Right Hon. Philip Snowden Firm In Stand for Better Treatment of Britain on Reparations Plan

THE HAGUE, Aug. 8.—Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer of the Labor Government of Great Britain, declared categorically today in the meeting of the financial committee of the conference of nations that Great Britain would not give way on the demand for an increased share in the German reparations money and that his Government regarded the point as fundamental.

Mr. Snowden previously declared that Britain would not agree to continue making sacrifices while other nations benefited. The conflicting viewpoints on the Young reparations plan were submitted to the committees in secret session with the hope of a reconciliation between England on the one hand and France and Italy on the other. The British attitude is supported by the smaller powers in this measure. Germany is keeping out of the argument.

GOVERNMENT TO TAKE HAND IN STOPPING RUM

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—The government is studying ways by which it can more effectively cooperate with the United States in the suppression of liquor smuggling across the border. Following a cabinet meeting yesterday Premier King said: "Since the United States officials have become more active themselves in preventing liquor smuggling, it seems appropriate that further measures of cooperation should be considered by the Canadian government." He indicated that there might be an announcement in this respect within a few days.

FIRES DESTROY TIMBER STANDS

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 8.—Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon saw flames eating their rich timber stands today while armies of forest fighters fought desperately to stem the onrush of the forest menace. They have been burning for two weeks and a rough estimate of the territory devastated is 50,000 acres with loss running into millions. There are 4000 men working on the fire lines.

CANADIANS TO THE LEAGUE

Hon. Raoul Dandurand Heads List of Representatives From This Country

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—Canadian delegates to the League of Nations assembly in September were announced by Premier King as follows: Hon. Raoul Dandurand, Hon. W. D. Euler and Hon. J. C. Elliott.

Alternate delegates, who are necessary because committees sit simultaneously, will be Sir George Foster, Malcolm McLean M.P. of Fort Melfort, Miss Agnes McPhail and Hon. Philippe Roy.

RUSSIAN MILITARY PLANE LEAVES ON A FLIGHT TO NEW YORK.

OMSK, Siberia, Aug. 8.—The Russian military plane "Land of the Soviets," left Moscow early today bound for New York and landed here this afternoon.

PRESBYTERY MET YESTERDAY

Gratifying Reports From All Branches of the Church's Work

Yesterday afternoon the Prince Rupert Presbytery opened its session with a good attendance. Rev. A. Wilson, chairman, presided over the meeting.

Rev. M. E. Eby, B.A., of Prince Rupert, who was appointed for the Missionary Maintenance Fund, gave a very encouraging report up to the present time.

Rev. A. Wilson and Rev. M. E. Eby were appointed to take charge of the induction service of Rev. C. E. Motie to the Rupert East United Church, which will take place early in September. Rev. A. Wilson and Rev. T. H. Wright of Hazelton were also appointed to officiate at the induction service of Rev. H. T. Allan at Terrace, which will take place about September 21.

Rev. Dr. George A. Wilson, superintendent of the mission, was also present and gave wise guidance to the affairs of the Presbytery.

Rev. Wm. Deans of Ocean Falls gave a report on Home Missions, which was very gratifying, and Rev. R. C. Scott, of the Marine Missions gave an excellent report of the work of the mission boat Thomas Crosby, which is engaged in visiting the canneries along the coast.

Altogether the meeting yesterday was very successful and it seems that all fields are well looked after and in capable hands.

Little Lad Was Saved When Three Others Lost Near Nanaimo

NANAIMO, Aug. 8.—Those drowned in Tuesday evening's boating accident at Boat Harbor were Mrs. E. J. Mines, aged 30, of Burnaby; her son, George, aged 8; and her nephew, James Cummings, aged 3. James Cummings, aged 3, was saved when Mrs. Mines managed to put him back in the boat before she went down trying to save the other children.

James was found drifting in the boat three hours later. Mrs. Cummings, mother of James, witnessed the tragedy. She could not swim and walked four miles for aid.

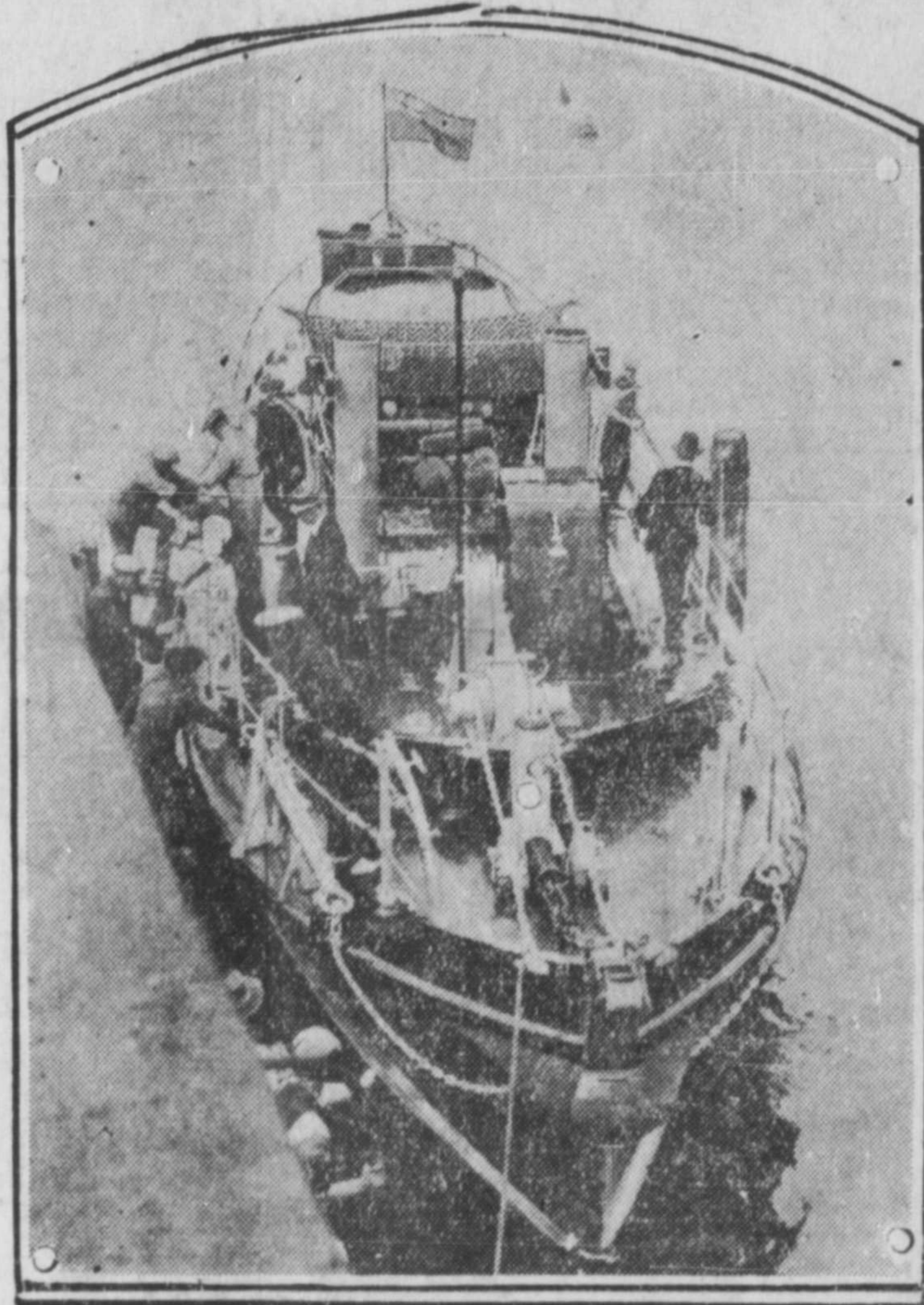
The pink run has been better, just twice as good as the cycle run of 1927, but nothing like as large as some seasons.

TENDERS FOR NEW FLOATS

Bids Being Called For Construction in Bay North-east of Drydock

Tenders are being called for the construction of fishermen's floats at Prince Rupert, the bids to be in the hands of the department of public works at Ottawa on or before September 7 after which it is understood the contract will be let.

The floats will be built in the cove just northeast of the Drydock and, judging from the plans, have a length of 520 feet and are built in four sections. It is understood that the intention is to have the floats ready in time for use in the fall.

C. P. R. HEAD OPTIMISTIC

Says It Takes More Than One Short Crop to Break Canada

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—"It takes more than one short crop to break Canada," said E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, last night, regarding western Canada crop conditions. "Of course, the railways will lose," he said, "but only on that one source of revenue. Mining, lumbering and other industries have developed to such an extent in the last year or two that we will more than make up."

Mr. Beatty said the Canadian Pacific was not considering any new developments in its service of an aviation branch.

BREAKDOWN OF PEACE EFFORT

TOKYO, Aug. 8.—Despatches from Harbin state that the Chinese and Russian peace negotiations have broken down again and that Russian demonstrations at the border have given cause for alarm as to the intention of the Soviet troops. The air squadrons and tank corps are manoeuvring within sight of the Chinese border guards.

TWO BOYS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

Eight Year Old Boy Jumps Into Lake to Save His Brother Aged Six

OCEAN FALLS, Aug. 8.—What would have been a double drowning accident here yesterday was averted by the presence of mind and quick action of Louis Cunningham, of Ocean Falls, one of the champion rifle team of Canada. The little Bommer boy, aged six, fell into the lake and his brother, aged eight, promptly jumped in after him to bring him out. The elder boy, although only eight years, had enough confidence in his own powers, being able to swim, although the younger one could not. The younger boy, however, in his fright at his sudden immersion grappled with his brother and both went down.

Louis Cunningham, seeing the commotion, promptly went in after them and was successful in bringing both the youngsters to land where they were quickly restored.

MADE RECORD JASPER COURSE

Gardiner W. White of New York Made Round in 69

JASPER, Aug. 8.—All amateur records on the famous Jasper Park Lodge golf course were broken yesterday when Gardiner W. White of New York turned in a score of 69, one under par. A month ago B. Tait of Pasadena played the course in par, the first amateur to make it.

Playing with Philip Armour of Chicago, Col. George Murphy, president of the Royal Ottawa Club, Ottawa, and Frank Hopkins, the New York artist, yesterday, Mr. White went out in 33 and June 30; and, although the army and the air programs have not been nearly carried out, the naval program—or at least that portion of it represented by ship construction—is in a better position.

With the five new vessels added to her fleet, Australia has a navy which, if it does not begin to compare with those of the great powers, is at least an effective addition to the naval strength of the British Empire.

Oil is Active Issue at Queen Charlottes where Experts Investigating

Everybody Talking Oil and Good Seepages Discovered Which Considered Good Indications

MASSETT, Queen Charlotte Islands, Aug. 8.—From one end of Queen Charlotte Islands to the other the people are talking of oil. It has been known for years that there were oil seepages at different points and at one time a well was put down on the west coast and it is still exuding gas. Other attempts to bore have been made, but through lack of capital or because of mishandling of funds they have proved abortive.

A new impetus has been given to the oil movement by the lengthy visit of three oil experts from the south, who have gone over the island carefully, and it is reported are well satisfied with the result of their visit. They have found a number of seepages on the west coast and others have made discoveries of late that indicate the extreme likelihood that oil will be found when boring follows the report of the engineers.

Recently there have been a number of oil lands staked and others are likely to follow. The whole island is discussing the possibilities and the people here are hoping to see a strong company come in and put down several holes to thoroughly prove the lands.

The experts who are here first made investigations in the southern and eastern part of Graham Island, but now they are making investigation in the northern sections.

SKIDEGATE, Aug. 8.—Another oil seepage has been discovered at the head of Vancouver Harbor on the west coast of Graham Island by Ernest Grieves of Prince Rupert.

VICTORIA ARCHITECT DIED THIS MORNING

VICTORIA, Aug. 8.—Samuel McCune, one of British Columbia's oldest and most prominent architects, died this morning. He was born in New Westminster, studied architecture in New York, and came to Victoria 35 years ago.

FIVE SHIPS IN THE NAVY OF AUSTRALIA

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 8.—Following the precedent set by Great Britain and for the sake of efficiency in expenditure, the Commonwealth government in 1924 laid down a five years' program for all three branches of the defense service. It was intended that by the end of that period the defenses of the country would be advanced to "a definite point."

GRAF ZEPPELIN IS NOW OFF ON A WORLD TRIP

LAKEHURST, N.Y., Aug. 8.—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin took off at 11:40 last night with 22 passengers for Friedrichshafen on the first leg of a world tour with other stops at Tokio and Los Angeles.

Lady Grace Drummond Hay was the only woman passenger on the big ship.

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—Before dawn off the coast of Maine this morning a message cracked in from the sea tell that the Graf Zeppelin was 200 miles off Nova Scotia coast flying at 90 miles an hour. Shortly after she was reported between Halifax and Cape Sable. Subsequently vessels saw the ship but at a great distance.

PROTECTION IS PROPOSED FOR FOOD PRODUCERS

ALERT BAY, Aug. 8.—Producers of food should have protection the same as manufacturers, Hon. R. B. Bennett said in his address here last night. If agriculture dwindles and does not prosper, there will be the inevitable reaction against industrial progress, he said.

HECATE STRAIT LIGHTS

Two new lights are needed for Hecate Straits. All marine men are agreed on it, but the Lighthouse Board of Canada cannot be made to see the point. They do not seem to realize the local situation.

It is useless to outline again the reason why action on this is necessary, except that it seriously affects the business of this port. We should make it so clear to that board and also the marine department at Ottawa that there may be no further excuses for holding off.

This is not a question of politics any more than the highway is a question of politics, but if we do not get relief it is liable to become a political issue.

It does not matter to Prince Rupert people whether it is a Liberal or Conservative Government that holds up the progress of the port. What we want and must have is relief.

WEST COAST INDUSTRY

The news from the Queen Charlotte Islands that herring are being successfully cured on the west coast of Moresby Island and is likely to develop into an important industry is most satisfactory. The islands have waited a long time for developments and if they get fish industries there it will help out a great deal. Once there is a sufficient population on the islands they will get a regular, almost daily steamship service and will be able to ship their produce to better effect than is possible today. People who were at one time producing fruit and vegetables have given up trying because of the difficulties of transportation. Changes are in the offing. We look to see great happenings on the Queen Charlottes in the next few years.

SNOWDEN AND THE CONFERENCE

Practically all the powers interested in the late war are represented at a conference at The Hague, particularly those that have reparations or other payments to collect. During the life of the late Government a tentative settlement was made along the line of proposals emanating from Ambassador Young, representing United States.

Philip Snowden, now chancellor of the exchequer, but then a private member of the House, opposed the arrangement and he is now opposing it at The Hague conference. He claims that preferential treatment is given France and Italy at the expense of Great Britain.

ENVIES PEOPLE OF PRINCE RUPERT

We have a letter from a resident in New York City which says: "Just incidentally we have been going through an exceedingly trying period of heat in New York, for when the thermometer rises to the nineties considering the humidity which always obtains here New York City is some punishing place."

"Up in Prince Rupert the weather must be delightfully cool and I sometimes envy you and your associates who are privileged to live amid conditions in so many respects far more enjoyable than is our portion in this big and noisy city."

BOARD OF TRADE VANCOUVER WILL INVESTIGATE COST

The Vancouver Board of Trade is investigating the proposal of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade for a campaign to urge the Provincial Government to establish a trunk road between Prince Rupert and Prince George, linking the northern city to the remainder of British Columbia, says the Vancouver Province.

In a recent letter presented to the council of the Vancouver organization, the northern board urged that the Board of Trade here co-operate with it in gaining consideration for this public work.

The council, however, deferred action until information relative to cost and the possible routes had been presented.

DELEGATES TO PEACE RIVER NOT APPOINTED MUST BE VERY SOON

Secretary Brooksbank of the Board of Trade as received a letter from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce asking definitely how many delegates are coming from Prince Rupert.

Mr. Brooksbank says they would like to hear from any members of the board who are willing to go, paying approximately half of their own expenses. The appointments will be made from those.

So far none of the delegates have been appointed.

SITKA SPRUCE GROWS ONLY IN THE FOG BELT

Last Valuable Stand is at Queen Charlotte Islands Whence Local Supply Comes

The recent increased demand for Sitka spruce draws attention to the fact that the last valuable stand of this timber is at the Queen Charlotte Islands. It is there the supply comes for the Big Bay lumber mill at Seal Cove. When that stand is gone there will be practically none left.

Sitka Spruce, the largest of our spruces, grows only in the

so-called "fog belt" along the coast of the Pacific Northwest. The trees average from 160 to 235 feet in height and from 4 to 6 feet in diameter, but specimens from 8 to 12 feet across at the stump are not uncommon. Because of its great size this tree produces large amounts of clear lumber—a larger percentage of "shop and grade" than any other softwood species. The wood itself is quite similar to that of the eastern species, but due to the greater size of the tree it contains more clear material.

The wood is light in weight, fairly soft, straight-grained, of uniform texture, and possesses great toughness and strength in proportion to its weight. It is well suited for many building purposes, both for interior and exterior uses, because of its strength, light weight, ease in working, and its freedom from

excessive resin or pitch. Sitka spruce is odorless and tasteless, has little tendency for warping, holds nails firmly and can be given treatments with paint or enamels that give it a smooth, velvet-like finish.

Sitka Spruce is well adapted for use as siding and is especially popular in the bevel form. A large percentage of the siding is heartwood and hence has the durability required for such a use. Because of its stiffness, light weight and strength and its small defects, Sitka Spruce is popular in the items of common lumber for house construction such as framing, studding, sheathing, concrete forms, roof boards, etc.

Specialty Wood

This species is best known as a specialty wood, however, and high on the list of its uses is that of airplane stock. Millions

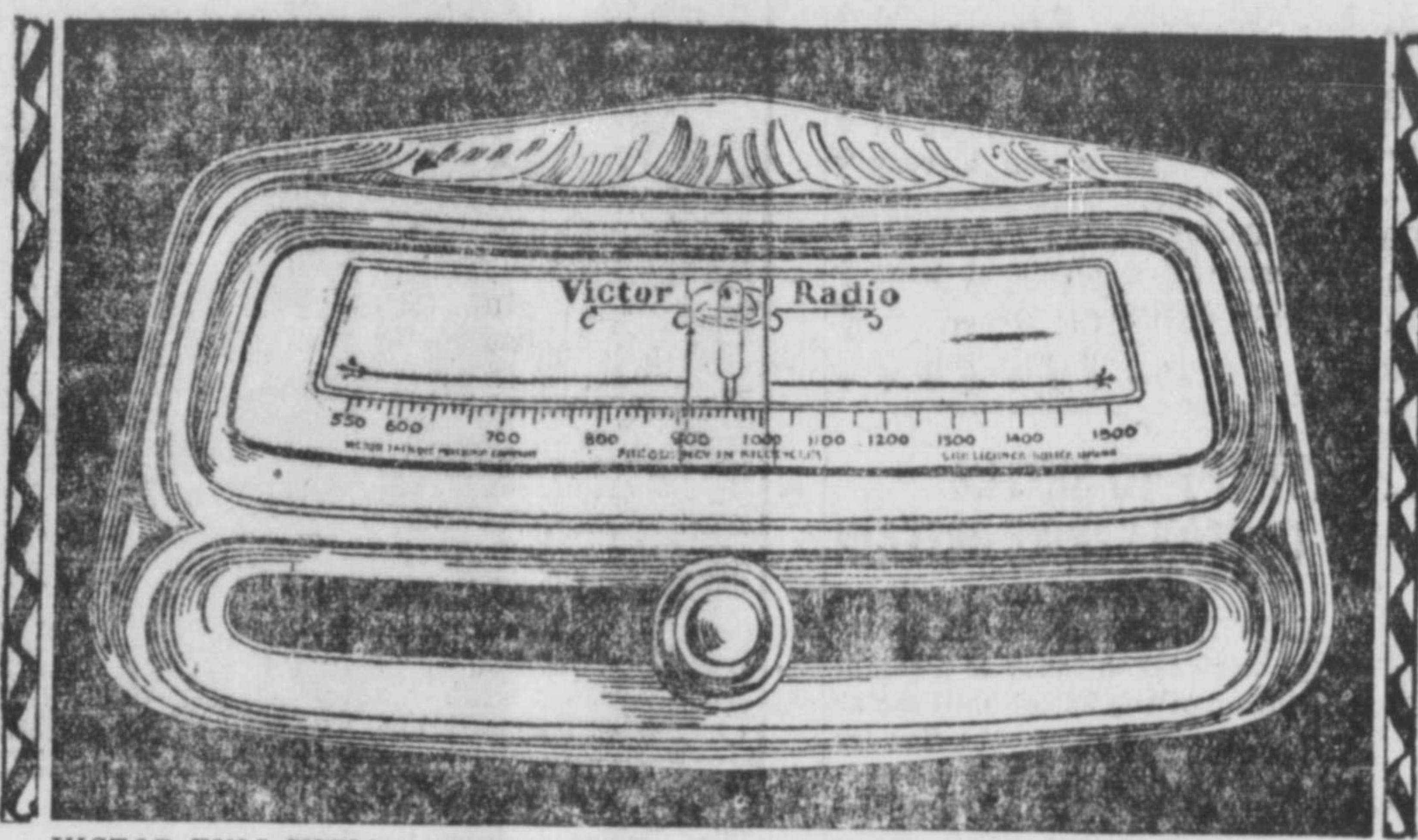
of feet of Sitka Spruce were used for airplanes during the World War; wings of Sitka Spruce carried Lindbergh to Paris and Wilkins across the North Pole; and large quantities are used in the construction of the planes which carry our mail. A recent survey covering more than 80 plants in this country engaged in the manufacture of airplanes shows that approximately 90 per cent of them use Sitka Spruce in some form in the construction of their machines. This wood ranks first in airplane construction because it combines with light weight the properties of stiffness, toughness and resilience to a higher degree than other species.

Because it responds so well to vibrations, spruce is widely used for musical instruments such as pianos, violins, mando-

lins, etc.
Adds to Its Value
On account of its small tight knots, its freedom from pitch and odor, and its ability to take nails without splitting, it is widely used for boxes, food containers of all kinds, kitchen cabinets and built-in fixtures. It is a preferred wood for partitions and the lining of walls and doors of refrigerators. It is an ideal wood for drainboards because its uniform texture enables it to resist warping even when used in unusual widths.

In many regions it is displacing other species of shop lumber because of its many good qualities and because it is procurable in specified widths.

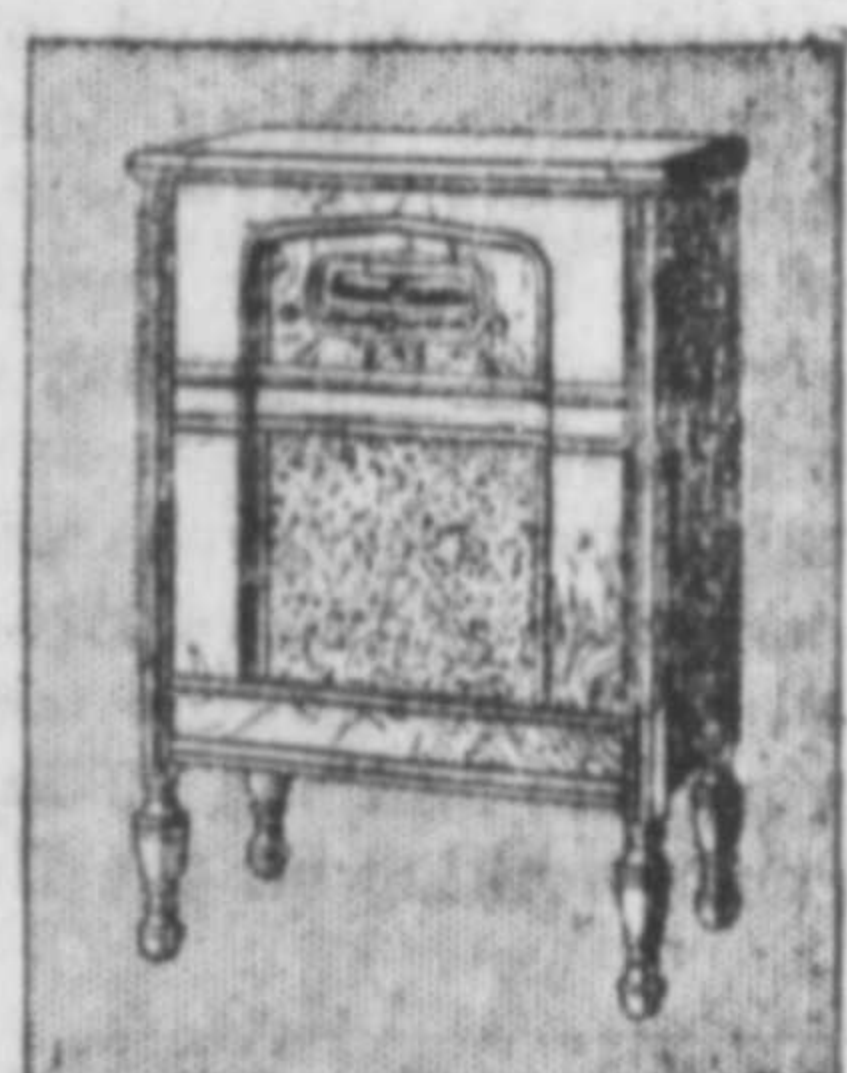

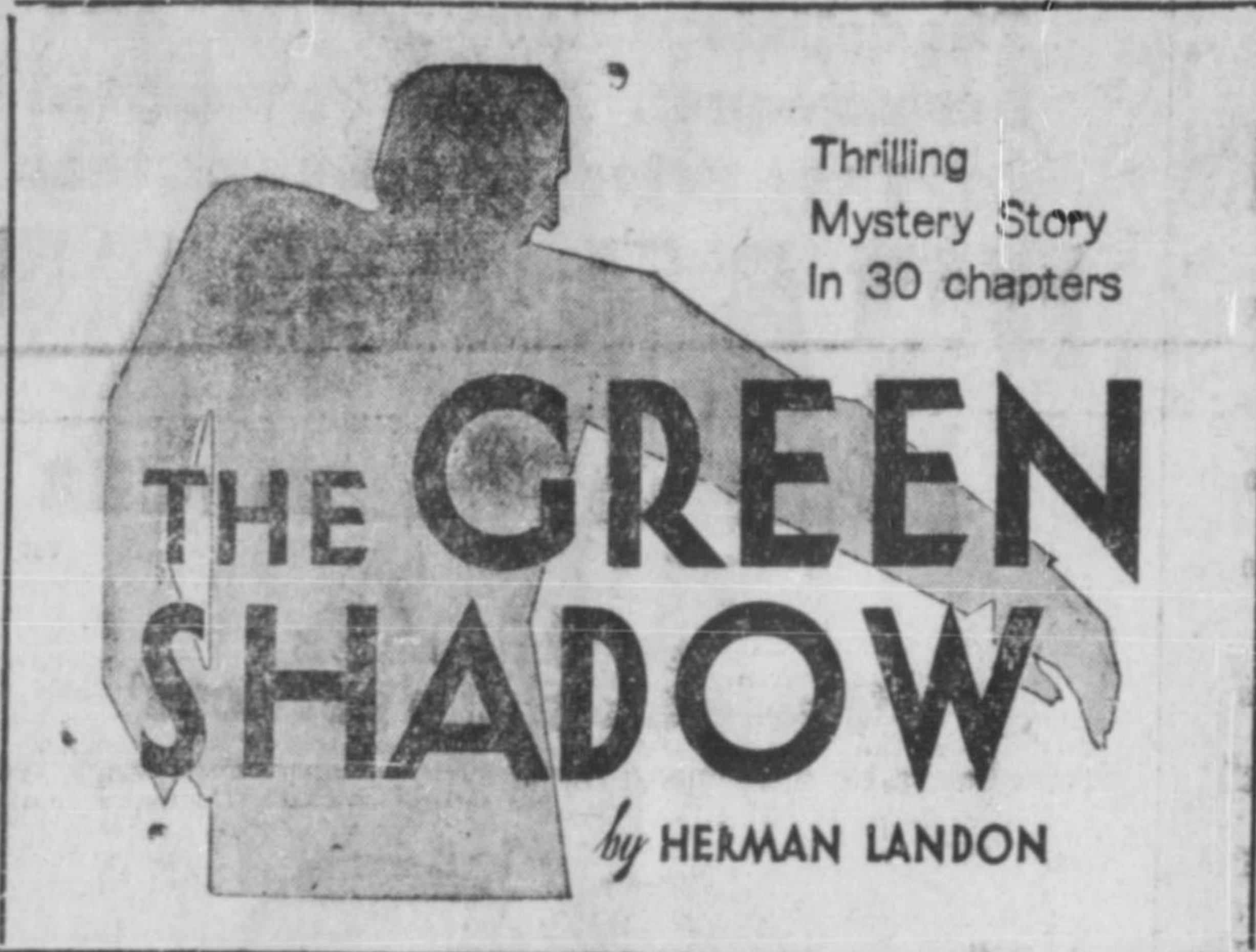

"The high price," said a buyer, "is for troll caught fish alone and not for trap caught fish. The troll caught fish are dressed and cleaned and also arrive in better condition than trap caught fish. Brailling rubs off the scales to a certain extent and it does not have a good appearance for the market. The main point, however, is the fact that we are saved the labor of dressing the fish when troll caught."

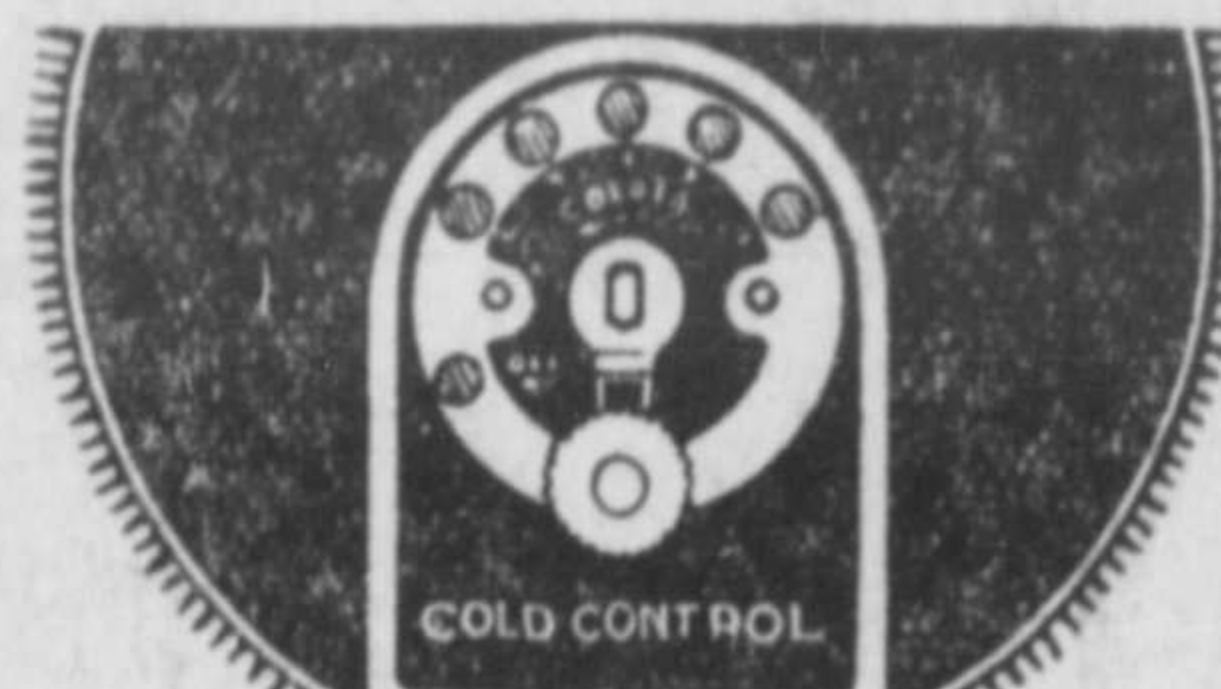
