.

Voting is in progress on the school bylaw to provide for the borrowing of \$150,000 to erect a permanent building on Acropolis Hill at a point about where the tennis courts now stand.

There is still time if anyone has forgotten to vote. It is a very important matter and one on which there should be no hesitancy. Education is one of the things that we must give the children.

Russian Situation From First Hand.

The letter written by Mitchell Albert and published on another page is a very interesting document. It is the work of a man who has been in close touch with the situation. Both he and his Vancouver partner have many relatives and friends in Russia and the information they send out is given from personal observation on the spot. It is well worthy of perusal.

The Best Place In all the World.

Where is the best place in all the world? The question is often asked and never satisfactorily answered. Every person has his own ideas of what characteristics are necessary to make a place the best. In a general way, however, people may be classed into two grades, those who think they live in the best place and those who think they do not.

All things being equal a person should live in the best place in the world. If he does not do it he is a fool. He has to live his life but once and he has no time to fritter away on places that are objectionable to him. If Prince Rupert, for instance, is not the best place in the world for him to live in, there is a railway and several steamship lines, all constructed especially for the purpose of conveying him to the best place.

There are many people who show their faith in the place in which they live by staying right there. Others show their faith by speaking well of it. The person who says unpleasant things about a place and then continues to live there is inconsistent.

To Prince Rupert people the best place in the world is Prince Rupert. That is plain. If it were not the southbound boats would be crowded and the eastbound trains jammed full. Most of us follow the line of least resistance, or else we live here because we love a fight and the best place in the world for a fight is Prince Rupert. There are a lot of things we do not like here, if there were not we should show no progress. Striking an average, however, and putting the bad against the good, Prince Rupert is the best place in the world to over five thousand people or else there are five thousand fools in the world and they live right here.

Labor Day is Close at Hand.

Most people in this city are laborers and they will appreciate the significance of Labor Day. The Trades and Labor Council which represents a small section of labor, generally known as "Organized Labor," spelt with capital letters, has charge of the festivities this year and the other laborers of the city will join with them in making the day a pleasant one for everyone. It will be a day of recreation and enjoyment and the efforts of the Labor Council to provide means to this end must meet with the approval of everyone.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Residence may be leased, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same, or operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared, and annual residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase towns or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown Grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

ALICE ARM PEOPLE MEET THE MINISTER

Dolly Varden Tangle is Straightened Out at Conference with Messrs. Mobley and Taylor.

Alice Arm, August 27.—Events which have transpired here during the past few days have done much to clarify the atmosphere as regards what misunderstanding there may have been between the people and the Taylor Engineering Company in connection with the operation of the railroad, and there is now a feeling that it is the intention of the company to do everything in their power to advance the interests of the district.

Dr. King and Mr. Mobley acting as arbitrators interpreting the law and acts involved.

Other Shippers.

Mr. Taylor, when asked as to whether the railroad would be in a position to handle any ore from the mines aside from that of the Dolly Varden property, stated that much would depend on how the road and equipment stood up under the tests soon to be made but that if he could possibly see his way clear in the face of the many complications involved he certainly would help out the prospective shippers to the limit of his ability. Assurance was also given that the other questions brought up at the meeting would be adjusted, so far as it lay in his power, to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Dr. King and Mr. Mobley offered many valuable suggestions tending toward a clearer understanding and the citizens of this district feel deeply grateful to them both for the valuable services they have rendered the community at this time.
