Baron Fisher Would Scrap Half of British Navy which He Says is of Little Value

Now that Germany is Defeated former First Sea Lord thinks A Big Navy is no Longer Required; Experts Suggest That Proposal is much too Drastic.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 London, Sept. 4.—Baron Fisher of Kilverstone, former First Sea Lord, demands that half the navy be virtually scrapped on the ground that it is obsolete and of little value.
 Baron Fisher says that now that Germany is defeated and her navy destroyed a big navy is no longer required.
 Naturally the demand of a man in such high standing as Fisher has created a great sensation here. Naval experts, while agreeing that some of the naval vessels are obsolete, consider the proposal much too drastic.
 On the other hand there is a big section of the people of Great Britain that favors a commencement in retrenchment at once, in order to help solve the financial situation.

STEAMER LINE FROM EUROPE TO THIS COAST

Monthly Service Arranged With Vessels of 6,000 Tons From France, Norway and England.

 London, Sept. 4.—It is announced by the Agent General for British Columbia that arrangements have been completed with the Johnson Line for a monthly steamer service with 6,000 ton vessels between Havre, Christiania and British ports on one side and British Columbia on the other.
 This move is regarded as an attempt to force Alberta wheat through Pacific ports which can be done at a rate only half that paid by the railway by way of Montreal.

CHARGED WITH SELLING "KICK"

W. H. Malkin & Co., it is Alleged, Illegally Sold Ginger and Other Extracts Contrary to Act.

 Vancouver, Sept. 4.—A charge of violating the Prohibition Act has been laid against W. H. Malkin & Co. by R. H. Young, secretary of the Campaigners of the Great War. He alleges the sale of ginger essence and other extracts containing alcohol and used by drinkers to put kick into near beer.
 The case is attracting much attention.

ALL MOTOR CARS MUST HAVE LIGHTS

Several Fined in Police Court Today for Not Having Tail Lights.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMorde, Fred Scadden, Tony Stino, Wilson Wong, K. A. Rood and C. H. Thomas were each fined \$5 for failing to display a red light visible from the rear end of their cars. The police are out after all culprits and there are a number of other cars about the city which have no lights, but have not been caught moving about at night.
 The long dark evenings will soon be here and it is insisted that every precaution be taken.
 The case of E. J. Butler who appeared on the same charge has been adjourned until tomorrow.
 S. R. Lawrence appeared on the charge of breaking the city bylaw No. 13. He had permitted on his premises an artifice for sewage which was a nuisance to the public. Evidence for the prosecution was furnished by W. Martin, Mrs. Richmond and A. Montesuma. A fine of ten dollars was imposed.

ALBERTA PRICES MOVE DOWNWARD

Edmonton, Sept. 4.—A dollar a bushel is not considered an exorbitant price for new potatoes on the Rice street market and a large quantity was purchased at that price. In this commodity the price may be considered a pre war price and there will likely be a gradual decrease. There is a plentiful supply in the district. All other vegetables remain correspondingly normal in price and are at their best at this season of the year.
 In the butter and egg section prices are still high, butter bringing 55 cents a pound and eggs 60c a dozen. Dressed spring chicken sold at 38 to 45 cents a pound and ducks at 35c a pound. Nice leads of corn sold at 40 cents a dozen and pickling onions in abundance sold at 20 cents a pound.
 Inquiries in the meat department with reference to the recent fall in hog stockyard prices revealed the fact that there was no appreciable decline in the prices in this line though beef prices were a little easier.

MRS. E. SANDERSON DIES AT SIMPSON

Passed Away in Hospital After Long Illness—Was Well Known Throughout District.

After years of painful illness, the death of Mrs. E. Sanderson, wife of Captain Ted Sanderson of the "Geo. E. Foster," occurred last evening at Port Simpson hospital. Mrs. Sanderson had been in failing health for some years past and had been in Port Simpson Hospital since May of this year, where it was hoped that she would benefit by the change. Lately, however, the patient gradually got weaker and passed peacefully away last night.
 Mrs. Sanderson came west from the old country in 1914 to join Captain Sanderson and is survived by two daughters, who are married in England; her eldest daughter having died in Dublin only last year. She was well known throughout the district and will be missed.

P. G. E. MAY GO TO HAZELTON, ACCORDING VICTORIA NEWSPAPER

As the result of a trip of inspection which Premier Oliver, who is accompanied by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, and Chief Engineer Proctor, will make over the Pacific Great Eastern line, it may be that some marked changes in the route of the line north of Quesnel will be made, says the Victoria Colonist. The party left yesterday afternoon and will go straight through to the end of steel at Williams Lake, where rapid work is being made in track-laying by the Northern Construction Company, which now has about 500 men on the job and is laying steel at the rate of about a mile and one-half a day.
 The original route of the line from Quesnel northerly followed the Fraser River to Prince George but subsequent information gained has indicated that that route can be improved upon. It has even been suggested that it would be better not to run the line to Prince George, but rather to connect with the G. T. P. either at Vanderhoof or even at Hazelton, a route leading to those points traversing sections of undoubted agricultural value and making of the line a greater settlement proposition than if the original route were held to. There has been considerable agitation in the northern section to have a new route followed on the northern portion of the line.
 As a result of the trip it will be possible for the government directors to formulate a program of work for next year, as the present contract being executed by the Northern Construction will be completed within the next month or two.

SUNDAY CONCERTS BY SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

It is the intention of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra this winter to give a series of Sunday evening concerts. The orchestra has been making great progress throughout the summer. The members have been working very hard and expect to be ready to give their first concert in the very near future.

British Seaplane Crossed to Norway

Flew from Felixstowe to Christiansand and Continued by easy Stages to Several other Cities a Total Distance Of 2450 Sea Miles.

 London, Sept. 4.—The Air Ministry states that a flying boat of the Royal Air Force, started from Felixstowe and proceeding by way of Dundee, flew direct to Norway and landed at Christiansand. This is the first occasion that the journey has been accomplished by a British seaplane.
 The trip was continued by easy stages to Christiania, Copenhagen, Stockholm, Gossburg, Esbjerg and back to Felixstowe, a total distance of 2,450 sea miles covered in a total flying time of 40 hours and 40 minutes.

OPPOSITIONS ASK FOR MORE INFORMATION

Liberals in Caucus at Ottawa Decide to Help Expedite Business.

 Ottawa, Sept. 4.—The members of the opposition of both houses of parliament have been in caucus here to discuss the attitude they should adopt to the Peace Treaty and the League of Nations Covenant.
 At the conclusion of the gathering a statement was handed out to the effect that while the work of the session should be expedited the country was entitled to more explicit information from the Prime Minister as to the obligations contracted by Canada in the League of Nations.

SIFTON GETS PORTFOLIO OF PUBLIC WORKS

Former Premier of Alberta Promoted in Borden Cabinet, Leaving Vacancy.

 Ottawa, Sept. 4.—Hon. A. L. Sifton, minister of customs and inland revenue in the Borden Government, has been sworn in as Minister of Public Works in succession to F. B. Carvell who was recently appointed chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners.

Mr. Sifton was for several years premier of Alberta. He is a son of Hon. John W. Sifton, formerly speaker of the Manitoba Assembly, and is a brother of Sir Clifford Sifton. He was a member of the assembly of the North West Territories previous to the formation of the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan.
 The position which he leaves will be a vacancy until his successor is announced.

HART AND M'LEAN ARE EXPECTED HERE

Two More Ministers of the Crown Will Probably Visit the District.

Two more provincial ministers are expected to visit Prince Rupert next week. Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, and Dr. McLean, minister of education, are both expected next week, although definite arrangements have not yet been made. It will be a holiday trip but with the double purpose of enjoying an outing and of posting themselves on the progress the newer part of the province is making. This has become a custom with provincial ministers.

PRINCE OF WALES SHAKES TOO MUCH

Fall Session. Is Expensive.

It was necessary that there should be a fall session of Parliament, but it might have been an adjourned session. That would have answered the purpose and would have saved the country money in several ways. In the first place there would have been no second indemnity for the members. As it is, however, they earned their indemnity when the house closed and they will get another for this extra session. We are not sure what the indemnity is but we believe it to be \$3,000. That doubled makes a nice little thing for war times. It is one of the privileges of democratic governments.

A somewhat similar condition arose at Victoria, but there the government declared that the indemnity of \$1,800 was enough for one year and instead of closing the session they adjourned it and there was no second cheque for the members.

Another saving in having an adjourned session rather than a new one is in the matter of time. There is no speech from the throne at an adjourned session with the consequent interminable debate about nothing in particular. Members have to talk about something when they talk. That, of course is a hardship.

Snobbery Feared At B. C.'s Capital.

The people of Victoria are much perturbed over who is to meet the Prince of Wales when he comes there. At a recent meeting Col. Lorne Ross voiced the fear that he would be monopolized by the social set and that the real people would not catch a glimpse of him. It was also suggested that he be provided with a horse to ride so that he might not be whisked away beyond the speed limit in the Lieut.-Governor's auto.

There will undoubtedly be many heart-burnings over who is who and why. The Prince himself has expressed the wish to have all functions open to the public, but unfortunately there are no buildings large enough to accommodate the crowds. This is another of the little difficulties caused by our democratic spirit.

Brewery Has at Last Been Caught.

The Silverspring Brewery has been fined for selling beer that was found to contain four and a half per cent alcohol. Hitherto it has been the retailer who has had to pay such fines. The local police commissioners recommended to the prohibition commissioner that he should get busy and see that the retailers were protected by making the manufacturer live up to the law. He has been a long time doing anything, considering the flagrant breaches of the law which have been apparent to everyone but a government official. It is satisfactory, however, that at last some action has been taken.

The News believes that all should be treated alike in matters of this kind. Hitherto it has been the retailer who has had to pay fines, often for no fault of his own. The place to deal with this overproof question is certainly at the fountain head, where the stuff is made.

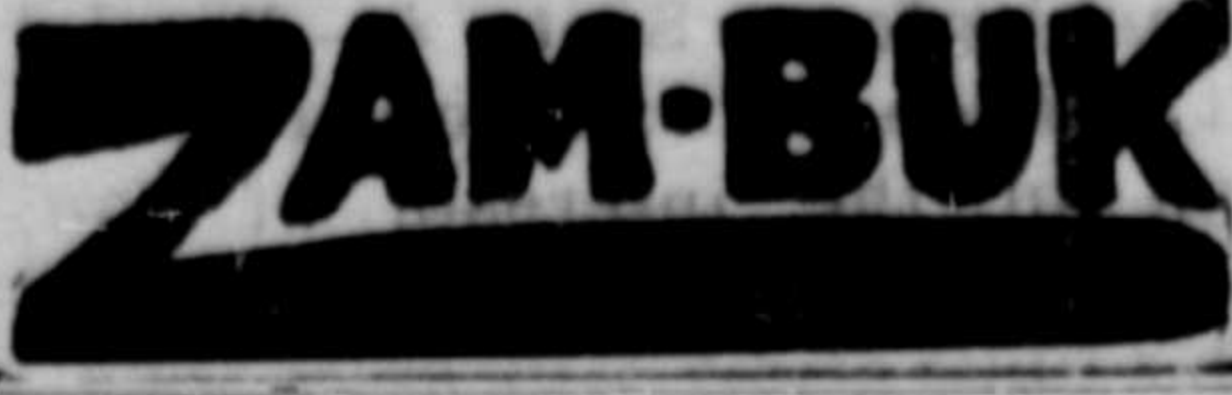

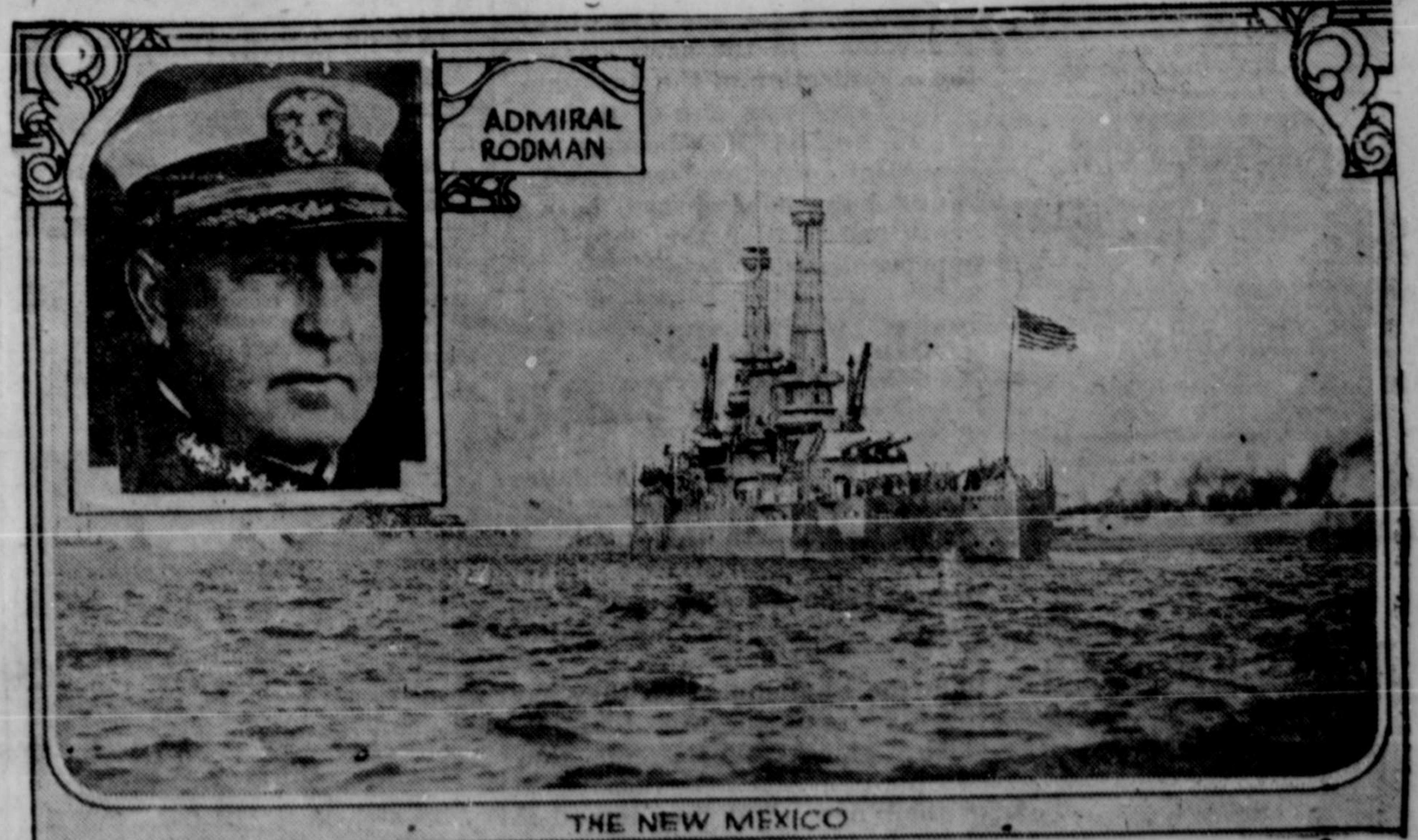

FLAGSHIP OF PACIFIC FLEET ROCKED BY QUAKE



Six dreadnaughts of the Pacific fleet were shaken severely by a double earthquake shock twenty miles off the coast of the State of Colima, Mexico. None of the war ships reported any damage. The New Mexico trembled from bow to stern as if she had struck an uncharted reef, and the navigating officer sounded "Collision Quarters" on the flagship's siren. Sailors in the foretop said the basket masts of the war ship swayed like poplar trees in a gale. Officers on the quarterdeck hurried to their stations and the crew and the marines took their places. Men-while all watertight compartments on the New Mexico were closed and inspection parties were sent into the holds to see if there had been any damage to the hull. Admiral Hugh Rodman, commanding the fleet, quickly recognized the cause of the disturbance. "It's an earthquake," he said. "We are right off the coast of Colima, where there are many earthquakes." Then, turning to Commander Brainard, he ordered: "Signal all ships in the fleet and see if they felt any excessive vibration." The stout Yankee ship weathered the disturbance, however.

WILL INVESTIGATE MUNICIPAL FINANCE

Hon. John Hart Taking Steps to Get into Closer Touch With Problem.

Municipal delegations galore have appeared before the Provincial Cabinet during the last two years, virtually demanding legislation towards providing additional sources of municipal revenue, says the Victoria Times. Not a little persuasion has been employed to convince the Government that it should share some of its revenue with the municipalities. Enterprises launched in boom times, when a new country's natural optimism has occasionally dwarfed better judgment, have gradually reacted with the inevitable result. While this has been true of municipalities, it was also true of the government of the province, although in the latter case the rehabilitation of provincial credit has proceeded apace during the last eighteen months. Nevertheless, British Columbia's finances have not yet recuperated sufficiently to permit of the extension of relief from the public treasury to the municipalities.

Questionnaire Issued.

On this account, and in pursuance of his promise made some time ago to investigate the whole subject of municipal financing, the Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, has prepared a form of questionnaire which is to be sent to every municipality in the province.

In brief, the form is designed to ask for every conceivable financial detail related to the government of each individual municipality. With the form will go a request that the questionnaire be filled up and returned to Mr. Hart on or before September 15. It is then the Minister's intention to give due notice of sittings which will be held in the cities of Vancouver and Victoria during the month of October at which representatives from every municipality in the Province of British Columbia will be permitted to plead the case of his own community.

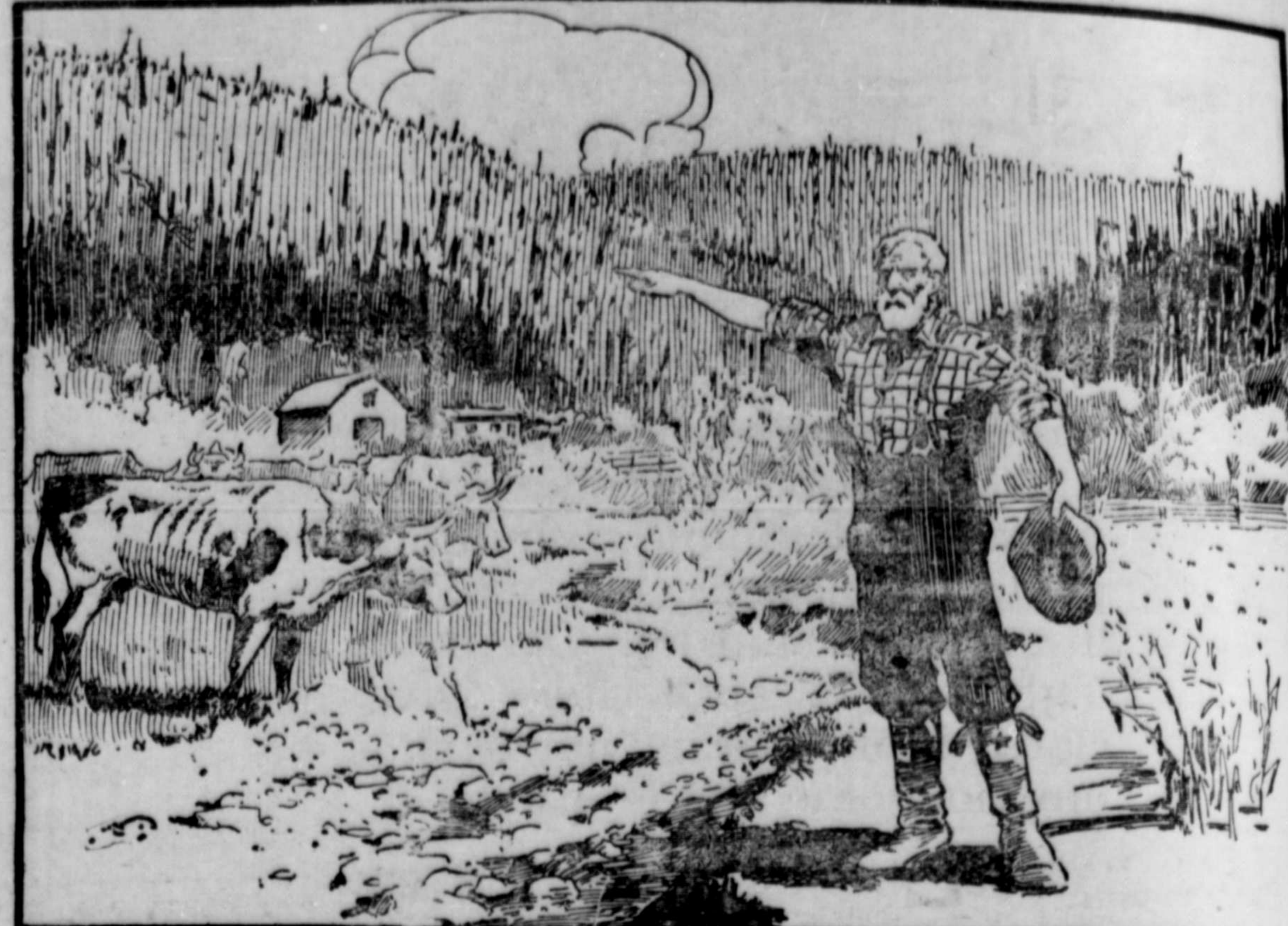

MEMBER SEES MUCH PROGRESS IN DISTRICT

Alex. M. Manson, M. P. P. Makes Tour Through His Constituency and Notes Improvements.

"The Land Settlement Board has established new areas at Smithers and Evelyn Lake and is about to establish an area at Francois Lake," reports Alex. M. Manson, M. P. P., who has made an extended trip through the country and returned much pleased with what he saw. He says that the original purchaser for speculation in still a nuisance in many cases and is holding up development. In other cases the owners are doing good work in bringing in real farmers who are buying the lands and cultivating them. The Land Settlement scheme has had a good effect, not only in putting men on the land, but in inducing others to do the same. The result is there is such an era of prosperity in the valleys to the east along the G. T. P. as has never before been seen. There has been an increase in the number of schools from 28 to 57 in the northern district and of teachers from 47 to 82 and this is a fair indication of the progress. No less than ten new schools were authorized in the month of June.

Interested in Progress.

Mr. Manson went east with Dr. King, minister of public works in the Oliver Government. They left the train at Hazelton and drove in an auto to Burns Lake. He reports that the minister was keenly interested in the progress that had been made and had an eye for the needs of the settlers along the route. He expressed himself as satisfied that the large appropriations for that district were warranted.

From Burns Lake the minister went on to Prince George and the Cariboo, while Mr. Manson continued his drive south to Francois and Ootsa Lake and along the north shore to Wistaria, and then to Houston and Telkwa. The trip he says was a pioneer one for an automobile and the little Ford negotiated it without the assistance of baling wire or other outside aid. The whole journey was over the road and a great portion of it had never heard the throb of an auto before.

Rapid Progress.

Mr. Manson says that he found settlement in rapid progress and all along the route were parties of land seekers attracted by the fame of the pea vine and the vetch which grows so abundantly there. The district has its future in stock raising, dairying and mixed farming.

In the Bulkley a large number of soldiers have taken up land and they seemed to be making excellent headway. In most cases they are real farmers.

Mr. Manson attended the barbecue at Telkwa which he says was a great success. Many new faces were conspicuous.

Another trip is planned by the member in the near future with two other ministers of the crown.

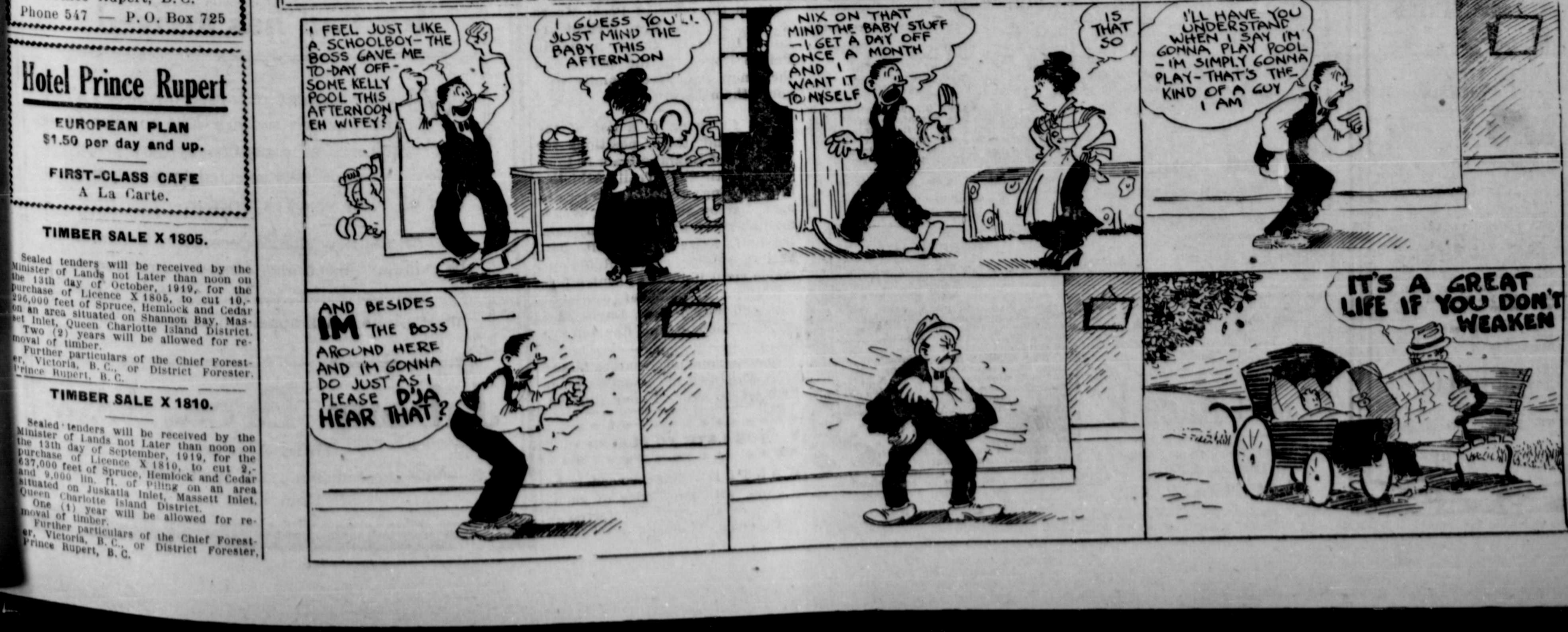
