WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 27. The experiments carried out by the dirigible Los Angeles in launching and recovering aeroplanes in midair is regarded by Rear Admira William A. Build a road and a railway and the Peace will then become really a part of British Columbia, to which province it belongs.

After the two most important highways are built will be time enough to consider the matter of a north and south trunk road that will connect Alaska with the States and which is being asked for by the American people.

We want to please our American neighbors, but we must not neglect our own people in any effort to please them. As we have said before. First things first. Give Prince Rupert proper highway transportation and Peace River the same and then look after Alaska. This should be urged upon Mr. Lougheed when he visits here next

The movement for a return to the old system was led by former mayor of Cleveland and former governor of Ohio, Harry L. Davis, an astute political leader of the old school. The campaign was a hot one throughout, and charges of graft and waste were freely made against City Manager Hopkins and the other municipal officials. The Cleveland Plain Dealer led the fight for the retention of the manager-commission plan and the defense of Manager Hopkins' administration. It declared emphatically that "beyond question Cleveland has had under the manager plan the most economical, businesslike, efficient and satisfactory government in many years." The verdict of the people sustained the Plain Dealer's position.

The people generally will be glad that the people of Cleveland have determined to give the manager-commission form of government a thorough test. It is important to other large cities that a city of a million inhabitants should try out a system that has worked well in smaller! towns. If it is a success in Cleveland, it might serve to improve municipal government in other large cities. Chicago and Philadelphia, for instance, might get good government some day.

Ideas are always dangerous. Many have suffered for them, while others have been so obsessed with them that they have made others suffer.
