## Big Steamship Arrives to Load Lumber at Local Dock

### War Company was Piloted North by well Known Coast Skipper; Vancouver Built Vessel Handles like a Yacht says Her Captain.

This morning the big steamship War Company, 3,800 tons, steamed into port and docked at the coal wharf shortly after ten o'clock. Captain MacBeath is in charge and is very well known along the coast in navigation circles. The pilot on the trip north was Capt. Cecil Wearmouth, a brother of Bert Wearmouth of this city, who now holds a position on the Pilot Board in Vancouver. Many of his old time friends will be glad to hear of his arrival here. Charles Williams, surveyor for the Imperial Munitions Board, is also making the trip and Charles Coughlan of the firm of Coughlan & Sons, the builders of the ship. Mr. Rhodes, the engineer of Coughlan & Sons, has also made the trip north and is representing the company on board and is watching the progress of the ship.

Captain MacBeath reports a very excellent voyage here with an average speed of 10 1-2 knots. The total steaming time was about 45 hours, but they were held up for 15 hours on account of fog. "The ship handles beautifully, just like a yacht," is the skipper's comment. In the engine room with Chief Engineer Thomas Cowan in charge everything has gone fine.

The "War Company" was built by J. Coughlan & Sons of Vancouver and was launched August 24, 1919. This is really her maiden voyage and she will receive her first full cargo at this port. She will load the spruce still left at the coal dock by the Imperial Munitions Board. She brought up a small quantity of freight to Cheakamus on the way here.

The dimensions of the War Company are: Length over all, 427 ft.; length B. P., 410 ft. 5 1-2 ins.; breadth moulded, 54 ft.; depth of hold to top of floors, 27 ft. 5 ins.; depth moulded, 29 ft. Her hold capacity is: Grain, 479,652 cubic feet; half beam, 450, 644 1-2 cubic feet; bale, 438,854.

## LIEUT.-GOV. SIR FRANK BARNARD VISITS RUPERT

The Governor spent a few hours in the city making an official call on Mayor McClymont at his office and on Government Agent J. H. McMullin and Judge Young. He was also shown the drydock, the cold storage and the mill by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who took advantage of the occasion.

The party has been on a fishing trip on the steamer which is still operated under the naval department. She should have been here Monday but was delayed by fog.

The Stadacona recently arrived on the coast from Halifax and this is her first trip since her arrival. She is commanded by Captain Thomas who took H. M. C. S. Shearwater to Halifax some time ago.

From here he goes to Alice Arm and will then hurry back to Victoria.

## ASK PRINCE TO HELP SET DEFAULTERS FREE

Montreal, Sept. 9.—The City Council adopted a motion to ask the Prince of Wales to intercede for amnesty for defaulters under the Military Service Act.

They were soon whisked away in an automobile to see some of the industries of the city and this afternoon are also the guests of the Board of Trade. They leave for Anyox tonight and will go east later and see all the wonders of the valleys between here and the Rocky Mountains, returning by the P. G. E.

Mr. Hart said that they were out to see the country and to get in touch with affairs generally so that they may be in a position to understand its needs.

## Crown Prosecution of Business Agent Electrical Workers

### Boston Police Force on Strike; John Mitchell Underwent Operation; Mine Workers to Deal with Unruly Unions that went On Strike.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Sept. 10.—The crown authorities are preparing to prosecute James T. Dunn, business agent of the Electrical Workers Union, on the ground that he is responsible for the strike of the electrical workers and the consequent stoppage of the street railway service for four hours while the exhibition was on. Great inconvenience was caused to the public by the traffic hold up.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Union members of the Boston police force are on strike. Window smashing was done about midnight and considerable property was stolen from the small stores. Police inspectors and Metropolitan Park patrolmen succeeded in scattering the crowd after firing a few shots in the air.

New York, Sept. 10.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America, and one of the most widely known labor leaders in the United States, underwent an operation ten days ago. He is 49 years of age.

Cleveland, Ohio., Sept. 10.—The United Mine Workers in convention here may exclude from their meetings delegates from the local unions that have gone on unauthorized strikes.

Glasgow, Sept. 10.—By a vote of 4,478,000 to 77,000 the Trade Union Congress today passed a resolution favoring the nationalization of coal mines.

One of the Rules of Constitutional Government.

No one would make a louder protest if the Prince of Wales was to interfere in regard to Canada's internal affairs than those same persons who are asking his help to have some military defaulters set at liberty. We are not now discussing whether they ought to be set free or not. What we object to is trying to use unconstitutional means to have them liberated.

With a constitutional government, such as we have, the ruling power can do no wrong, because it acts only on the advice of its ministers. If the king does wrong it is because he is badly advised, and the ministers are responsible.

It is most probable that the present visit of the Prince of Wales has been arranged on the advice of David Lloyd George, and that his general course of action is mapped out for him.

MacKenzie Does Not Represent Liberals.

It seems a pity that the duty of an opposition in parliament seems to be always to oppose. When D. D. MacKenzie opposed the signing of the Peace Treaty we do not think he expressed the views of the people of Canada, nor of the Liberal party.

We are all anxious to see the treaty signed. Think of Canada standing out from the rest of the Empire and refusing to join the final treaty. The Liberal convention certainly did a wise thing recently in deciding that Mr. MacKenzie was not a proper man to act as its leader and spokesman.

Making Provision For the Visitors.

The fair directors are to be congratulated on the vigorous measures they are adopting to prepare for the housing of the visitors to the forthcoming fair. Last year this end of the work was overlooked with results that were not a credit to the city.

Salvation for Working Class.

In connection with the story "Mufti," mention of which was made yesterday, the writer introduces a Socialist agitator and this is what he makes him say:

"You see, Captain Vane, we approach this matter from a fundamentally different point of view. You look around you, and you see men striking here and striking there. And you say 'Look at the swine; striking again!' But there's one thing that you fail to grasp, I think. Underneath all these strikes and violent upheavals, bursting into flame in all sorts of unexpected places—there is the volcano of a vital conflict between two fundamental ideas. Though the men hardly realize it themselves, it's there, that conflict all the time. And we who see a little further than the mob know that its there and that, sooner or later that conflict will end in victory for one side or the other. Which side, my friend? Yours or ours, or both, yours and ours?"

"To the master class generally there is a certain order of things and they can imagine nothing else. They employ workers—they pay them or they 'chuck' them, as they like. They hold over them absolute power. They are the masters and the others are the men. That is the only form of society they can conceive of. Any mitigation of conditions is simply a change within the old order."

After a good deal of discussion comes this final query from the Captain: "And you really think that by exchanging private ownership for a soulless bureaucracy you find salvation? You're rather optimistic aren't you on the subject of government departments?"

### A SPEED BOAT RACE AT FAIR

Preparations Being Made for an Unusual Event in Endeavor to Land Challenge Cup.

#### SPECIAL PRIZE FOR INDIAN LAUNCHES

Superintendent Campbell of the Anyox mine expects to have a speed boat in Prince Rupert that will be fast enough to carry back the silverware to the smelter town, according to a report made by Ben Self at the meeting of the Agricultural Association directors last night. The race will take place at 10 a. m. on the last day of the fair and there will be either two or three local entries that will possibly have an effect on Mr. Campbell's ambitions.

In addition to this challenge cup event, there will be a big launch race for Indians, the prizes offered for the event being \$50, \$25 and \$15. Many Indians are very proud of their launches and this will be an opportunity to test their speed and endurance. A number of entries are looked for.

#### REORGANIZING TRADE THROUGHOUT BELGIUM

London, Sept. 10.—Trade organization is proceeding rapidly in Belgium. As Great Britain has its Federation of British Industries and France its formidable industrial groups, so Belgian industry has been divided into a well-organized system of 18 main divisions. In each of these divisions have been formed one or more groups to take charge of the interests of each of the particular branches into which the industry in question is subdivided. The groups are not merely industrial associations, but are judicial organizations with power to buy and sell. They were formed without any official intervention or control, but have been virtually recognized by the Belgian government. At the head of this system is the Central Industrial Commission which existed before the war as a federation of the large industrial associations. The Commission has established a special reconstruction service with headquarters in Brussels for the purpose of assuring unity of action among the various groups and to serve as the intermediary in dealing with the Government in all questions of general interest.

#### REV. GEO. H. RALEY IS TO OPEN EXHIBITION

Many Indian Schools Will Have Displays and There Will be Basketry and Network Demonstrations.

Definite arrangements were made last night to invite Rev. Geo. H. Raley of the Coqualeetza Industrial Institute of Sardis, B. C., to open the fair here. He always takes a deep interest in the fair and his institute will have an exhibit here.

Five Indian schools will have exhibits of their work entered for competition, including color work and plasticene modeling.

President Perry expects to have demonstrations of Indian basket making and net making at the fair this year. He visited Metlakatla yesterday to see the Indians who do the work and will go to Tucks Inlet when he hopes to have the final arrangements made.

A wire was received yesterday from Dan Harris at Hazelton saying that he was shipping the mineral exhibit from their district.

# FEDERATED LABOR TO OPPOSE DR. TOLMIE

The Federated Labor party is to oppose the Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, when he appears before the Victoria constituency for re-election next month, it was decided at a meeting of that organization in the K. of P. Hall last night, says the Victoria Colonist. Forty members of the Federated Labor party were present. The candidate will be chosen next Wednesday evening.

This action was taken by the meeting because of the failure of the Dominion Government to deal seriously with the high-cost of living, profiteering and its refusal to grant bail to the Winnipeg strike leaders who were arrested and thrown into jail.

Members of the party are now working to secure the consent of some prominent labor representative to allow his name to go before the proposed nominating convention.

The Federated Labor party was formed last January as a political labor party, both for organized and unorganized labor, following action taken by the B. C. Federation of Labor at Vancouver. It is quite distinct from the Trades and Labor Council. Its members, under President E. W. Ellis, have hopes of gaining representation in the Federal and Provincial Houses.

## IS ARRESTED FOR MURDER

Degenerate Kills a Woman at Anchorage and Puts Body in a Well.

Seward, Sept. 10.—Wm. Dempsey, who shot and killed Deputy Marshal Isaac Evans, and then escaped and later was recaptured, has confessed to having been implicated in the murder of Margaret Lavor of Anchorage.

He implied that he assisted another. He said they did not intend to kill the woman, but simply to lure her to his cabin while her store was being robbed. Instead of knocking her unconscious, the one blow from the "sand bag" caused her death.

This confession to the officers was made before the body of the woman had been removed from an abandoned well in Anchorage, where it was found under a false bottom after dogs had attracted attention to the well. The truth of his statement is proven by the fact that the woman's head was smashed.

At a preliminary hearing a charge of murder will be made. This will be held in the jail, as the officers are afraid to take him outside to the courtroom for fear of popular feeling which is running high against him here.

Dempsey is a degenerate. He was born in the Children's Aid Directory in New York City and reared in a foundling's home. He was a tough character. He absolutely shows no remorse of any kind, other than the fear of punishment to himself.

The woman whom he killed was a well known character of the underworld, having, since coming to Anchorage, kept a cigar store and soft drink place opposite the ball park there. She wore much jewelry and made money. The officers suspected Dempsey from the first, and while they were searching for the body he left for Seward and information was sent here for Deputy Isaac Evans to arrest him.

## ALLIED TROOPS FOR SCENE OF CONFLICT

London, Sept. 9.—Upper Silesia, the scene of conflict between German and Polish elements, is to be occupied by the Allied troops.
