

## INADLUI DOMINION

Imports for Twelve Months Ending July 31 Were Slightly Less Than Exports

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.—Canada's total trade for the twelve months ending July 31 totalled \$2,677,200,-000, or an increase over the corresponding period last year of slightly more than \$232,000.

Total imports for consumption amounted to \$1,341,500,000, while exports totalled \$1,360,000.000.

Agricultural and vegetable exports were valued at \$596,000 and agricultural imports amounted to \$233,000.

Guarded Secret

REGINA, Sask., Sept. 6-The new legislature is now in special session and it is expected that before the proceedings are far advanced a decision will be reached as to whether Premier J. G. Gardiner, leader or the Liberal party, which has been in this province during the past twenty-three years, or Dr. J. W. T. Anderson, Conservative party leader, will hold the reins of

new teacher for Hazelton Public power. The Gardiner government meets the legislature with twenty-eight supporters out of a total member-Mitchell Newman of Hazelton ship of sixty-three. The Conservatives have twenty-four. There are independent labels on six, while the remaining five seats are occupied by those who at present define themselves as Progressives, but who, if the proposal of R. M. Johnson, president of the Saskatchewan Progressive Association, is accept ed, will officially classify themselves as members of "The Saskatchewan Farmers' Political As-

sociation." The three groups-Conservatives Independents and Progressivesmustered under the leadership of Dr. Anderson have announced their intention to vote Premier Gardiner and party out of office at the earliest possible moment. Premier Gardiner, including his

own vote, will have a majority of four over the Conservatives, but in relation to the whole house he will be in a minority of seven. This represents a big turnover from the standing in the last legislature when the Liberals numbered fifty-

Cabinet Ready It is understood that Dr. Anderson has his cabinet slate already prepared in readiness should his honor call upon him to form a government, but its personnel is a closely guarded secret. One selection is considered, however, that of Major M. A. MacPherson, K.C., one of the Regina Conservative members, who has been frequently mentioned for the post of attorney-

If, and when, Dr. Anderson and his colleagues are sworn in they must return to their respective constituencies for re-election, and during this recess the legislature

will probably stand adjourned. Mr. Gardiner has defended his course in retaining power until the legislature should meet, on the ground that he led the largest group and that the legislature was the proper arena for the test of strength. In addition, he declared that deferred elections were pending in two far northern constituencies-Ile a la Crosse and Cumberland-and the general election could not be considered as completed until these returns were in. Both of these ridings returned Liberal

candidates.


