Hurricane Swept Florida and Cuba Overturning Buildings And Wrecking many Vessels

Property Damage at Key West Estimated at Two Million Dollars; Town of Goulds wiped out; Five Killed at Havana And Several people Missing; Churches and Other Buildings Razed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Key West, Sept. 11.—Lower Florida is paralyzed as the result of a violent hurricane. Three hundred and fifty buildings have been razed, many church edifices wrecked and five stores turned over by the wind. The property damage is estimated at two million dollars.

Shipping off the coast has met with disaster. Several vessels have been sunk and others were driven onto reefs, and the strong wind and rough sea prevented rescue. It is feared that many lives have been lost.

The tornado almost demolished the town of Goulds, a place with 500 inhabitants 25 miles south of Miami.

Havana, Sept. 11.—Five persons are dead and several missing as a result of the cyclone yesterday flooding the greater part of the city with huge waves which swept over the sea wall. When the waters receded the streets were left strewn with alien trees and debris.

RAIL GRANTED TO LEADERS IN RECENT STRIKE

Being in Jail Twenty-six Days, Eight Labor Men are Out on Bail.

Winnipeg, Sept. 11.—After being incarcerated for 26 days in provincial jail, pending trial charges of sedition, eight strike leaders have been granted bail. Chief Justice Mathies with Mr. Justice Macdonald and Mr. Justice Metcalfe heard the arguments counsel and gave their decision in refusing bail on the sole ground that the state would be endangered by permitting the leaders at large.

MINE WORKERS ARE PROPOSING A NEW PARTY

Resolution Formulated and Will Be Brought Before the Convention.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 11.—Resolutions favoring the formation of a national party which will stand for the nationalization of the coal mines at the earliest possible moment, and an alliance for co-operation in political and economic effort with the railway brotherhoods, freight handlers and other transportation workers' unions, was accepted in principle by a committee on resolutions of the United Mine Workers of America and will be brought before the convention.

Soldiers Fire on South Boston Mob

Use Machine Guns and Kill three people; Gangs of Gamblers broken up by State Guards Following Police Strike.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Boston, Sept. 11.—State guardsmen opened fire with machine guns on the mob in South Boston killing one and wounding several. Gangs of gamblers were broken up at the point of the bayonet.

The soldiers found fifteen dice games in progress with about 2,000 participants and spectators that withdrew when the troops arrived.

Two men and a boy have been killed as the result of turbulent outbreaks growing out of the police strike. Many people suffered injuries of a minor nature.

TIDAL WAVE AND TYPHOON

Three Thousand Persons Lost as Result of Great Storm off China Coast.

Amoy, China, Sept. 11.—A great Typhoon swept over the south-east coast on Monday last resulting in the death of 3,000 persons. The typhoon was accompanied by a tidal wave 28 feet high.

The big engine which was brought here from Vancouver has been returned, as it was too cumbersome for the craft.

DRIFTING IN NORTHERN SEA

Road Amundsen in Ice-Locked Schooner in Far Arctic Ocean.

Bound for the North Pole Road Amundsen, Norwegian discoverer of the South Pole, is at present drifting in his ice-locked schooner, the Maud, somewhere north of western Siberia, according to beliefs held by the Seattle Norwegian vice-consulate and Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Canadian Arctic explorer.

In planning the trip, the explorer said he expected, after reaching the pole, to return either to Grant Land, west of Greenland or Melville Island, which lies in the Arctic Ocean north of Canada. Should he reach Melville Island he probably would journey by sea to Nome, Alaska, or overland to Dawson, Yukon Territory.

Two aeroplanes, it is believed, formed part of the Maud's equipment when she left Norway last fall and sailed through the White Sea bound for the icy north. The final dash to the pole may be made in one of the planes. Amundsen, it is believed, may also fly back to civilization in one of the machines.

Nothing has been heard from Amundsen since September 1, 1918, nearly one year ago. At that time the Maud was reported taking oil for her motors at Dixon Island, a White Sea point. After taking the oil she sailed northeast into the rapidly freezing waters of the Arctic Ocean.

From White Sea Amundsen expected to drift east with the ice to the new Siberian Islands, which lie in the Arctic off Siberia. At the new Siberian Islands, it was believed, the drift would carry the boat toward, if not across the pole. Amundsen intended to use the aeroplanes if he found the drift would not carry him across the "top of the earth."
