School Attendance In City Hits High Mark

Total of 1437 Shows Big Gain Over One Year Ago at This Time

More than 1600 pupils have enrolled in District No. 52 schools for the fall term, it was disclosed from reports at the school board meeting last night. And 1437 of the total attend city schools.

Balance go to district schools, such as Port Edward, Digby, Port Essington and Sunnyside.

The total enrolment figure of 1437 compares with 1253 at the commencement of the fall term in 1950, making up the greatest increase in school attendance ever recorded in the city in a single year.

The old Seal Cove school, which was put into service this fall, Joe Scott, finance chairman, called "the best investment yet made." Two classes of 67 students—grades I and II—attend the remodelled school under supervision of Principal T. G. Bateman of Conrad Street school.

Equipment for the new schools—King Edward and Booth Memorial—had been slow to arrive, Mrs. M. M. Roper, secretary, told the board, but it is expected most rooms would be fully furnished this week.

Breakdown of enrolment is as follows:

Booth Memorial High School, 459; Borden Street, 278; King Edward, 357; Conrad, 276, and Seal Cove, 67.

School Board Is "Slighted"

Thinks Minister Should Stay Longer for Opening of Schools

The school board here feels slighted by a recent suggestion of Hon. W. T. Strath, minister of education, that he attend the opening of the new schools here between "boat stops." The board will ask for a change of plans.

Mr. Strath advised the board both he and Dr. F. T. Fairey, superintendent of education, would be in Prince Rupert October 5, travelling by Union steamship, and would appreciate officiating at the school opening at that time.

Dr. R. G. Large, chairman, said arrival time of the boat was "so uncertain" that the board could not depend on holding the opening at a certain time of the day.

Trustee Bruce Brown said: "I, for one, feel slighted by their attitude," and the opinion was concurred by the others.

Inspector G. W. Graham said he thought the school opening concerned more people than only the education department and felt a "good deal" of attention was due to the people who had worked so hard for the schools.

High School Overstaffed

Ten Dollars a Day at Fish Plants "Bad Set-up," Says Inspector

The School board has found itself with too many teachers on the staff of Booth Memorial High School and blame for this situation last night was placed on students working at full-time jobs well after fall school term begins.

"As long as students can make \$10 a day at the fish plants, they'll prefer it to school any time," said Inspector G. W. Graham. He deplored the situation and termed it a "bad set-up."

Present enrolment of the high school is 459, instead of the estimated 510, although Principal A. M. Hurst, in his report, told the board he believed "after a while" the estimate would be reached.

For purpose of receiving full grants, Mrs. M. M. Roper, secretary, advised board there must be enough students for the 24 teachers now on staff. At present enrolment, she said, the school is overstaffed by two.

Mr. Graham said he thought the situation warranted explanation to the Department of Education and foresaw no trouble in obtaining the grants.

"This has been the trouble here for some time. The students who work don't think it's

of any use going back to school for the first month or so. Many even take their holidays after school starts because they have been working all summer," said Mr. Graham.
