Two More Treaties Approved After a Brief Discussion

Special Committee will deal with Re-establishment of Returned Men as well as Additional Gratuity; War Veterans at Ottawa are Satisfied with Government Promise.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
Ottawa, Sept. 13.—Following a brief discussion the House of Commons yesterday approved two more treaties, one with regard to the occupied Rhineland and the other a treaty with Poland. The debate on the address was scheduled to resume yesterday but speakers were ready and as a result it was again adjourned. An announcement was made that a special committee of the House would consider an amending bill having to do with the re-establishment of returned men.
It is understood that the question of additional gratuity will also be considered by the committee.
Ottawa, Sept. 13.—(Noon). The Great War Veterans Association officials in Ottawa say that they feel their request for a special Parliamentary Committee will be formed to deal with the whole matter and make recommendations to the House.

AL LACROSSE MATCH TODAY

Victoria Plays Winnipeg for the Amateur Lacrosse Championship This Afternoon, Concluding Big Tourney.

TO INVESTIGATE UNEMPLOYMENT RETURNED MEN

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
Ottawa, Sept. 13.—The Soldiers Civil Re-establishment Department has appointed Lieut.-Col. W. W. Foster, formerly deputy minister of public works in the McBride Government, to investigate unemployment among returned soldiers on the Pacific coast.
It is stated that there are 17,000 unemployed soldiers in British Columbia, supposedly due to the large number who chose that province as the place to take their discharge.

STORY OF PREMIER MINE IS TOLD IN STEWART NEWSPAPER

In the Portland Canal News this week Chas. Bunting tells the story of how the Premier mine was lost and found. The vein of ore almost paralleled the tunnel which was driven by H. R. Plate. Had the men driven two feet to the right they would have been in five dollar ore, while five feet ahead would have brought them into high grade ore. It is an outstanding example of a great mine being missed by a small margin.
Telling of the mine as it is known today, the article says:
"In the block of ground 8 feet long and fully 100 feet wide as proved by surface cut and underground work and from the surface to the present level, a tonnage of at least 1,000,000 can be safely estimated with a gold and silver content of \$30 a ton, making a total of \$30,000,000. A thorough sampling of all the present workings and openings gives an average value of well over \$30 a ton.
"As the ore shoot is bigger, stronger and far richer in the tunnel than on the surface it is safe to assume it will continue for at least 50 feet below the present workings.
"In that event—and any engineer familiar with this ore body would concede that much—a further \$10,000,000 can be added to the above total."

AUSTRIA REFUSES TO GIVE UP BELA KUN

Glasgow, Sept. 12.—The Trades Union Congress adopted a resolution last night calling for the immediate withdrawal of British troops from Russia and for the repeal of the Conscription Act.

STATE OF SEIGE IN CAPITAL OF KOREA

Tokio, Sept. 12.—Seoul is occupied by Japanese troops and is in a state of seige following an attempt on Sept. 2 to assassinate the governor of Korea.

RAIDED SINN FEIN QUARTERS

High Explosives Seized at Derry As Result of Action of Military and Police.

Belfast, Sept. 12.—The police and military raided the Sinn Fein quarters here and at Dublin, Cork and numerous other places simultaneously. Some high explosives were seized at Derry and two Sinn Fein members of the House of Commons were delayed in Dublin.

ILLEGAL FISHING CHARGED AGAINST HAYSPOUT NO. 2 TODAY

In the provincial court this morning before Magistrate McMullin there was a charge of illegal fishing against the Haysport No. 2. Evidence was given for the prosecution by Mr. Curtis and Mr. Weir, both of Lowe Inlet cannery, who said they came upon the boat in Barnard Cove with the seine in the water catching fish. Captain George Selig was the chief witness for the defence and many points of interest about the fishing came up when cross examined by Mr. Patmore. Wm. Vincent and Richard Druken, other members of the crew, also gave evidence. W. E. Williams appeared for the defence.
The court was adjourned for judgment until Monday.

MAKE SNOW ROAD TO BIG MISSOURI

A provincial government party in charge of James P. Suttie, is now engaged in surveying and locating a road to serve the Big Missouri and other properties located in the upper Salmon river valley. The Premier mine road will be used as far as Bunting's Camp, from which point the government road will take a generally northerly direction.
The road will probably have a width of 16 feet with a grade not more than 8 per cent. While it is not expected that construction will start till spring, a commencement of clearing may be expected this fall and a snow road made for winter use.

LEAVE RUSSIA BY THE BALTIC

(Special by G. T. P. Telegrams.)
London, Sept. 13.—Winston Churchill's statement on the policy of the Government in Russia suggests that evacuation will take place, not through the Arctic region but through the Baltic after the attack on Petrograd.

GERMAN GOLD HAS ARRIVED IN LONDON

London, Sept. 12.—Four and a half million pounds sterling in gold or about twenty million dollars, Canadian currency, has reached London from Germany in payment for foodstuffs. Part of this is on the way to Canada.

Labor Congress has Concluded Sessions

Passed Resolution calling Special Conference of Labor Captains to consider Action to Enforce their views on British Government.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
Glasgow, Sept. 13.—The Trades Union Congress has adopted a resolution calling a special conference of the British Captains of labor to consider the form of action to be resorted to should the Government refuse the demands of the Labor Congress for the repeal of the Conscription Law and the withdrawal of British troops from Russia.
The Congress concluded its sessions yesterday after passing a number of resolutions. Two of these were protests against the despotism of alien officials and home rule for Ireland.

PERMITS FOR NEW BUILDINGS

J. H. Pillsbury to Erect Residence on Fourth Ave. and Other Houses Planned.

J. H. Pillsbury has made application to the City Engineer for a permit to erect a residence on Fourth Avenue. Already work has commenced on the excavation for the basement which will be made of concrete. The house will be a substantial one and attractive and will be built at an estimated cost of \$6,000.
Among the recent building permits issued from the office of the city engineer is one to Dr. N. M. McNeil for the erection of a garage on Fourth Avenue. The erection will have a concrete floor and will be built at a cost of \$400.
Mr. Rice, a returned soldier, has received a permit for the erection of a residence on Eighth Avenue about one block east of McBride. Already the piles have been driven and the sills laid, with the work of raising the walls proceeding apace. It will be a one-storey frame building and will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$1,900. The work is being done by Mitchell & Currie as was also the garage.
A permit has also been issued to Horace M. Hale for the erection of a residence on Eleventh Avenue. It will be a one storey and a half structure and will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,500. There are a number of new buildings on Eleventh Avenue and many people are contemplating operations out there in a short time.

Sane Labor and Sane Capitalists.

H. Hulatt, manager of G. T. P. Telegraphs, suggests co-operation between sane labor and sane capitalists. By that he means those who are not extreme. The old order must go, but the new order must not be too great a change from the old, else it is likely to lead to great injustices and tend toward anarchy. There must be progress and courage in tackling the big problems of the day, but there must not be fanaticism.

War Veterans Get Parliamentary Commission.

The Great War Veterans of Canada asked for a Royal Commission to inquire into the question of granting a further honorarium to those who fought overseas. Sir Robert Borden refused to grant what they asked, but under pressure he has agreed to appoint a parliamentary commission to hear evidence and make a report to the Government. The difference between what the soldiers asked and what they received is this:

A Royal Commission is an absolutely independent board of inquiry and usually a judge of the supreme or county court is chosen to act on it. A parliamentary commission is a political appointment. It is a committee chosen from the House during the time it is in session and dying automatically when the House rises. It always has a supporter of the Government as chairman and consists of members from both sides of the house with a majority on the Government side.

Whereas the Royal Commission is likely to give an unbiased report the committee of the House almost always reports in accordance with the views of the government that is in power. It is not necessary but it is likely that the members will be largely influenced by the Government which appointed them and in support of which they vote on all important questions.

Sometimes a committee of the House reports somewhat contrary to the previous expressions of the Government in order to give the Government an excuse for changing its attitude.

Bishop Du Vernet On School Life.

If family life is the nursery of democracy, school life is the gymnasium of democracy. In our thinking about school life we need to get away from the individualistic conception that the public school exists for the purpose of filling up the mind of the individual child with a mass of information, regardless of how this information is put into use in relation to others in the community. Our whole conception of the public school and its function should be controlled by the social purpose which aims at enabling children to grow gradually in the life of mutual service as they ripen into mature citizens of the state and loyal subjects of the Kingdom of God. It is of the utmost importance that in school the children should learn by practice—not that they will become in the future when they are grown up, but that they are now in the living present, ministering members of Society. In school they become sharers of the knowledge and experience of others as members of the one body, and they should early learn that this knowledge is not for their own selfish aggrandizement, but that they in turn may share it with others as they put it to practical use in their life of loyal citizenship.

In their play in the school-grounds, supervised by elders, they enter with zeal into the social life where each must do his best in relation to the others. Team-work is the earliest form of true democracy. Play fair, keep to the rules, because the rules were made with the consent of all for the benefit of all. The bully must be ruled out because he is forcing himself upon others, whereas the true leader among boys has an authority because he leads and inspires others. Here we see where the function of religion comes into the game—inspiring to lofty ideals. It is impossible to keep religion out of the schools. The more religion there is the better, provided it is not a narrow sectarianism, but the religion which inspires brotherly love and mutual service recognizing the Fatherhood of God and the leadership of Christ.

Sport Briefs

Joey Ray of the Chicago A. C. beat the Canadian one mile record in winning the one mile handicap race at the Toronto Exhibition grounds last Saturday in four minutes and two fifths seconds. The best previous Canadian record was four minutes and twenty seconds. The world's record is four minutes twelve and three-fifths seconds. In the mile bicycle race Norman Webster of Alberta was fourth.

Four teams, Regina, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and University of Saskatchewan, will comprise the senior league in the Saskatchewan rugby football union this year. The first games are scheduled for September 27th when Regina plays at Moose Jaw and Saskatoon at the University. The season ends November 1. J. E. Armstrong is president of the union and Bert Scott is secretary.

The Edmonton city and district football association have asked the City Council for a special football ground which will be known as the Municipal Football Field. It has also been asked that the Council should assist the amateur associations as they are not self supporting. In this way young players would be encouraged to take up the healthy sport if accommodation is furnished for the convenience of those taking part.

Only a few of the members of the latter team showed up at the grounds and there was no referee appointed by the association. Fragments of rock and cinders cut in below the skin and medical attention was necessary in order to have them removed. The same thing hap-

pened when Albert Wells hurt his arm. The cinders cut in very deeply and the wound is hard to heal.

One of the biggest crowds that has ever witnessed a football game in this city gathered at the Acropolis grounds to see the performance of the two teams on Thursday evening. Interest has been running very high throughout the league and those who gathered the other evening were more than repaid for their climb to the heights. The shout that arose when the Callies scored their first goal was heard down at McBride Street and Ninth Ave. The wind was blowing in that direction which accounts somewhat for the large volume of sound.

ORE SENT FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Exhibit Represents Whole of the Portland Canal Mining District.

Several boxes of ore samples, for display at the exhibitions to be held this month in Vancouver and Prince Rupert, were taken on the steamer Prince John on Thursday, says the Portland Canal News. Included in the shipment are some of the finest specimens which ever left this part of British Columbia.

During the past few weeks the Portland Canal Prospectors' Association has bestirred itself, and as a result a large amount of ore samples have been on display at the Stewart mining headquarters. Many of these have gone south with Thursday's shipment and they are bound to attract attention. H. F. Gibson, president of the association, and the committee appointed to gather samples from the various sections, have been busy in this direction, and the Portland Canal district is bound to reap a lot of splendid publicity during the annual fairs in the coast cities. Among the samples were some of the native silver being found in other properties as well as the famous Premier.

While the attention of the public just now is focused on the Salmon River section, the ore samples from other sections in this district ought to turn attention to them as well, for it is only a question of time, so mining men declare, when properties up Bear River, the Marmot and other places, not forgetting the Unuk River, will attract as great attention as Salmon River at present.

CHAUTAUQUA CLOSING WITH GOOD CONCERT

Serbian Tamburica's Entertain Large Audience with Varied Program of Music.

There was a good attendance for the closing night of the Chautauqua series of entertainments held this year at the skating rink. While the building was not crowded all the chairs were filled and some of the benches.

The Serbian Tamburica orchestra gave an interesting and varied program and the general verdict was that it was a "rattling good show." The first half was made up partly of operatic selections which were well played. The second was devoted more particularly to the light melodies and more popular airs for which the type of instrument is particularly suited. The audience was very free with its applause and all seemed to be enjoying themselves.

The chief criticism that can be made was that the singing was poor. As, however, the vocal numbers were undoubtedly put in for the sake of variety and were really outside the scope of the orchestra, it is perhaps hardly fair to mention this. On the whole the entertainment was a good one. People went to hear the native Serbian instruments and they were not disappointed.

In the afternoon Miss Attiyeh gave an interesting description of the manners and customs of the people of Turkey and particularly of the women.

INDIAN WIDOW OF ARCHDEACON BACK TO TRIBE

Mrs. McDonald of Dawson Returns to Her People at Peel River.

Dawson, Y. T., Sept. 12.—Mrs. McDonald, widow of the late Archdeacon McDonald, left Dawson on the long journey of 100 miles to the interior to go back to her people and to remain there indefinitely.

Mrs. McDonald is a full blood native Peel River woman. She was married to Mr. McDonald when he was a young missionary in this country. They had several children, including Lieut. Hugh McDonald, who volunteered at Winnipeg and served with distinction through the great war, and died at the close of the war from pneumonia, being survived by a wife and little child. Another son, Kenneth, is with the navy, and a third son, Neil, is a trapper on the Porcupine river. He visited here recently. Archdeacon McDonald lived many years in the Yukon, during which he accomplished the remarkable work of mastering the Takudth Indian language and translating the entire Bible and several hymn books into the native tongue. Those translations are used extensively today by Indians of this realm, and will be used, no doubt, for a long time. Archdeacon McDonald lived for years in Winnipeg after leaving here. After his death, Mrs. McDonald returned to Dawson and has resided here the last four years.

Long Journey.

In making the trip to Peel river Mrs. McDonald will have to walk the full 100 miles overland along the old Indian trail, which is no light task for one of her advanced years. Mrs. McDonald, in her many years of contact with whites has won the esteem of all who knew her. She hopes to join her father's brother in the Peel River country, and says that she does not know when she will return to Dawson, if ever, and that in going back to her native region she hopes to get in the midst of the land where nature supplies many of the wants and where the problem of high cost of living does not press so sorely on those of little means.

AUGUST FISHERIES REPORT TO HAND

During the month of August 13,844,800 pounds of salmon were handled by the canneries of Prince Rupert, and of this quantity 160,219 cases were packed by the cannerymen, says the Vancouver Province. The salmon pack is valued at \$692,220. The trawlers landed 895,700 pounds of halibut on the wharves of that city in the same time. Halibut is worth \$10 a hundredweight and the total value of the catch is therefore \$89,570. Brille comes next with 470,200 pounds valued at \$14,106. Other varieties of deep sea fish were landed in smaller quantities, such as red cod, ling cod, grey

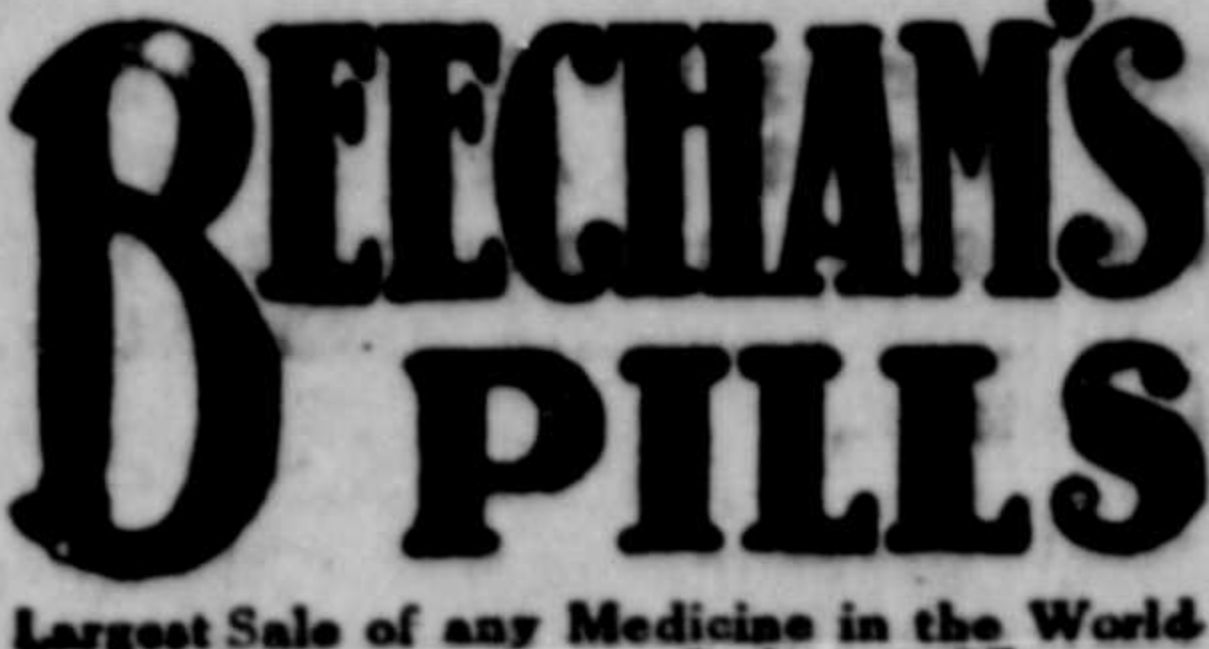
cod to the value of \$1,539, and black cod \$2,440. Over 150 cwts. of plaice, costing \$465, passed through the hands of the fish packers during the preceding month. The American landings during that period were 17,784 pounds of salmon and 4,192,930 pounds of halibut.

The fishery inspector for district No. 3 reports a small run of humpbacks on the Skeena River, while the cohoes are not coming up to expectations. Word received from Skidegate Inlet indicates that the cohoes are appearing on the bar off the mouth of the inlet, and on the Naas River an extra big run of that variety has been noticed recently heading for their spawning grounds. The average daily catch per boat at Kimsquit on September 5 was 17 cohoes, 18 chums and 14 humpbacks. The run of fall fish on Rivers Inlet has been very poor so far.

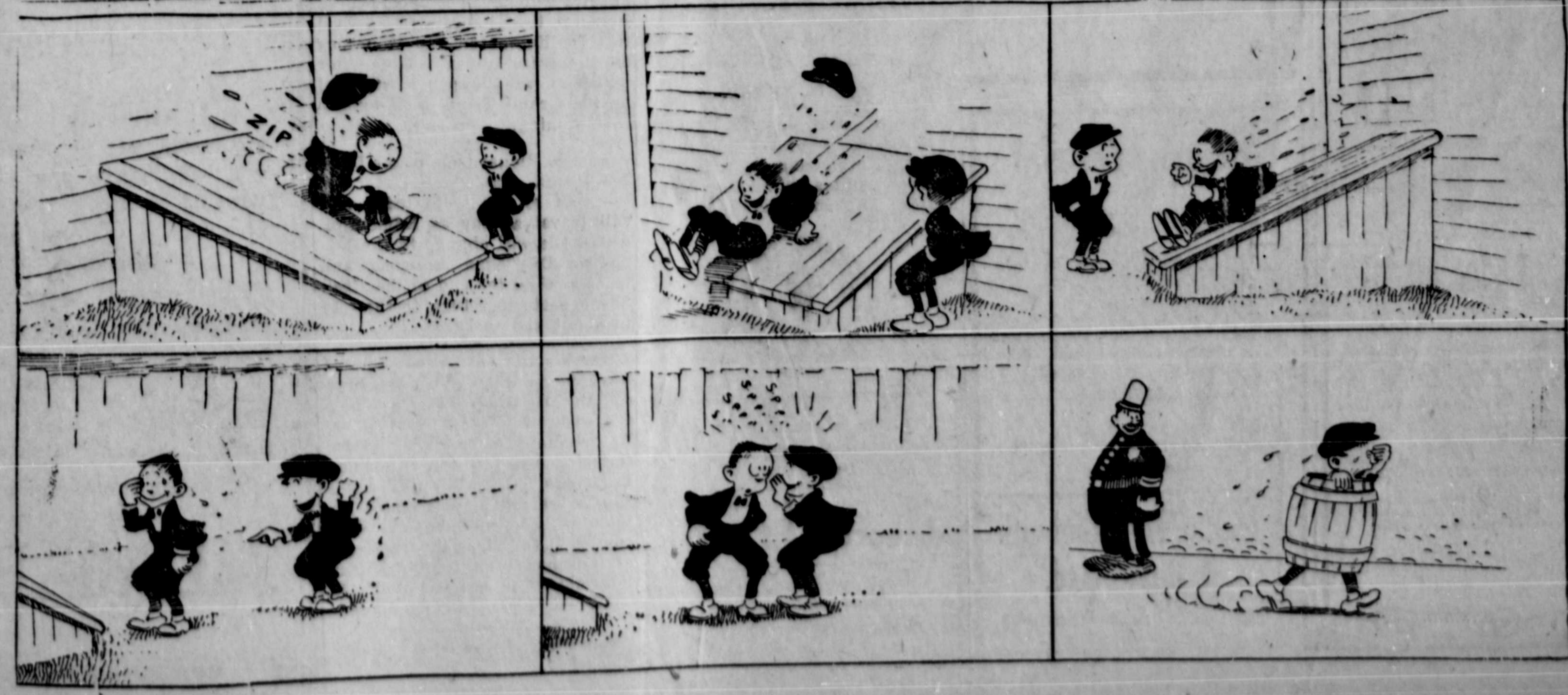
