## York Today From S. S. Berengaria and Given Enthusiastic Welcome

NEW YORK, Oct. 4. - Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay. Macdonald, British prime minister, en route to Washington to visit President Hoover on a good-will mission, was enthusiastically acclaimed when he set foot on American soi' this morning, following his arrival on S.S. Berengaria.

The welcoming committee boarded the liner on her arrival, after which the premier, his daughter, Ishbel, and party, were taken aboard the city tug Macom and taken to the Battery, to the accompaniment of shrieks from harbor vessels, whistles and a salute of 19 guns from Fort Jay on Governor's Island.

Among the first to grasp the premier's hand ashore was Secretary of State Stimson. The party climbed into cars and started up the canyons of Lower Broadway to the city hall.
