Ottawa, Sept. 3 .- The debate on the address opened in the louse of Commons yesterday, but quickly gave way to a discusion of the treaty of peace.

Sir Robert Borden, by unanimous consent, presented a motion or the ratification of the treaty with the accompanying covenant f the league of nations and the labor conventions.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, who has now taken the seat immediately the left of that to be occupied by W. L. Mackenzie King, Sir Vilfrid Laurier's old seat, wanted to know what would be the ffect if Canada refused to ratify the treaty.

Sir Robert Borden sharply replied that it would mean the efeat of the Government presenting the treaty for ratification nd that Fielding and his colleagues would be called upon to take heir seats on the treasury benches, if Canada stood out from a reaty assented to by the rest of the Empire.

Although there will be discussion on the general principle, in e event of there being any opposition it is likely to centre around e treaty of the league of nations covenant. Under this the embers of the league undertake "to respect and preserve as ainst extreme aggression the integrity and independence of e members of the league politically."

Speaking of the tour that they have just taken, they told of the wonderful Mount Robson Park across the river from the railway, where only a bridge was needed to give the public one of the finest playgrounds in the world. Easy Matter to Become a Voter.

Nothing is more disappointing than to find on election day that a person is unable to vote just because he has neglected to register. It is so easy to put the name on the list that it is often neglected. All that is necessary is to stop some official in the midst of his already heavy duties, listen to his expletives for a few minutes and then insist that he get in a stock of forms so Re Application No. 11,044-I. File 6,198. Sundays p. m. that when you come around next time he will be prepared to take your affidavit and place you on the list.

In the less civilized parts of the province where the people herd together in large numbers, those wishing to register have been sent from pillar to post until tired of the game of hunting for an official with the requisite blank forms and the time to take the affidavit, they have given it up and decided not to vote at all. Here, however, everything is different. All the officials in the city from the mayor down, are well supplied with the requisite forms so that there is no excuse for not being on the list. We and to the following extract therefrom: do not know this from experience but knowing the officials and their anxiety to do their duty we feel certain that they are so anxious to receive applicants.

It is customary for the political parties to be well represented in the matter of commissioners and usually there is at least one of the number that has the forms and knows how to fill them out. If that one will notify the Daily News, we shall be glad to publish the name for the benefit of those who wish to become voters. We should like to have the name of a labor, liberal, conservative and unionist commissioner, so that every affiliation, if there are such here, may be provided for.

We have known it so easy to become a voter in this province that hundreds of men, who had never seen a commissioner, found their names on the list, their oaths having been taken by proxy apparently. There are usually plenty of dead men on the list. It would be a treat for Prince Rupert to be the one city in the province with a real live list.

Another Small Step In Port Development.

FEW GET NAMES ON VOTERS' LIST

Plenty of Officials Ready to Serve Those Who Wish to Register.

Those who wish to vote at the next general election and who are not already on the list of voters should see that they are registered at once or they will find themselves disfranchised when the time comes. There are hundreds of people living here who are not on the voters' list and who would like to vote, but they will not be able to do so unless they take steps to register. Some of the labor men have registered, but not many of the newer arrivals have placed their names on the list.

There is some little doubt in the minds of many as to where they may register. Among those who are authorized to receive applications and who should carry the proper forms for the purpose are every justice of the peace, the mayor, any of the aldermen, the postmaster, the registrar of titles, every notary public, provincial constable, assessor, mining recorder, judge, stipendiary magistrate, municipal clerk, assessor, Indian agent, registrar of voters, and those commissioners especially appointed for the purpose. With such a multitude of officials ready to act, there should be no difficulty in getting on the list.




