Receivers Allow G.T.P. to Default Debenture Interest Comment of London Papers

Daily Telegraph says Suspicion that Government is intending to Use G.T.P. to Enforce Confiscatory Terms on Parent Company; More Sympathetic Policy Should be Adopted says Star.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 2.—The announcement is made by G. T. P. officials that they are without funds to meet the four per cent debenture interest due.

The Daily Telegraph financial editor declares it unthinkable that the Dominion Government as receivers should leave the bondholders in the lurch and draws the attention of the Dominion authorities to the fact that their attitude toward Canada's pioneer railroad has been so ungenerous that one cannot avoid the suspicion that they intend to use the G. T. P. as a lever to enforce confiscatory terms on the parent company.

The Daily Chronicle counsels the bondholders to be patient and advises them not to sacrifice their holdings.

The Star says a more sympathetic policy will have to be adopted by the Dominion if British investors are not to lose faith in the Canadian administration.

NON-STOP FLIGHT TORONTO TO MINEOLA

HIGHER PRICE FOR HALIBUT CATCHES

On Sunday's market the price of halibut soared high. There were three car loads in and 15.30 was paid for first class and 10.60 for second class. Today's arrivals amount to four car loads but the price has lowered somewhat. The average for first class is 13.60 and for second class 7.50.

Suggest Truce For Next Six Months

New York Federation of Labor would Give President Wilson chance to Bring down Cost of Living; Telegraphers Convene.

New York, Sept. 2.—The suspension of strikes throughout the United States and the declaration of a labor truce on a basis of a status quo for six months or more to enable President Wilson to bring about a change in the cost of living situation, is recommended in a report of the committee of the New York state Federation of Labor.

St. Louis, Sept. 2.—The general chairman of the order of Railway Telegraphers in the United States and Canada has opened for a week's conference to arrange a new scale of wages and a standard of working hours.

WELL KNOWN CITIZEN DIES

Edmond E. La Casse Passes Away in Vancouver and Will be Buried Tomorrow.

The death occurred in Vancouver on Saturday of one of Prince Rupert's well known and respected citizens, Edmond E. La Casse of the La Casse Bakery. He had been ill for some time and a short time ago went to Vancouver for treatment. On Saturday he passed away and will be buried on Wednesday morning. Rev. Father Forget of St. Patrick's parish officiating. Out of respect for the deceased the local store will remain closed all day Wednesday.

Mr. La Casse was born in Ottawa on April 14, 1861. For several years he had been in business here and during that time earned the respect of all who knew him. He was always progressive in business and as a citizen was above reproach. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow and five children, two of whom live here and the others in Vancouver. They are Ulysses and Edna of Prince Rupert, and Edmond, Annie, and Mrs. W. J. Donovan of Vancouver. Mrs. La Casse also lives in Vancouver.

EXTENSION TO DOCKS HERE

Provincial Government Calling for Tenders to Build Addition and Repair old Structure.

Tenders are being invited for the construction of an addition to the provincial government wharf in this city and also for the repair of the old wharf. The repairs are made necessary by the fact that the old wharf is in very bad condition and much of the underpinning must be renewed.

The new part is to be built where the Prince Rupert Boat House now lies. The extension has a seventy foot frontage and will add a good deal to the capacity of the wharf, made necessary by the growth of business in the city and the desire of the Provincial Government to do its bit in extending it.

In order to build the extension it will be necessary to move the boat house.

Are They Playing With Cost of Living?

It looks as if the Canadian Government was only going to play with the cost of living question. If that is so there will be little patience with them. To say that the cost of living is high because the people are cheated by the small dealers is but begging the question. Three pounds on a peck of potatoes makes a difference but not the difference that the inspector of weights and measures would have us believe.

The President of the United States seemed to have struck the right spot when he forced down the price of everything, but whether the price will stay down and continue to drop, remains to be seen. The difficulty seems to be that production is required and there will not be any forced production if the prices of products drops low. Not that there is any danger just now of their going down out of sight.

Letters to Editor Always Welcome.

The News welcomes letters from writers who have some public question to discuss and can do so without introducing personalities and making themselves and the paper offensive. Sometimes it is absolutely necessary to say things which some people do not like, but as a general policy we do not go out of our way to annoy people. We like to discuss questions on their merits and not bring people into the discussion in an offensive manner.

Primarily a newspaper is for the purpose of disseminating news—as accurate news as possible. Secondly the dissemination of opinions comes within the scope of a newspaper and it is for that the editorial page is used. Naturally those opinions, like all opinions, are open to question. Here the correspondence comes in. Other people have opinions as well as the editor and some like to state them. The columns of The News are open for these people, but they must be stated in as moderate a manner as are the views expressed by the editor. Hard hitting is not a part of our general scheme. We prefer to discuss in a reasonable, moderate manner.

A good letter is always welcome. We publish a good many, and readers seem to realize that they are welcome, but it must necessarily follow that a good many letters that are sent in never see the light of print. They do not conform with the ideals of the editor. Letters are always welcome, but not always printed.

PENSION BONUS NOW IN FORCE

Commencing Yesterday There will Be a Twenty per cent Increase For One Year.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Ottawa, Sept. 2.—The new Pensions Act became effective yesterday. This provides for the granting of a bonus for a year to the lower ranks.

A twenty per cent increase—intended to offset the present high cost of living—is allowed to ex-privates, and approximately a thirteen per cent increase for those who held the rank of sergeant, or a corresponding rank in the naval forces. Thus to the total disability pension of \$600 per annum for an ex-private there will be added a bonus of \$120, payable for one year only, making a total of \$720. The totally disabled ex-sergeant's pension of \$637.50 is similarly increased to \$720 by the addition of the thirteen per cent bonus, previously referred to.

A substantial increase in the pension for the first orphan child of a deceased soldier is also provided for. Under the new schedule such a child will be entitled to an award of \$360 per annum instead of \$288 as at present. Where there is more than one orphan child in a family, pension for the second child will be at the rate of \$240 per annum, and at the rate of \$192 per annum for the third and each subsequent child.
