Fishing Boat Alameda Went Down in Hecate Straits and Crew had a Narrow Escape

Three Men Rowed for Eighteen Hours in Small Skiff and Were Finally Picked up by Trolling Boat. Lost 15,000 lbs. of Halibut as well as boat No Insurance.

On Saturday evening at eight o'clock the fishing boat Alameda foundered in Hecate Straits. The crew had time to get off in their small skiff and on being picked up by a troller were brought to Dundas Harbor where they were transferred to the boat Vesta which brought them in this morning. The three men, Hans Tiedman (captain), Percy W. James and Louis Sivertsen, had rather harrowing experiences while in the open skiff and are very glad to have returned to port in safety.

At the time of the disaster the Alameda was returning to port with about 15,000 lbs. of halibut for the Sunday market. Suddenly she began to sink at the stern and it was seen that a plank must have sprung as the water very quickly crept up on the decks, which were littered with fish. The springing of a plank seems to be the only cause of the accident as the boat was making good headway in calm water and no rock was hit but suddenly started to sink.

Percy James realized the danger and ran aft, cutting the lashings of the skiff. When launching the small craft into the water it was seen that it was leaking badly so after the other two got into it he returned to the big vessel and got a buoy keg which they might use for bailing. By the time he got it, the Alameda was sinking fast and he had to swim to reach the skiff.

This was about twenty miles off Zayas Island and to this refuge they started rowing. One had the oars and the other two were kept busy bailing out the water. From Zayas they turned in the direction of North Dundas and a short time after were picked up by a troller which brought them round to Dundas harbor. Here they transferred to the Vesta.

The fishermen were eighteen hours in the small skiff and were decidedly fagged out when picked up. On reaching port today their clothes were rather dishevelled and they had a dejected appearance of having endured rough experiences.

Hans Tiedman has been fishing out of this port for a number of years and following his release from military service with the U.S. army returned here and bought the Alameda from Steve Pelleg. The boat was 43 feet long and has seen considerable service out of this port for four or five years. The total loss including the value of the catch is estimated by Hans at \$6,000 and there is no insurance covering the accident. All three are American fishermen and the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union has wired the news of the accident to Seattle and also the good news of the safe return of the unfortunates.

MANY CANNERY MANAGERS HERE

A number of cannerymen arrived in the city this morning, among them being J. G. Dorpan of Claxton, A. P. Gurd of Skeena, E. Hillman of Balmoral, A. L. Carter of Oceanic, Harry McCouper and E. M. Ural of Balmoral, E. A. Taylor of Port Essington and R. W. Sinclair of Inverness.

Owing to the small tides last week the fishing was very poor but it is expected that there will be a pretty good run of cohoes and chums on the big tides this week. After that a good many of the canneries will close for the season.

The season on the whole has been a good one.

Many Victims of Brutality Found by The Roumanians

Priest Crucified Before his Church; Others Starved to Death; Many Bodies of Victims found beneath Parliament Buildings.

 Geneva, Sept. 8.—The Roumanian bureau at Berne states that the Roumanian troops after their entry into Budapest, discovered 270 bodies of victims of the communists under the Parliament buildings. Among champagne bottles in a factory, sixty more bodies were discovered, while in a Catholic monastery eighty priests, who had been imprisoned and starved to death, were found.

The worst case of communist brutality found was that of the celebrated Magyar priest named Hoch who was found crucified before his church.

RETURNED MEN DEMAND \$2,000 FOR GRATUITY

Hold Big Meetings at Toronto and Agree Not to Accept a Less Amount.

 Toronto, Sept. 8.—Urgently demanding that a gratuity of \$2,000 be paid to every returned man, a crowd of 5,000 returned soldiers gathered in Queens Park and pledged themselves to "sleep, eat and drink gratuity" until the Dominion Government granted their demands. The crowd agreed not to accept anything less than this sum since a compromise would show weakness.

The benefits mentioned on the placard calling the meeting was a smaller one. The notice advised soldiers to proceed to the Queens Park meeting with rifles and bayonets. Whether or not this was meant seriously, it was not followed.

ADMINISTRATOR FOR GERMAN AFRICA IS SIR HORACE BYATT

 London, Sept. 8.—Sir Horace Byatt, administrator for German East Africa, is leaving England in a few days for Dar-es-Salaam, which will be the new headquarters under direction of the League of Nations.

The necessity for developing the former German colony to the utmost is fully realized. The old German army has melted away and the Askaris have returned to their villages.

Dar-es-Salaam is a seaport close to the British island of Zanzibar.

COBALT STRIKE IS SETTLED AT LAST

BARON CHARLES BERESFORD DIES

Famous Admiral Passes at Age of 73 Years From Apoplexy.

 London, Sept. 8.—Admiral Baron Charles Beresford died yesterday while on a visit to the Duke of Portland at Langwell, Caithness, Scotland, as a result of an attack of apoplexy.

Beresford, who is better known as Lord Charles, was created a baron by King George in 1915. He assumed the title of Baron Beresford of Metemes and Curraghmore.

Born in 1846, the son of the fourth Marquis of Waterford, the admiral had a varied and distinguished career. He did good service at Alexandria and was on Lord Wolseley's staff in the Nile expedition. He has done a great deal of fighting and was generally looked on as the most popular man in the navy. He commanded the channel fleet from 1907 to 1909, and was elected to represent Portsmouth in the Imperial Parliament in 1910.

AUSTRIA VOTES FOR THE TREATY

German Nationalists Oppose and Others Protest Against Its Provisions.

 Vienna, Sept. 8.—The National Assembly, by a vote of 97 to 23, decided to sign the Peace Treaty. The Assembly protested against the violation of Austria's right of the free disposal of persons.

The German nationalists voted against signing the treaty and some of the members of the Tyrolese party abdicated.

PEACE WITH BOLSHEVIKS

Conference Between Them and Estonians to be Opened on Wednesday Next.

 London, Sept. 8.—There is likely to be peace between the Bolsheviks of Russia and the Estonians. As a result of a suggestion from the former, a peace conference is to be held at Phlov. The proceedings will commence on Wednesday next, delegates from each side being present.

Omsk, Sept. 8.—An explosion near his home of a quantity of grenades has led to the rumor that there had been a plot to assassinate Admiral Kolehak.

TRAIN WRECK EARLY SUNDAY

ITALIANS KILLED

Duke is Tie With Empire.

The Duke of Devonshire is coming here soon and we shall welcome him as one who holds the highest office in the land. He is the representative of the sovereign people of Great Britain and Ireland and is the tie between Canada and the rest of the Empire. The existence of the Governor is the only thing that differentiates the Dominion of Canada from a republic. In all other respects we are a self governing people.

In this country as in every other we are working out a democratic form of government. We believe that we have advanced a long way, but we still have some distance to go before we can feel that the will of the people is always being carried out. Also the will of the people needs a lot of educating before it becomes a will that makes for the best interests of all the people.

Integrity of Belgium Again to be Guaranteed.

The integrity of Belgium is again to be guaranteed. This is a repetition of what happened once before. This time, however, the Monroe Doctrine which has always stood in the way of American action in Europe has been so thoroughly thrown to the winds that it would not be a difficult matter for the republic to step in, always supposing the Irish senators would allow it. We cannot see, however, what use the league of nations is, if it is not to deal with just such cases and to prevent any two or three nations forming treaties of offence or defence.

Dominion Government Seems to be Roused.

It is to be hoped that the Dominion Government will carry out its design to prevent all profiteering in the food and other needs of the people. It is easy to make laws and to declare intentions, but the thing is to act and to do it with consistency and vigor.

Many have been disappointed that the Government has not done this in the past. All sorts of allowances have been made for unusual circumstances and still they have fallen short. Possibly now they will really act. The people are patient and are still ready to believe that the cabinet means well and that it is not wholly in the grip of the profiteering interests of the country.

It took a good deal to rouse the Government to action. It was the final awakening of President Wilson that seems to have been the final factor in making them see the light. Now we shall see what we shall see.

Chautauqua Festival During the Week.

Prince Rupert is to have her first Chautauqua Festival this week, and already there has been a good deal of interest aroused. The visitors are said to be real artists in their respective lines and they will give no less than five entertainments. There will be three lectures, entertaining and instructive and also there will be plenty of music. Doubtless everyone will want to attend these entertainments for it is not often that high class entertainers come to the city.

Sir Thomas White

Canadian Minister of Finance in his Budget Speech said:-

"Our ability to meet and retire our war obligations will depend upon our power to increase our production and to economize individually so as to bring each year substantial increase in domestic wealth and savings.

"In other words the motto for the future must be 'Produce and Save.'"
