The glue obtained from fish heads comes almost entirely from the fish

Two samples of glue made from salmon heads have so far proved unsatisfactory.

The results obtained with halibut head glues are considered so satisfactory that arrangements have been made to prepare large scale samples of this glue under plant conditions at fish meal plant. These samples will be distributed to : users of glue and used under actual working conditions. This procedure should reveal any defects of the glue so far hidden and give some indication of its value as a commercial product.

The investigation has shown that a satisfactory glue can be made from fish heads and it is evident that the application of the process would solve the waste liquor problem. Experiments are in progress to determine the effect of the process on the fish meal and oil obtained under such conditions.
