## CONFERENCE REGARDING GRAND TRUNK

Alfred Smithers and Sir Robert Borden Discuss Fate of Railway.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, August 28.—A conference took place yesterday between Alfred Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk Railway board of directors, and Sir Robert Borden with regard to the ultimate fate of the Grand Trunk System. The result of the negotiations has not been divulged but it is understood that any offer made will not be found to differ to any extent from the offer made during the previous negotiations. At that time the Government made an offer of an annual rental of \$6,000,000.

## CAUSES DROP IN PRICE OF MEAT

## BOTH BYLAWS ARE RATIFIED

Schools Proposal Gets Very Little Over the Required Sixty Per Cent.

SCOTSMEN SEEM TO HAVE POLLED FOR IT

The two bylaws were passed yesterday by sufficient margins to make them quite safe. The most important of these was the one to provide for the building of a new school on Acropolis Hill and setting aside \$150,000 as the amount that may be needed for the purpose. The other was to raise \$25,000 for the repaving of streets.  
The school bylaw had rather a close run, too close to be pleasant to those who supported it. However there was a safe margin of four above the sixty per cent. required to pass it.

Returning Officer Woods was in charge and promptly at 7 the polls closed and the counting commenced. There were four boxes and it was in the first, A to D, and in the last, Q to Z, that the bylaw fared worst. Apparently it was carried by the Maeks for the box M to P gave a vote of 35 to 14. This was the subject of some comment for Scotchmen are proverbially close, but apparently they saw a better deal for the city and for the children in carrying the bylaw than in defeating it. As one man said "It is sure to be all right for the Maeks have endorsed it."

It is to be assumed now that the bylaw is passed that immediate steps will be taken to commence the work of building the new school.  
The deputy returning officers were: J. Evans, F. Morrison, A. Clapperton, and R. H. Shockley.

## GENERAL LOUIS BOTHA IS DEAD

## LENINE SHOWS WHITE FEATHER

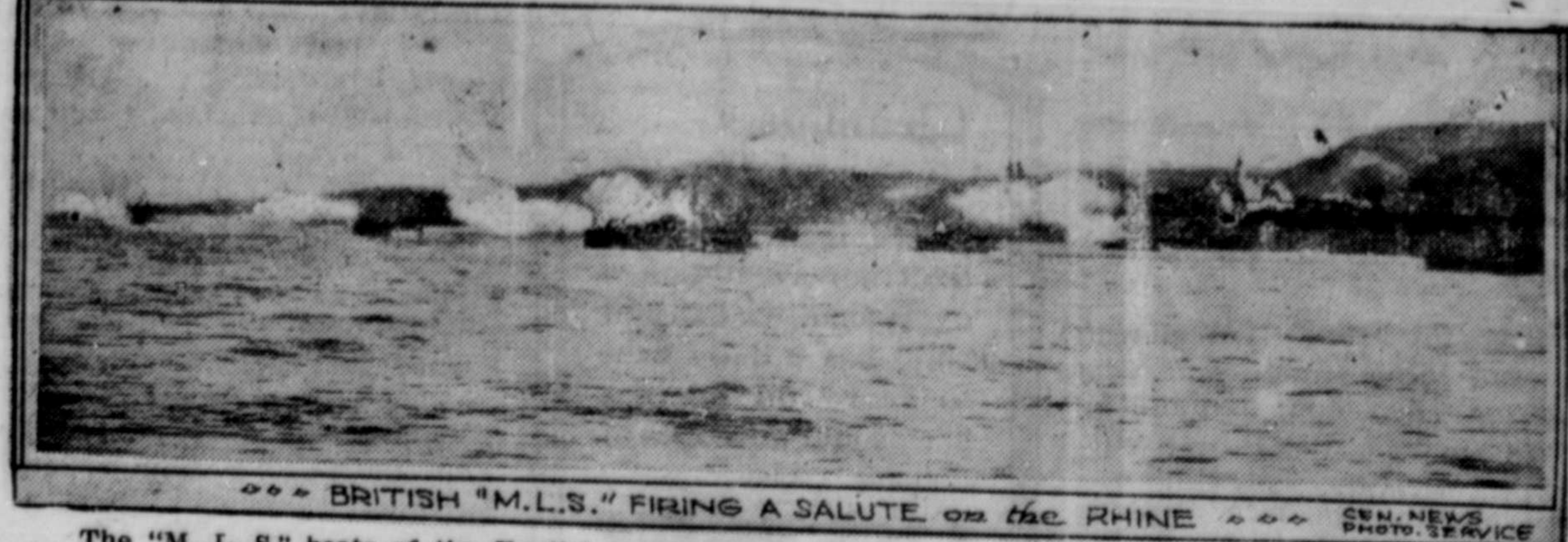
Sueing for Peace With Roumania, According to Dispatch from Copenhagen.

## EXEMPTION TAX IS PROPOSED BY GERMANS

Tax of 20 Marks Per Head is Suggested for Those Who Did Not Fight.

Berlin, August 28.—The Government is being pressed to levy an "Exemption Tax" on all men who did not wear the uniform required during the late war.  
It is estimated that a tax of twenty marks per head per annum, net, would bring in something like 130,000,000 marks yearly.

## CREW REPORT SCHOONER GONE

Blew Up at Sea After Caught Fire—Was Loaded With Ammunition.

Yarmouth, N. S., August 28.—Twelve men, members of the crew of the auxiliary fore-masted schooner Elmer Roberts, have arrived here. They report that the ship caught fire and blew up at sea. She was loaded with ammunition.

## ICE HOCKEY PROPOSED TO ENTERTAIN PRINCE

Victoria is Planning to Show the Royal Visitor Unusual Summer Sport.

Victoria, B. C., August 28.—It is proposed here to entertain the Prince of Wales to an ice hockey game. Lester Patrick, the owner of the artificial ice rink, has the matter in hand and it is expected that the unusual sight of an ice hockey game in summer will be presented for the amusement of the royal visitor.  
Victoria is one of the places where ice is unusual even in winter, except at the big skating arena where skating is one of the winter pastimes. It will be a novel thing to have a hockey game there in summer.

## DRASTIC PROCEEDINGS AGAINST PROFITEERS

London, August 28.—In the House of Commons, C. A. McCurdy, the member for Northampton, chairman of the central committee established under the new profiteering law, said that they intended to take drastic action against the food profiteers.

## HINDENBURG MAY BE NEXT PRESIDENT OF GERMAN REPUBLIC

Berlin, August 28.—General von Hindenburg may be the next president of Germany. It has been announced here that he is likely to be the nominee of the national people's party at the next presidential election.  
Although now a republic and with a Government pledged to peace, the German people have not yet given up the military idea and Hindenburg represents the militaristic section of the country.

## NO REDUCTION IN BRITISH NAVY SAYS SIR JOHN JELICOE

Wellington, N. Z., August 28.—Replying to a deputation from the Navy League, Admiral Sir John Jellicoe stated here that any great reduction in the naval expenditure of Great Britain would be impossible. It was likely to remain at about one hundred pounds a head.

## AUSTRALIA WILL NOW EXCLUDE ANARCHISTS

Melbourne, August 28.—An amendment to the immigration bill providing for the exclusion of anarchists and former enemy subjects for five years, received its second reading in the House of Representatives.  
The measure was opposed by the labor members of the House.

## PRINCE RUPERT MEN STRIKE IT PRETTY RICH

O. Besner Finds Forty-Foot Face Of Ore on Climax at Alice Arm.

ZARELLI AND PARTNER REFUSE BIG OFFER.

Alice Arm, August 28.—Three Prince Rupert men have struck it rich at Alice Arm. O. Besner, D. Zarelli and James McAleenan are all interested in properties that will be liable to make them rich.

Mr. Besner has just struck a forty-foot face of ore on the Climax which assays from 130 to 300 ounces of silver. This property adjoins the Wolf and is only a quarter of a mile from the Wolf mine to which the railway is to be built next year.

James McAleenan and D. Zarelli owners of the North Star, refused a big offer from the Guggenheims of New York. Recent ore discoveries have justified them in sticking to their property. On drifting from the main tunnel to the left they encountered a large body of high-grade. The vein matter is very highly mineralized with ruby silver and plastered all over with a rusty colored native silver.

## Another Dolly Varden.

The Swiftwater claim, across the river from the Dolly Varden, recently purchased by D. J. Hancock, is showing silver sulphides in the tunnel and has every appearance of making another Dolly Varden.

The Vanguard group owned by Morris Pender has had an offer from Preston Lock, chief engineer of the Tacoma Smelter.

The ore of the Dolly Varden is now moving to the bunkers on the railroad at the rate of 150 tons per eight-hour shift. The value per ton is about 500 oz. silver. Major Doris figures on building a 3,000-ton bunker at the wharf at Alice Arm.

The La Rose property owned and operated by Miles Donald and associates is producing silver glance ore that will average 1,000 ounces of silver, mine run. They have considerable tonnage now mined and will sack when they have obtained the desired tonnage. They have made two shipments so far, one to Granby and the other to Trail.

## Ready for Shipment.

The Joplin, Silver Star, and Silver Hoard, operated by D. J. Hancock, are producing about three tons per shift of ore that assays 380 oz. of silver, \$13 gold and 65 per cent lead. There is ready for shipment now 180 tons, most of it being sacked, which will be sent out as soon as the government trail is in shape to commence shipments.

The camp in general has a very promising outlook, going ahead slowly but surely, with no aspect of a boom. Mr. Price of New York has a large force working on the Last Chance property and is producing excellent ore. If the values go down it will be as big as the Big Missouri.

## SOCKEYE PACK ON THE SKEENA

Total is Approximately 180,000 Cases, Worth Nearly Three and a Half Million Dollars.

SALMON OF ALL KINDS ABOUT 350,000 C.

Port Essington, August 28.—It is estimated that the sockeye pack for the present season will be 180,000 cases. As these have been selling at \$19 a case the total value of the sockeye run for the season is set at close to \$3,500,000. This is in addition to the pinks and chums and springs and cohoes.

The total salmon pack of the district including all varieties is estimated at 350,000 cases. While this is not quite as large as that of last year it is much more valuable. Last year the sockeye pack was only about 100,000 cases.

## RED SOX WILL PLAY TIGERS

Prize of \$25 Offered for Winners of Labor Day Event.

The baseball game on Labor Day between the Red Sox and the Tigers is arousing considerable interest about the city as the boys gave such a good exhibition on July 4. The Red Sox are the older team in years, but the Tigers have been playing together for the most part of the summer and their team work has shown up excellently in the various matches.

The prize offered is \$25 and both teams will strive hard to win the cash as such a nice sum will help to alleviate many of their troubles in the way of lack of outfit. It promises to be a keenly contested match and will be one of the outstanding events of the Labor Day program which is so filled with attractions for old and young.

School Bylaw Is Endorsed.

Over sixty per cent of the ratepayers of Prince Rupert who voted on the bylaws yesterday endorsed the project of raising \$150,000 for the erection of a new permanent school building on Acropolis Hill. There was some strong opposition to it and most of those who opposed did so, doubtless, from conscientious motives. They feared that we were spending too much money in one direction.

Those who supported believed with The News that the cause of the children is paramount. They saw no serious obstacle in the young folks having to climb the hill once or twice each day, even in bad weather.

We congratulate the people of Prince Rupert on having decided for a policy of permanency and progress. When the school is built we shall have at least one building that should stand the ravages of time. It will show that the people of the city, those who pay the bills, have faith in the future of the place and in the children who are to live here.

There was the best of feeling among those who were supporting or opposing the bylaw. That is the only way to conduct the business of the city or country. We cannot agree, of course, but we can agree to differ. There will be other questions of public import come up for decision from time to time and if we can settle them amicably and without bitterness we shall be in a position to get results. We are all shareholders in a big concern, the community. Each one thinks the business should be conducted in a certain manner. Why fight over it? Amicable strife is invigorating, but bitterness spells death.

Churches Suffer From Money Depreciation.

The dollar has lost a good deal of its purchasing power, yet some people are getting no more income today than they were years ago. This is particularly noticeable in the churches. As men earn more they spend more, but the expenditures are increased only in certain directions.

The man who goes to church and puts twenty-five cents in the collection plate has in many cases done so for many years. The little silver piece is not worth as much today as it was a few years ago, so the church really gets less. As a result an effort is to be made to even things up. Churches and other institutions kept up by voluntary subscriptions are the losers by the falling in value of money.

If the churches are of value to the community, and we believe they are, they should be properly supported. There should be no sweatshop methods in the church any more than in the factory. Those who are responsible for the churches should be ashamed to starve them. Properly supported they may become centres of healthy activity, making for the betterment of the community.

Metric System of Weights and Measures.

Two societies are campaigning for the use of the metric system on this continent. They are the World Trade Club of San Francisco and the Metric Association of New York. They have a good cause as it must be to the advantage of any community to cast aside a poor system and introduce a better in its place.

The metric system is already in use in a good many countries and some of which are not as far advanced in a good many respects as this country. The late Andrew Carnegie was among the supporters of the change and so also are W. C. Redfield, U. S. Secretary of Commerce; the Assistant Secretary of War, W. G. McAdoo, war time Secretary of the Treasury, and a number of others.

The metric system resembles our money system in that it is counted in tens instead of by twelves, threes, and other irregular numbers.

HUNTING WILL OPEN SOON

Duck Season Commences September 6 and Deer on 13th of September.

ROD AND GUN CLUB FORMED AT TELKWA

Already the Omineca Rod and Gun Club has been formed in the interior in readiness for the coming shooting season. Officers have been appointed and already there is considerable interest about methods which may be adopted to help conserve the game and to urge further prosecutions under the Game Act. All points in the Telkwa vicinity are interested and are sending representatives to the club.

Locally the sons of Nimrod have been stirring uneasily in their hard office chairs and have been glancing furtively across the harbor with thoughts of the deer trooping silently around amongst the trees. Soon the season will be open and already the game regulations have been posted in conspicuous places for all interested. Prince Rupert lies in the Northern District which means and includes the Electoral District of Atlin and all that portion of the province situated and lying north of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and to the east of the summit of the Cascade Range. This is a very important matter for those hunters who may go down the coast and will find themselves thus under slightly different regulations.

Deer (mule, white tail and coast) throughout the province, except on the Queen Charlotte Islands, open season from September 13, 1919, to December 15, 1919, both dates inclusive.

Ducks and geese in the Northern District from 6 a. m. September 6 to December 20, 1919, both dates inclusive.

Grouse in the Northern District to the south of the 56th parallel, which includes all points from slightly north of Stewart to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, open season from September 6, 1919, to December 21, 1919, both dates inclusive.

The daily bag limit for ducks is twenty and total bag limit one hundred and fifty.

The daily bag limit for geese is ten and the total bag limit fifty.

The bag limit for deer in the Northern District is three of one species and four altogether.

Daily bag limit for grouse is six for any one species, nor more than twelve for all species in any one day; total bag limit fifty.

# CHURCHES ARE TO UNITE IN GREAT DRIVE

George Bell, M. P., and Rev. Dr. White Tell Methodists of District of Plans Laid for Renewed Activity.

## TWELVE MILLIONS FOR FIVE DENOMINATIONS

That a united effort is to be made this coming autumn by the evangelical churches to raise the sum of \$12,000,000 for the combined work of the organizations and also to increase the spiritual activity and effectiveness of the church people, was the message brought to Prince Rupert last night by George Bell, M. P., of Victoria, and Dr. White, superintendent of missions for the Methodist Church, in addresses given in the Methodist Church.

The churches to engage in the drive will be the Presbyterians, Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists, and Congregationalists. The funds will be kept separate but the effort will be a united one and conducted at one time. It is to be a union of effort.

The Methodist Church expects to raise four million dollars of which this district will be responsible for \$5,000. The drive will be organized and conducted according to modern methods and all church people will doubtless bend their energies to making it a success.

**Need of Activity.**  
 Mr. Bell told of the need for increased activity on the part of the churches. The world was in danger as a result of the turmoil following the war. The churches were the only people to undertake the work of saving the world from that condition and if they did not do it they would be found guilty. There was just as much devil in the world as ever.

Mr. Bell went on to tell of the apportionment of the money to be collected by his church and he referred to the Victory Loan as an earnest of what could be done when it came to raising money. He also suggested methods of economizing which could very easily save enough to pay the required sum. People's tastes were extravagant and a saving could be made without injuring them. The twelve millions would be a mere bagatelle if there was a spirit of economy. They could not afford not to do the work which was in sight.

Mr. Bell told of efficient work done by the church in different parts of the country and closed by expressing the opinion that the church had made good and would still make good.

**Dr. White.**  
 Dr. White, who was the first speaker, told of the vast problem before them. He spoke of the condition of flux in which the world was today. The views of churchmen had changed since the days of John Wesley. The leaders today were not asleep, but they were much perplexed and they needed a great leader in the religious and political world. They did not want their grandchildren

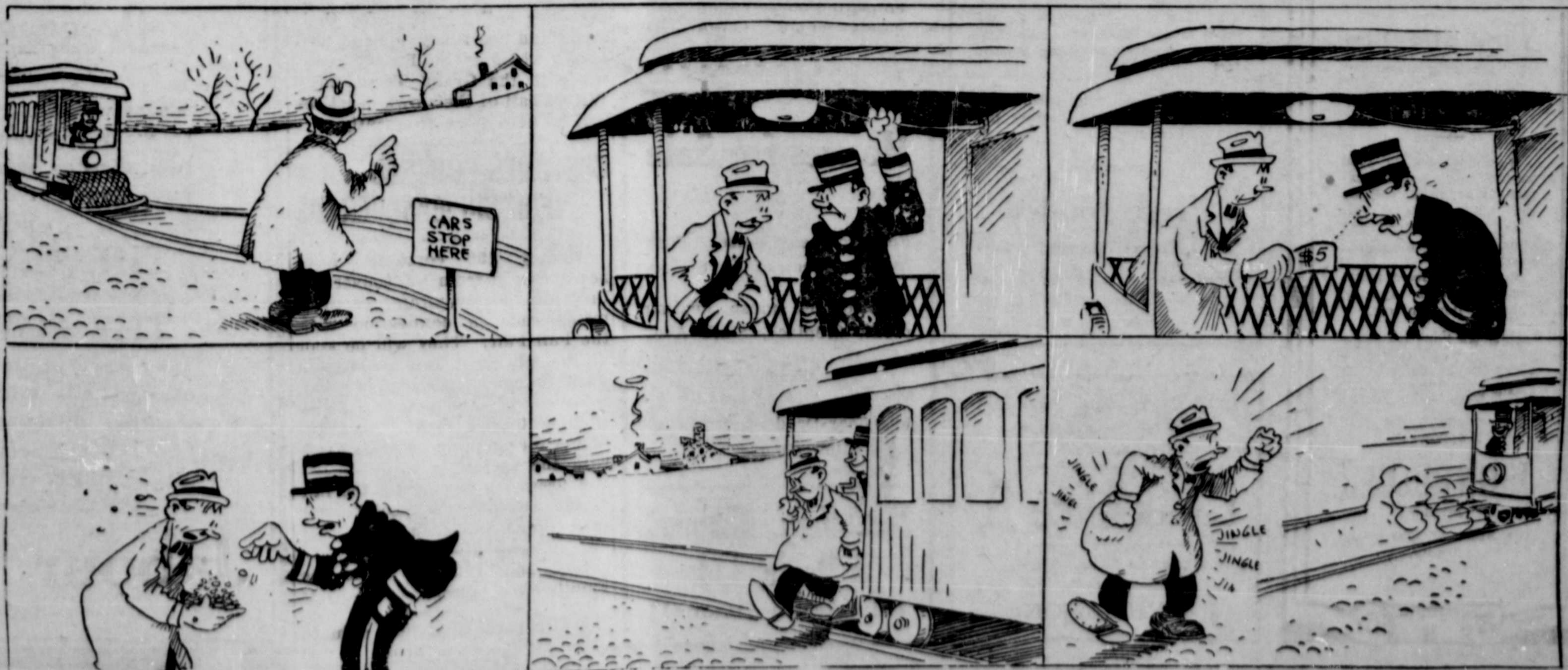
