Russia Breaks Off Diplomatic Relations With China and Will Recall All Her Representatives

MOSCOW, July 18.—Russia broke off diplomatic relations with China last night. A note issued by the Soviet Union said all means of reaching an amicable settlement had been exhausted and placed the entire responsibility for all consequences on the Chinese.

The note announced that all diplomatic and consular officials and all government and commercial representatives would be recalled from China at once; that all railway communications between Soviet territory and China be suspended and that diplomatic and consular representatives of the Nanking government would be ordered immediately to leave Russia.

The note declared the Chinese reply to the Russian ultimatum was unsatisfactory in content and hypocritical in tone.

AIR RECORD FROM NEW YORK TO NOME PLANNED IN FLIGHT
 NEW YORK, July 18.—Capt. Ross Hoyt hopped off for Nome this afternoon in an endeavor to make the round trip flight of 8400 miles in record time. His schedule calls for refuelling stops at Minneapolis, Edmonton, Whitehorse and Fairbanks of one hour coming and going with a six hour stay-over at Nome.

CAPITAL FOR THE PROVINCE

Hon. Nels Lougheed Declared Money Will Come From London to Canada

VICTORIA, July 18.—British capital in large volume will flow to Canada in the next two years, and particularly to British Columbia, Hon. Nels Lougheed declared yesterday following his return from London. "The bankers assured me," he said, "that the next twenty years will be Canada's so far as Britain's overseas investments are concerned, and in the immediate future we may expect a large influx of capital."

The minister of public works stated that British Columbia House is doing fine work. He will make a detailed report on the matter of agricultural exports to Premier Tolmie.

HARVESTERS NOT REQUIRED

East Will Furnish Only About 13,000 This Year Instead of 50,000

WINNIPEG, July 18.—Less than 25 per cent of the harvesters brought to the prairies from eastern Canada last year will be required to handle this year's crop, according to employment officials here. It is expected that not more than 13,000 will be sent from eastern Canada this year and it is not likely any Britishers will be brought over. Last year the east furnished 50,000 men.

MAY BE COMMERCIAL ROUTE TO THE ORIENT WAY OF NOME, ALASKA

NEW YORK, July 18.—While the flight of Ross G. Hoyt, who takes off tomorrow for Nome by way of Edmonton, White Horse and Fairbanks, is sponsored by the war department and is announced to be for military purposes, it is understood that the motive behind is to test out the feasibility of the route as a possible commercial route to the Orient.

BANK BANDIT IS AT LARGE

Less Than Half of Money Stolen From Smithers Bank is Recovered

KENNEY WAYLAIID HIM

Posse of Police and Citizens Scouring Countryside For Robber

SMITHERS, July 18.—Less than half of the \$2,000 which an armed, masked bandit removed from the Royal Bank of Canada here yesterday, after holding up the teller has been recovered, a check-up shows. The amount recovered by L. H. Kenney, local broker, who intercepted the bandit as he made his getaway, was \$860, \$1175 still being missing.

After leaving the bank, the bandit was followed by Kenney. He stopped by the bush near the town and waited for the latter who was unarmed. The bandit took off his coat saying: "Do you want to die?" After a few minutes conversation, the robber handed Kenney a roll, saying that was all he had. He then took to the bush. The bandit did not produce a gun when with Kenney.

The man was supposed to have been seen later three miles east of town but he has not yet been apprehended. A posse of police and citizens are out.

The man wore a dark felt hat, blue coat and trousers, dark khaki shirt and brown boots. His height is estimated at six feet and his weight at about 175 pounds. He was English-speaking and probably about 35 years of age. He had a black handkerchief over his face.

BISLEY, July 18.—Three Englishmen with 101 out of a possible 105 tied for leadership in the qualifying stage of the King's prize yesterday. They were Sgt. Major Clarke, Lieut. J. G. Booth and Quartermaster Sergeant Philpott.

Lieut. Desmond Burke of Ottawa led the Canadian team with 99. Other Canadians qualifying being Master Gunner Collings of Esquimalt, with 95; Sgt. J. H. Regan of Victoria, 94.

The Dominion government department of public works is asking tenders for the construction of a breakwater and repairs to the approach at Digby Island. The work was provided for in the estimates at the last session. Tenders have to be in by August 9.

"MOOTLE" THE HYBRID ANIMAL AT DANSKIN PUZZLE TO RANCHERS

Jersey Cow Bears Calf to Bull Moose, Producing Most Unique Specimen, at Farm of George Buchanan

The combinations possible between the words "moose" and "cattle" are exercising the minds of many philologists in the Burns-Francois-Ootsa Lake districts these days. Among the possibilities is "Mootle" as the easiest and evenest. This interest in philology has been caused by what will in all probability inspire our scientists to overhaul their theories of at least one aspect of biology and comes from what is to be seen at the farm of George Buchanan at Danskin, between Francois and Ootsa Lakes.

Brewing Has Received Call to Join Vancouver Congregation Next Year

VANCOUVER, July 18.—Bishop Willard Brewing, head of the Reformed Episcopal Church both of Canada and northern United States, has accepted a call to the new United Church which will be built on Burrard Street, following the amalgamation of the three churches here of the United Church, namely Wesley, formerly Methodist; St. Andrew's, formerly Presbyterian; St. John's, formerly Congregational.

PREMIER BRACKEN OF WINNIPEG ARRIVES EDMONTON IN PLANE

EDMONTON, July 18.—The second largest machine in Canada, the super-Fokker universal airplane of the Western Canada Airways, piloted by W. T. Brintnell, with Premier Bracken of Manitoba as the principal guest, landed here yesterday afternoon from Winnipeg and Regina. They will proceed to Vancouver.

SHAM BATTLE PUGET SOUND

SEATTLE, July 18.—In order to test out the defences of Puget Sound, a sham battle has been going on for the past day or two. Yesterday the invading fleet under cover of fog and smoke screen got safely into the sound past the forts, but met with a terrible bombardment from air, land and sea forces.

DOCK BURNED SEATTLE FIRE

Union Pacific Loss a Million Dollars and Matson Line \$100,000

SEATTLE, July 18.—The Union Pacific dock was practically destroyed by fire yesterday with a loss estimated at a million dollars covered by a blanket insurance policy. Six firemen are recovering from burns and suffocation as a result of fighting the fire.

Caught in his office on the pier Harbormaster A. A. Paysee leaped into the bay from which he was rescued.

The Matson Line to whom the dock was leased suffered \$100,000 loss of merchandise.

ALASKA AIRPLANE LANDS LOWE INLET, PONTOON DAMAGED

A Washington-Airways plane, bound from Seattle to Ketchikan, made a forced landing at Lowe Inlet with a damaged pontoon. The plane expects to continue its flight as soon as repairs could be effected.

Another plane of the same line, having left Ketchikan at 5:30 this morning for Lowe Inlet, reached here from the latter point at 9:30 this morning and moored at the Pacific Salvage Co. floats. It came here in search of repair parts for the other plane.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN IS BANK PRESIDENT

MONTREAL, July 18.—Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden was elected president of Barclay's Bank of Canada at the first meeting of shareholders here. He assumes his new duties on September 3 when the bank commences business.

DR. M'DOUG ALL HEAD OF NATIVE SONS OF CANADA

WINNIPEG, July 18.—Dr. J. L. MacDougall of Vancouver was yesterday elected president of the Native Sons of Canada. Arthur C. Pike of Victoria was reelected secretary.

WINNIPEG, July 18.—The three new modern steamships which will be placed in service between Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Alaska next summer are now under construction, according to B. C. Keeley, Pacific coast manager of the Canadian National Steamships.

The new boats will be 385 feet long, have an accommodation for 340 passengers, and will have a contract speed of 25 knots per hour. In design and appearance they will be the finest products of the ship-builders' craft and are superior in every respect to any steamship now engaged in the coastal service of British Columbia.

It has been necessary for the company to order these three vessels to care for the increasing bookings by tourists. The accommodation of ships now engaged in this service is completely taxed every trip and many hundreds of applications have to be refused annually. It is expected that the ships will be ready for delivery early in the year and that all of them will be in service when the tourist season begins next summer.

Plane Arrived Today for the Highway Reconnaissance: Gwyer Will Personally Supervise Work

A Western Canada Airways seaplane which has been engaged for the past ten days in transporting mining supplies from Stewart to Bowser Lake, arrived here today at 12:45 from the north to carry out an aerial reconnaissance in search for a pass north of the Skeena River through which the Skeena River highway may be built, thus avoiding the rocky defiles of the Skeena River canyon. The plane is piloted by Walter Gilbert and there is also a mechanic and camera man on board. It left Stewart at 11:18 a.m.

The reconnaissance will be carried out personally by W. K. Gwyer, district engineer for the provincial department of public works, who stated this morning that the survey would be started just as soon as weather conditions permitted—today if possible. The plane will fly inland as far as Terrace and Mr. Gwyer will carefully scrutinize the route as he passes, having pictures taken where necessary. Landings will be made at the other end either on Kitsumkalum or Lakelse Lake.

BODY OF JAP FOUND TLELL

Word has been received by the provincial police that the body of Sugiwara who was drowned on the boat Nikko has been found three miles from the wreck near Tlell. Constable Martin of Skidegate and the coroner have gone to investigate.

\$25,000,000 LINERS

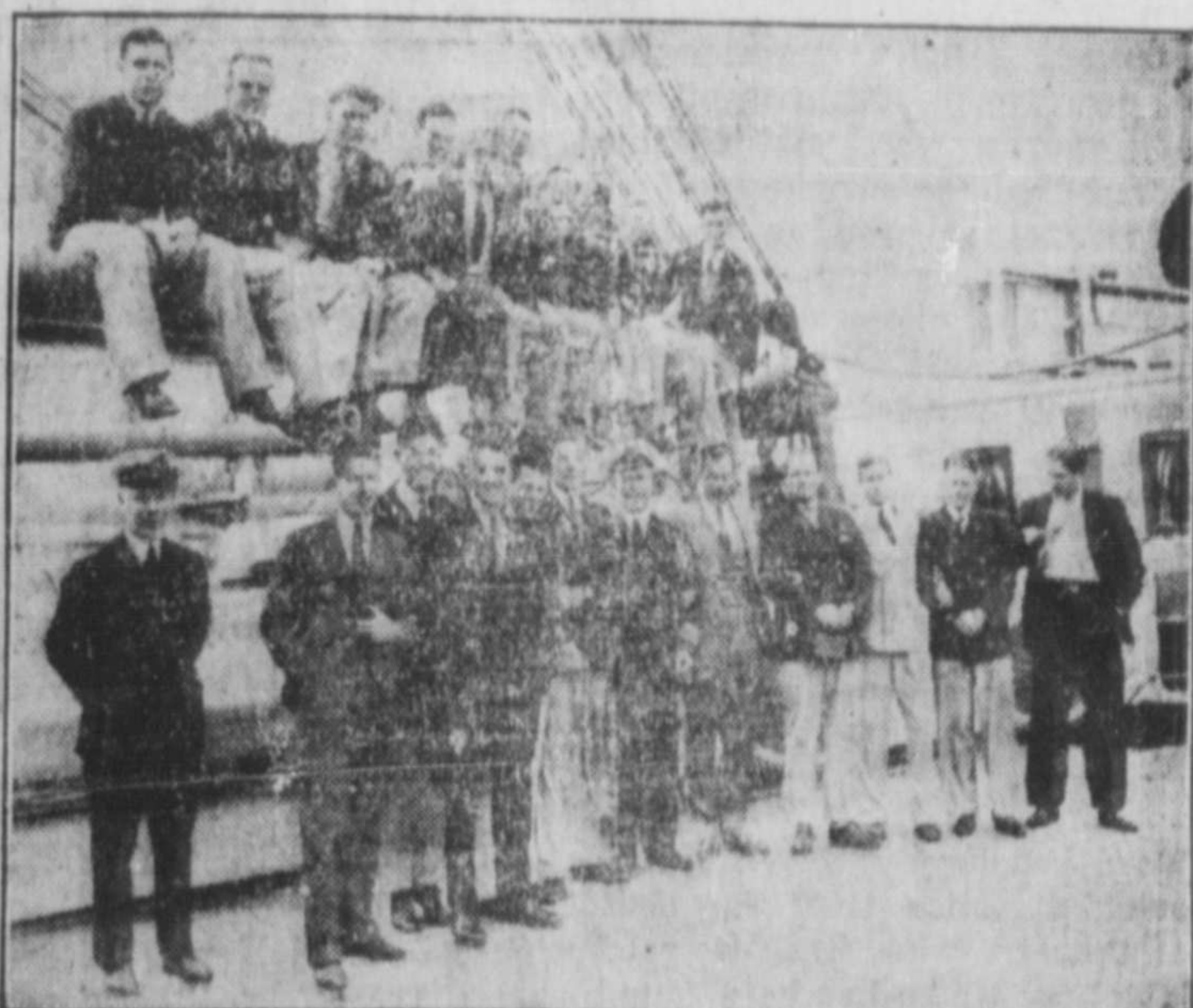

hooves pure moose. His little pig-like—or rather moose-like—tail is away up on his rump and on his neck is the beginning of a fine mane. Horns, too, promise to grow flat instead of round. While at present the front view of "Mootle" is the usual sedate appearance of his Jersey mother, his hind quarters belie his legitimacy. While the lawful-born calf seems an awkward bunch of legs, "Mootle" is all grace and strength with leg muscles of steel wire. Mootle can jump—not merely throw himself around like an ordinary well-bred calf.

The significance between this successful cross between Moose and Taurus is at once apparent to ranchers in the interior where the winters are long. Cattle graze. Moose browse. Moose will rustle fodder through the winter snow under conditions in which cattle would starve. Therefore a successful cross between Moose and Taurus would combine the browsing capacity to the grazing quality of ordinary cattle and this reduce to a minimum the long winter feeding so expensive to the ranchers in the cold winter country. For it costs just so many tons of hay to winter each head of stock in northern and central British Columbia. And hay costs money. But if "Mootle" finds his winter browsing himself, he and his descendants will cost his owner little or no board charges during the winter. Hence more cows and less cost. More milk and butter at a cheaper price. Thanks to "Mootle."

The whole story of the "Love of the Foolish Cow" will of course never be told, for the motto of moose as well as man is "Protect the Woman." And with what wiles the Jersey cow snared the bull moose—that secret lies within the brown Jersey's heart and will never be uttered in words. But the black calf still prances around George Buchanan's yard and cannot deny his paternity.

Jack Sealy of Smithers, who is some judge of cattle—among other things—and far-sighted in business, has already offered more than twenty times the value of an ordinary calf for "Mootle" where he stands and five times that again if he proves reproductive, which is some little indication of the regard in which "Mootle" stands among the up-country ranchers.

"Mootle" and his bull moose father may be the beginning of greater things for the moose country ranchers.
