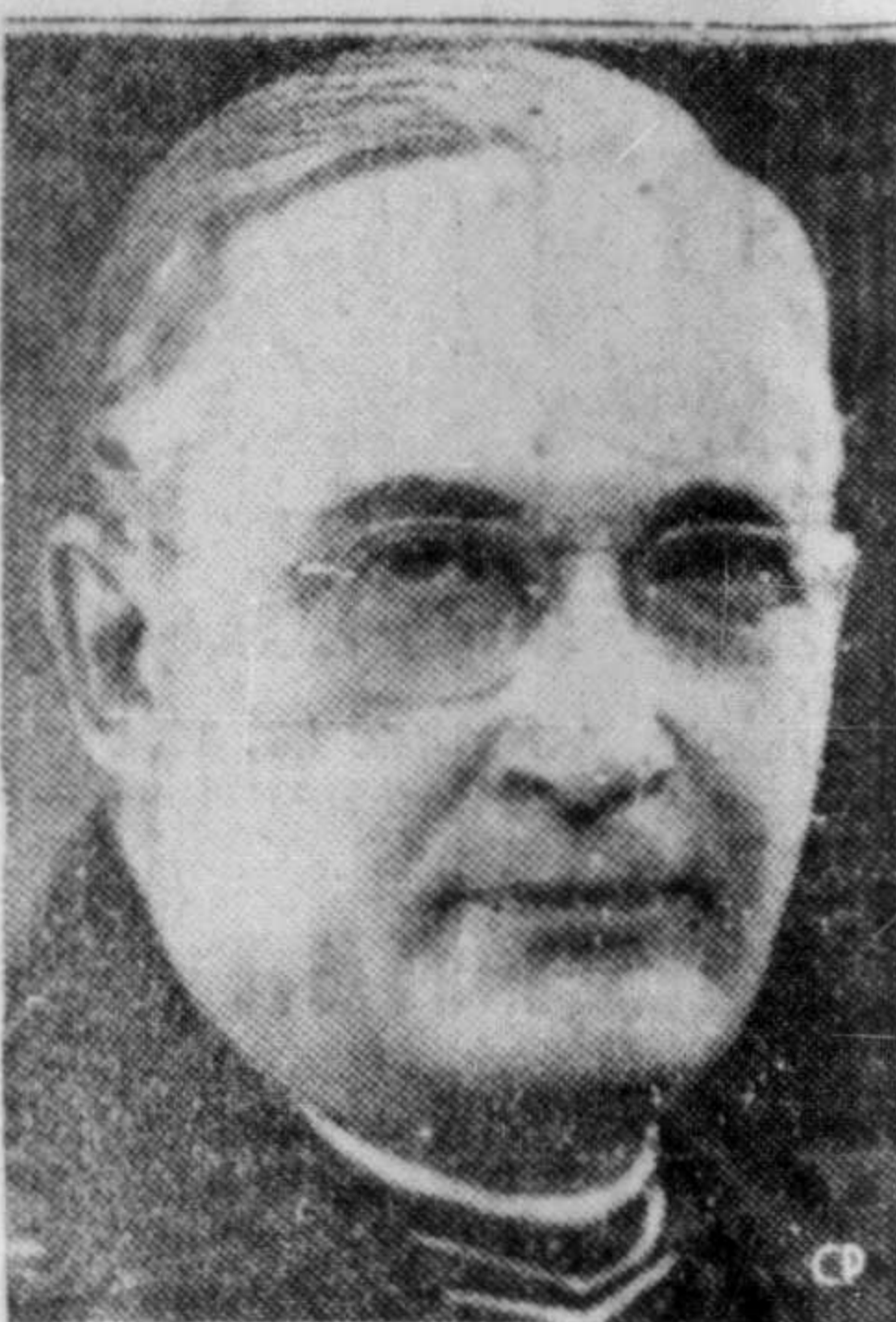
CNR steamer Prince Henry is making its final Alaska trip of the season to Skagway with Captain Harry Neddin in command.

ACUTE OR CHRONIC?

Hospital Insurance is designed to protect citizens of B.C. against bills incurred for care during the acute stage of any disease.

A chronic disease is classified as a disease which continues for long periods of time or for life. Chronic disease is not covered by B.C.H.I.S. except during its acute stages.

In deciding whether a condition is acute or chronic B.C.H.I.S. gives the term acute its widest possible interpretation by saying that when a patient requires treatment normally available to him only in a general hospital, his case is classified as acute.

Hospitals list the diagnosis for each patient on admission notices which are filed with B.C.H.I.S. Where the diagnosis indicates a chronic condition, the hospital is advised with regard to the length of time B.C.H.I.S. can pay; unless the hospital forwards further evidence of the existence of an acute condition which would, therefore, be eligible for additional B.C.H.I.S. coverage.

Many hospitals undertake frequent periodic medical reviews of all patients to determine if further hospitalization is required.

When a hospital has been advised by B.C.H.I.S. regarding extent of coverage and there is no further evidence that a patient can be classified as acute, the hospital then is responsible for informing the attending physician, the patient, relatives or responsible parties concerned about the limit of B.C.H.I.S. coverage for the case.

Prince Rupert is passing up a good bet in the way of attracting "rich American tourists," believes the first mate of a luxury charter yacht which makes a business of taking out hunting and fishing parties in Alaskan waters.
Chief Engineer and First Mate Wayne Forbes with Capt. Edward Cade, picked up their first party three weeks ago here in Prince Rupert. Yesterday, after a "very successful fishing trip," the 87-foot Onawa returned. Robert Ishard, Vermont textile manufacturer, his son and daughter-in-law to Prince Rupert. Today, the yacht is northbound again, where she will pick up the ex-governor of Vermont, Mortimer Proctor, now in Ketchikan.

Death Removes Another Pioneer

W. E. Denning, Former Legion President, Passes
Death came to a well known Prince Rupert pioneer citizen with the passing of William Edward Denning in Jericho Beach Hospital on Wednesday after a long illness.
Mr. Denning came here when Prince Rupert was only a tent town in 1905 and participated in the building of the Grand Trunk Railway.
He enlisted in the 102nd Battalion in 1916 and served in France during the First World War.
On his return from overseas, Mr. Denning joined the civil service as a staff member of the Government Liquor Store where he served until his retirement in 1949.
His passing will be mourned by many friends and associates.
Mr. Denning is survived by his widow, two sons, Ted and John, all of Prince Rupert; a sister, Mrs. Annie Hall, and a brother, Walter Denning of Cheshire, England. He is also survived by two grandchildren.
Deceased was born in Carlisle, England in 1884. He would have celebrated his 67th birthday a week from the day he died.
Mr. Denning was an active member of the local branch of the Canadian Legion, having served as President of that organization several times. His remains will be brought here this week-end for burial.

London Pays Attention To Only Woman Trapper

Letters from Mrs. Hilda Chichester Skinner of Copper City who is visiting in the Old Country continue to contain many items of interest. These deal with many different phases of life, visits to Madame Tussaud's famous waxworks where the figure of General MacArthur surprised her with its "fine, beautiful, sensitive" face, characteristics that she had not expected to find so delicately modelled. A contrivance that told one's fortune when one's hand was inserted, was tried with considerable scepticism, and found to be surprisingly correct.

For treatment of her hand Mrs. Skinner had gone to the orthopedic hospital in Great Portland Street where Mr. James, a noted surgeon, operated. She is very enthusiastic about the skill and the attention given there.

A visit to Beaver House, headquarters of the Hudson's Bay

That statement opened the doors and a senior employee was assigned the duty of introducing Mrs. Skinner to all the heads of the various departments. Finally she met Sir Patrick Ashley Cooper, the governor of the company.

But the highlight was the visit to the huge vaults where the furs are stored, all kinds of skins from all parts of the world. The section containing the B.C. furs was her objective and the well-known aroma made her feel almost back home. They had a huge stock of beaver skins. She was greatly impressed with the treatment accorded to Russian grey squirrel furs. They are plucked, treated and dyed until they look the most rare and expensive furs. The Russian sables did not strike her as being at all equal to the Copper River colors or dark martens.

Prices of furs for the next season promise to be good.

As a result of her visit to the Hudson's Bay headquarters she received a request from the BBC to broadcast but doubts as to whether she will be able to accede to their wishes.

She was able to give the officials at the Beaver House up-to-date and informative details as to fur-trapping methods in British Columbia. Many of their ideas were antiquated. But then it is not often that they have a visit from a real trapper with first-hand knowledge of the industry.

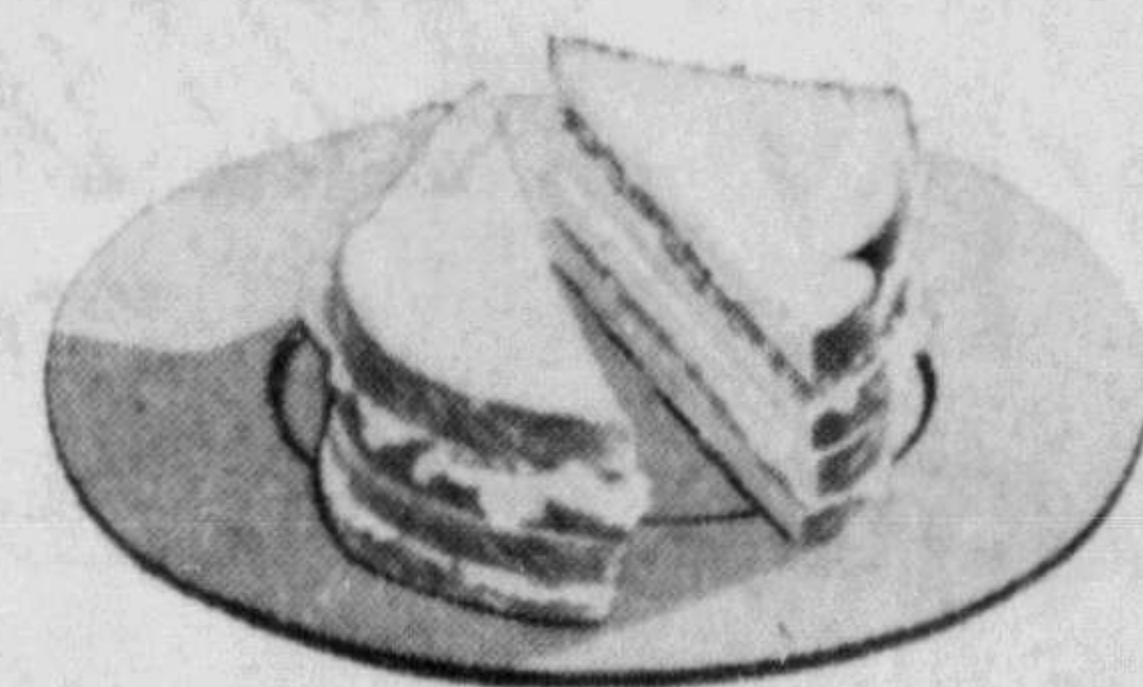

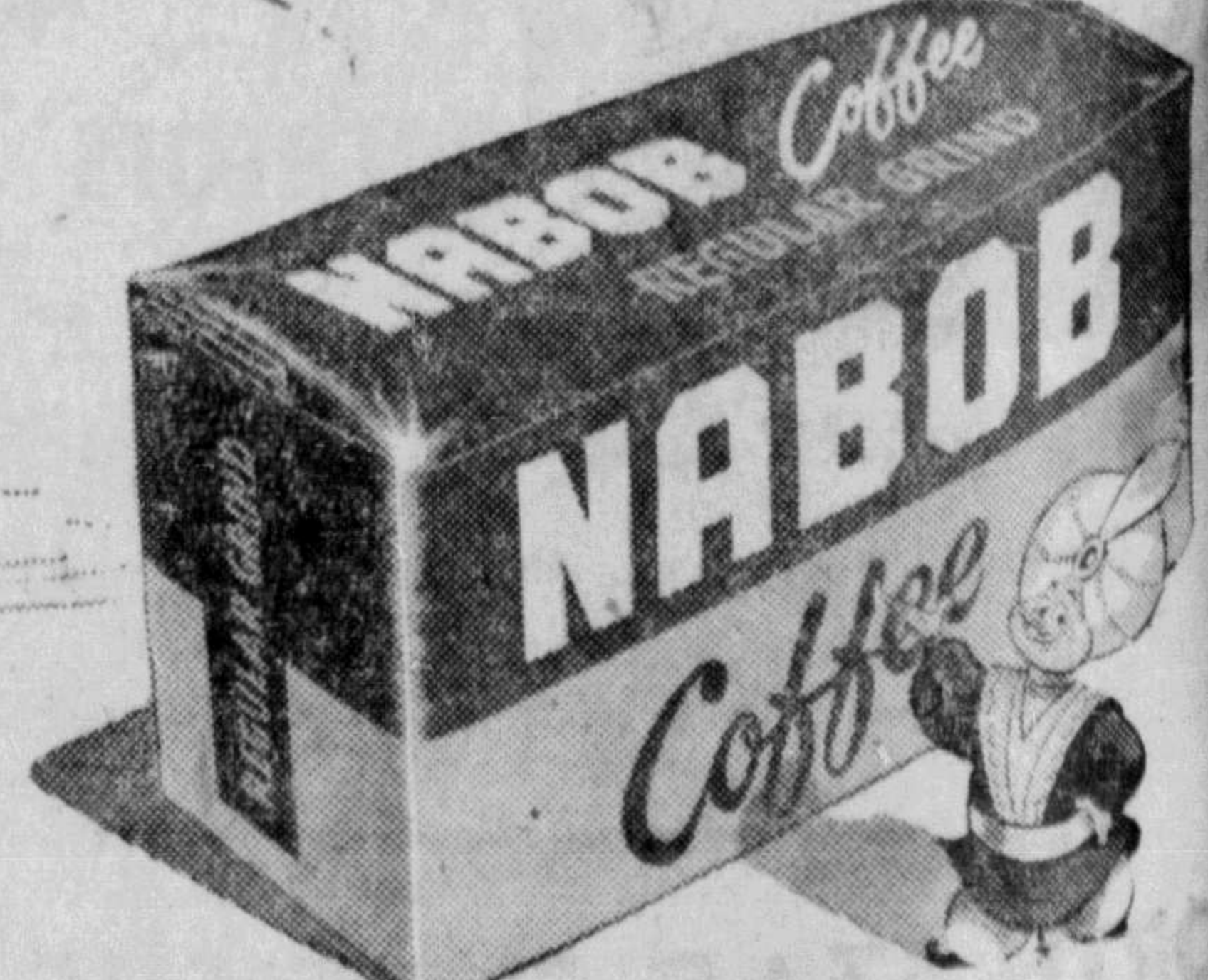
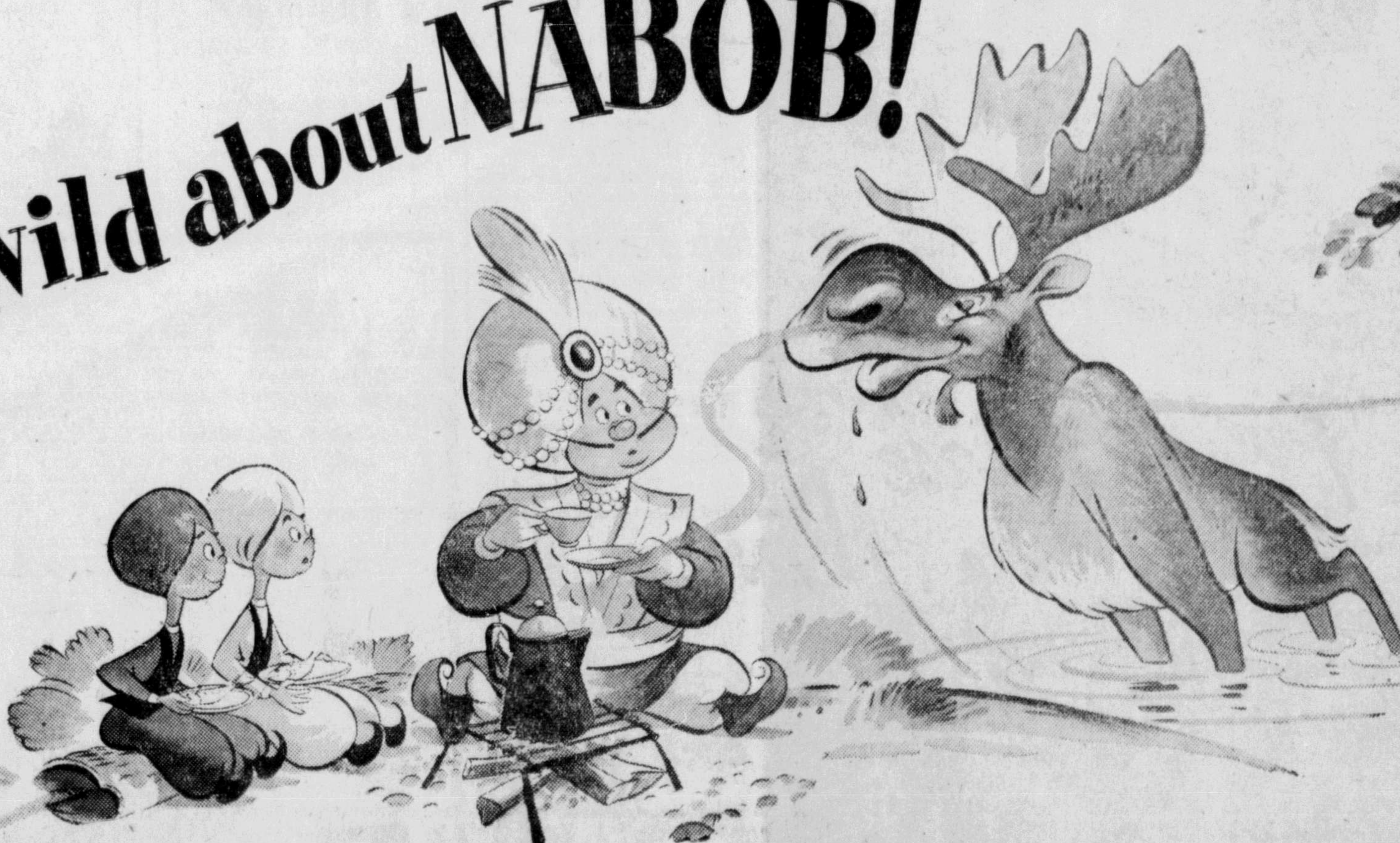

... HOUSEKEEPING ...

**COOL, GREEN CUCUMBERS ARE
SIGNAL FOR PICKLE-MAKING**

When it is cucumber time it is time for making pickles. Cucumber pickles of various sorts are favorites with all Canadian families. Home economists have sent us two recipes for making gherkin pickles. They have also sent a recipe for nine day pickles. Generally, gherkins and nine day pickles are made from a small type of cucumber which has a dark green skin and small seeds. If the cucumbers used are over 2 1/2 inches in length, they should be cut in half lengthwise. In making pickles such as cucumber pickles, it is most important that they be placed in cold water or a brine as soon as possible after picking to ensure success. Holding the cucumbers at room temperature for even a few hours may result in hollow centres.

GHERKINS METHOD 1
4 quarts small cucumbers
16 cups boiling water
1 cup salt
2 cups blended vinegar
1/4 cup salt
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup mustard seed
1/2 cup mixed pickling spice
7 cups sugar

Wash the cucumbers, scrub well, rinse, drain well and place in a crock. Cover with hot brine made by combining boiling water and salt. Let stand overnight. Drain cucumbers thoroughly and place in clean dry crock. Prepare pickle mixture by combining the cold vinegar, salt, the 1/4 cup sugar, mustard seed and pickling spice. Pour over cucumbers. Each morning for the next 14 days, add 1/2 cup sugar, stirring well to dissolve the sugar. When last of sugar is added, remove pickles from liquid and pack into sterilized jars. Strain pickle mixture to remove seeds and pour over pickles. Seal and store. Yield: approximately 4 quarts.

GHERKINS METHOD 2
4 quarts small cucumbers
16 cups boiling water
2 cups salt
2 cups blended vinegar
2 cups sugar
1 ounce cinnamon stick
2 tablespoons celery seed
3 cups sugar

Wash the cucumbers, scrub well, rinse, drain well and place in a crock. Cover with hot brine made by combining boiling water and salt. Let stand for 1 week. Drain, cover with boiling water and let stand 21 hours. Drain cucumbers and place in dry crock. Prepare pickle mixture by combining the vinegar, the 4 cups sugar, and the cinnamon stick and celery seed which have been loosely tied in a bag. Bring to a boil and pour over cucumbers. For three successive days, drain off the syrup, add 1 cup sugar, heat and pour over the pickles. On the third day, pack the gherkins into sterilized jars. Remove the spice bag and pour boiling syrup over the pickles. Seal and store. Yield: approximately 4 quarts.

NINE DAY PICKLES
4 quarts small cucumbers

16 cups boiling water
2 cups salt
16 cups boiling water
2 cups blended vinegar
6 cups sugar
1 tablespoon celery seed
2 teaspoons whole cloves

Wash the cucumbers, scrub well, rinse, drain well and place in a crock. Cover with hot brine made by combining 16 cups boiling water with the salt. Let stand 3 days. Drain cucumbers from brine, bring brine to boiling point, pour over cucumbers and again let stand 3 days. Repeat this and again let stand 3 days. Drain cucumbers and place in crock. Add alum to remaining 16 cups boiling water and pour over cucumbers. Let stand six hours then drain and rinse thoroughly. Pack pickles into sterilized jars. Prepare pickle mixture by combining the vinegar, sugar and spices. Boil mixture for five minutes. Strain through cheesecloth and pour over pickles. Seal and store. Yield: approximately 4 quarts.

In pickle making, the type of vinegar used is an important factor. Blended vinegar which may be purchased in most retail stores or which may be made in the home by mixing equal parts of cider and white vinegar is recommended by the home economists. The combinations of spices suggested in the recipes may be varied according to personal taste.

Col. A. J. Kerry, an RCE officer now living in England, has been appointed honorary historian of the corps with the task of compiling the "sapper history."

Working on the belief that thousands of heads are better than one, he has asked all sappers and former members of the ACE to dig into their memories, wartime letters and diaries for items which have a bearing on the history of the corps.

African Natives Learn First Aid

JOHANNESBURG (CP)—Knowledge of magical incantations, of evil-tasting potions and of "throwing the bones" no longer is sufficient for the African with doctor.

Even in the most remote villages it is becoming more and more necessary for him to have a knowledge of first aid, and it

must be according to Red Cross standards, supported by certificates and medals.

The native African is fast taking to regulation first aid, and incantations just won't do any more to treat a drowning person, for instance. There are far too many tribesmen with the knowledge of artificial respiration for the witch doctor to get by with the old spells.

The natives pack the stands at every fair aid contest between African teams competing for the favor of the white judges and officials, and of the crowd. Such events draw as much enthusiasm as a football game.

Team-leaders put on a great show, tumbling and leaping, clowning and howling. But in spite of the horseplay the tests are carried out with speed and efficiency. Tourniquets are in the right spots, bandages correctly tied and applied, rules of hygiene are not forgotten and splints are just what the doctor ordered.

Motor Cars Ended Big-Time Sailing Says Old Skipper

TORONTO (CP)—Marriage and motor cars have been the doom of big-time sailing, says William Churchill, a devotee of canvas and polished brass for nearly 70 years.

The 35-year-old sailor says nowadays the trend is to smaller craft—dinghies and one or two-man jobs. He is the owner of a 45-foot cutter, the Madora.

He says the automobile is the main reason young men aren't spending the time they used to under sail.

Now they go by car to the lake; they couldn't reach in the yote and buggy days," he says. But the wedding bells are almost equally responsible.

"Years ago fellows used to come looking for a chance to get in a boat crew. They'd work hard at it too—for free. Now the trend is toward smaller boats because you can't get five or six men to stick together. As soon as they are married, you never see them again."

Churchill was born at Portugal Cove near St. John's, Nfld. That meant he was all but born with a tiller-sheet in his hands. As a boy he sailed the Grand Banks on Buenos schooners. At 20 he left the sea and came to Toronto to work as a plasterer.

At the turn of the century he was sailing the waters of Lake Ontario in the Dolphin, a 35-foot sloop which he and his brothers built.

A few years later they built the Madora. Oak and other materials were cheap then and the craft was completed for about \$1,800.

"You couldn't build her today for under \$18,000," Churchill says.

The veteran yachtsman has been watching the Toronto sailing scene for over 60 years. He regards the period just before the Second World War as tops. Since then the number and size of sailing craft has fallen off.

Churchill now sails only a few times a year, and because it takes four men to sail the Madora, he will have to dispose of the cutter.

"I'm going to scrap her," he says. "I'd rather scrap her than see someone fooling around and making a mess of her."

Cross-Breeding For More Meat

MANYBERRIES, Alta. (CP)—Brahma bulls from India, Canadian buffalo and conventional beef cattle are being bred at the experimental farm here to develop cows that live longer and provide an extra roast or two.

Experiments to develop cattalo—half buffalo and half bull—have been conducted in Canada for more than 20 years without success. Last year herds were shipped here for another try.

So far cattalo bulls have been sterile and the mixed offspring have been born with the tapering hindquarters of the buffalo. However, the long-maned cattalo with the distinctive hump have been able to withstand winter weather better than their beef cattle forebears.

Next year, officials plan to breed beef bulls with the hybrid calves. If the smaller hindquarters and sterility among the bulls are eliminated, the plan will be a success.

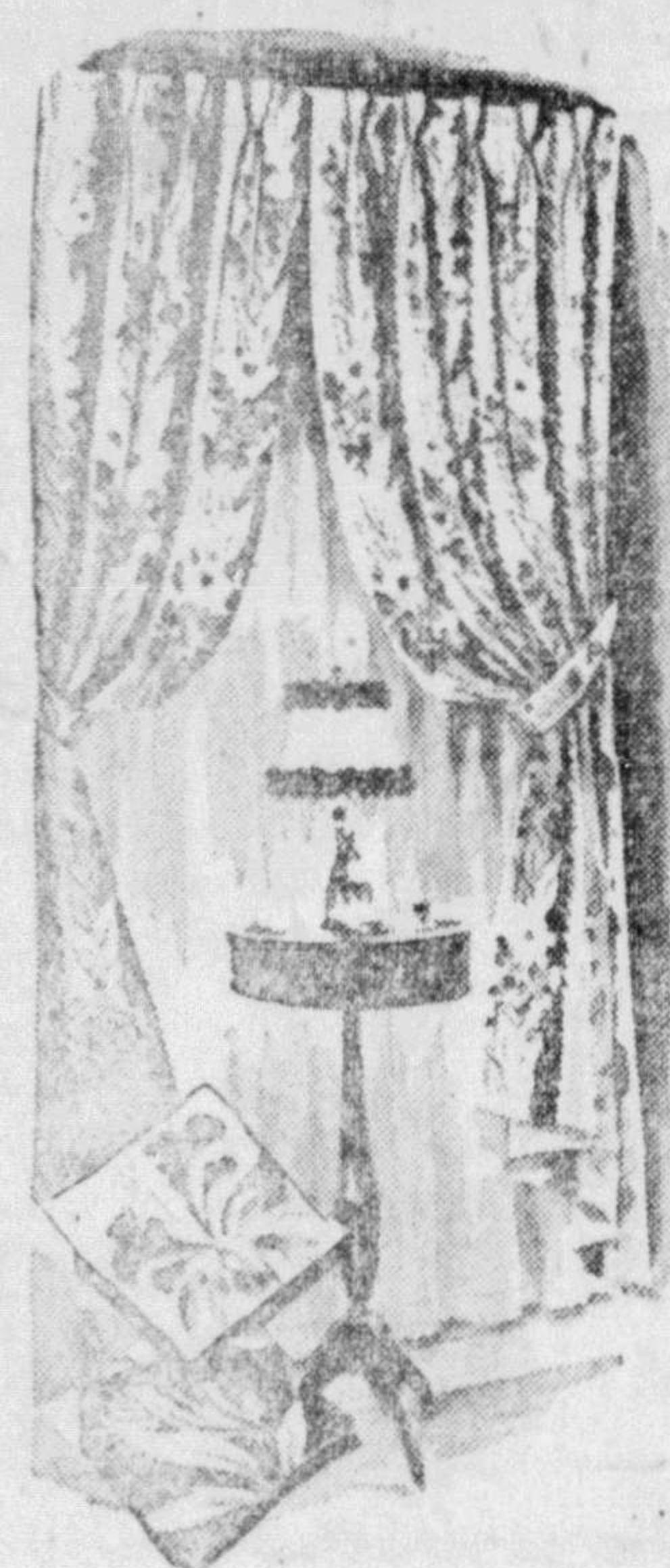

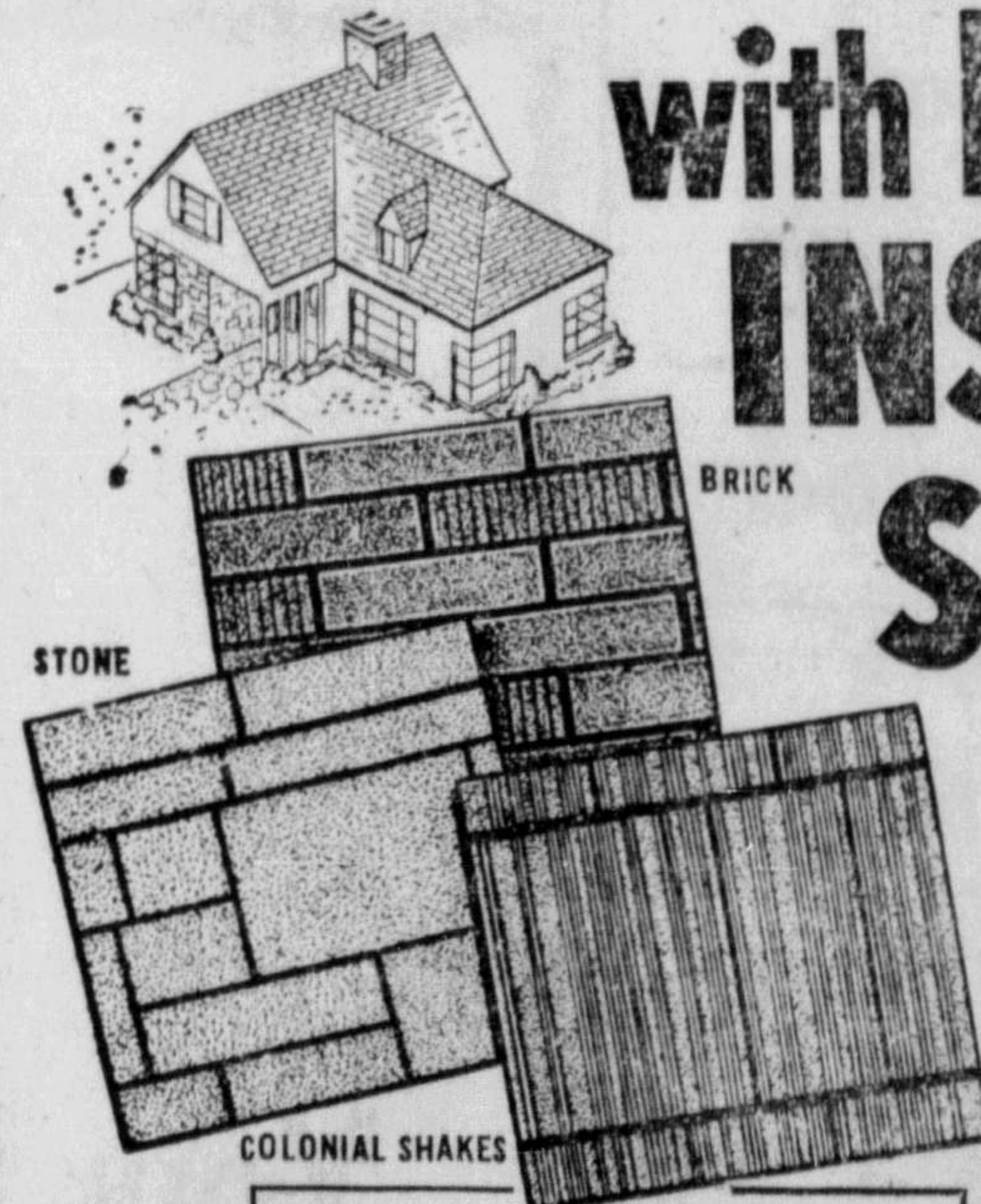
