Royal Commission Asked to Go Into Question of Claims Made by Returned Soldiers

Matter Discussed at Caucus at Ottawa at which many Soldier Members were present and it was thought Independent Tribunal Best able to Deal with it.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—Representatives of the Great War Veterans Association are pressing the claims again on members of parliament for the appointment of an independent royal commission to re-inquire into the demands of the returned men for better terms.

The claim for a royal commission has already been refused by the Prime Minister, but at a caucus at which were present a number of soldier members it was decided that the delegation should again wait on the Premier and urge a change of decision.

It was the consensus of opinion that the claims of the soldiers for better terms could best be decided by a tribunal divorced from political considerations.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR RECEPTION TO GOVERNOR

Committee to be Appointed by Mayor McClymont to Entertain Distinguished Guest.

At the meeting of the City Council held last night it was decided to present an address to the Governor-General on his arrival here, and at his request he will be shown the industries of the district. He expects to arrive on the evening of Friday, Sept. 26, and will be met by a representative committee.

The mayor said that his idea was they should have a reception at the exhibition building when an address would be presented, and people would have an opportunity of meeting the members of the party. There would be music on this occasion.

On Saturday a visit would be paid to the drydock, the mill, the cold storage and the cannery.

The whole question of the erection and upkeep of garages is to be investigated. At the meeting of the City Council last night Alderman McRae was asked to secure a report on the local garages for the Council at its next meeting.

The question came up in connection with the granting of a permit to the Pacific Cartage Co. to erect a garage on Third Ave. below the Pioneer Laundry. The application was granted.

Alderman McMeekin said he thought there should be some general regulation. He did not see why some should get the privilege and others not.

The mayor explained that it had been the policy to refuse a permit in congested districts as the garage was a danger to the business places. It was all right if they were constructed of concrete.

The whole question will be discussed further at another meeting.

Neither the Premier nor Sir George Foster were present during yesterday. Sir Robert was confined to his bed with a severe chill and was reported to have a very high temperature. Sir George was watching beside the bedside of Lady Foster who is seriously ill.

D. D. McKenzie took part in the debate and expressed the opinion that the ratification of the treaty would commit Canada to foreign wars which might align her against the motherland.

ACCOMMODATING CROWDS AT THE COMING FAIR

City Decides to Co-operate With The Agricultural Association in the Work of Providing Temporary Housing.

It is expected that this year there will be more visitors at the fair than ever before and it is likely to tax the local accommodation very severely. Last night at the City Council meeting Alderman Perry, who is also chairman of the Agricultural Association, drew attention to the fact that arrangements were being made to house everyone who came, and requested the co-operation of the city. It was finally agreed to give the mayor discretion in allowing the use of the reading rooms, and possibly the Council Chamber for the three days of the fair.

Arrangements have been made to use a number of different buildings and an application has been made for the use of the sash and door factory. It is expected that there will be plenty of room for everyone.

Alderman Perry explained that two bands were coming each with forty instruments and that the Skidegate orchestra would also be here. These it was proposed to house in the reading room. They would put a man in charge and he would look after the valuable band instruments. The Salvation Army had already agreed to allow the use of their citadel. So far they had made provision for about 600 in addition to those who go to the rooming houses.

Many Dangers in Fisherman's Calling.

The sinking of the fishing boat Alameda draws attention once more to the fact that the life of the fisherman is beset with danger and that while he sometimes makes big money he has many risks to take. It is a calling that needs plenty of stamina and the life develops a hardihood of character such as has made Great Britain great among the countries of the world.

Baron Beresford Was a Great Man.

Baron Beresford was one of that fearless breed of men of whom we like to read and at the record of whose deeds we all thrill with pride. He was one of the bulldog type that never lets go. Whether it was on the high seas against the enemies of the country or in parliament in forensic battle he was a hard hitter and fought without compromise. He was one of the men who tried again and again to rouse the Empire to the danger of war with Germany at a time when everyone was refusing to believe that country meant anything but peace.

Suez Canal is Important Waterway.

The first year the Suez Canal was opened, that is in 1869, only ten vessels passed through it, the total tonnage being 10,557. In 1913 the number had increased to 5,085 of over twenty-seven millions gross tonnage. The first year of the war there was a large amount of war material taken that way, but traffic gradually fell off with the smallest amount last year for many years past. Now it is on the increase again.

It will take a good many years to make up the loss which occurred during the war and that will affect the business of the canal. There will also be a shifting of the nationalities. Germany will do very little for years to come.

Mufti is Book Worth Reading.

Our attention having been drawn to the story "Mufti" by Sapper, through a writer in one of the departments of this paper, we have taken the trouble to read the book carefully and find it a first rate yarn and one that is an incentive to thought.

In the first place the story is one that makes the reader want to stay up at night in order to reach the climax. It is a story of love and of the ever pressing economic problem that forces men and women to do that which they otherwise would not. It does not set out to settle anything, but it gives the labor and capital side as well as that of the man between. That is part of the story. Undoubtedly the writer is a student of the new movements and he writes sympathetically. He makes it clear that there is reason in every point of view.

The writer also deals with religion incidentally. He tells how the men in the trenches are thinking for themselves. He says: "The simple creed of helping on the other fellow and playing the game is what they understand. But they will have to be reminded of it from time to time. One wonders whether the church will be big enough to seize the opportunity that stares her in the face."

He also introduces snatches of life in the trenches as he has seen them. Here is a reference which is interesting:

"Are you a Socialist?" she demanded suddenly.
"God knows what I am," he answered cynically. "I am trying to find out. You see, something has happened over the water which alters one's point of view. It hasn't happened over here. And just at the moment I feel like a stranger in a strange land."

Sometimes Sapper makes his characters argue for individualism. Here is a little example:

"It strikes me you are a great deal too occupied about other people, and you don't pay sufficient attention to yourself. You've got to live your own life—not the man's next door. And you do most good by living that life as you want to live it. If you really want to reform other people, well go and do it. Its part of your job. But if you don't want to, its no earthly use trying to pretend you do. You're merely a hypocrite. There's no use telling me that everybody can be lumped into classes and catered for like so many machines."

Another significant phrase which runs contrary to the accepted notions is: "The people who fail are the people who do things from a sense of duty."

Kitsumkalum and Smithers Will Both be Represented and Islands Will Send Produce.

At the fair this year the district exhibits promise to be much better than in former years. Already a display has been promised from Kitsumkalum and Smithers district will also send in an exhibit. F. PRICE OF CLOTHING FROM POINT OF VIEW OF MANUFACTURER

The charges of profiteering in the matter of the prices of suits and overcoats were referred to by several speakers at the annual dinner of the Wholesale Clothing Manufacturers' Federation of Great Britain and Ireland, held at Leeds recently.

David Little, the chairman of the federation, said that while of the opinion that clothing for civilian wear had been too cheap in the past, he was bound to add it was much too dear at the present time. But the clothing manufacturers could not be saddled with the responsibility, for they were compelled to pay as much as six times the pre-war price for cloth, four times the pre-war price for linings, and heavy advances for buttons and sewings. This was apart altogether from the wages for making, which had advanced continuously during the war, and one of the heaviest demands ever presented by the operatives was now under consideration by the Tailoring Trade Board. Personally, he would welcome an inquiry which would throw a searchlight on the whole structure in the manufacture of a suit from the raw materials to the completed garment. The trade was prepared to place its cards on the table, face upwards, and to face any investigation. The complaints of dear clothing were felt by many to be justified, but how anything could be done by the clothing manufacturers to meet it he did not know. Clothing could not become cheaper so long as materials remained at the present high prices, and, indeed, further advances had occurred during the past few weeks. Even

SCRIMGEOUR CASE AGAIN BEFORE COURT

Judge Young Hears Evidence and Will Give Judgment This Afternoon.

In the County Court this morning before Judge Young there was an appeal in the case of Walter Scrimgeour who was sentenced some time ago for exposing liquor for sale over the Savoy Hotel bar. W. E. Williams appeared for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore for the defence.

The evidence was taken on both sides this morning and the judge reserved his decision until afternoon. The court adjourned for two hours at one o'clock.

The testimonies of Constables Adams and Leek were taken of how they had made the raid and found the liquor in a jug on a shelf under the bar and also in a bottle marked Thorpe's orange wine, which stood among many other bottles of the same sort of label at the back of the bar. The accused had shown no perturbation in spite of the fact that the booze was found. He offered no explanation at the time of how it came to be there.

Scrimgeour stated his story of how Strassmund had brought the whiskey to the Savoy bar and had left it there in his care. Strassmund told of how he had obtained the bottle and said that he had left it there for safety while he went to find a man for whom he was looking. On his return he found the bar closed and knew nothing of the arrest until he was stopped on the street the next morning. Robertson, the partner of the accused told of how he had seen the jug produced in court in the customary place behind the bar at the time he relieved Scrimgeour. He had never sold or knew his partner to have sold hard stuff over the bar since they had taken over the place.

Captain McGregor and Frank T. Bowness, the proprietor of the Savoy rooms, stated that in all the times that he was in and out of the bar-room that he had never known any liquor to be sold over the counter.
