## Peace Treaty Motion Comes Before Canadian Parliament And is Discussed by Members

**Sir Robert Borden says that Defeat of Treaty would mean Defeat of his Government; Not likely to be Opposition Unless it is to League of Nations Covenant.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Ottawa, Sept. 3.—The debate on the address opened in the House of Commons yesterday, but quickly gave way to a discussion of the treaty of peace.  
 Sir Robert Borden, by unanimous consent, presented a motion for the ratification of the treaty with the accompanying covenant of the league of nations and the labor conventions.  
 Hon. W. S. Fielding, who has now taken the seat immediately to the left of that to be occupied by W. L. Mackenzie King, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's old seat, wanted to know what would be the effect if Canada refused to ratify the treaty.  
 Sir Robert Borden sharply replied that it would mean the defeat of the Government presenting the treaty for ratification and that Fielding and his colleagues would be called upon to take their seats on the treasury benches, if Canada stood out from a treaty assented to by the rest of the Empire.  
 Although there will be discussion on the general principle, in the event of there being any opposition it is likely to centre around the treaty of the league of nations covenant. Under this the members of the league undertake "to respect and preserve against extreme aggression the integrity and independence of the members of the league politically."

## PETROGRAD IS BEING FREED FROM TYRANNY

**British Army Close to City and Will send Food When It is Taken.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Berlin, Sept. 3.—General reports in Riga indicate that the British army will soon be in Petrograd and that an attack is being made by forces which are only a mile from the city. The reports quote a proclamation which has been issued which says: "As soon as Petrograd is taken from Bolshevik tyranny, food will be sent."  
 The Chatauqua Festival will be held here on September 9.

## SALMON TREATY SIGNED BY U. S.

**is Negotiated between Great Britain and States for Protection of Fraser River Fish.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Washington, Sept. 3.—The treaty between the United States and Great Britain for the protection of the sockeye salmon of the Fraser River system has been signed; Secretary Lansing for the United States, and R. C. Lindsey, in charge of the British Embassy, and Chief Justice John Douglas Hazen of Canada for the British Government.  
 The treaty makes it possible to control the fishing on both sides of the boundary line and thus give the sockeye a chance to get to the headwaters of the river to spawn.

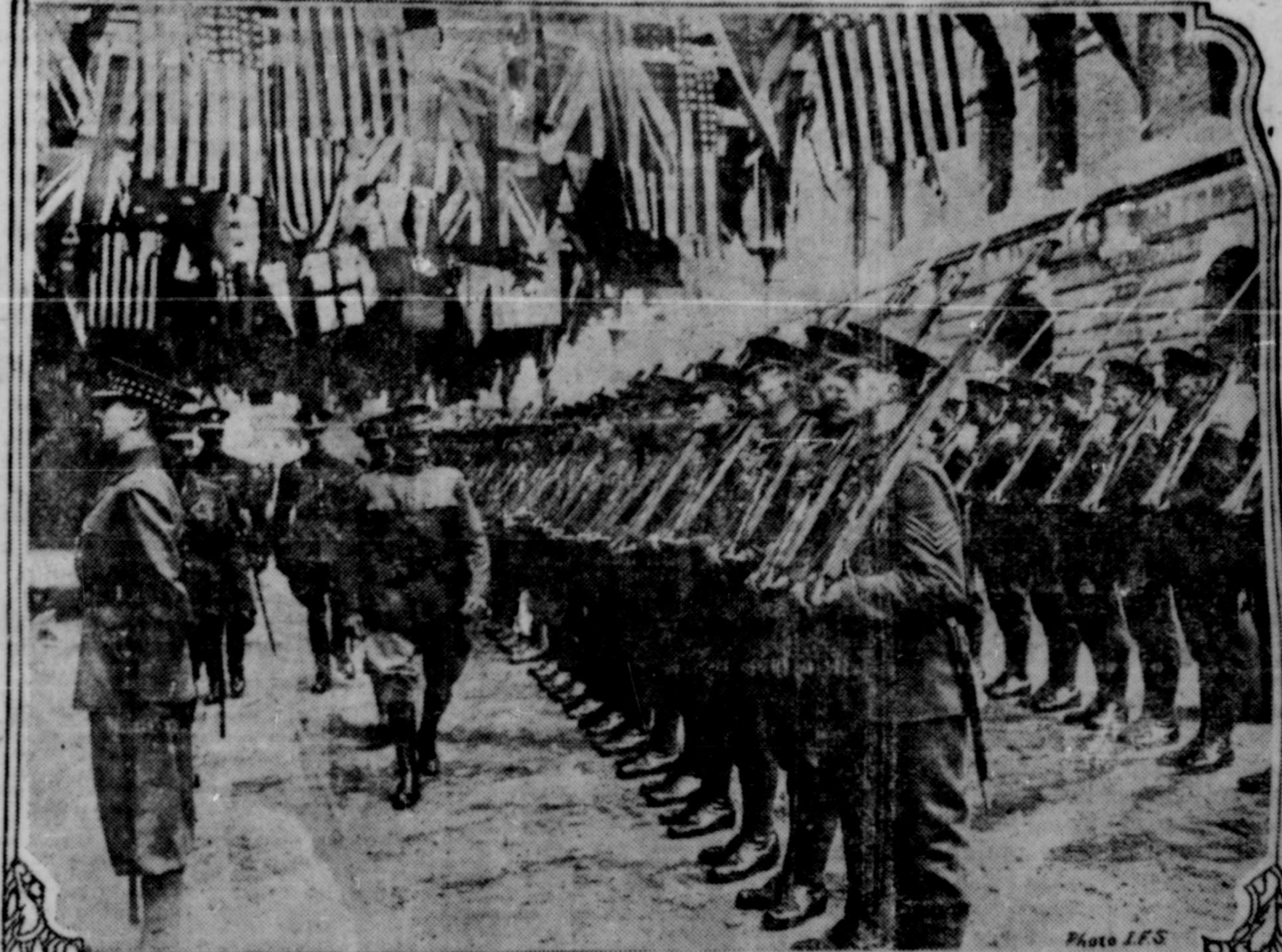
**Advertising Man Tells of Some of the Things They Saw on Their Trip West.**

 All we want is the people and the money in order to make a great country of this," said R. C. W. Lett, industrial and colonization agent for the G. T. P. who is in the city. "We already have the resources. Take Terrace as an instance. Berries from there were on the market at Edmonton and they were better than any that could be bought. They would have been ordered by the car load if they could supply the whole country with the best of strawberries long after the Hood River berries have gone."  
 Mr. Lett came in from the east with W. C. Riddell, head of the G. T. P. advertising department. They are going south on the next steamer tomorrow night.  
 Speaking of the tour that they have just taken, they told of the wonderful Mount Robson Park across the river from the railway, where only a bridge was needed to give the public one of the finest playgrounds in the world. No one could believe the beauties of this park unless he had seen it, they said. It is a provincial government park but as yet it is wholly undeveloped.  
 A hotel is also badly needed in Mount Robson Park but it cannot be erected until such time as the bridge is built, so that it may be said the building of the bridge means the beginning of the development of one of the finest bits of Canada.  
 Messrs. Riddell and Lett made calls at various points along the line. They stopped at the Little Lake Manitou, noted for its mineral springs, at Wainwright where there is a fine herd of buffalo and elk, at Jasper, of which Prince Rupert people have already heard a good deal, at Prince George where they saw big English cherries that made the mouth water only to see them, at Vanderhoof where there were immense vegetables, and at Terrace where the fruit is always attractive.  
 "California has nothing to show like British Columbia," said Mr. Riddell, "and people are now coming to realize that along this central part of the province is the finest scenery and the best land there is."

## LABOR WILL DISCUSS RIGHT TO ORGANIZE

**Round Table Conference With President Wilson—25 Charters Revoked.**  
 Washington, Sept. 3.—The right to organize and bargain collectively with respect to wages and working conditions will be discussed at a round table conference to be called by President Wilson, labor leaders here say.  
 Springfield, Sept. 3.—The charters of 25 local miners' unions in Illinois have been revoked by President Frank Arrington, of the state mines organization.

## MANY PUPILS IN SCHOOLS

**New Room Opened in High School, New Room at Seal Cove and Another Down Town.**  
 At a special meeting of the school board last night it was decided to open a new room at the Seal Cove School, and another new room down town if a suitable place can be secured for the purpose. A new room has already been opened at the high school so that it is clear that the people were justified in voting for the new school building.  
 While it is impossible to tell exactly how many pupils will be attending school this term, the number to date including high school is nearly 670, as against 560 last year, a clear indication that the population is increasing. A number of children arrived on the steamer this morning, thus adding to the number. The board now has every available room filled and will have two rooms rented down town and in the near future it is expected that a third will have to be secured.

## GENERAL SCHEME OF GRADING THE CITY

A general estimate for rough grading the whole of the city was presented to the City Council last night in a communication from the city engineer. For several months past the engineer has been busy engaged on a general plan of grading which it is proposed to adopt and the estimate for the whole of sections 2, 5, 6, 7 and 8 amounts to something like four million dollars. It is not proposed to do this work all at once, but as needed from time to time.  
 The report was laid on the table for a week.

## HOUSING STILL IS BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL

**Delay Not at This End, Says the Mayor—Dozen Houses are Now Going Up.**  
 That a dozen houses are under way under the Dominion housing plan and that it is not the fault of the city that delays have occurred was stated by Mayor McClymont at the meeting of the City Council last night. Everyone was agreed that there had been delays but all were pretty well agreed that they had not been at this end.  
 Alderman Perry moved a resolution providing for the dismissal of the Housing Committee and the submission of the whole question to the committee of the whole council. This followed the reading of a letter from the B. C. Soldier Settlement Board dealing with the agreement which had been drawn up and submitted to Victoria. Several small points had not been covered and one or two minor amendments had been asked.  
 Alderman McRae took the motion of Alderman Perry's as a censure on the committee.  
 The mayor further explained that the delay had been partly owing to the soldiers themselves not filing their plans. Also there had been delays in securing Government lots.  
 Alderman Casey explained that he was unable to attend the meetings and moved that Alderman Perry take his place on the committee. This the alderman refused to do, stating that he al-

## STEAMER B. X. STRUCK ROCK

**Famous Fraser River Boat Goes to Bottom After Passengers are Ashore.**  
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Vancouver, September 3.—The steamer B. X. on the Fraser river was lost on Saturday afternoon near Woodricker Island, half way between Prince George and Quesnel. There were no casualties.  
 The vessel was on the way down the river when she struck a rock. She was immediately run ashore and beached and after the passengers had been got ashore drifted into deep water and sank.

## HOTEL VANCOUVER, RUSSIAN CONSULATE INVOLVED IN PLOT

## FEW GET NAMES ON VOTERS' LIST

Plenty of Officials Ready to Serve Those Who Wish to Register.

Those who wish to vote at the next general election and who are not already on the list of voters should see that they are registered at once or they will find themselves disfranchised when the time comes. There are hundreds of people living here who are not on the voters' list and who would like to vote, but they will not be able to do so unless they take steps to register. Some of the labor men have registered, but not many of the newer arrivals have placed their names on the list.

There is some little doubt in the minds of many as to where they may register. Among those who are authorized to receive applications and who should carry the proper forms for the purpose are every justice of the peace, the mayor, any of the aldermen, the postmaster, the registrar of titles, every notary public, provincial constable, assessor, mining recorder, judge, stipendiary magistrate, municipal clerk, assessor, Indian agent, registrar of voters, and those commissioners especially appointed for the purpose. With such a multitude of officials ready to act, there should be no difficulty in getting on the list.

J. H. McMulvin is the official collector and all applications are forwarded to him on their completion.

## BIG GUNS ARE NOW COMPLETE

Built by Vickers for the British Government and Expected to Carry 75 Miles.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 2.—Two unique guns have been completed by the Vickers Co. to the order of the British Government. These two cannon are unique. They are really the standard naval 12-inch guns reduced to 8-inch by inserting interior linings in the bores. They will fire special streamer shells, so shaped as to avoid air friction and secure smooth rotation and even flight, and the range is expected to be at least 75 miles.

These guns were ordered by Mr. Churchill when he was in charge of munitions, and were not approved by military authorities in France, partly owing to the difficulty of transport, the guns and special mountings being very heavy and bulky, and partly because no adequate military results were foreseen.

From the military point of view the killing in Paris of a few people by long-range freak shell fire was negligible. But from an expert ballistic and artillery point of view, the new weapon will be of supreme interest. In a short time there will also be completed several 18-inch howitzers of terrific power.

**ONE BIG UNION IS HEARD FROM AT THE COUNCIL MEETING**

A letter writtlen by J. H. Burrows, secretary of the One Big Union, to the City Council and read last night drew attention to the large number of accidents at the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills of late and stated that in two cases where death had resulted no inquests had been held. It requested that the Council take action with a view to securing an inquiry into the cause of the accidents and the establishment of preventive measures.  
The letter was ordered to be forwarded to the Provincial Government agent with a request for information.

**LETTERS AND CHECKS BACK FROM THE SEA**

The mail which went down on the S. S. Princess Sophia on the voyage from Skagway, October 24, 1918, has been recovered and forwarded to its original destination. A day or two ago Stewart & Mobley received a registered letter containing checks to the amount of \$4,600 which had gone down on the ill fated ship. They were forwarded by F. H. Mobley Co., of Atlin to Stewart & Mobley of Prince Rupert, and were all in good condition.

It was rather badly obliterated although the address on the envelope was not much injured. As soon as the agent heard of the ship going down he forwarded duplicate copies which were duly published last autumn.

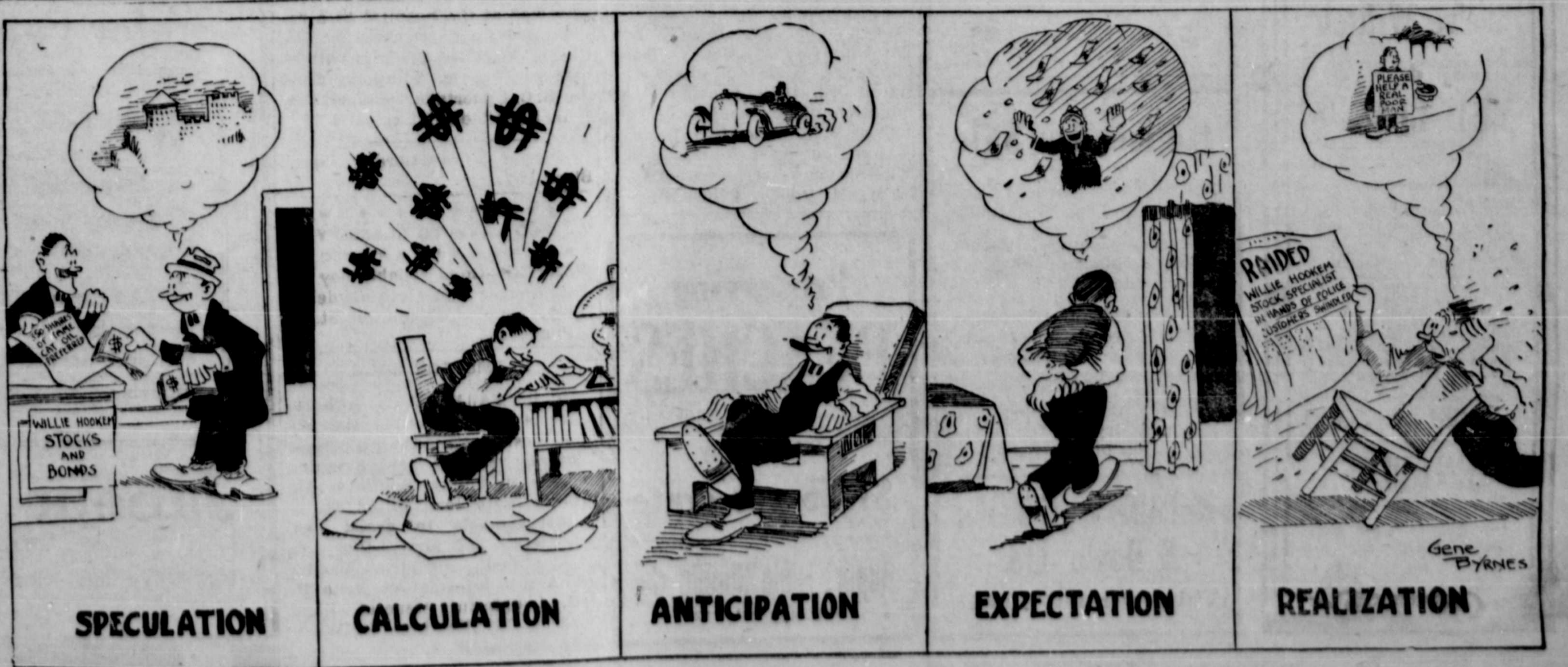
