Dominion Government will Set Prices of all Foods: Discussion in Parliament

The firm Handling of Profiteers is Demanded; Connor says * That Investigation will be made in all Lines And Profits will be Fixed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Sept. 6 .- The Dominion Government has decided to fix the prices at which commodities can be sold. That is the latest announcement in regard to the regulation of prices.

"It means that we will fix the profits on everything, just as on sugar," said W. F. Connor, vice-chairman of the Board of commerce when asked the exact portent of the announcement that the Board would make a series of inquiries and afterwards fix the scale of profits, to exceed which will be an offense under heavy penalty. "All who disobey the order are liable to a fine of 1,000 a day or to imprisonment."



Ratify Treaty

Without Delay. Perhaps by the time this appears in print the Canadian Parliament will have ratified the Peace Treaty. We believe they should know what they are ratifying before they take action, but we do not think they should delay. This treaty has been made by the best minds of the British Empire and representatives of the Canadian Government were present and took part in the proceedings. It is for us to ratify it as speedily as possible and thus show that we have confidence in the statesmen who have carried us through so many crises. With men like Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Wilson in consultation, it is hardly for the Canadian Parliament to quibble over little things. The men at the top had all the facts before them. They had all the difficulties to overcome and there is nothing for Canada to do but acquiesce cheerfully.
