LONDON, Nov. 22.—Stanley Baldwin, leader of the Conservative party, last night came out in favor of a policy of Imperial co-operation and Empire unity.

PREMIER IS PLEASED AT RECEPTION

Returning to Winnipeg last night the Premier issued a statement expressing satisfaction with the success of his trip, which, he said, in all particulars had surpassed his expectations.

O'CONNOR WAS BURIED

O'Connor, veteran Irish statesman, that he might be buried in England to typify the reconciliation of the two races, was solemnly fulfilled yesterday when his body was interred at Kensal Green cemetery after an impressive service at Westminster Cathedral.

PULP MILL AT TERRACE HEARD FROM

Possibility of Big Industry at Mouth of Kitsumkalum River Mentioned

The pulp mill proposition for Terrace has moved forward another peg. Last Sunday the local representative in Terrace, C. R. Gilbert received a message from Toronto financiers, to the effect that if the owners of property in Terrace which is under option to the eastern capitalists, will consider time payments on the land instead of all cash, the eastern mill will proceed with their plans for the early establishment of the pulp mill and other industries.

At the present time the financial market in the east is in poor shape for the floating of new issues, but if the Terrace people who own the land required by the new company will consider the request of the promoters, the said promoters will be able to proceed with the plans and be ready to raise the necessary money as soon as the money market returns to normal.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 22.—Andy Cruikshank, northern aviator, arrived at Fort Reliance on Great Slave Lake bringing word from Fort Reliance that it is reported Colonel McAlpine and his party are safe at Fort Reliance on McLeod Bay, where he has been landbound since November 12.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Efforts of the sugar lobby to secure the higher duties on sugar were laid bare here yesterday. It was shown that the Domestic Sugar Syndicate had paid \$35,000 for the purpose of influencing public opinion along the line indicated.

OTHER SIDE OF INDIAN COMPLAINTS

W. E. Collison Takes Issue With Those Who Suggest Persecution

In connection with the suggested persecution of Indians when visiting Prince Rupert as discussed at the Fair Board annual meeting, W. E. Collison, Indian agent, writes as follows: Editor, Daily News—With reference to the discussion at the recent meeting of the Fair Board regarding the smaller attendance of Indians at the exhibition, I would state that the real reason for this was largely due to the fact that the fair was held this year at an earlier date and many of the Indians were still engaged in fishing.

The Dominion constable goes out of his way to assist the natives in every possible manner and is frequently sought after for help and advice.

With regard to the matter of persecution of the natives upon which so much stress has been laid, it is strange that no complaints have been received by me, and it would appear that the matter has been magnified out of all proportion.

With regard to the payment of moieties of fines, these are paid only in cases of liquor supplied to Indians; having liquor in possession or being intoxicated on Indian reserves. No moieties are paid in connection with fines imposed in ordinary cases of intoxication off Indian reserves or in the city.

I would suggest that if the presence of natives is to be encouraged at the annual fair, more decent accommodation be provided for them than has been available in the past.

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SAY IT, THEN SIT DOWN.

Discussing local public speakers with a visitor to the office yesterday, emphasis was placed on the terrible waste of time in the preliminaries which meant nothing of those who got up to give addresses. This wasted the time of the whole audience. Even the "Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen" is unnecessary and the long list of plausibilities is unbearable. If a man has a message he should give it in as few words as possible and then sit down.

The one unforgivable sin is to apologize for not being prepared. If a person is asked to speak and accepts, he should be prepared. To apologize is to insult the audience. It is as much as saying that they are not worth the trouble of preparation.

Another difficulty is to know when to stop. Most people, especially preachers and political speakers, do not know when to stop. They keep on talking after their message is delivered. One would imagine, to hear them, that their speech was sold by the yard. Brevity covers a lot of sins.

SALMON FISHERMEN

It is a good thing to see so much interest taken in the salmon fisheries. Yesterday we published a letter from the secretary of the salmon fishermen's union objecting to an editorial article and the same day another fisherman came in to tell us how we had hit the mark and that all we had said was true.

Another person, who is in a position to know, suggests that if the fishermen's union tries to steer all the fish in one direction it simply means that other companies wishing fish will have to put on boats of their own in order to secure the fish they want.

We have every sympathy with the fisherman, no matter whether he catches halibut, salmon or crab. He earns every dollar he gets and the more he gets the better we are pleased. We like to see him prosperous. We give more news of interest to fishermen than any other paper anywhere, because we realize the importance of the industry. We also realize that often the fisherman is the victim of conditions beyond his control and has had many lean years. We also believe in organization in industry of any kind for the protection of those engaged therein. In order that such organization may succeed, it is necessary that it be wisely led and that it be moderate in its demands and careful in its course of action. To be otherwise invites failure. That is why, when from time to time we heard last summer that the salmon fishermen were using the big club occasionally against individual firms and were concentrating on selling to only one buyer to the exclusion of others, we felt that they were taking the wrong course and one that would land them in difficulties. Salmon are in demand and always will be from this time on. This year the trollers have had a good season and everyone is pleased that they have. What we want to see is a succession of good seasons and the best possible prices for the men who do the work, and this can be brought about, we contend, only by having lots of competition among buyers. If a firm cannot get fish it is either going to quit buying altogether or take other steps to see that it gets a supply.

Suspension of the Edmonton Grads, world's champion women's basketball team, for their actions last spring in refusing to obey the edict of the Canadian Basketball Association and travel to British Columbia, is asked for, by the B.C. Basketball Association. The association, at its annual meeting in Vancouver last Saturday, passed a unanimous vote censuring the Edmonton team for their behavior and asking the Canadian body to discipline them for their acts. At the same meeting as this request was made, Dr. J. A. Gillespie of Vancouver was elected president of the B.C. hoop body while George Winter was re-elected secretary treasurer for his third consecutive term.

Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Edward Grant Barrow, holders of the Yankees' purse strings, have departed from New York for a season at French Lick to prepare themselves for the ordeal of signing Babe Ruth to a new contract. The Babe has just served out a three-year document calling for \$70,000 a season. The work of inspection and loading is now at an end until a start is made on the new contracts about the middle of February when it is expected a smaller force will be employed owing to reduced orders.







Canadian Legion Turns To the West

Third Annual Convention at Regina Marks New Forward Step by Organization

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 22.—For the first time in its history, the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League is this year swinging westward past the geographical centre of the dominion for its annual dominion convention, to be held in Regina from Nov. 25 to 28.

This will be the third dominion convention since the Canadian Legion came into being as a result of the efforts of the late Field Marshal Earl Haig during his visit to Canada in 1925. The first was held in Winnipeg, Man., in 1927, and gave the Legion a definite entity as the one great representative ex-service men's organization in Canada. The second, held in Saint John, N.B., in

June, 1928, saw the Legion consolidate its position. Since then it has expanded to the point where the west matches the east in the number of branches and members.

Standing second only to Ontario in branches and membership the province of Saskatchewan is worthy of the honor of having the 1929 convention held in its capital city, and the other provinces of the west have also made tremendous forward strides and contributed in no small measure to the upbuilding of the Legion as a national organization.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22.—The loss of money to small stock holders as a result of the stock market slump is largely responsible for the large number of unemployed in Canada today, according to J. H. McVety, general superintendent of the employment service in British Columbia. This month has been worse than in several years, he said.

Letters have been received from the employment office from men looking for work who state that they need employment as a result of losing their savings in the market. Prince Rupert states that winter employment situation is serious with a large amount of surplus labor available.

Prince Albert Lads Winners Swine Judging

TORONTO, Nov. 21.—Gordon and Lindsay Weir have won the Canadian championship in Juvenile Swine Club work at the Toronto Royal Fair, bringing this honor for the second successive year to the district of Prince Albert. The two boys are Canadian champions in the work as a result of the conclusion yesterday of the Canadian National Railways judging contests for provincial champion teams in Swine Club work. They competed against five teams from various other provinces, and were outstanding in their judging and demonstrations. They become possessors for one year of the W. D. Robb Trophy, presented for the past seven years by Vice-President Robb, of the C.N.R. for annual competition amongst the provincial Swine Club champions.



STORAGE OF FOOD VITAL TO INDUSTRY

D. B. Finn, Director of Fisheries Experimental Station, Gives Address

The importance of refrigeration in the preservation of foods of all kinds and the consequent importance of the new building at the Fisheries Station and of the work to be done there, was stressed by D. B. Finn, director of the station here, in an address to the Rotary Club at their luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Finn stated that cold was the ideal preservative, but that in preserving a live thing like an apple it must not be too cold. If an apple were frozen it would be killed and begin at once to disintegrate. The problem they had before them was to devise means of holding foods of all kinds for a long time without causing a chemical change. In life there was a system of balanced reactions, but in death this balance was destroyed.

Mr. Finn went on to tell of the manner in which the body was built up by the conversion of soluble matter into insoluble. Changes continued after death and the aim was to treat food substances so as to cause a minimum of change. They tried to freeze without rupturing the cells or removing the ice crystals which formed when the material was frozen.

Other factors entering in were the drying of frozen materials. This was prevented to some extent by lining it with a coat of ice. The frozen fish were dipped and thus ice was formed all around. This was a factor in keeping the fish moist. It also prevented chemical substances in the air from uniting with those in the fish and causing deterioration.

The speaker said there was an immense lot of work to be done in connection with refrigeration before they could expect results. Already British scientists were working on this at Cambridge and London, England, and the new building here would be devoted to it.

The moment a fish dried, chemical changes commenced and one thing to determine was at what stage these changes should be arrested.

The preservation of food was one of the most vital problems in the food industries today, Mr. Finn said. It affected every branch of food storage. The ideal was to be able to freeze and keep food for years. He felt they were on the verge of stepping off in the right direction and by the use of the new plant and with the support of the Government and the industry they should meet with success.

WINTER MAY BE COLDER

Head of Meteorological Station at Victoria Talks About Weather

VICTORIA, Nov. 22. — F. Napier Denison, director of the Dominion Meteorological Observatory here, who last spring forecast an abnormally dry summer and fall on the Pacific Northwest, in an interview today suggested that the coming winter would be as cold or colder than last year. As for the Puget Sound precipitation, which is causing much anxiety owing to the lack of power through failure of the water, Mr. Denison said it may continue light for months to come.
